THE NOT SO-CANADIAN 30% NATIONAL "EX."

Toronto: The Canadian National Exhibition should look seriously into changing the name of the annual exposition to the Toronto Local Exhibition. While Canadians work hard to build a strong nationalistic feeling in Canadians and particularly in the music industry, Local 149 of The American Federation of Musicians in Toronto, has threatened to "yank" Barry Allen and Wes Dakus and the Rebels from the "Under 21 Club" at the not-so-Canadian and only 30% National Exhibition. The Edmonton group, according to the "Under 21" people, has been the biggest draw, but the union has a contract with the Exhibition that says 70% of the musicians employed be from Local 149. Already the plum of the country for musicians, Local 149 has made sure that even the CNE, which is a national exhibition (but unfortunately) housed in Toronto, must abide by a local ruling.

None of the reports from the officials of the "Ex" or the union have bothered to detail the percentage of U.S. musicians employed elsewhere throughout the "Ex".

If the national music picture is to improve in Canada, than the union will have to change their thinking. While a few Canadians are working to kill the rather "sickening" image that Toronto has,

nationally, the union is stepping backward in order to protect their local overfed, overworked members.

No doubt this ruling was freely adapted from a foreign constitution. The possibilities are great that this is another outside instruction. The Toronto local is to be envied for their power in the golden area for Canadian musicians.

One exhibition official apologized that the group was from outside Toronto and claimed they weren't informed by the agent. Indeed this was an oversight by the agency who should have insisted that the group in question show their passport to Tkronto officials. This further indicates that the group would not have been used at all, since the NATIONAL flavour of the "Ex" is but a facade. The "Ex" officials should now move to hold the CNE in a different "LOCALE" each year to assure Canadians a truly NATIONAL exhibition, or the 70% quota should apply to every aspect of the annual affair.

In case this incident should reflect on a lack of nationalism in Toronto, it must be noted that Toronto is, for the most part, quite aware of Canada and musicians outside Local 149. There is no doubt that this situation will not re-occur next year, and it is hoped that Expo 67 doesn't get wind of this ruling and apply it to an even more national show that MIGHT just be another LOCAL affair.

Sonny and Cher arrived in Britain Aug 22 for a series of television tapings and a charity performance before going on for a tour of Continental high spots....Cher's ''I Feel Something In The Air'' is beginning to happen.

Crispian St. Peters has a new single out next week called "Changes". Crispian says it is the most ambitious thing he has ever tried since it involves singing through two octaves. This release was chosen as the strongest item available to follow "Pied Piper".

Philip Industries and associated EMI will jointly release a new type of cartridge here in October. The "tape casette" as it is being named will fit into any Philip's tape deck suited for cartridge loading. The tapes will feature The Walker Brothers, Dusty Springfield, Joan Baez, Cliff Richard and others. The casette will weigh about three ounces and will be about the same size as a cigarette package and will retril here for about \$6.00.

FIGHTING CANADIAN CORONER CBC-TV SERIES



Also starring are Ted Follows as Bateman of the crown attorney's office, detective Byron James is portrayed by Carl Banas and Patricia Collins plays Marty, Wojeck's wife.

Saturday Sept. 17 at 10:30 PM EDT, Canadian viewers will be introduced to folk singers Malka and Joso who will star as performers and hosts of the new CBC-TV series, "A World of Music". Cameron, of the "Newsmagazine" show and Richard Nielsen, of "Eye" will share the putting together of this project. The arrangement is a natural, as both shows follow one another anyway. 10 PM EDT it's "Newsmagazine" with "Eye" following at 10:30. It's hoped the combination will give a strong news and public affairs image for the CBC English network.

Tarzan moves into the CBC-TV network circles beginning Saturday Sept. 10 at 7:30 PM EDT. 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





Mr. G. as much as said to me that he had no comment to make "at this time". My first question was "Where will I fit in under the new structure?" Many U.S. record companies and radio stations who are subscribers to the Music Weekly are now asking for copies of the new RPM 100 chart.

NOT TO BE UPSTAGED BY THESE GREAT NEW DEVELOPMENTS...the Bigland Agency is rumoured to soon not be anymore. The split now seems to indicate the complete disappearance of the name Bigland. Watch for a new agency with an "image-like" name to crop up amidst a number of other strong contenders. It will be a fight for survival of the fittest to give the best service. It is doubtful that the industry or the union will allow another "empire-like monopoly" to twist the arms of the younger musicians. To quote one of the more verbose authorities on this subject, "Like taking candy from a baby."

NOT TO BE UPSTAGED BY EITHER RPM OR BIGLAND....Paul White in his "Sizzle Sheet" (August 26) asks a few pointed questions of C-FUN regarding their newly conceived Canadian policy. I've been saying this all along Paul, but my copy ends up on the cutting room floor. You get my VERBOSITY AWARD of the year. (Ed: She's just discovered the word verbose in the dictionary and she's going to work it to death.) ALL EYES are on C-FUN.

I GOT A NOTE RECENTLY....from the top....that says I have never mentioned The Townsmen in my column. This is not true. I have, in fact, often made reference to this group. Their latest outing on the Phonodisc label of "The Lion Sleeps Tonight" is a great record. It just needs that extra little push to be noticed, and BANG....right to the top of the charts.



THE NON-PROFESSIONAL DISC JOCK. Jocks that run those "Battles" and "Choose the Hit" things should be very careful what they say before and after they play the two records. This is an appalling practise and next time you listen to one of these seemingly "fair" battles, listen to the carefully worded hypes that the DJ uses. This is the first sign of a "lousy DJ", and the reason that "battles" have NO VALUE to the music industry. There are SO MANY offenders. (I think I'll clip the "Predict-A-Hit" ballot from my RPM 100 and send it in.) (Ed: Just to even!!!!!)

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STACCATOS RELEASE NEW SINGLE

The Staccatos have a hit with their latest Capitol single of "Let's Run Away". Toronto, Montreal and Ottawa are giving the disc a fighting chance. Reports from other centres are beginning to shape up as well. Tower, the hot U.S. label will release the disc later this month.

The Townsmen, from Ottawa, are showing signs of chart action with their latest release of "The Lion Sleeps Tonight" on the Regency label. Both The staccatos and The Townsmen have been skedded for an appearance on the CTVer "It's Happening" which is one of the exciting new colour teen shows set for the fall.

Phil Anderson, prexy of Arc Sound, announces that he has signed the Abbey Tavern Singers to a world wide exclusive long term recording contract. Anderson has just returned from Ireland and expects to release an album by these popular singers, who have had so much luck with "Off To Dublin In The Green".

Many of the fast buck artists devised numerous means of capitalizing on the recent Beatle tour. In Cleveland, the day after their appearance at the stadium, there was an ad in the local paper offering 4 microphones at two hundred bucks each. The mikes were apparently part of the Beatle equipment and the reason for the high price tag was the hopes of the sound supplying company to recoup some of the money they claim they lost through thefts etc. One enterprising radio type in Kitchener is offering a disc of the Toronto press release for a buck. Still another has cut up a stage, supposedly used by The Beatles, into 1 inch blocks, attached 24 inch neck chains to his merchandise and got ready to retire.

Shades of "Baby Ruth". Philips have just released a single taken from their newest shaver jingle "Where The Action Is". The single will be used as a giveaway but the company is apparently open for ideas that would put the disc on the charts with the possibility of making it a saleable item. The session was cut at RCA Victor studios in Toronto. Sidemen include Rudy Toth, Don Thompson, Ron Pully, Eddy Brickert, Jim Pirie and Jack Zaza. The tune was written by Dolores Claman and arranged by Rudy Toth. Although the disc is an instrumental, the jingle features Tommy Ambrose and The Willows.

The Carlton Showband are having as much luck with their LP release as they are with their Casl single "The Merry Ploughboy". Arlene King, who is featured on the single as well as the album is from Hamilton. The boys are all from Ireland with the exception of one

who comes from Nova Scotia. They are now working in Toronto and gigging on weekends.

News from Edmonton has it that The King Beezz will be returning to Toronto shortly to tour and to cut another session at the RCA Victor studios. This time they plan to put together an album under the guidance of their producer/manager, Bob Stagg.

The Mersey Brothers, one of the most talented brother acts in Upper Canada, have just signed with Columbia and will have a single on the market before the end of the month. Also from Columbia comes news of the single release of The Five Rising Suns.

Bobby Curtola's trip to Canada's north country resulted in a re-scheduling of his Dawson Creek appearance to two shows so as to accomodate the unexpected crowd. He goes on to visit Yellowknife and other Yukon centres as well as Peace River.

CHARLES-RODDY BEATLE RALLY GIANT BELLEVILLE SUCCESS

Belleville: CJBQ's Dave Charles and WKBW's Rod Roddy teamed up to present a monster Beatle Rally that turned out to be a smashing success. Over 2300 Beatle boosters turned out to vent their denunciation of the magazine that had attempted to smear the Beatle image.

This was the first Canadian American rally of its kind and was given an extra boost by the appearance of Dynavoice recording artist Norma "Walking My Cat Named Dog" Tanega, The Sleepers and King Bees and the Buffalo Rogues.
