Don't despair bunky, it could happen to you and maybe it has, and what did you do about it, and what do you think this group will do about it.......? You can be sure.....NOTHING!

Remember Teak Wood? He's got himself together a bunch of chips. Madison Cassis on bass; two leads, Robert Burr and George Pliakes; Roman Huzar on drums; sax, George Waters; trumpet, Micky Kay; and a surprise organist you'll hear about when Teak Wood and The Chips make their first appearance.

John Pozer's group The Five D are doing so well in Toronto they're fame has spread to Sudbury where they've just picked themselves up a fantastic booking through Music & Artists Placement Ltd.

Don't forget to look in on the CBC-TV's Vancouver "Let's Go" on Friday Jan 12 (5:30 PM). That's when you'll see The Poppy Family, and if any of you promoters are interested in booking this fantastically talented and handsome trio you can drop a line to Doug Miller at Jaguar Enterprises in Vancouver.

Received a few enquiries about The Fringe. Quality's latest big Canadian find, who are currently happening with "Flower Generation". After playing a couple of dates at the El Patio (21-22), they'll move up to St. Theresa High School, in Midland for a Dec 30 showing.

Here's another Toronto group that's going to be busy over the holiday, A Passing Fancy will be appearing at the El Patio, in Toronto's

Village from Dec 23rd through Dec 26. They're also making a strong showing with their Columbia single of "The People In Me".

Watch for some action from the long time dormant Lakehead.

Lexington Avenue are the latest to head for the recording scene. They'll have their RCA Victor release going for them the first of January. It's called "Bird Collector" and "Flowing Kind Of Feeling". Tom Horricks is the sax player; Dan Brown is on lead guitar; Peter Demian, bass; Doug Muncaster, drums; and Joey Stapansky is on organ. If you recognize a couple of them as being with The Plague, you're right.

Montreal is about to happen again. We were beginning to think that with the breaking up of M G & The Escorts all was lost, but not so. Glenn Grecco and Bill Bryans have joined with Gary Hines to form a new vehicle of "musical expression". They're called Theodore's Smokeshoppe and they're opening at the Coal Bin in downtown Montreal on Dec 21. Mel McCormick, one of the best personal managers in the business is looking after their affairs, so how can they lose.

Here's a year ender that needs a little notice. A certain south central Ontario radio station is pleading for Canadian records. Seems they got so used to filing all domestic product in the garbage can they forgot they had to renew their licence and how can they impress the BBG with proof of Canadian content when they don't have any Canadian content discs in their library? I have a copy of a letter that this radio station sent to a booking agency advising that they would not program any Canadian efforts because they just didn't come up to the standards of foreign product. Cha cha cha.

"I'LL MAKE YOU A STAR, BABY"

Recently I was criticized for not doing an article on personal managers because I was a personal manager. Although the press constantly refers to me as a manager or agent, I have never been a personal manager nor have I had any kind of a management contract with an artist. I hasten to add "any kind of a management contract" because often a personal management contract is disguised as a "music director contract", "promotion and publicity contract", "a direction contract" and the many other names that are used including "business manager". I can therefore talk as an outsider and add that there are numerous areas that I have not touched, but in due time, I will attempt to cover the entire spectrum of artist administration.

In this article I will be dealing with those colourful fellows who with their "Madison Avenue approach" will tell you, "I'll make you a star, Baby. Sign here". Your first question should be "How much will it cost me?" and remember a percentage of what you make isn't nothing. You might find yourself with 15% of what you make as a take home pay. That's something. It is 85¢ on every dollar that you might be paying out for a fast trip up the stairway to the stars.

Don't get me wrong there is nothing wrong with having a PM, but you have to pick him as carefully as you pick your next axe. He may be with you for a long time.

There are many many excellent PMs in the business and they do a great job. It isn't necessary to warn you about the GOOD ones, but I think you should be put on guard against the bad ones. To prove how volitile a situation this can be, I can give you living examples of groups that have been conned into contracts by the smooth talking, nicely garbed young man about town who will paint a beautiful picture for you as he receives calls from the big A&R men and DJs in the U.S.A. (really his girlfriend phoning on a pre-arranged signal to impress you with his connections.)

Often the personal management pitch comes after you are recorded FREE (they have paid for the studio) but in the long run the studio costs are against royalties and puffed up quite a bit. THAT isn't free by any means. Anyway you have laid down this great sound, and all the PM's flunkies crowd around to congratulate you on your "hit sound". The next line is "I just spoke to Hotshot Harry, the local radio station music director and I have him wrapped around my little finger (sound familiar???) and he's heard the tape and he can't wait to put it on the air. He does what we tell him to, baby, we got him BOUGHT". (Sound familiar???)

""We pay for everything. We'll advance the money for everything and collect it out of your gig money". You probably didn't believe that many of the big groups end up with \$30 a week from their great success. When you work it out, you'll see that that's just about what will be left after you pay all the high priced help you've hired for your success.

"COME ONE! COME ALL! GATHER 'ROUND while I tell you about what we have to offer under one roof. We will record you, book you, manage you, promote you and many many other things (including ROB you) and there is no pain, no strain, just SIGN here, and here, and one more.....HERE! Don't worry these are standard contracts. Look how well the LIMBLESS REPTILES are doing, they're booked every night. Just sign all those forms".

If I were an artist, I would like to be managed by a "personal" manager. My own representative who would work and invest in me or my group exclusively. I wouldn't want to be tied into a stable of performers or a factory complex. In the area of management, I think there must be an exclusiveness and a creative urge on the part of the mentor that would lead me to believe that since my life is dedicated to success in the entertainment business, his should be dedicated to me. His connections and knowledge of the business would have to be far reaching and (in Canada) international. I would have the contract I was about to sign scrutinized by an expert. I would ask for all the disadvantages to be outlined to me by the expert. I would consider the PMs promises last. I would consider the marriage that was about to take place first. I would like to know who my "brain" will be for the next number of years and what he is really like. I would investigate every area of his past experience and carefully evaluate any criticism of his past. I would NOT sign on the spot no matter how honourable he seemed to be. There is always time to check out a move as important as signing with the man who will be your master for possibly the next five to seven years and in the pop music business even one year wasted is too much, and now the MEAT of my whole article:

YOU PROBABLY WON'T MAKE ONE PRECAUTIONARY MOVE BEFORE YOU SIGN (because of the "stardust").

The Jefferson Airplane has finally landed with "After Bathing At Baxters" (RCA Victor). For the past six months the group has occupied RCA's Hollywood studio, working day and night to put out this electronic masterpiece. The album concentrates on heavy psychedelia, rather than the smooth tunes featured in "Surrealistic Pillow". The Airplane's last single "The Ballad Of You And Me And Pooneil" and their current "Watch Her Ride", are included with nine other original selections.

The controversial Janis lan is back with a new album, "...For All The Seasons Of Your Mind". (Verve/Forecast). Janis is a good singer and the lyrics in most of her self-penned songs are clever and authentic. One of the selections "And I Did Ma", is way out. It's one-two-three waltz rhythm and vaudeville band sound livens up the serious album. The packet winds up with "Insanity Comes Quietly To The Structured Mind", a song that follows in the footsteps of Janis Ian's controversial hit, "Society Child''.

One of Albert Grossman's newest discoveries is Richie Havens. His album "Something Else Again", (Verve/Forecast) shows that Grossman possibly has another Bob Dylan on his hands. Havens not only plays the guitar but is also the master of such Indian instruments as the sitar, tamboura and bongos. Standout selections are "No Opportunity Necessary,

on "Run, Shaker Life" It's A&M month again. Herb Alpert is now on equal basis with Beethoven. His new album, "Herb Alpert's Ninth", at least equals Beethoven's nine symphonies in number. The cover itself is original with a drawing of Beethoven wearing a sweatshirt with Alpert's picture on it. Because of the various selections, the album can be enjoyed in a

No Experience Needed", "New City" and "Don't Listen To Me". Two of The Paupers, Skip Prokop (drums) and Denny Gerrard (bass) help Havens

discotheque or at siesta time. "The Happening", "A Banda" and "Flea Bag'' are arranged in true Tijuana Brass style. Sounding like Alpert's album is Julius Wechter and The Baja Marimba Band's "Fowl Play" Recent hits, including "Windy", "She's Leaving Home" and "The Look Of Love" are exceedingly well done./Another A&M album that deserves chart space is "Misty Roses" by The Sandpipers.

The Five Americans' third album "Progressions" (Abnak) presents the group's fine vocals in a uniquely moving collection of originals including "Stop Light", "Rain Maker", "Zip Code" and "Evol-Not Love".

Also included are The Young Rascals' "Come On Up" and "Somebody Help Me" by The Spencer Davis Group. This is their best to date./Jon & Robin's first album, "The Soul Of A Boy And Girl" (Abnak) is appropriately titled "The Duo Souls" on rhythm and blues favourites like "I Found A Love", "Midnight Hour" and "Hold On, I'm Coming". Included are Jon & Robin's three singles, "Do It Again, A Little Bit Slower", "Drums" and "I Want Some More".

Other good album releases are "The Magic Garden" (Soul City) by The Fifth Dimension, "Try It" (Tower) by The Standells and "Our Family Portrait'' (Buddah) by The Five Stairsteps & Cubie.



The Standells will release their "Try It" album for Sparton the latter part of this month.

The pre-Christmas week around town offered a host of entertainment. Appearing at the Imperial Room of the Royal York Hotel was Ottawa's own master, mimic-comic, Rich Little. Little returned to the Imperial Room with a whole new bagful of impressions. Little's fantastic repertoire includes over 140 voices.

Pop singer, Bobby Vinton, played for one week at the Club Embassy (11). Vinton has graduated from the teen image into a swinging sophisticated performer. He pleases his record fans by doing a medley of their favourites; "Blue Velvet", "Roses Are Red", and "Mr. Lonely", among others. However, Vinton has a much wider appeal and displays his talents with standards like; "Teach Me Tonight", "Please Love Me Forever", and a swinging arrangement of "A Very Good Year". To further display his talents he ends his performance with solos on the clarinet, tenor sax and trumpet.

"The Impossible Years" at The Royal Alexandra Theatre, stars Sam Levene, who plays the part of a psychiatrist up against the younger generation. Excellent comedy, and will continue to run into the new year.

A world premiere piano concerto was given by composer Reg Wilson at the Cave-A-Bob on Yonge St. Wilson has been appearing nightly at the Cave for the past month playing jazz piano (see RPM Dec 16/67). Mr. Wilson wrote the concerto 11 years ago and it has recently been scored for a 95 piece orchestra. The orchestra of course was not at the Cave, so Wilson played the complete score on the piano. I was very impressed. It is in sonata form, in three movements. The Symphony of the New World Orchestra will perform it at Carnegie Hall next year with Benjamin Steinberg conducting and Reg Wilson as guest soloist. Wilson is Montreal born, residing in New York.

'Married Alive'', a new Broadway-bound musical at the O'Keefe Centre for two weeks starred Vincent Price and Patricia Routledge. It is all about a famous painter who impersonates his deceased butler in order to escape from being knighted. It wasn't nearly as bad as the critics put it down to be. The one fault I found was the length of the first act, which was a little laggy and slightly overwritten. Miss Routledge was excellent, and Mr. Price's superb acting overshadows his singing ability. In approximately six weeks ''Married Alive'' will open on Broadway. By that time it will have been shortened and speeded up considerably and no doubt, a hit. I predict two hit songs from it; "I've Got A Rainbow Working For Me", and "Let's See What Happens".

The Toronto Symphony and the Mendelssohn Choir performed their annual Christmas concert of Handel's "Messiah" at Massey Hall (18-19). The orchestra was conducted by Elmer Iseler and guest soloists were; Lois Marshall, Nancy Greenwood, Leopold Simoneau and Louis Quilico, An excellent performance by all, of this great work. I never miss this presentation, and each year I enjoy it more.

T.S.O. fans were overjoyed at the announcement by the Board of Directors of the Symphony that Seiji Ozawa has signed as Music Director and Conductor of The Toronto Symphony through the 1969 season. Mr. Ozawa was first engaged as Music Director of the orchestra for the 1965-66 season following his debut as guest conductor in January of 1964

I have talked to Old Ed: and I have been promised that in 1968 my column will be more dynamic and possibly with this column you may see the change./// A current survey of top acts for awards (not in RPM) conveniently lists the acts you can vote for and asks you to add your favourites, but it is obvious that the conveniently listed acts are very helpful when choosing./// A TOP gigging group in the Toronto area are having management troubles. The problem is a lack of bookings. The real problem is a laxity to pay their debts and the word has got around.///A certain Toronto publicist is passing out unofficial press releases "out of school" and I want to remind him that that's MY department!!!!!///There are ten companies in Canada releasing Canadian talent. Why would a radio station tie in with one company to help promote their talent. Wouldn't it LOOK BETTER to spread it around.....JUST to make it LOOK better.///Toronto's answer to No. 1 radio isn't working out as well as the people who helped with the big push were hoping it would. The station has acquired the usual "sideline" dance promoting and group promoting and that is one area that the BBG neglected to cover in their regulations.///Then there's the story about the musician who took a trip and never came back....to his group!! ///I refuse to believe that space in a Toronto chart is being sold with the PROMISE of airplay, but that is the rumour that is circulating.....so I'll force myself to believe it!!!//My plaudits to the Coke people who have done so much for Canadian groups. Coke is the company who looked ahead and had the foresight to swing with domestic talent across Canada with their jingles.///The group sound on TV sometimes has a great deal lacking and it is about time the OTHER network worked harder to get something that sounds reasonable to improve their star's image!!//Music critics are very important, but when you find a whole entertainment department led by a jazz enthusiast, you may find a whole nest of down critics when it comes to music other than that THIN area of jazz. The pop music scene didn't end in the forties, there is a whole set of new rules and a youthful approach to the reviewing of today's music might be in order or possibly a sane approach to the readers of tomorrow who are temporarily interested in the music of today. Then there is the pop music columnist who must have landed here from the moon and is just discovering the Monkees are fair game for a reader reaction. THAT is the responsible position a newspaper might put itself in when someone at the top must dig jazz and jazz is dying at an even faster rate because of monotony. ///When voting in the RPM annual awards, please remember that only the official ballot will be honoured. All other ballots will not be considered in the tabulation.

A recent article in a daily paper regarding the prevalence of PAYOLA in Toronto leads me to ask the following questions. Was the promo man so green he was trying this for the first time or had he tried it before and if so, what happened then? Can a disc jockey really be bought this CHEAP? Does this answer the question as to whether there is payola or not, and if it implies there is then isn't this reason enough for a ROYAL COMMISSION ON PAYOLA - IMMEDIATELY with all the facts about this incident made available to the commission? The trade will be watching to see which promo man is let go on account of this incident since it casts a shadow of doubt on the whole industry and the veracity of record companies. Perhaps someone should refer to Section 368 of the CRIMINAL CODE OF CANADA.///I, Elvira Capreese would throw any record promo man out on his ear and thrash him severely for offering me the PALTRY sum of \$20 to hype a record.///HAPPY NEW YEAR.

Stampeders Sign With MGM IN U.S.

Toronto: The Stampeders, currently holding down the number one spot on the Canadian hits chart for the third straight week have been signed by MGM Records for all further releases.

On December 14th., Robert Morgan, Executive Producer of Artists and Repertoire operations for MGM, jetted in from New York to finalize arrangements with the groups manager, Mel Shaw. Negotiations were started before the groups first release was on the market in Canada and with the success of "Morning Magic" on MWC showing the groups ability to gather chart action on a national scale, Mr. Morgan expressed confidence in The Stampeders entry into the American market.

Commenting on "Morning Magic", Mr. Morgan stated that "It is still rising on several Canadian charts and it could pick up a few more major centres yet. We are setting up their initial recording session for MGM from the 15th through the 19th of January in New York".

The groups material will be produced by Music World Creations, with Bob Morgan supervising their work. Songs written by the group are being readied for their first MGM session.

Details on the contract were not made public but it is known that the group is extremely pleased with all details and considerations involved. Their well planned career has taken another important step toward international recognition and now moves into high gear with the help of

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

THIS WEEK SPECIAL REPORT FERRANTE & TEICHER by Frances K. Smookler

It is always a pleasure to see and hear true professionals at work. That is how the T.S.O. penetrates the senses; talented, dedicated and well rehearsed they can span the complete range from a sharp, clear 83-voiced whisper to a volume which can almost drown one in delicious sound (but what an exciting way to go). Whether the credit for their performance on Saturday night (December 2nd) belongs to their regular conductor Seiji Ozawa or the guest conductor who handled them that night, Niklaus Wyss, I cannot say but someone deserves an extra special commendation.

Their opening selection was Leonard Bernstein's overture to his opera "Candide". Bernstein does not despise the use of schmalzy passages and neither did the T.S.O. but both of them know when enough is enough and the effect was never allowed to become overpowering.

Whether it was labelled as such or not the evening was a pop concert and the next selection was that old warhorse, Liszt's "Les Preludes". This is a piece which has been played by so many orchestras and heard by so many audiences that one tends not to listen - that is, unless it is played as brilliantly as the T.S.O. did it. As one is drawn into the sound, sensations whirl and swirl around inside the head in exciting rapidity, satisfying all the senses. Only the precision bowing of the strings and the controlled power of the entire orchestra permitted this effect but, in the hands of this group, it revived the old warhorse and turned it into a prancing stallion.

After this warm-up we were introduced to Ferrante and Teicher. Both have thick brown hair, horn rimmed glasses and they wore identical blue and black evening jackets. Although the facial resemblance is not that of twins yet one does not know which is which without some sort of photographic identification and they heightened this anonymity by changing pianos every time they walked on stage or stood up together and alternating whenever an announcement or any other spoken business was



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called for. Even as they were playing they seemed to alternate between melody and rhythm and their opening selection, a medley of Steven Foster songs, gave them the opportunity to change places on the melody with each song. They followed this with "Malaguena", "What Now My Love", "Work Song", and the "Theme From Exodus", and were most unexciting until they reached "Work Song" (which, while it can be bad can hardly be dull) on which they began to show the fireworks that the orchestra had reached without them. Their last rendition in this set came through loud and schmalzy and left me colder than this very sentimental, minor key piece had ever left me before.

After the intermission the "boys" returned but without the orchestra which had accompanied them in their first set. They were dressed in garnish gold snake-skin jackets and Ferrante (or perhaps it was Teicher) commented "Some people hang their gold records on the wall....". The "movie-theme-team", as Teicher (or perhaps it was Ferrante) said they were often called, then played the theme from "The Apartment, "Strangers In The Night", "Comedy Tonight" (from "A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum"), "The Shadow Of Your Smile", "Born Free", "Lara's Theme" (from "Doctor Zhivago"), the theme from "The Magnificant Seven" and "West Side Story's", "Tonight". And through it all the whole sequence lacking, for me, any dimension - the audience loved

I began to see what brought the fans out in a medley from "The Sound Of Music", which has begun to bore me of late. At the four hands of this very well integrated team it was surprisingly good. They supplied the missing dimension by not echoing one another as they had frequently done up to this point but taking totally different roles so that one could almost have been said to have provided full orchestration for the other.

As their final act (and I use this word advisedly) they set up their pianos with gadgets for an original composition of their own. A clever use of the pianos' strings was made by both plucking and banging them directly as well as affecting the tone achieved directly from the pianos' own keyboards. They made their final bows to much applause after which many of the audience who had apparently come to see them walked out.


As for me I was thrilled to see the T.S.O. return at long last making us fall in love once again with Gershwin's poignant and beautiful suite from "Porgy And Bess".

Guest conductor Niklaus Wyss, who performed most ably for the too short time he was on stage really made the whole evening swing. He has the Old World virtues of complete professionalism, discipline, courtesy and patience, deferring to the guest artists whenever he accompanied them, combined with the New World attributes of enthusiasm and the ability to throw himself completely into conducting. His body was never still and he would frequently lean forward so far that he was balancing himself on one foot and the toes of the other but this mannerism never became affected and served only to make you realize that he was conducting the whole orchestra with his entire body.

For that matter the orchestra itself was a treat. I would advise any musician to see them at least once a year to understand the type of professionalism which must be achieved before liberties can be taken with musical discipline.

Ferrante and Teicher are spectacular and flashy but the T.S.O. is brilliant.

Thank you, fellow D.J.s, for your reaction to my last article. By reacting that strongly you have proven that the truth struck home, and it

Usually, if someone unjustly condemns you, you ignore him. But, on the other hand, if the criticism strikes home, it's human nature to fight back and try to prove the accuser wrong. And that's exactly what you bums have tried to do. Unfortunately your protestations of innocence have served only to accentuate the magnitude of your sins.

REPENT NOW!

It's obvious that radio station managers in a one station market don't give a damn about the quality of their announcers. You've undoubtedly heard the saying that "a radio station is a license to print money". Ask yourself who the heck is getting that money. Not the announcers, baby. And as long as these so-called "small-town D.J.s" are willing to work for glory and/or listener adulation the situation is not about to change.

There are exceptions, naturally. One of them is in Quesnel, B.C. Quesnel is one of the smallest markets in Canada, and yet the combination owner/manager/announcer/janitor, Denny Reid, has established a hard core of "pro" announcers. I mention especially Bob Leckie, Gil McCall,

and of course Denny himself. I'm sure that Denny still has one or two kids doing rock portions of the station's programming, but I'm equally sure that they are learning a lot about broadcasting, and that they are receiving a decent wage for beginners. When one punk kid I know of started in Quesnel about five years ago CKCQ paid the know-nothing creep \$225 a month.

Other stations bring young school kids in, pay them as little as possible, and teach them nothing about the business.

It would be futile, however, to march up and down in front of your local station with placards proclaiming "END EXPLOITATION OF AN-NOUNCERS NOW". That won't work. Concentrating on your own development will. Improve your personal programming to the point that either the local station will realize your value, or another market will.

A step toward improving yourself would be to gather all the information you can through trades, newsletters, and personal contact, about other D.J.'s activities.

Assimilate the better ideas and then develop some of your own. Exchange airchecks and ideas with other jocks. Wouldn't it be a gas to have a D.J. convention?

As I mentioned earlier, managers seem to be satisfied with adequate announcers. It's up to you to improve yourself, and claiming that your listeners are satisfied with you is not an indication of your progress. But it is indicative.

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
