To say "Thank You" to the Canadian music industry will probably be taken by many to be facetious on the part of a magazine that has continually pointed up the inadequacies of the industry. But, we must insist, we are sincere in thanking those, who have been with us since the beginning, and to extend our thanks to those who have joined in our support over the past few months.

We at RPM can reflect with much satisfaction, the events of the past five years, and feel that we have contributed somewhat to the growing recognition of our industry by both the Canadian public and throughout the world.

Whether the going was rough is beside the point. Most important is the realization that we have been here for five years and the accomplishment, however slight, is still measurable.

There have been those who have fought our policy of "Buy and recognize Canadian talent". Fortunately the industry has now reached a point where these people can be pushed aside for the more healthy thinking of those who believe in the support of domestic product for the good of the national economy.

Fortunately, for our industry, the end has come to

the unfair concept of marketing whereby a record company would pick up a master and throw it out on the market with little or no respect for the time, effort or expense involved. Record company execs have also come to the realization that the old adage of "They'll play it if it's good" actually points up the inadequacy of the promotion man or A&R director responsible for the furthering of the product.

The struggle of the first five, and the reaching of this summit, is by no means an indication that the battle has been won. We are representatives of a very fast moving industry. Our very presence each week (we haven't missed a deadline since February 24th. 1964) is not sufficient. The behind the scenes effort of putting out our "funny looking paper" would be a very strong storyline for an interesting book — the non-support and avoiding by, both major and minor interests — the lack of communication — the complaints etc. etc. But, we have our happy moments — the growing circulation — the international recognition of RPM — and, of course, we sleep well at night, which is more important than profit or personal gain.



Canada's Top Male Vocalist - Andy Kim

"Andy Kim", reads the press re-lease, "an unlikely blend of the Far North and Near East, is an intense, inquisitive and concerned young man'.

Being as we like to "tear apart"

bio-press releases, so as to get into the meat of the matter, we prefer to start with: "We remember Andy Kim well.......'. It was back in 1964



when Andy Kim first came on the scene with a 20th Century Fox single of his entitled "Give Me Your Love" He didn't win any prize for this recording but he picked up a great deal of respect from the industry, generally, for his dogged determination in personally promoting this single in a country where Canadian talent was and still is, measured by the amount of action received in the U.S.

From his home in Montreal.

throughout the surrounding Quebec countryside and into Upper Canada, Kim kept banging on doors. He met one disappointment after another but continued to hang on long after most young recording artists would have packed it in.

Much of the credit, and indeed financial healing, is due Andy's brother Joe, who was the sustaining force in Kim's long and unrewarding adventure with the Canadian recording industry.

It wasn't until an American, name of Jeff Barry, became interested in the young Montrealer and signed him to his own label, Steed Records, that things began to pop. Kim, by the way,

was the first artist signed to Steed.

Their first recording 'How'd We
Ever Get This Way' was a smash in 1968, and because it had the U.S. stamp of approval, became a big hit in Canada, with a large sized promo push from Quality Records.


Once established as a chart topper, which he did in both countries, Kim's follow-up "Rainbow Ride" and his album, under the same title, have become top sellers in Canada.

It should be noted that Andy Kim divides his time between Montreal and New York. He writes most of his own material but always has an ear for new compositions that fit his style.

Although Kim records in the U.S. and lives there, part of the time, he is still, very much, a Canadian and he just might cut a session in Canada, if for no other reason, than to prove to Canadians that a Canadian can make it with a wholly Canadian produced session.

Other product originating from the CBC are expected to be released by London over the next few months.

Mob Draws Well At Isy's By Allan Burkett

One of the most exciting groups to make the Vancouver scene in some time was The Mob, who drew exceptionally well at Isy's Supper Club.

This Chicago based group gives more to a performance than some of the top groups who have appeared here recently.

Together since June of '66, The Mob exhibit complete professionalism and showmanship that keeps the audience on the edge of their seats, from their blistering entrance to the soul filled climatic finish.

Big Al, and Mike Systak, the lead singers give perfect renditions of many great hits including "For Once In My Life", "Reach Out", "Can't Help Myself", "Baby I Need Your Lovin", and others. Whether singly or together, this duo give a fantastic sensual exhibition of dance and song, unique and excellent in style and timing.

The versatility of the group is most pronounced when they put together a medley of "Brass Hits" such as "Taste Of Honey", "Tijuana Taxi" and others. With the exchange of instruments and the antics on stage plus their tight yet remarkable sequences of dance, in which all members participate, really gets to their

audience.

The second set saw the group at home with a medley of Four Seasons' hits, a bit of Detoirt sound and more of the Brass.

One of the most moving portions of the show is Big Al's own version of "Try A Little Tenderness". He evokes more soul and feeling than do most solo soul acts.

The Mob is real. Their songs, and dance convey the feelings of the group and from the reaction of the audience, they can return to Vancouver any time.

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

CANINT INCREASES ACTIVITY IN PUBLISHING FIELD

Toronto: Phil G. Anderson, president of Canadian International Music Corporation (Canint), has announced the completion of phase two of a four part program involving the activities

of songwriters Brian Russell and Alan MacRae, regarded as two of Canada's hottest potentials in the field of writing.

The pair were signed last year to the CAPAC affiliated pubbery by Tony DiMaria and under his direction have developed and excelled in their own separate field of writing, which could catapult them into the international market.

Phase one of the above mentioned program is the basis for this expected recognition of the U.S. and European markets. Material by both writers have been recorded by Arc Records' producers utilizing some of Canada's top recording units.

MacRae came off well in the LP market with several artists using his composition of "It's All Over", which was included in the folk-rock LP by Ann Murray, and the Arc Citation series LP by the Carlton Showband. The song was also recorded by Fern Dauth of Country Music Hall (CTV) fame and Dick Nolan, a consistent top country seller for Arc.

Anderson reports completion of negotiations between MacRae's material and Paul Tannen, president

of Natson Music Corporation, of New York City, with DiMaria representing the Toronto based publishing firm. It's expected that several releases will be on the market within a short period of time. These, involving several top U.S. producers and recording units.

One of the most exciting of new Canadian writers is Brian Russell who hails from Canada's west coast. His main exposure has been by way

of the pop market. He gained national prominence last year, with his composition of "Drifting In The Wind" by the Raja on Goodgroove. Russell was also lead guitar of this group. He has been concentrating on material in the contemporary rock vein for a completely new album featuring young Toronto singer Eddie Spencer. DiMaria, who discovered Spencer and signed him to a Goodgroove recording contract, will produce. The album is expected to be released by early spring but DiMaria hopes to release a single of Spencer, doing one of Russell's earlier compositions, within the next few weeks.

Russell is currently working with the popular Toronto recording unit, the Majestics, seen regularly on CBC-TV's "Where It's At".

London's Kouri To Chicago For Meet

Montreal: Gary Kouri, Philips/ Mercury Group national sales Manager (London Records of Canada) will be attending a Product Conference at Mercury headquarters in Chicago Feb 24 and 25.

Mercury product making chart showings include "Things I'd Like To Say" by the New Colony Six which moves up to No. 27 on the RPM 100; Dee Dee Warwick's "Foolish Girl" up to No. 72, and "Anything You Choose" by Spanky and Our Gang first week on at No. 97.

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RPM Tells It As It Is

On varied trips across Canada and to the United States, one thing has become very apparent. The words Canada and RPM have become synonymous in the music industry. The phrase "I read it in RPM" is heard often. This column has been the most gratifying of all my experiences in the music industry.

Often you write, but you wonder who is reading and indeed if anyone is reading at all. It therefore comes as a surprise when recording artists let you know that they enjoyed a certain article and when record men, nationally and internationally, take time to write, telephone, or personally discuss some aspect of a recent column.

It is at these times that I realize the scope of RPM and the power of this Canadian weekly.

As Canadians possibly we are a little backward about anything we originate. We might think that it isn't equal to what the rest of the world can offer. We fail to realize that we have one advantage over the rest of the world. We are Canadian and we excel in Canadian things. We are also creative and imaginative and we have the ability to come up with new and different ideas. We have a dignity we have inherited from the British and we have an excitement that we have come by because of our proximity to the United States.

For five years Walt Grealis has been circulating RPM Weekly into the United States, as a propaganda piece, for the Canadian music industry. Each week more and more Americans are becoming aware of Canada and what the Canadian music industry is doing. They are more familiar with our progress and they have the ability to watch our progress. They are reading names that they would otherwise never hear of and they are becoming familiar with groups and artists that someday may be a buy-word throughout the world.

I firmly believe that the door to the International music industry has been opened a little wider by RPM and Walt Grealis. Today an artist with a demo or a producer with a master or a songwriter with a lead sheet can expect a warmer welcome south of the border because of the trailblazing that RPM has done The world is suddenly aware that there is a genuine and real record industry in Canada not unlike their own. They have always suspected something was happening in Canada, but today the fact is not only confirmed but related, in names and numbers.

Geographically they are becoming aware of places like Dauphin Manitoba and Bathurst New Brunswick. They are getting used to names like Al Mair and Lee Farley. They are hearing releases from Musimart and Allied and Caravan. They are hearing about Debbie Lori Kaye and Myrna Lorrie and The Mythical Meadow.

Canada is no longer that 5% market north of the border. Today we are discovering and producing talent. What is today the farm team of the United States might someday be an all star effort that will produce talent and technicians for the world music industry. Canada is on the threshold of coming up with a great deal of creative work that will find its way into the world market because of 5 years of news and information that has been flowing out into the world by way of RPM.

Right or wrong (and to many people often wrong) RPM is constant. RPM is reliable and above all patient. It has been a long wait for the acceptance that is so needed by a weekly to attain respect, but the struggle was worth waiting for.

Next time you read a story about yourself or your company in RPM or you place an ad in RPM, remember that it is being seen by readers in London England, Los Angeles, South Australia, Hamburg, Germany and New York City as well as all across Canada

Toronto Agencies On Up-swing

Toronto: Recent activity among booking agencies in the Toronto area would lead one to believe that the business might be starting to move once again. It's obviously much easier now to find a Toronto booking agency who just isn't a ten percenter. There are still a few exceptions but the honourable agencies would seem to be dominating the scene. The passing of the greedy disc jockey, stage stealing and television magnate, and fast talking attache carrying fast buck Charlie era has been welcomed by Toronto promoters and indeed those in many parts of Ontario who were effected by these people.

Some of the more honourable agencies managed to hang on and are now becoming the force to put Toronto back in the running. One of these agencies is Music and Artists Placement Ltd., headed up by Bert Mitford. MAP have been booking since September of 1966 and have become an important part of the teen music scene. Mike Watson has recently been added to the roster to concentrate on two distinct fields in the booking industry. These being the college circuit and the high school market. It's expected before long that MAP will be exporting as much Canadian talent to the U.S. as they are now importing American talent.

Sammy-Jo's Top Ten Agency is another that survived the dreaded FBC era. They are handling excellent talent and finding top exposure for Canadian groups in the U.S. Rather than overburden his effectiveness as a top flight agency Samy-Jo prefers to concentrate on building the reputation of a few rather than several acts. Giving Samy-Jo an assist is Sam Collins and the recently acquired services of Doug Greer, a very dynamic and self conscious sub-agent.

Agencies who concentrate on the booking of folk groups and other class "A" entertainment were never really effected by the falling apart of the group scene, but they have become much more effective over the past few months. Leading the way are Elcoda Productions and McCallum-Kingsbury Association. The old stand-by, of course, the Billy O'Connor Agency was oblivious to it all. Billy, Vivian and Bob continued along in their own fashion and ended up with the winners.

New blood is now moving in with good business sense and a desire to contribute to the industry. One such agency is the John Carl Morris Agency. Morris is currently working on a Masters' degree in Engineering at the University of Toronto. During his undergraduate days he was editor of the Engineering Newspaper Toike Oike. It was during this time that he became active in organizing dances and shows and found that the services offered by many of the agents left a great deal to be desired. After graduation Morris applied for and received his booking agents licence

in the spring of 1968. His prime interest was to supply the universities of the area with good talent, at a price they could afford.

Morris has been quite successful in this endeavour and has found an up-swing in his business. His clientele has been returning and bringing their friends which has made it necessary to tie in Graham Howes, also a student at the University, as a sub-agent.

Much of Morris' success is due his frankness with talent, operators and other agents. When he feels he can't handle a certain talent he refers them to other agencies who might be better equipped to look after their needs.

One of the top talents in the Morris roster is the group known as the Altar Ego who are described as "A new group and a new way-of-music". They are comprised of Keith Richardson, organist and creator of much of the group's material. Keith also sings many of the lead parts; John Pullam, guitarist who has made a practice of showing his superiority overhis electronic equipment; Bob Read, bass player provides a very

heavy bass that makes their soul sound, soul; Rick Love, the drummer is an exceptionally fine showman who becomes totally involved in his work, not his audience.

Another new Toronto agency is Metropole, which is headed up by Lawrence Cuthbertson and George Elmes. Groups now enjoying good bookings are the Carnival of "It's Happening" fame and the Five Shy. The latter were recently signed to a recording contract with Mainstream records and will be cutting a session at New York's A&R Studios before the end of the month. The Five Shy is made up of Bill Amesbury, guitar; John Kimmel, organ; Dennis Pinhorn, bass; Jack Flynn, drummer and Ken Carty, lead. Both Carty and Amesbury write most of the material for the group. Elmes reports good audience



reaction wherever the Five Shy have appeared. Their recent showing at London's Centennial Hall brought out a crowd of over 1000 which made promoter Bruce Steward very happy. Metropole has been instrumental in moving this Toronto based group out into the hinterlands as well. They'll be making appearances at Cornwall (14), Ottawa-Arnprior (15-16), Brantford (22) and many in-town dates. Much of their success is due their excellent vocal harmonizing for which they are equipped with a PA system costing over \$5000 and equipment having a price tag of \$22,000.



Five Shy

Working with today's groups can be frustrating. Egotism is difficult to contain. What's good for one group isnot adequate for another. A five man group presents five personalities, and nearly all with a problem. Bookers should be wary of concentrating too much on one particular group. A booking agency should be just that, not a launching pad for one act. This only breeds contempt and usually leads to the falling apart of the agency and the group. To contain ones operation by the selecting and boosting of up to 10 groups is much more rewarding then the concentration on one act alone. A booker-manager is unfortunately forced to wear two hats.

This observation really hasn't any obvious connection with Mother Tucker's Yellow Duck and might better be tucked away where it can't do any harm to the image of the group.


Their recording of "One Ring

Their recording of "One Ring Jane" (Duck 2) distributed by London Records, is a sensitive and highly meaningful message of LOVE, once you get past their experimentation. This should create much interest to those with an ear for the

"progressive sounds", which we prefer to the over used "underground". The Duck have an exciting backbeat which keeps them within the realm of hard-rock, but with exceptional folk-rock delivery.

They are comprised of Patrick Caldwell, Don McDougall, (co-wrote their first release, Rodger Law, Hugh Lochhead and Charles Faulkner.

Rather than go into a long tirade of why the duck "are", and what they believe in, which really belongs with a fan club bulletin, we would prefer to simply refer to them as an excellent recording unit and instead of attempting to read extras into their lyrics, which usually creates unnecessary hang-ups for many groups, let's settle for paragraph 3 above.



New York City experienced the week of the super-stars last week and survived. Not only did JANIS JOPLIN make her New York debut with her new band, but JOHNNY WINTER, guitarist extra-ordinary, made his second appearance at THE FILLMORE EAST.

Both Joplin and Winter are rated tops by the so-called hip segment that fill the Fillmore to give standing ovations for anything that moves onstage. All four of Janis' shows were sellouts as were Johnny Winter's. The problem is that neither of these artists are as good musically as they are important sociologically. Winter, in fact, has

based his entire career as a superstar on one rave notice in the San Francisco rock newspaper ROLLING STONE. On the basis of that review and appearances on the West Coast and New York, Winter reportedly signed a deal with COLUMBIA RECORDS in the range of \$300,000, last week.

If either Janis or Johnny ever came up against real musicians, it's been suggested they might have to go run and hide. But the general state of affairs in this country allow somebody who is white and does a fair imitation of black music to be more successful than the more talented and creative black originator of the riffs they're playing

playing.

SLY STONE breezed out of New York last week after doing a guest spot on a local radio station here. While he was in town, Sly did some shopping and bought three fur coats. One was a dyed red, rabbit fur coat with black fox cuffs. The second was made of grey monkey hair, the hair is

really long so that it will blow back when Sly rides his motorcycle around San Francisco. The third coat was a simple white mink affair with a black fox collar.

When you hear the new JEFFER-SON AIRPLANE album, "Bless Its Pointed Little Head", you'll hear more than just the Airplane singing. When they recorded the LP at the FILL-MORE WEST in San Francisco, "King Kong" was being shown as part of the light show and the film's conclusion was included in the Airplane's tape. So you hear, "The airplane's got it, No, it wasn't the airplane. It was beauty that killed the beast".

A new BACH TO ROCK craze is gaining a strong hold in the U.S. It all started with an album called "Switched-On Bach" which is Bach done with MOOG SYNTHISIZER. First the album took off on the classical charts becoming the fastest moving classical album in the country. Now it is starting to hit the pop charts. Several other albums have now been released featuring the Bach to rock formula which is essentially electronic variations on a rock basis

of classical compositions.

Folk protest singer JANIS IAN has left the world of pop and has just begun her first major tour backed by three jazz musicians....AMBOY DUKES sent their thanks to the NEW YORK POLICE DEPARTMENT after the cops recovered \$30,000 worth of gear stolen from the group....O.C. SMITH and THE CHECKMATES LTD. teaming up for a concert in New York City next month....SIDNEY POITIER recording an album in which he reads the poetry of the black man...BENNY GOODMAN attended the JANIS JOP-LIN concert and is reported to have enjoyed himself....FLYING BURRITTO BROTHERS plan their first trip east soon for dates at the FILLMORE EAST and STEVE PAUL'S SCENE RICHARD GOLDSTEIN, respected rock critic and pop fan, has just written a book called "The Poetry Of Rock". Very enjoyable book, but really a wierd experience to see lyrics like "To know, know, know him..." printed out as poetry.... MOTHERS OF INVENTION making their first appearance in New York in almost a year....SHIRELLES, now known as SHIRLEY AND THE SHIR-ELLES, planning an 18 day tour of European military bases.

Toronto: A couple of weeks ago, when Bob Dalton walked into the Horseshoe Club in Toronto, his intention was to sit down and enjoy the country stylings of one of his favourite singers, Miss Diane Leigh.

He was just removing his coat when Jack Thibeault, Diane's manager, rushed over and explained he had a plaque to present to Diane, voted "Canada's Top Female Country Singer' for the fourth consecutive year. (RPM Poll)

Jack wondered if Bob, Canada's Country Music Ambassador, would present the ward to Diane when she

went on stage.
"And while you're at it, Bob", Jack added, "there's also a bouquet of roses from one of Diane's admirers."

From the way things are beginning to happen, Dalton's next presentation to the "Baby Doll" of CTV's "Country Music Hall' may well be a golden record.

Diane's last two Chart recordings (RCA in Canada)), "The Wife You Save May Be Your Own" and "Keep The Home Fires Burning", have been chart toppers, creating action on both sides of the border.

Who knows, maybe Diane's next record will be the big one.

Now at long last the Toronto Bernie Early fans are happy. For the past month the rock 'n roll star turned country singer, whose Columbia re-cording of "Chaser For The Blues" remained on the charts for more than four months, has been featured at the Brown Derby.

The other half of the Bernie Early Duo'is Billy Tabb, who was formerly with King Ganam. Billy plays lead, sings solo and harmony with Bernie, and is also quite a comedian. He's come up with what he considers the ideal "Chaser For The Blues" drink... Tiamaria and milk.

Johnny Burke has to have what we consider to be one of the best country bands we've heard in a long time. Backing Johnny, who sings and plays bass, are Bob Lucier, formerly with Bill Anderson, on steel, Ollie Strong, steelman from the Tommy Hunter Show, on lead guitar, Roddie Lee on drums, and Cliffie Short on rhythm and vocals.

It should be noted that several top sellers came from the San Remo Festival in recent years including "A Man Without Love", "Volare", "Al-Di-La" and "Quando Quando".



Love.....With A Twist Of Charly

Toronto: Lloyd Landa, who handles promotion for International Film Distributors reports excellent Canadian reaction to the Selmur Production of "Charly", which is now in its ninth week at Toronto's International Cinema. The film is also showing at Edmonton's Garneau, the Gaiety in Winnipeg, Capitol in Calgary and Vancouver's Park Royal.

The movie is based on the book "Flowers For Algernon", distributed in Canada through Bantam Books and apparently enjoying good sales. The sound track is on the World Pacific label, distributed by London Records, and could become a very large seller for Ravi Shankar, Indian sitarist who is featured.



Claire Bloom and Cliff Robertson
Billed as "A love story that
begins with an incredible experiment",
"Charly" is one of those films gaining
much popularity through word of mouth.
Its science-fiction approach, at time
of writing by Daniel Keyes, who
wrote "Flowers For Algernon" from
which "Charly" is taken, is not so

far fetched. In fact it's been reported that several branches of the scientific world consider this turning of a man with the mind of a child into an extraordinary genius as "science-fact". This would appear, therefore to be the basis for the long stand of "Charly". The story, although somewhat incredible, is still very believable and the "now" love approach adds much warmth and satisfaction to the story even though identified with a large, cold and bustling American city.

The Keyes'short novel was actually published six years ago and being recognized as a classic of its kind, found its way into several anthologies. This included a television adaptation called "Two Worlds of Charly Gordon", a title which expressed an approximation of the theme of "Charly". Cliff Robertson, who stars in "Charly" with Claire Bloom, also starred in the television show. It was while rehearsing for the TVer that Robertson realized the potential of this story as a film. To make sure he would appear in the part of Charly, should a motion picture be feasible, he acquired the motion picture rights to the Keyes story.

It was a couple of years later that Robertson and Ralph Nelson, (director) presented the "Charly" project to Selig J. Seligman, executive producer at Selmur Productions. Seligman also sensed the potential of this story as a film and plans were set for the filming.

Boston was picked for the onlocation shooting because 1) it is pre-eminent in the areas of medical and educational experiments and, 2) producer-director Nelson and Seligman wanted a fresh look and feeling for the film. Many of the exciting shots took place from Faneuil Hall and Bunker Hill to Boston Common and M.I.T.

It should be noted that the sound track (World Pacific) is somewhat unique being that it was composed and recorded by Ravi Shankar in a very unorthodox manner. There was no written score until the morning of the first recording session, but somehow Shankar managed to transform a studio full of sidemen into an exacting and brilliant vehicle of sound for the eastern come western influence that permeates the theatre. This weird but exotic flavouring does much in expanding and relaxing of audience emotions.
