that Beatle-eared Paul White of Capitol records hawked down on these Sparrows and confined their nesting grounds to the Capitol camp. The boys have contributed a great deal to the task of making the average Canadian aware of the fact that we in Canada have a music industry to be

proud of. The Sparrows are Canadian. Art Ayre is the lead. He is pianist, organist, melodicat, vocalist and composer. Art is a vigorously trained musician who stems from a jazz background. Besides looking after the business end of the group and keeping track of the instruments, he also manages to crack up the boys with his quick wit. He has owned and raced several modified sports cars and at the drop of a cab fare will show you his collection of trophies, his pride and joy.

Jerry Edmonton looks after the drums, blows a mean harmonica, is an important part of the harmony (vocal) of the group and also pens some mighty pretty tunes. Jerry hangs his hat in Oshawa (home) but has been so successful as a musician he now shares a dorm with the rest of The Sparrows. When he's not way out listening to a blues recording, he's way out in space by way of his telescope. He is somewhat of an expert on space. He can give you the name of every constellation in the sky and has followed every blast-off so closely he knows the space ships by their first name.

Dennis Edmonton, brother of Jerry, picks one of the prettiest sounding lead guitars in the business. His singing voice is the strongest and keeps the other voices well paced and in close harmony. Dennis is also the master when it comes to setting down a tune. His bush and specs (beard and glasses) give him that scholarly look which in effect he is. He spent three years studying psychology at university. Of the four he is the most even-tempered. Never angry, very patient, and always happy. His educational and musical achievements can best be described by one of his compositions:



Montreal: Last week we mentioned that a very big company and an equally large advertising agency had arranged a cross country tour of top Canadian recording groups. It turns out now we were a little too premature. The very big company is not so big and the tour has been called off. But it didn't take long for someone to pick our music industry back up off the floor. We under-

stand arrangements are now under way to kick offthis same show in Montreal through the efforts of Lionel Pasen and Dave Boxer. This show will have a completely. Canadian lineup and we can safely predict that when Dave Boxer (The Pied Piper of Montreal) gets behind a promotion it will be the biggest show ever to hit the bi-bi town. A sponsor is standing by, we understand, and if sufficiently impressed will take the show across Canada. This show will be a success in hogtown despite the negative attitude of some of the not so Canadian minded citizens who would use their influence to discourage a show of this magnitude. The chance in a lifetime for our floundering music industry.

J.B. and the Playboys, who are regarded as Montreal's number one group, will be appearing in a movie called "Montage". The boys have been busy gigging in Upper Canada and are fast becoming one of the most popular groups in the area.

Los Angeles: Walt Davis, assistant to Bob Marcucci, sends along news that John Andrea is in New York cutting a session for MGM. Walt also sent along a copy of the new release "Runaway" by Gail Ganley on 20th. Nino Tempo and April Stevens, who are always big favourites in Canada, have released "Think Of You" on Atco. We prefer the flip "I'm Sweet On You". Could be another "Whispering".

New York: Negotiations are under way between Larry Uttal of Bell Records and Stan Klees Productions for the release of "Sloopy" in the US. Release skedded for latter part of July.

Blockpool: The on-again off-again Canadian Rodeo is on again. We understand the show is slated to run in conjunction with the Royal Lancashire Agricultural Show to commence August 1 for eleven weeks. The location is Stanley Park in downtown Blackpool. The BBC will be doing a 30 minute telecast of the show and could reach us through the services of the ''Early Bird'' satellite.

Regino: Barry Dreger, president of the Loreen Church fan club, sends RPM an honourary membership plus news that Loreen will have a new record out some time in August.

Ottowo: Pat Hamilton, president of the Esquires Fan Club, has news that The Esquires have just cut a recording session for Capitol. They are presently playing the Ottawa House in Ottawa and will shortly move on to Brockville for a two week stint. Plans are apparently in the making for the Esquires to make a cross Canada tour linking forces with other top Canadian groups.

Noshville: Ray Griff will be releasing his first on the RCA Victor label the first part of August. The tune "I'll Follow Each Rainbow" by the Blue Boys (RCA) was written by Ray and could make the charts.

The Country Music Association has announced plans to sell an album featuring 25 great country artists. Label and publishing companies involved have waived their rights in order to make the album possible. Artists featured on this LP 'Original Hit Performances'' are Hank Snow, Ray Price, Tex Ritter, Marty Robbins, Buck Owens, Hank Thompson, Merle Travis, Hank Williams, Kitty Wells, Ernest Tubb, Johnny Bond, Johnny Cash, Patsy Cline, Red Foley, Lefty Frizzell, Don Gibson, Pee Wee King, Roger Miller, George Morgan, Bill Anderson, Roy Acuff, Bobby Bare, Eddy Arnold and Jim Reeves. Pressing will be done by Columbia with an initial order of 500,000 copies. The LP will sell for \$2.00 but only through mail orders as arranged on 200 TV Stations and up to 500 radio stations.

Los Vegos: The Personality Plugger has news that The Bits & Pieces, a strong Canadian comedy and instrumental singing trio now at Isy's in Vancouver, are skedded to re-enter the US for a six to twelve week stay at The Gaslight in Hollywood. Several singles and an LP are being readied for Dee Gee Records. It was also interesting to note by way of The Personality Plugger that Ike Cole will be appearing on Art Linkletter's Talent Scout Show. According to reports, the similarity between the voices of Ike and his late brother Nat are almost unbelievable.

Soult Ste. Morie: J.B. and The Playboys and The Big Town Boys, two of Canada's most popular recording groups, made their appearance at the Gardens in the Sault. Reports had it that the advance sales were greater for these Canadian groups than for The Dave Clark Five.

Toronto: Jack London releases his first on the RCA Victor label July 26. "Don't Ever Change" and "Misery and Me" were both written and produced by Jack. The Last Words, a local Toronto group, have been given an assist by Jack and could be preparing to sign with a major recording company.

Fred Roy, prexy of Acadia Records, is getting set to release the biggest new country single ever to hit the market. The artist is Aubrey Hanson, radio personality at CFNB Fredericton. His first single is "Green Hills and Blue Rivers" (Sparton). An LP "Old Fashioned Country Songs" is also being readied for release. Fred also advises that new equipment is being set up for Acadia Records and the hunt is on for new Canadian country talent. All interested parties contact Fred Roy, Box 400, Toronto 19, Ontario.

According to a newspaper report, Jon and Lee and The Checkmates have landed a US TV deal which should net them somewhere in the neighbourhood of \$150,000. The boys will be leaving shortly on a cross country tour boosting the city of Niagara Falls, Ontario. Special two-decker buses have been brought in from England which will be the mode of transport for the group. It is further reported that a major US recording company has reserved a dotted line for the boys.

RPM would like to take this opportunity to welcome the executive, members of the sales staff and distributors of Capitol Records of Canada on the occasion of their annual sales convention being held at the Inn On The Park in Toronto July 19, 20, 21.

On a much smaller scale, but of much more importance to Canadians, comes a 2½ minute film on Canada. The score is written "Something To Sing About" by Oscar Brand. Now, Torontonian, Oscar Winner (film editor-"Target For Tonight") Donald Ginsberg is looking for the appropriate film. He and his assistant, Toni Trow, are busy examining many thousands of feet of film from various film-makers in an attempt to find 90 feet. This is much cheaper than taking a camera crew from Howe Sound to Dingle Beach.

Jim Darra of Darra Enterprises advises that he has made arrangements to produce a recording session for Lynda Lane. We understand back up group will be The Regents with vocal background by The Charmaines.

Record Jottings: Hot on the heels of Disneyland colossus "Mary Poppins" comes news from RCA that Disneyland has adopted the favourite of the 1930's "Winnie-the-Pooh". Although the film is not yet finished and still only about twothirds hand painted the cartoon isn't skedded for release until next Thanksgiving (US) but already the wheels of promotion have been put in motion. A large US department store has tied in with the promotion for a line of youngsters' clothes. By the time the film is released the public will probably be so pre-conditioned to A.A. Milne's loveable bear that the release will no doubt be a chain reaction of success throughout the "50" and will, of course, affect Canada as well.

Columbia records releases "You Don't Want to See Me Crying" by Ross Campbell. This single has the right ingredients to make it a chart item. Ross is well backed up by good experience with the Du-Kanes and the Laurie Bower Singers.

Winnipeg: CJOB led the way in introducing Fre-Modulation quency broadcasting to western Canada and are now leading the rest of Canada in a venture that quite appropriately began on "Canada Day". General Manager R.M. MacLennan advised that "It's a matter of record that many Canadian composers and performers are recognized in the fields of traditional

western, ethnic, country and folk music. Therefore, effective July 1st, CJOB-FM will broadcast a format embracing these four broad music fields." He went on, "This work requires and deserves recognition just as the efforts of Canadian performers in other areas of music and the arts." The Board of Broadcast Governors has given approval for the first major change in FM programming in Canada thus making CJOB-FM the first station to break with the accepted FM programme format to reach out to the largely neglected audience that prefers good traditional and popular music in the country field. Many thanks to Kirk Northcott for supplying us with the above information.

Quebec: Bill Payton, PD at CFOM, has good reason to be proud of his station. Every year, a good number of American warships make Quebec City one of their ports of call, and it's not because of the beauty of the Plains of Abraham or the equally beautiful Chateau Frontenac. It has to do with beauty but La Femme. Each year CFOM have lent their air staff to the navy to run their radio stations on board ship. This year CFOM decided to make this the biggest effort yet. CFOM moved lock, stock and barrel to the destroyer USS Compton and proceeded to broadcast their regular shows from space allotted by Commander T. Stuart. The shows were complete to regular commercial content and music. The station's air personalities took aboard their music and programmed their shows direct from the ship. Interviews with the ship's personnel as well as visitors gave the day's programming that touch of personal interest. Public response was overwhelming and CFOM have been asked by both Canadian Navy officials and the American Consulate to do repeats on other ships making the Quebec scene. This is a first in Canada, in the sense that two complete days of regular station programming originated on board a visiting warship. It also gives our sometimes strained relations a chance to relax.


Ottowa: "Hush Hush Sweet Charlotte" would never get a second reading with our "Dear Charlotte". It only happens for 15 minutes a day, five days a week, but Charlotte Whitton is enjoying more popularity now as a television personality than she did as "the fighting Commander" of the Ottawa City Council. Originating from CJOH-TV, viewers in Ottawa, Kitchener, Montreal and Toronto have granted her show unanimous acceptance. It is hoped that other member stations of this network will see the potential of taking this show for their own area. Miss Whitton is far too entertaining and controversial to be confined to a four city spread.

Learnington: The new DJ line-up for CJSP includes - Johnnie Jay 6-10 a.m. -Craig Cole 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. - Wayne McLean 2-8 p.m. - Don Brown 2-8 p.m. (Sat). CJSP has been number 1 in Essex County for ten consecutive years and dominates with 61% of the audience.

Truro: Graham Wyllie of CKCL sends news that Lynda Layne will be appearing for a week at the Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition September 1st to 5th.

Edmonton: DJ line-up at CJCA boasts Emperor Jim Hault 6-9 a.m. - Scott Cameron 9-Noon - George Payne Noon4 p.m. - Frank Todd 4-8 p.m. - Bob Stagg 8-Midnight - Chuck Chandler Midnight-6 a.m. Bob Stagg looks after "Disc Derby Battle" and "Juke Box Jury" so if record promoters are looking for the right person to send their extra disc to it's obviously Bob Stagg. Other news from the Edmonton area has it that Klondike Days turned out to be one of the successful events of the year for CJCA. The Guess Who appeared at the CJCA Teen Tent during the 6 day show (July 12-17). Wes Dakus and The Rebels were the added special feature attraction for the event.

CHED were also very active for the Klondyke Days Exhibition. The CHED Klondyke Discotheque Show turned out to be a crowd getter with guest star Eddie Rambeau performing several times daily. Eddie's newest is "My Name Is Mud".






We in Upper Canada have always been envious of the French-Canadian market and lately the English-Canadian market in French Canada. From all reports it is quite obvious that if and when the Canadian industry becomes a power in this country, the action will happen first in LaBelle Province. The following letter is evidence of the interest generated by the general

public in Quebec.

"Dear Sir: I would like to tell you about something that happened in Montreal yesterday, June 25. There was a big show of French-Canadian talent here and 225,000 people paid a dollar to see this show. The top Canadian, French-Canadian that is, were there. You may know them; The Classels, Baronets, César et Ses Romains, Tony Roman et Les Dauphins, Les Bel Canto, Les Excentriques, Les Honlops, Têtes-Blanches. There were also singers like Pierre Lalonde, Donald Lautrec, Michel Louvain, Michele Richard, Robert Demontigny, Joel Denis, Jenny Rock and folk singers like Les Cailloux, Les Quatre Vingt etc. This show was presented by radio station CJMS (French). It was held on an open air stage at Jarry Park which was surrounded by a fence for this occasion. Now tell me, where in Canada, where even in the world would so many people go and support their own nation's talent? Why not put this information in one of your books and use it as a lesson to the English-Canadian. The French-Canadian go and support their artists but the English-Canadians don't support their artists in the same way. Then those who read your magazine will say to themselves 'What do French-Canadian have that we don't have?" and they may accept this as a challenge and start supporting English-Canadian talent.
