ACMP IN TALKS WITH CRTC

Ottawa: A delegation representing the Association of Canadian Music Producers travelled to Ottawa recently for discussions with members of the Canadian Radio and Television Commission (CRTC). The talks reportedly revolved around the subject of legislation of Canadian content on radio, definition of Canadian content, and what percentages were recommended and possible.

The ACMP was represented by Larry Trudell (Quartet Productions); Jack Richardson and Peter Clayton (Nimbus 9 Productions); Dave Shando (Eastern Sound Studios); and Stan Klees (Stan Klees Ltd.).

The representation apparently found the Commission members extremely interested in the proposals of the music producers.

One very important point of contention with the Commission was the amount of domestically produced recordings the industry would be able to produce in the various areas of music programming and the definition of Canadian content.

It is RPM's understanding that the other delegations from various areas of music production have already appeared before CRTC members with still further representations to be made.

It was learned that a public hearing is scheduled in the near future explore the type of regulation, definition, of Canadian content and capacity to produce.

The music producers were reportedly somewhat surprised at the knowledge of the industry the Committee members had apparently acquired and how well they were versed on what could be done and what had to be done to improve the industry.

Don Messer Fans Won't Let Go

Halifax: CBC officials have learned rather emphatically they shouldn't underestimate the power of an image they helped create. Don Messer may be the CBC's representative of the "generation gap" but to tens of thousands of television viewers across Canada, he's a weekly tonic. Premier Robichuad of New Brunswick brought about a thumping response from his House members when he advised that he would join in the battle to save Don Messer. A Halifax supermarket placed a Save-the Messer-Show in Halifax newspapers which resulted in more than 4000 letters of protest going to CBC Network president George F. Davidson. Other newspapers across Canada were swamped with letters of protest over the planned cancellation of the Messer show. The Star's Patrick Scott, obviously not a fan of the Messer show, nevertheless was impressed with the amount of support shown Messer by Toronto fans, and reprinted many of the letters of protest to the paper. A well organized protest by several hundred Messer fans, created a good deal of excitement on Parliament Hill, resulting in hundreds of telegrams and letters to

Toronto: Some of the Toronto's bestknown musicians will pay tribute to Lonnie Johnson in a special benefit concert on Sunday May 4, at the Ryerson Theatre, at 7:30 PM.

Johnson, a pioneer jazz and blues artist, once recorded with such greats as Duke Ellington and Louis Armstrong. Now the unfortunate victim of a car



accident he is in traction at the Toronto General Hospital. Through his work in Toronto and having made his home here Johnson has made many friends in the music industry.

Taking part will be folksingers Ian and Sylvia, Stan Thomas, blues singer John Lee Hooker, Jim McHarg's Clyde River Jazz Band, Hagood Hardy and the Montage; Salome Bey, the Metro Stompers, Jodie Drake with the Connie Maynard Trio, and the Ian Barge Jazzmen. A host of emcees featuring columnist and radio personalities such as Elwood Glover, Phil Mckellar, Patrick Scott, of the Star, "Jazz Tailor" Dave Kaplan, and John Norris, editor of Coda Magazine are combined to make the evening a succes.

Toronto: When Kerr recording star Rich Little moved into the Royal York's Imperial Room for his fifth try (in four years) at cracking the socalled tough Toronto market, his Canadian inferiority complex was showing. He referred to his return engagements as "I guess I just keep coming around like the Jehovah Witnesses". Little is too great a showman and an obvious top rate crowd pleaser to allow Toronto critics to get under his skin and become part of his show. As they grow older and less perceptive (granting they had any perception to begin with), Little becomes the toast of the world. He's known throughout the U.S. through his many television appearances, one shot and series, and is considered one of the biggest draws on the U.S. college circuit. He literally stood the UK television industry on its ear when, appearing on two shows of the Tom Jones series, he interjected a personality, lacking in Jones. This has resulted in his being signed as a regular for the series next season. Rumours are also strong for Little to have his own television series in the not too distant future, this also from the UK.

Opening night for Rich Little at the Imperial Room (21) drew an exceptionally large crowd. Much of this success was due efforts of RCA's Ontario branch manager Ed Preston and his promotion manager Scott Richards, who went all out in spreading the word about the appearance and the availability of Little's latest Kerr LP, "Rich Little's Broadway". He was somewhat nervous opening night. He seemed to be playing to the furthest table in the house, and from the Imperial Room stage, that must seem like two miles away. This great barn of a room would appear to offer little or no intimacy for an act such as Little was prepared to put on. However, after

a couple of routines which brought about an enthusiastic audience reaction, Little, settled in to much of his old stuff, a little updating on some of his known routines and a sampling of extra newie voice impressions including a very funny few words from an obviously "worn out" Onassis. The take-off on Nixon was superb as was his "Porky Pig" routine on Humphrey and the favourite U.S. Senator Dirkson. One voice he hasn't got the feel of yet is Pierre Trudeau, but it was well done and if Trudeau remains in the political limelight for any length of time, he could become a Little character. The voice impression that almost brought the house out of their seats was that of John G. Diefenbaker, former Prime Minister of Canada. Little's facial and body movements as well as the unmistakable Diefenbaker growl, were priceless. It should be noted that his show is 75% musical, which makes for a well rounded routine.

Little also supplied us with a taste of his new venture, a voice he's been trying to command for twenty years, his own. He tried it out with the Bacharach/David composition of "This Guy's In Love With You", made into a hit by Herb Alpert, not too long ago. Unfortunately Little's own voice has too much interferience from John Wayne, Kirk Douglas, Robert Goulet, Jack Benny and the many other voices that have contributed to his success. It's there however, and he just might conquer himself in time for his next Toronto showing.

While in Toronto Little guested on the Elwood Glover "Luncheon Date", and Larry Solway's "Speak Your Mind" show over CHUM. The latter must surely be rated as one of the best two hours ever presented on CHUM. Solway was continually breaking up, a rare Solway, indeed.

The Ottawa born Rich Little is

now in England taping John Davidson's summer show for ABC. He will also make several guest appearances on British variety shows and tour the country generally.

Little's manager, Gibb Kerr, and the one responsible for many of the new ideas that become Little routines, has been the right arm to the Ottawa born comic. Kerr knows he has the best impressionist in the world and his confidence with the press, television, agency and record execs is exceptional. He believes so definitely in Little's potential, his enthuiasm opens many doors.

Hendrix Set For Canadian Dates




Obodiac notes "The box office is going so well that only the Beatles, Elvis Presley and the Monkees in this entertainment bracket will have exceeded his drawing power here."

STAN KLEES, noted Canadian record producer and music industry consultant writes this column each week exclusively for RPM Weekly. Any questions or comments regarding this column should be directed to Mr. Klees c/o RPM.

It has become a well known fact that records are based on sound and not the talent or professionalism of the performing group or artists. It has therefore also become a fact that many groups with a #1 record haven't the talent or ability to appear on television with any degree of professionalism.

Often I have been in the control room of a television studio when the producer of a show (after seeing a run through of an artist) has asked for a stool for the artist. Having seen that the artist is unable to move professionally, he has solved the problem by putting the artist on a stool. He isn't able to request a stool for the artist's lack of naturalism in the area of the face. Even a group singer armed with a guitar still has trouble putting on a good stage face that will attract the audience.

Although experience is the best teacher, the industry as a whole has contributed to the semi-success of many artists who even with a #1 record don't have the ability to put on a #1 performance.

Attitude is one of the problems and it even leaves the area of performers and goes much deeper into inadequacy and inferiority.

Having worked with many many artists, I have found that the artist is so dazzled by his own talent, that there is little room for improvement. Having worked and talked to young people that are not performers, I find that the communication gap has even further made it impossible for anyone older to interfere with "their own thing".

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As bad as a performance may be (on stage or off) youth has always been defiant of the advice or instruction of elders. In this category I must even include myself when I was at their age.


It is only today that I realize how little I knew at that age and how anxious I was to make changes which today I realize were pipedreams and only possessed me because of my lack of experience.

If I may give a personal example: For six years I have been working for the day when a unique opportunity would present itself. Finally the day came and the moment to present my case. After six years of living with the problem, within minutes of discussion with the powers-that-be, three unsurmountable problems presented themselves because of the superior knowledge of people older than myself with their abundance of experience. Throughout life this happens.

In the years to come you will realize at 25 how stupid you were at 20 and at 30 how stupid you were at 25 and at 35 how stupid you were at 30.

So when you hear someone say, "Now let's see! That happened to a group about five years ago, and they got into a terrible bind, so we'll have to take some steps to see to it that it doesn't happen to you....."

That's experience talking.

Quebeckers are also lucky in the fact that they can see their own talent every night of the week on the CBC French Network; CTV, and another private network, known affectionately to some as Channel 10. Quebec abounds with local stars, some already starting to make a dent on the International scene....but whatever they do they remain dear to their fans in Quebec, as you will soon grow to know.

The game, the Province loves to play most, is the "AWARDS GAME"... and this time of the year is the one to spotlight the complete fervour of the "QUEBEC SCENE"....as an example

"QUEBEC SCENE"....as an example ...in the last month we have had the FESTIVAL DU DISQUE honouring the disc stars...the "BEST DRESSED PERSONALITY"...."MOST CO-OPERATIVE ARTISTS WITH THE QUEBEC PRESS" and others. Currently under way in the Provinces

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weekly papers are readers' poll to choose "MR. TELEVISION", "MISS TELEVISION", "FEMALE REVEL-ATION OF THE YEAR", "MALE REVELATION OF THE YEAR" and a few more. NAMES...NAMES...NAMES ...Leading the star spangled list of Quebec personalities are the likes of ROBERT CHARLEBOIS, PIERRE LALONDE, STEPHANNE, CHANTEL PARY, CHRISTYNE CHARTRAND, GILLES LATULIPPE, and others.

GILLES LATULIPPE, and others. ROBERT CHARLEBOIS is without equal at this moment in Quebec. His recording of "LINDBERGH" on GAMMA Records (shared with Lousie Forestier) was No. 1 on the Quebec charts for two months his stormy concerts at the OLYMPIA in Paris brought the French critics to boiling point but whatever his style, it has proven to be an eye-opener for the people of Quebec. Steeped in a history of Chansonnier, they were suddenly exposed to a performer who offered them a look at the World 1969 style. With his grotesque hair style and completely spontaneous stage show Charlebois defied all the old cliches, even to singing some songs in English in his act, and became a star. As a result, his record "LINDBERGH" was named "SONG OF THE YEAR" at the Festival Du Disque, and he was voted the "ARTIST OF THE YEAR"

Another name in the news these days is PIERRE LALONDE, star of his own weekly TV series, who was just named "MOST CO-OPERATIVE ARTIST" by the press, and also "BEST DRESSED STAR IN QUEBEC" He also defied local tradition by signing with CAPITOL RECORDS with a contract that should make him a star on the International market. Capitol recorded singles by Lalonde in both French and English, the former, a French version of Paul Anka's "Put Your Head On My Shoulder" becoming the fastest selling record in his career, over 8,000 copies within the first two weeks of release.

As this is only my first report for RPM we should spend most of our time introducing you to some of the current trend setters in this Pro-

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vince. For instance... leading the poll for "MR TELEVISION" is GILLES LATULIPPE, host of a daily suppertime show, spiced with interviews, performers, and general chitchat, all done before a live audience of housewives. At last count he had polled 4769 votes, against number two, PIERRE LALONDE (4014), and Jacques Boulanger 3154 (host of a weekly French CBC-TV show entitled "ZOOM"). In the fight for MISS TELEVISION, MARIE-JOSEE LONGCHAMPS, star of a weekly soap opera is leading with 5187 votes just ahead of CHRISTYNE CHARTRAND and JULIETTE HUOT.

Yet another contest is for the "REVELATION OF THE YEAR" (New Personality)...This is proving a close battle with CHANTAL PARY ahead of CHRISTYNE CHARTRAND by only 139 votes. There is an equally tough race in the vote for the men, BRUCE leading the way over PAPILLON by only 108, with MICHEL PAGLIARO 479 behind.

Today Quebec is a vital part of the complete Canadian music scene. Our next reports will deal with the latest arrivals, departures, innovations on both the French and English Canadian scene in Montreal. This week, along with the enchanting ELVIRA CAPREESE we just wet your appetites....and close with the up to date OFFICIAL CHART of QUEBEC.



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NEW FORMAT FOR RPM

This week's RPM has once again taken steps to keep its place as a leader in music publications. Its new format now in appearnce is the first step in updating the entire image of this publication. Change will in no way alter the quality or identity of RPM but will serve only to further its position, and the position of Canada in the world music scene.

The reason for change come best from the man behind RPM the editor and publisher Walt Grealis. In his view "RPM has adopted a policy of constant evolution. In order to fit in with an industry that is constantly changing, RPM changes with no fear of losing its image or identity. That is what the entire industry is based on, change after change. It is a fast moving business and everything we do in RPM Weekly bears this in mind. We might be subject to some criticism eliminating our editorial areas in our masthead, but RPM is directed at the trade and has in the past five years reached and identity of its own. Anyone in the music and entertainment field knows what RPM writes about and who it writes to. We don't have to announce it on our front page anymore. It has given us a greater liberty to present RPM more artistically. The new appearance is a great improvement."

Bill Armstrong, art director of Groovyart who design and pubset for RPM each week says, "The new image of RPM is a brave departure from the 'masthead advertising' that most tabloids are limited by. Possibly it is only in Canada that the publisher would allow the description of content to be removed from the masthead to give the magazine a better appearance, and possibly RPM has been such a constant and reliable source to the industry that it can stand on its name and reputation alone throughout the world."

When asked why he didn't follow suit with the other magazines and go to glossy paper Grealis replied, "We are always being asked when will we go into gloss paper. We can't possibly keep up our immediacy in a business that wants information and statistics yesterday if we succumb to fancy paper and a slower process. We won't be able to compete with other magazines that are forced to take valuable time to get their publications processed. RPM has proven to the surprise of many that we can cover last minute happenings so fast that we

have the news on the street the following day. We have puzzled the international industry with our charts and our ability to be so current from Canada. RPM (and I feel this personally) has sped up the industry whether the record men like it or not, records hit faster in Canada and sell more

Joan Baez Set For Mariposa

Toronto: Vanguard recording artist Joan Baez has been signed to appear at the Mariposa Folk Festival, which will be held on the Toronto Islands, July 25 through the 27th. Miss Baez will also hold an hour-long workshop discussion session during one of the daytime programs.

Festival organizers have apparently allowed Miss Baez the freedom to discuss any topic she might desire. It's expected she will more than likely discuss the U.S. political situation. Her husband, David Harris, is currently awaiting the outcome of his appeal against the jail sentence he has received for resisting the draft which, if not successful, will result in him having to go to jail for three years. The decision is expected the early part of June

This is the first appearance for Miss Baez at the Mariposa Festival. and although she normally receives a fee as high as \$10,000 for a single concert, she will appear at the Toronto Festival for a fee only slightly in excess of Musicians' Union Scale, the same fee which all Mariposa performers receive.

Miss Baez is expecting her first child in November.

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





Happiness is an "Oliver"! And what is an "Oliver"?

It is the sensitive, flexible acting of a group of young boys led by Mark Lester (Oliver) and Jack Wild (Artful Dodger).

It is the sensible volume of music and sound effects that does not distort the simplicity and beauty of Lionel Bart's music, and allows the audience to hear the dialogue.

It is the blend of colour and form that does not confuse the viewer but makes him feel part of the story.

Then there are those pertinent details that determine the results of colour, sound, acting, and so on.

For example: the superb editing would make most American films look like sloppy, amateurish, jobs. (The movie was filmed in England). The "inn" atmosphere is realistic,

not overdone.

One of the highlights (in my opinion, the highlight) is the sequence of "Who Will Buy?" Everything about it is excellent - technical work. music arrangement, choreography, costume design, acting, all intricately interwoven to bring about its own gay, dream-like spectacle. Happiness too, then, is a scene like "Who Will Buy ?".

Needless to say, the other musical numbers are just as well done and possess their own "personalities"; Like Fagin's "Reviewing the Situation''; and at the beginning, "Boy for Sale", a very touching piece, beautifully sung. The popular "Where Is Love?"

is done naturally and sincerely by Mark Lester. Shani Wallis seems to be earning meatier roles. In "Oliver", she plays Bill Sikes' wife, Nancy, an amiable though sometimes coarse and tough person. Both sides of the character come through in "As Long As He Needs Me".

One character who never sings is Bill Sikes, the quiet, sullen, brawny, half-animal (played by Oliver Reed), whose appearances sober all those present (to put it mildly).

Which brings me to another point.

The contrast of lyrical and dramatic scenes is well-proportioned in length and amount; just enough to let you know that this is taken from Dickens' novel "Oliver Twist" and that those atrocities did exist.

Without going into detail, the acting is exceptional if only because each is a character role portrayed by people who are consistent.

They are a part of an award-

by Claire Louise Lalonde winning musical which takes Dickens' novel with a grain of salt, and prefers to look for the more optimistic. happy, light sides. Bart's music conveys this and other moods with flair.

The Derby's new downstairs room will lean heavily on Canadian country performers. This marks the much travelled Linda Kent's first Toronto country room appearance.


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
