# E-NATIONA

With Expo '67 stealing some of the thunder from Toronto's Canadian National Exhibition, plans are apparently underway for the Toronto Fair to lean a little more toward the under 25 crowd. Many are wondering if the C.N.E. will continue its attitude of ignoring the rest of the nation and presenting only local talent. Perhaps the C.N.E. officials could muster up enough courage to re-negotiate existing contracts and toss out those rules that restrict the percentage of non-local Canadian talent used but encourages the use of foreign talent.

Mr. John Holden, manager of publicity for the Canadian National Exhibition announces that "Teens and young adults get fair just for them - at the C.N.E." The "Teenage fair" will, this year, take up the entire floor, forty-five thousand square feet, of the lower west annex of the Coliseum, and will contain exhibits and feature activities and continuous entertainment for the young adults.

The "Teen-age Fair" will feature a Miss Teen Canada Pageant, with the winner picking up an all-expense paid trip to Hollywood as Eastem Canada's Representative in the Miss Teen International Pageant. Sixteen year old Eva Koclik, this year's Miss Teen Canada and sixth runnerup in the Miss Teen International

Pageant, will reign over the fair and crown the new Miss-on August 31st.

There will be 45 fashion shows during the 15 day period, featuring fashions for both male and female. Guest celebrities will include Noel Harrison, male star of "Girl From Uncle", Sally Field of the TVer "Gidget" and The Liverpool Five. Three stages will be set up to present continuous "live" entertainment using top local bands

The big show will commence August 18th and go through to September 4th.

Besides a grand prize award and many hundreds of prizes, there will be free dancing, movies and games.



The fact that Admiral Robble Dale uses the side as a theme on Radio Caroline South, also helps the promotion and exposure//John Corbett tells us that Mary Wells was a knockout at the London Bag O' Nails during my absence in Canada. Apparently the club had to turn away thousands who wanted to hear this fantastic girl///Roy Orbison is back in town for a nationwide tour, which is happening in a big way. Apparently Roy is looking for a London Home. Could

it be that Roy wants to do more work in this land?///cat Stevens has a big follow-up to "Mathew And Son" happening here in the U.K. On Deram it is "I'm Gonna Get Me A Gun". This side is already clocking it on the big national chart listings///Other strong sides to watch are Jeff Beck's "Hi Ho Silver Lining", "Ha Ha Said The Clown" from Manfred Mann, and "Al Capone" by Prince Buster's All Stars//Princess Margaret was seen dancing with DJ, personality Simon Dee (originally from Ottawa) at the Carl Allan Awards party in London. Spencer Davis was presented with the award for the best newcoming group, by the Princess///The Otts Redding soul tour was a smash success in the U.K. The tour was arranged by the Emperor - Rosco, from Radio Luxembourg///New on the schedule for the tour season is the Beach Boys return in May///That's it from the "in" scene from London town.



CKBC-BATHURST - Denny Menard picks "Buy For Me The Rain" - Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, "The Way I Feel" - Gordon Lightfoot, "Me Minus More" - The Skaliwags. The Northern Light reported that Denis Menard's "Canadian Showcase" which is heard each Monday over CKBC, will undergo a few changes, mainly the featuring of more national talent. Apparently the local groups have entered into a bit of squabbling which makes these changes necessary.

CKFH-TORONTO - Librarian, Anne Lee, picks "Buy For Me The Rain" - Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, "Can't Seem To Make You Mine" - The Seeds, "Looking At A Baby" - The Collectors CKFH has started their new "Chickenman" series and are the only foronto radio station authorized to carry this series which is heard 5 times daily. New personality at FH is Don O'Neil, who will take over the 10 AM to 3 PM time slot. Barry Nesbitt will now move into the realm of armchair

CFOM-QUEBEC - Bill Payton picks "Barefootin" - Larry Lee. Montreal's Haunted hit the French speaking capitol with a SRO crowd at St. Lawrence College and really set the place on its ear. The Rank Organization, another Montreal group, played the Ville a couple of times and drew capacity audiences. In recent months several Montreal based groups have played the Ville, all with success. Ontario groups, on tour, should take a new look at Quebec, when they think of one nighters."

CJKL-KIRKLAND LAKE - Doug Williams picks "Whiskey Man" - The Who, "Lovin' Sound" - Ian & Slyvia. "Ain't Nobody Home But Me" - The British Modbeats.

CJRL-KENORA - Rick Hamilton picks "That's The Tune" - The Vogues, "Money" - Main Line, "Don't Make Promises" - Susan Taylor. Rick has just returned to his old stamping grounds of Kenora from CKPR in The Lakehead. New staff additions at RL include Wayne Kooman and a local boy, Mike Richards. Dave Gorden, a local, is now workfull time at the station.







MacDonald Waltz", "John Diefenbaker Polka", "Lester Pearson Clog" and others. Johnny Mooring also comes through with a fiddlin' album on Banff. You know that Johnny is the only fiddler in the sixteen year history of the North American Fiddling Championship to win the title three years in a row.

Well, Penelope went bar hopping last week, thanks to Jack Thibeault, who happens to be the manager of Diane Leigh and Johnny Burke. We only went to one bar, The Horseshoe and I was certainly impressed. This must be the biggest bar of its kind in Canada and done up well in the country tradition. Owner Jack Stark brings in the best in country talent, both American and Canadian. Jim Brown, RCA Victor recording star was holding forth last week, and he is one beautiful talent. He had the audience with him from the start. He mentioned to me that Roy Penny was the finest guitarists he's had the pleasure to work with and that Johnny Burke is high on his list of favourite Canadian country singers. You might be interested in knowing that Jim Brown has just released his second RCA Victor album. It's called "Just Jim". I'd like to see them take "What Does It Take" off the album and make a single out of it. Nice to see the RCA Victor folks there, Ed Preston and Walley Jamieson. It sure makes an artist feel good to see his

record people in the house on opening night. There's a young gal name of Norma Gail who plays in the house band at the Horseshoe and she's one of the best country gal singers I've heard in sometime. One thing I wish she wouldn't do, and that's the solo bit during intermission. She's a great talent but it's not fair to put her up front by herself.

Russ Wheeler has a new one, on Melbourne. It's titled "Hello Operator" and it looks like it's headed for the charts.

I'm pushing Cousin Ed: to get on with those stories on The Mercey Bros and Ted Daigle and he tells me that I can do the Mercey Bros next week which is good timing because I notice where their "Uncle Tom" single is even showing up on some of the pop charts.

BILL PAYTON-CFOM-Quebec


"A pretty ballad for late night listening. Should find a place on most country playlists, and with enough exposure should become a charter."

#### RCA & CBC Release 17 Canadian Albums

Montreal: To commemorate Canada's Centennial, RCA Victor, in conjunction with the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation International Service, has released a collection of seventeen albums, devoted to the music of Canada.

The announcement was made by George Harrison, vice president and general manager of the record division of RCA of Canada, who described the release as one representing the classical contribution of Canadian writers over the past hundred years and by this release hopes to bring international recognition to these writers.

This very expensive project which covers the works of 32 composers is the first attempt by Canadian interests to make Canadian classical recordings available for the world market on a commercial

There are 42 works included in the release, mainly by living composers. There are performances by the CBC Toronto Chorus and Symphony, the McGill Chamber Ork, the Chamber Ensemble of the Winnipeg Symphony and others. Soloists include violinists Hyman Bress, Steven Staryk and Marta Hidy, cellist Peggie Samson, flautist Dirk Keetbass, organists Kenneth Gilbert and Hugh McLean and pianists Charles Reiner, Malcolm Troup, Victor Bouchard and Renee Morisset.

Included in the release will be a number of performances of works by Beethoven, Brahms, Britten and others.

In keeping with the Canadian theme, each album cover is a reproduction of a piece of art by a Canadian artist. Also included in each album is an information piece on the composers represented in the album.

Both RCA, through advertising and company promotion, and the CBC, through their radio and television outlets throughout the world, will make a concerted effort to bring this project to the attention of people, not only in Canada but those in every comer of the world.


