CRTC RULING HERALDED BY MUSIC TRADE

Canada's greatest gift to Canadians for Centennial may turn out to be Judy LaMarsh's very hard fought for New Broadcasting Act. The Act has finally been read and the Canadian Radio-Television Commission is beginning to interpret the Act.

Canadian radio – possibly the most flagrant offender in Americanizing Canada's airwaves (radio) – may have to pull up their socks. Radio may be asked to program 30% Canadian content. The new ruling proposal was made by Pierre Juneau in Toronto, Feb 12 at the hearings of the CRTC held at the King Edward Hotel.

The news spread through the record and music industry within minutes of the long awaited announcement. The proposal was greeted by cheers and tears as many of the pioneers of the music industry, who had dedicated the most productive years of their lives - to prove Canada could make a sound in the world, reacted to the 30% proposal. The staff of the Canadian Talent Library (CTL) were very pleased and excited with the proposition. The excitement spread, reportedly, through the offices of Local 149 of the AF of M, in Toronto. Independent producers (many of whom have gone through years of struggling to meet studio bills) were choked up with emotion. The fight that began six years ago seemed to be timed perfectly for celebration. The music industry was just about to enter its most troubled time. The announcement that radio stations were entering the production area had soured many on spending more money uselessly. For many, the battle will still go on - those who have unfortunately been victimized by the battle for legislated radio. For many, the ruling came too late. The fight had ruined them. The ruling should be dedicated to them. Actually there isn't a very impressive list of profiteers from Canadian content recordings. There is a very sad list of losers.

Although the proposal by Juneau can be challenged at future CRTC hearings, who would dare to oppose it at this point in Canadian recording? The ground work has been well laid. Objectors would merely show

Montreal Label Formed

Zorba To O'Keefe

Toronto: The Broadway musical "Zorba" comes to the O'Keefe Centre for a two week run February 16th. The big cast headed by John Raitt, Barbara Baxley and Chita Rivera is directed by Harold Prince whose "Cabaret" and "Fiddler on the Roof" have both appeared in Toronto. The O'Keefe run is the third in a coast to coast tour prior to returning to New York where it ran for eight months at the Imperial Theatre before its engagement was halted by the ill;ness of two stars.

Mr. Prince's decision to tour the production intact makes it one of the most lavish of the travelling musical attractions for the 1970 season. Designer Boris Aronson won a "Tony" award for his settings for the musical.

Raitt made his Broadway debut in "Carousel" and has the title role in "Zorba". Barbara Baxley recently starred in "Plaza Suite" and has a number of dramatic successes behind her, while Chita Rivera, who created the role of Anita in "West Side Story" has appeared on New York, London and countless North American stages in such triumphs as "Bye, Bye Birdie", "Can Can" and "Call Me Madam".

The musical is adapted from Nilos Kazantzakis' novel "Zorba the Greek" by Joseph Stein and is scored by "Cabaret" composers John Kander and Fred Ebb.

Montreal Sextet Bows On CTL

The Canadian Talent Library's release for the month of February is an album by Quebec stylists, Les Contretemps. In August 1969, at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto, in competition with nearly 550 groups from North America, Les Contretemps captured the North American College Folk Music Championship. The group comprises student-musicians from Montreal's College St. Jean de Brebeuf. The group's triumph came the evening after they had taken the Canadian championship before an enthusiastic audience of 5,000.

Les Contretemps, three girls and three boys, have a repertoire which ranges from traditional folk and local compositions to their present area of concentration, pop and jazz. The group has played a number of important dates including Place Des Arts and Man and his World, the Broadcasters Association Annual Banquet as well as a private performance for Pierre Trudeau. The new CTL recording has been in the works since last August and was taped in Montreal over the Christmas holidays. Side A is entirely performed in French while Side B is strictly English. CTL has expressed the hope that stations in all provinces will play both sides.

East Coast Concert Successes

Halifax, Nova Scotia's capital city, has been the scene of great musical activity by some of the best of the Canadian and American entertainers during the past few weeks. "Countrytime" features Vic Mullen and The Hickorys — two Spanish and one steel guitar, drums, an electric bass and a fiddle, topped off with Vic on the banjo, fiddle and mandolin. Their forte is fresh, genuine, country music untainted by incursions of pop-rock, the Nashville sound or any other modern commercial injection.

Vic Mullen, who's been in the country music field for 21 years, was a regular with the Don Messer group until the Messer series ended on CBC television last spring. Mullen by then had decided to form his own group and "do his thing".

Quality Records has resubmitted the Brutus single "Funky Roller Skates" to the Maple Leaf System on the basis of significant regional action. The lid is already charted at CKWS, CKLC, CKOC, CHEX, CKBB and CHOW. The group describes itself as a sort of light rock, providing the sort of music that is entertaining. As reported earlier in RPM, Quality's Lee Farley has staked his job on "Funky Roller Skates" becoming a hit, and Quality is certainly giving the single a big push. The group comprises the following:

ELLIE LOOKS AT JUNEAU'S 30% RULING

AT TEN THIRTY....on February 12th., 1970, the CRTC suggested that Canadian musical content on AM radio be legislated at 30%. The statement came just as radio stations were at step one of TAKING OVER the record business in Canada — for five years the biggest lobbyists and opponents of Canadian content on radio. Record companies are presently being USED to distribute the product of the radio station producers. How long will that last?

Although the CRTC is only suggesting 30%, who would oppose such a low figure? The industry is presently in a position to make enough Canadian content available in six weeks for 30% airplay as long as there is a guarantee of airplay. The Canadian studios that have either updated their equipment or built from scratch, can produce a sound comparable to most of the chart fare that is presently so hallowed by broadcasters. In-

Promoters also report lean times with some laying off office staff. Once again the blame is laid on economic conditions but there is also a possibility that many promoters are simply pricing themselves out of existence. deed, the broadcasters themselves can try their hand at producing a sound so outstanding that they not only affix their names to their own productions, but would PROBABLY program them heavily on their own station. When it is remembered that "Here Comes Shack" (a Canadian production) was #1 and who can forget "Charlena" (another #1 record produced in Canada). BOTH THESE indicate that radio stations have played Canadian produced records and, in fact, some Canadianmade records have climbed the international charts. Some have sold throughout the world and actually no one has any argument about the quality of professionally done Canadian masters. The argument that novices (and there are plenty of them) (Ed: I can name some recent ones) go into the studio and come out with nothing but a big bill.....does not and should not reflect on the quality of the record producers who have had the vote of confidence of record companies throughout the world who have released their product. NO ARGU-MENT AT ALL !!!

For the first time, RPM will present specially designed trophies to the winners of the Annual Gold Leaf Awards. The presentation will be made at a reception and cocktail party to be held in Toronto in the last week of February.

The affair will be attended by radio and record people from across Canada and the United States, and as well as honouring the winners of the Awards, will also permit the industry people an unusual opportunity to meet each other.

The formal presentation will be made to the winners by key figures in the industry.

This year's Awards have proven to be the most successful in the six years of their existence. Ballots from all across Canada poured into the RPM offices and following the official count, the winners were announced in last week's RPM.

Winners of twelve of the Awards are determined by industry vote. This year two special Awards are being made by RPM. The Radio Award For Community Activities and Canadian Music Industry Man Of The Year — are being awarded to winners determined by the editorial staff of RPM.

In the station category, RPM chose Vancouver's CKLG. The Music Man Of The Year chosen by RPM was Saul Holiff of Volatile Productions of London, Ontario. These two Awards only, were not based on the industry votes.

In the case of artists and record companies, the poll is effective on a national basis. In the case of regional activities eg. radio stations, it is difficult for the national vote to show any consistency. Also in the case of the music industry figures of the year, the broad vote has, in the past, shown great inconsistency because of the regional influence. It was decided this year that RPM would make these two choices and make special Awards in these two particular categories.

This week I would like to direct my message to my fellow booking agents across Canada.

We all have to get together to de-regionalize Canada. There is talent in the east and the west that would be warmly received in Ontario and I am sure that Ontario groups would be received well across Canada. I have already had experience in this particular area.

You must realize that I am talking about proven and experienced groups. The cost of traveling across Canada would not be justified for a group that has not established itself.

I would like to see a wide exchange of groups and I would like to see more Canada-wide tours. Top "10" would like to hear from booking agents who have a story to tell and personal managers of Canada's top groups. We would also like to hear from promoters from across Canada, with a view to making the exchange of groups, complete. It's a big country but it can get much smaller if there is an effort made to tour groups in every direction.

Even if we can't book your group or you aren't interested in any of our talent, we would like to hear from you so that we might be of assistance in starting the ball rolling for all the good groups, good agencies and reputable managers.

If our activities, across Canada, can assist in building a stronger music industry, then Top "10" must be out fighting for bigger and better things for Canadian musicians.



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

Lyttle Look At Alberta

The Poppy Family, Vancouver's True Canadians, gave an almost perfect performance at Calgary's Jubilee Auditorium on January 28, 1970 to a sellout of 2,250 eager fans.

They were at their best while performing material which ranged from Jackie De Shannon and Jefferson Airplane to several carefully chosen country western tunes.

Husband and wife team, Terry and Susan Jacks, have an act that is geared to appeal to all sexes! Susan uses her sweet voice to cleanly interpret songs which fall in the easy listening class, such as "Ode To Billie Joe" "A Different Drum", and even her unforgettable version of "House Of The Rising Sun".

Done up in excellent Jackie De Shannon style were "Put A Little Love In Your Heart" her opening number, "When You Walk In The Room" and "Needles And Pins". The last two songs were also hits by the now-disbanded Searchers from England.

Susan and Terry, who are both strong exciting vocalists, combined their talents and came out surprisingly resembling the Everly Brothers on such tunes as "The Price Of Love" and "Muskrat". Terry provides the pace on rhythm guitar as most of the material selected is either without drums or tablas. Another essential instrument, the bass, was also excluded quite unnoticeably from their array of instruments on stage. However, their overall sound is very pure and simple, quite a change from the loud and blaring guitars (usually 3) drum, and organ, groups that exist today.

The Poppy Family, whose initial London LP has just been

released, worked comfortably with Craig McGaw doubling on lead guitar and sitar while Satwant Singh continually switched from organ to drums to tablas to bongos, depending upon the mood of the material being performed. It should be mentioned here that Satwant has been with the group for only six months. How they existed without him is almost mind staggering!!

Several times during their two hour concert, Susan brought the house down with her cute gestures while her sporting hubby looked on! Entertainment is the Poppy Family's keynote whether singing material such as "In The Summertime", "I'm Not Angry", "Gotta Travel On", "White Lightning", or "It Will Take A Long Time To Forget". The above five tunes all happened to be country and western flavoured

To round out the first half of their show, five minute separate solos of both the sitar and tablas were presented to a slowly becoming restless audience! Restless for an intermission break, I mean!!

"Ode To Billie Joe" opened the second half with Susan dressed in somewhat scant western attire, much to the delight of the males in the audience. But it was "Paper Sun" that proved the group's versatility featuring the sitar and tablas. Jefferson Airplane material done in fine style were "Somebody To Love" and their well chosen finale "White Rabbit".

Solo performance of "Beyond The Clouds", "Which Way You Goin" Billy?" and the groups third smash hit single "That's Where I Went Wrong" provided Susan with a chance to demonstrate her incredible range of vocal talents. These three selections just mentioned have all seen top 10 action on charts coast to coast in Canada as single releases with two of them attaining the Number 1 slot. These three hit songs are all included on their LP "Which Way You Goin' Billy?".

Other songs given the Poppy Family treatment were, Buddy Holly's "Everday", Spanky and Our Gang's, "Give A Damn", Jimi Hendrix's "All Along The Watchtower", Hamilton Camp's "This Wheel's On Fire", and finally the Youngblood's "Grizzly Bear". It was only natural that their repertoire also included their theme song "Little Red Poppies".

Following their cross Canada tour, the Poppy Family leave for Osaka Japan, for a limited engagement at Expo '70.

BUCK KEEPS MOVING UP

Toronto: Gary Buck, who heads up the Capitol/Beechwood Music complex, but is perhaps better known as a top rated country singer and producer, has made excellent inroads into the Canadian country music scene. His latest Capitol deck "Wayward Woman Of The World" rests easily at the No. 5 position on the RPM Country fifty and shows good sales returns which should move the single even further up the chart.

Buck, when not producing for other pop and country artists, keeps up a full time booking pattern. Both he and Donna Ramsay, whom he produces and who also releases on Capitol, are off for a three day date at the Prince Albert Winter Festival commencing Feb 17. Gary goes on alone to the Purple Steer in Vancouver from Feb 25 for four days and completes several one niters throughout Western Canada.



THE IMAGE OF FORMAT RADIO IN CANADA TODAY

It is fifty years plus since voice and music came out of a box in Canada and broadcasting was born. The radio industry has experienced many evolutions. One is the advent of formula radio. The results are just a little less than the radio business would like. The image of pop radio (top 40) is anything but savoury in Canada.

Hit parade radio has a persecution complex. Their biggest enemy seems to be the daily press. If the (top 40) radio station owns the newspaper, the criticisms are lessened somewhat, but if they are competing in the market of freedom of speech, the (top 40) operation is criticized often and harshly. How did it come about? What excuse could they have and how can they improve their image?

National magazines put the blame on the lack of Canadian identity mainly with pop music stations. The theory that's obviously very deep indicate that not only has AM rooted, is that pop radio has a great influence on the young and in an attempt to rate high in the nose count they are forgetting that Canada is the country where they operate. Radio is going through a phase of fear. Television has all but become nothing of a threat. Today the pop music station isn't creating record sales. They really aren't aware that they aren't directing their sound at the audience that is there to be had. The result is a strong swing to records with a meaning. The formula is in the dying stages. The sale of a greater variety of records to the 25 and

under crowd is creating the problem for radio that the movie industry has just been crippled by.

When formula radio began, it was directed at the teenybopper. The 9 to 13 group often had a transistor for every occasion. The single was king and (top 40) radio was selling the simplest form of music ever created. Today, the single is on its last leg.

Record men despair at their warehouses filled with single returns. Dealers hesitate to stock singles because of an increasing lack of consumers. The LP is king. Today the radio listener is a young adult. He is affluent and he is aware. Radio has become the last resort in hearing music that would interest him. The lack of programming of LPs like the Led Zepplin's two albums (when compared to the sales) radio failed to judge their listener. but FM radio (with poor ratings) has not been able to keep up with the underground press sufficiently to create record sales. That is the real nose count of the consumers' value of radio. Will they move to buy what radio is playing.?

Could this new trend result in a bigger market for the underground press and will advertisers soon be looking at the underground tabliods for the audience that will buy their product? All these questions seem to be valid as the tastes and thinking of the new genera-

Warner's First Convention (Canada)

Toronto: January 29 through February 1st turned out to be three eye opening dates for the sales and promotion staff of Warner Bros./Atlantic. Although formed some two and a half years ago, this was the first time the company could find a sufficient break to allow east to meet west in the heart of Upper Canada, and even this was a bit of a problem in view of the hot situation the firm and its allied labels are currently enjoying.

The convention, helmed by Ken Middleton, vice president and general manager of the Canadian operation, was well calculated to instill inter-company excitement and send the gathering back to their home bases with a fresh new image of their young and "in" company. Much of this excitment and smooth flowing of presentations was due the efforts of Clyde McGregor, national sales manager and Mike Doyle, merchandising manager, and Joe Edwards, comptroller, who received a sizeable assist from local promotion manager Tom Williams.

Toronto's posh Sutton Place supplied the covering for the big show. Laced with the good things that are better when free, the Warner/Atlantic crew were able to get most of what they wanted at Convention headquarters but many ventured out into the streets of hogtown in search of visiting talent. Tom Williams spread the word that Atco artist Jerry Jeff Walker was appearing at the Pornographic Onion which made for a large sized and enthusiastic company crowd to beef up Walker's already successful two days.

Warner Bros. Product Presentation took up the major part of the first day's happening and the bombshell that Mo Ostin threw at the crowd

called for a few quick ones to settle down the proceedings. Ostin, who had become just plain Mo as second in command of the huge Warner Bros. recording complex, was from here on in, to be called President Mo. "It was Friday night and all through the convention not a word could be heard over the guzzling of good cheer when Mo said 'Hold on guys, there's hot news for your opener. - I'm no longer just Mo, I'm President Mo'." What Ostin had broken was news that Mike Maitland, had suddenly stepped down as president. As mentioned, the news stunned the gathering who, for the most part, had become closely associated with the dynamic Maitland over the past couple of years. Maitland is expected to take a well deserved rest before looking into other phases of the music industry. Assisting in the breaking of the news was Ostin's right hand man, Joe Smith, who was upped to the post of executive vice president and general manager of Warner Bros. Records. Also included in the Warner's VIP package was Phil Rose, vice president of international activities for the label.

Among the thirty one new releases from Warner/Reprise were several exceptional standouts including the new Gordon Lightfoot set "Minstrel Of The Dawn" which has caused sufficient back ordering for an initial pressing of over 80,000 and a simultaneous U.S. release with a large sized promotion push from that quarter as well. Other goodies with a Canadian flavouring included the new album from Joni Mitchell and Neil Young, the latter now moved in with Crosby, Stills and Nash, remains with the Canadian Warner operation

	operation, on Atlantic.
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Sunday was devoted to The Age Of Atlantic and the largest release in the company's history. This included releases on Atco, and two new and very hot labels, Cotillion and Embryo. This presentation was "mind bending" from the word go. The only function necessary, from host Middleton, was a short introduction and the push of a button and The Age Of Atlantic. all 80 minutes was flashed on a screen revealing one of the most costly and effective productions ever attempted by a record company. Producer of the film, Lanny Forlenzo, was in attendance along with Jim Sotos, president of Zorba Productions, under whose banner the film was produced. This full colour sound production presented many reasons why Atlantic is regarded as the top record company in the business. The excitement generated by the well selected cuts with appropriate voice-over by top U.S. radio personality Jack Roscoe was the 'piece de resistance'' for the meeting. It's expected this film will be edited down so as to provide video for television stations across Canada with the possibility of some of Roscoe's patter being put together for FM underground and AM free form stations.

Atlantic execs in attendance included Mrs. Patricia Mulligan, international department; Bob Konnheiser, vice president and general manager of the tape division- David Glew, national sales manager; and Dick Krizman, regional manager Cleveland.

From Lord Sutch, to Troika "from the far reaches of Canada" (Edmonton) to Joe Edwards, who guards the pursestrings for Warner Bros, and from Vogue Production manager Vincent Ranallo to that big beautiful and talented new acquisition Jacques Chenier, new Quebec branch manager, who will soon make the bi-bi town sing out with top sales, to the young and very photogenic west coaster Bruce Bissell and from the new ranchero-looking Mike Reid, now Calgary branch manager to the big lovable Al Dubin, director of Publicity for Warner Bros. Pictures, and to the equally lovable Ontario branch manager Gordon Edwards and all the sales and promotion men who returned to their homes with a new lease on the success pattern of the giant Warner Bros./ Reprise complex with a bag of flavouring from Atlantic/ Atco, the meeting has the high point of the year for the firm.



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Everly Bros Vogues-Two Worlds Apart

Toronto: The Vogues, one of the most polished pop foursomes on the club circuit, moved into the barn-like Imperial Room of the Royal York Hotel and promptly became victims of Hogtown snobbishness. This top rated Reprise group who, last year, tucked over 200 successful college dates under their belts, including a few in Canada, just couldn't seem to communicate. Their act is exciting and smooth and repertoire the kind that should have created a warm atmosphere. Most of the patrons were probably CFRB listeners, if indeed they listened to radio, so should have been familiar with "Turn Around Look At Me", which sold a million and a half records. They should have also been familiar with "My Special Angel" and "No Not Much'', which sent the Vogues into the top of the charts. Perhaps all the fault didn't lay with the patrons. It was obvious the Vogues weren't clued in on the massiveness of the room and opening night revealed the usual problems that tend to look even worse when the opener falls on Friday (new Imperial Room policy). The Vogues were born ten years too late for the Imperial Room.

On the other hand and in a suburban part of Toronto, The Everly Brothers, played to packed houses and, in fact, had patrons returning to catch their act. They played the 800 seater Hook and Ladder Club of the Beverly Seaway and owner Jack Fisher couldn't be happier. Part of the Everly charm is the fact they are "earthy", a term usually reserved for country folk. Country flavouring is still very much in evidence. This trip into Toronto they brought along a trio that added even more to their suave. professionalism. They warmed the house with some of their oldies including: "Bye Bye Love", and "Suzy Q", brought us slightly up to date with "Bowling Green", the big hit that made them such a fantastic draw when they played Toronto's Embassy a couple of years ago, and brought the house right up to date with numbers from "Hair" and other goodies from today's bag. The brothers were in complete control of their audience which was predominently made up of young sophisticates who could afford the tab.

He said that first class facilities for camping, food, sanitation and medical care will be provided for an anticipated crowd of up to one million young people from around the world.

their lack of Canadianism or lack of knowledge of the record business. Radio stations have become supporters of legislation since many have already indicated they plan to enter record production. Making records is, in fact, more lucrative than operating a radio station — if successful.

As one independent put it, the 30% figures means, "Two foreign records, one Canadian, two foreign records, one Canadian, three foreign records, one Canadian." Three records out of ten would have to be Canadian in content as defined (and rather well) by the CRTC.

In April of 1968, RPM ran a ten part series on why Canadian radio should be legislated. Canadian producers went to Ottawa to meet

Ryerson's annual satirical revue – subtitled "The Gap" – effectively utilized and blended the talents of Canadian actor Robert Christie as director and Paul J.A. Chaput, as producer, proving that the generation gap in the entertainment field is practically non-existent.

one of the most highly polished productions Ryerson has staged. The use of film was in good taste, well synchronized, and at times, hilariously unusual. Quietly psychedelic lighting and sparse sets created the mood without providing actual settings. A mood unlimited by time or location, e.g. one skit set in the B.C. era.

Originally-composed music, supplied by the Saint Petersburg Philharmonic (vibrant six piece band), under the expert direction of Ian McCutcheon, came across cleverly and professionally.

But it was the troupe of 13 who made the technical excellence worth-while.

Reflecting the attitudes of today's peace oriented youth, the performers (in mildly conservative unisex outfits) moved quickly from one skit to another, with no-holds-barred-on topics: government, the police, drugs, sex, educational system, religion, and of course Ryerson's Rye-o-Mat and the Board of Governors; all presented in a brilliantly witty style that offended no one.

Though everyone pulled his share of the weight to make the evening a success, there are a few who deserve special mention: Natalie; besides being a good comedienne, possesses a powerhouse of a voice. Susan Lumsden; competent voice, good looks and unusual ability for musical-comedy acting. Brian Bobbie; the most versatile of them all. He did everyone from Christ to McLuhan with a unique style. Subtle.

All the necessary ingredients in right proportions helped "Riot" bring its message to the nearly with members of the CRTC. Individual industry people, ACTRA and the AF of M lobbied heavily to protect Canada's musical talent and performers. BMI (Canada) and CAPAC worked hard to bring the problems of the Canadian musician to the attention of the government. Daily papers and the industry trade papers brought the problem to the attention of the trade and the public. The sweeping changes are harsher for the TV broadcaster who, in many ways, may have to originate his Canadian content. The radio industry will continue to be supplied records made by independents and record companies. The U.S. controlled record companies will now he able to justify the cost of production in Canada and will, no doubt, encourage the use of Canadian content records released by record companies which were produced by independent firms and leased to record companies.

A few problems remain. The airplay has been licked, but the cost of recording in Canada will still lead many producers to record in the United States and England. This is not the problem of the CRTC, who have already done their share to assist Canadian talent. The next step is to recruit the Economic Council and the Minister of Finance and the Minister of Trade and Commerce and impresson them that it's not feasible to record or produce in Canada. The new ruling allows production outside of Canada and will continue to be a drain on Canadian facilities. The tax structure governing records, commercials and movies are all anti-Canadian production. Moves are presently being made to make this clear. Until then, make the cheque payable to a U.K.or U.S. studio, but at least Canadians will be working even if they have to leave to do a session, a filming, or a commercial.

Juneau and his group have done their job well. Juneau may be disliked but he is well respected, and after all this kind of legislation is Canadian and up until now AM programming wasn't. The wheels of legislation are slow but at least they didn't grind to a stop. THANK YOU.
