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

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Gordon Hill, one of the very kind and gentle people of our industry, passed away in his 47th. year, Friday June 12, 1970. A very big booster of Canada's country artists, Gord was also responsible for the launching of many young new talents into the world of country entertain-ment. His trips to "Music City" (Nashville) for the Country Convention, became a once a year pilgrimage. Besides meeting with new and old U.S. country friends, he became one of our best known country ambassadors and counted among his many friends several of the top names in the business including Johnny Cash and George Hamilton IV.

It was Gord Hill who, along with Ben Kerr, helped launch the country career of Bernie Early, who's Columbia record "Chaser For The Blues" became nationally known. It was

Murray To Make US TV Debut

Nova Scotia-born television personality and Capitol recording artist Anne Murray is set to make her first American national television appearance June 27th. Anne will be doing a guest appearance on the syndicated variety show, "Upbeat", produced at WEWS in Cleveland. The show is to be aired through over eight stations across the U.S. including KTLA in Los Angeles and WPIX in New York. Although better known for his good deeds to country folk, Gord was also highly respected as an industry printer and detail man. He had been associated with Columbia Records for eleven years as head of their printing department and branched out to do independent printing as a service to the industry. He later formed his own company, Hill Lithographers, which he developed into a very successful business, showing even greater potential at time of his death.

Gord's sudden passing was an added shock being as he had always appeared in good health, and was a constant visitor, often three or four times a week, to **RPM** and our neighbouring art firm, Groovyart. He had become a very dear friend and business associate. His recent complaints of headaches led to his lapsing into a coma, the week of June 8th., where, at Toronto's Sunnybrook Hospital, he appeared to rally but suffered a relapse. Death was attributed to a brain hemorrhage.

Our sincerest sympathy to Gord's wife Dolena, his four children Ricky, David, Eleanor and Glenn, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Hill.

The Town's Wagon Wheel Pub introduced a new Canadian recording artist (1) in Johnny Thorson who, along with his own banjo. teams up with ragtime pianist Alex Reed. He is also set for a CBC-TV debut within the next few weeks. A native of Winnipeg, he took his schooling in Calgary. He is the son of Dr. S.B. Thorson, a specialist in internal medicine in Calgary. He didn't dig the medical profession and after a couple of years of college it was a toss up between social work and the banjo. The banjo won out. He is one of the most gifted banjo pluckers in the business, having lived with a four string plectrum banjo since the age of 12. He explains his reason for the plectrum over the tenor because "it's longnecked for chord melody." He refers to chord melody as "You get the lead notes and a full chord. On the tenor banjo it's more singlestring notes." Thorson adds a new dimension to the banjo sound which is often restricted to Dixieland, honky-tonk, or roaring twenties. He has had much success adding contemporary rhythms.

His Capitol recording shows his versatility with the banjo on material ranging from "So What's New, "Dr. Zhivago Theme" and "Tiger Rag".

Poor Souls Promotion Paying Off

Quality's recent promotion of the Barry Keane production of "Lookin' Round" by The Poor Souls, has been credited with picking up several chart listings across

Canada.

CHEX program director Don O'Neil (Peterboro), took the time to drop Quality's Lee Farley a note pointing up the value of the label's attention-getter promotion. What O'Neil was referring to was the tin cup and pencils package, appropriately engraved with "give to the Poor Souls" which was sent to radio personalities across Canada.

Notes Farley: "This is what we like to hear now and then. Makes our efforts seem worthwhile."

Lightfoot Surpasses CSN & Y

Tom Williams, Warner Brothers Ontario Promotion Manager, reports that the first Gordon Lightfoot LP for the Reprise label "Sit Down Young Stranger" has now surpassed the Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young outing of "Deja Vu" in the Toronto area. Although slightly behind on a national level, the Lightfoot effort is steadily gaining on American Warners product including the heavy selling "Easy Rider" soundtrack. Lightfoot has received much praise on the content and quality of the new album from press and radio people across the country. The set is also the object of heavy promo from the company below the border. Chuck Benson. production manager at CJYR/CKYR, has reported a highly successful Lightfoot contest with listeners submitting lists of Lightfoot compositions. Response was measured in the thousands with Mike Reed, Warners' promo man in Calgary supplying the station with copies of the LP for prizes. "The Poor Little Allison" cut is being accorded heavy exposure across the country from top forty. MOR and underground outlets.

Guess Who Catching In Britain

Bernie Welch, of the Hamilton Spectator, reports that while on a recent visit to the British Isles. the Guess Who deck of "American Woman'' was the subject of intensive plugging by the governmentowned BBC 1. The radio network preceded playing of the former number-one single across North America with chatter urging support of the Canadian disc. The Winnipegbased group's most recent LP, also titled "American Woman' received good airplay on most of the cuts. This marks the first intensive support given a Canadian rock group by the BBC.

Ampex Bows Mini-Merchandiser

Ampex of Canada has introduced a new Mini-Merchandiser to display and sell Ampex blank cassette tapes. Tagged the "Ampex 300 Series Cassette Merchandiser", the unit measures only seven inches square yet has a capacity



of up to eighty packages with provision for sixty, ninety and one hundred and twenty minute tapes. It is the lazy susan type permitting the browsing customer to rotate the merchandiser to the cassette configuration desired. The package comes from Ampex fully assembled and stocked with forty 60-minute, twenty 90-minute and twenty 120minute blank Ampex cassette tapes.

Hair Group Skeds Day Of Joy

Saturday, June 13th. was set aside by Rudy Brown and some of the cast of the Toronto production of Hair as the date of a free festival of live entertainment on Toronto's Centre Island. Entertainment to be provided will include Robin White and the Slaughterhouse, Rudy Brown, Gale Garnett, the Ryan Brothers, Brenda Gordon, Frank Moore, Tobi Lark and Jim Peters with Jackson Park. Other performers, musicians and groups were added. There was no admission charge of any kind. The only cost was the twenty-five-cent ferry ride from the foot of York St. The excellent turnout was everything expected by the promoters and no bad incidents to mar the day.



Early Morning Pacts For Music Distribution

Early Morning Music, a division of Early Morning Productions Ltd., has pacted with Warner Brothers Music Inc., for distribution of the company's sheet music. Warners will distribute Early Morning Music folios in conjunction with the release of each new Gordon Lightfoot LP on the Reprise label. In addition they will distribute sheet music on each Lightfoot single release. The first product to issue under the agreement is "Sit Down Young Stranger". Warners are set to distribute the folios in the US and England and Canadian Music Sales will handle them in Canada.

Warwick-Koffman Pack O'Keefe

The June 14th appearance of Dionne Warwick, Scepter recording artist, and Revolver star Moe Koffman, pulled a capacity house to this CKFM/A&A presentation. In view of the heavy demand for tickets, press passes were apparently suspended by the O'Keefe Centre, however, RPM's reviewer Claire Louise Lalonde was so intent on catching Miss Warwick's act, she joined the box office lineup. Her review follows:

A short but polished performance.....

The only disappointing factor about the Dionne Warwick show (14) was the short actual stage appearance made by Miss Warwick.

After a lengthy first half of Moe Koffman (whose musical appearance was enhanced by Lenny Breau, Rob McConnell, and Doug Riley), plus the intermission, we finally got the first taste of the promised evening.

The Constellations, one of the brightest male trios in a long time, whetted our appetite with a performance of polished choreography and vocal arrangements.

Polished was also the word for Dionne Warwick. When she finally did come on, the night of "music to remember", in her words, went much too quickly for the enthusiastic audience.

Here is a performer with unusually well-balanced warmth and power, interpretatively and vocally, whether the song was "Walk On By", "I'll Never Fall In Love Again", or "Promises, Promises". It has been said that hers is an extremely flexible voice, sensitve to timing as well as lyrics. It was, indeed, emphasized at the O'Keefe for this very critical Toronto Sunday crowd.

The finale (a medley of five numbers — mostly Bacharach material) done with the expert backing of the Constellations, conveyed the theme of peace and brotherly love, most effectively.

The evening seemed shorter by the fact that Miss Warwick did not answer the curtain call or appear for the encore.

Canadian Revolver recording group, CHIMO, made a special appearance in the lounge of the O'Keefe during the intermission of the Dionne Warwick Show.

Evidently the packed house helped give CHIMO a larger audience, therefore, greater exposure.

Though the set was not a long one,

These year end Awards are presented by RPM to the most deserving artists and companies at an elaborate Awards Presentation.


Most important to the winner will be the honour of being the holder of a special Award to signify for all time that the recipient supplied a suitable title for the Award.

Fruition of Canadian Country Scene By Walt Grealis

The Canadian country scene is fast taking on a much different image. It is, in fact, becoming Canadian. Much of the change is due the efforts of songwriters, country radio personalites, record companies and a fine fine quality effort by Canadian country artists. Some of the names that come to mind include George Taylor, The Mercey Brothers, Gary Buck, Dick Damron, Bev Munro, Donn Petrack, Bob McAdorey, D'Arcy Scott, Mike Graham, Lynn Jones, Angus Walker, Jury Krytiuk, Don Turner, Donna Ramsay, Stompin' Tom Connors, Judy Lynn, Ben Kerr, Roy McCaull, Mickey Sheppard, Tommy Hunter, Ray Griff, Gene McLellan, Rhythm Pals and many many others including the late Gordon Hill, who passed away June 12 of this year (see obituary). Radio stations have also done much in pushing the Canadian country image, and without damage to their ratings. John Hart, of the giant CFGM, has established an "open door" policy for new and established Canadian country recording acts. Yorkton's CJGX has also adopted a "push Canadian" policy and their Ron Waddell reports excellent acceptance by listeners. There are many more people across the country, too numerous to mention here, who have put their backs behind our new found country greats. RPM will be spotlighting these people as the weeks go by and will make an all-out effort to gather more news on the domestic country scene.

A newcomer, Mike Graham, has exploded onto the scene with a Rodeo single, produced by Gary Buck, entitled "No Pity For A Fool". The plug side was also written by Buck (Beechwood Music-BMI) with the flip "Sad Sad Fact" out of Graham's own catalogue of original material. Graham's deck makes another move up the RPM Country Fifty to No. 20 and from reports received by radio stations, record stores and London's Ontario sales manager, Ken McFarland, it looks good for Graham to make even greater advances.

Graham has been a fairly quiet country boy. Born in October of 1942, he took an interest in music at the age five with piano instruction from Torontonian Boris Berlin. Mike didn't get the country calling in the beginning. He started out a little confused like most of today's youngsters and trod the rock and roll path, as a feature singer with The Rockatones. He became a big name with the rock and rollers of 1959 and kept it up until 1961 when he moved to Montreal. Still scratching with the rockers, he joined a group known as The Roadrunners and ran throughout Canada and the U.S. sharing billings with some of the big names of the day like Joey Dee and The Starliters, The Ronettes, and many more.

Graham suddenly saw the light of country, in 1965. He dropped all his associations with the "hipsters" and moved into the glorious feeling of insecurity with the Canadian country crowd. At this time domestic country successes could be counted on one hand. Anyway, after hours, day, weeks, and three years of pickin' and writin' and catalogin' an impressive volume of his own material. He was, by now, somewhat of a hermit. He preferred to stay out of the limelight and restricted his joy-taking to just hearing other singers perform his material. He had several of his copyrights published by Summerlea Music of Montreal, a few of which he'll revive on his soon-to-be-released Rodeo album.

The next move for Graham was back to Ontario and a somewhat settling in Southwestern Ontario. He got the itch to perform again and became a fairly big name throughout the area with a reward later of his own weekly television show on CFPL-TV London, No slouch when it comes to finding solid employment when the circuit runs a little dry, Graham moved into the publishing business in a big way. He impressed Andrew Twa, president of Berandol Music, with his administrative abilities, and was appointed vice president of this powerful pubbery.

Graham had been kicking around the recording idea for several years but hadn't really wanted to become involved until he felt he was ready. He checked out a few of the new and old record bustin' types and clicked with the old master himself, George Taylor, one of the pioneers of the Canadian country disc business. Much of Graham's push was through his association with some of the solid and sincere people in the business. Another famous booster of the Canadian scene, Whitey Hains of BMI (Canada), was also instrumental in furthering Graham's record career. Next for this young country talent was a tie-in with record producer Gary Buck. The rest is shaping up to be an exciting and a very nice feeling for all those who have helped Mike Graham become one of the new and very great Canadian country talents.

Live Acts On "Luncheon Date"

The recent successful "live" performance of Jacqui and Lindsay (Morgan) on the CBC-TV "Luncheon Date" has apparently caused major changes and extra buck spending for the publically owned Corporation. With youthful producer Nigel Napier-Andrews, ever conscious and fearful of the generation gap, at the helm, Elwood Glover has, not only developed a "Pop popper" image but, control of one of the most highly rated network shows, seen at that time. It is hoped a better time scheduling is in order for this easy going noon-hour show for the housewives and shut-ins. It is expected however, that Glover and his one cameraman will be joined by another, maybe two cameramen, a larger audience and, of course, another location and perhaps a trio of musicians. What makes the foregoing almost fact is the increasing of Glover's show to 90 minutes, Sept. 7th., which makes almost impossible, the present set-up.

He's apparently been successful in talking the Corporation into increasing the budget of the show by paying for this added attraction. Jacqui and Lindsay have been signed for a return date (July 17) and the following between now and then: (19) folksinger Karen Jones; (26) folksinger Dee Higgins; (29) Irish folksinger Owen McBride; (Jul 6) Columbia recording artist Francois Jourdain.

Reason for the signing of only singles and doubles is the limited space available in the lobby of the Four Seasons Hotel, where the show is presently shot. Even with two, the cameraman works

It is hoped, Andrews won't be plagued by the old guard CBC performers who just don't communicate anymore - if they ever did.

Live At Leeds Breaking Records

Compo's Allan Matthews reports that the company's latest Who release on the Decca label, "Live at Leeds" is turning into one of the hottest properties they have handled in some time. 

Capitol's Brian Browne a Sound Canadian

"We sent a tape to the music department of a California high school. One hundred and fifty pupils between the ages of 12 and 16 listened to it. They all liked it but some had never in their lives heard instrumental music!"

(Brian Browne)

It must've been quite an experience; even for those who've heard instrumental music, it's something else to listen to Brian Browne and his trio. Those who came to the George (where the trio is currently playing) in Toronto, come to hear talent at its best, and they get it.

Montreal-born Brian Browne has been grooming himself for ten years for the so-called big break, by playing the major gigs in Toronto and appearing on coastto-coast television. He studied for a while at Berkley in Boston, then under Oscar Peterson in Toronto. But another Peterson he is not; he's individualistic.

Brian's keyboard work is brilliant, clear, emotive (somewhat like that of his favourite - Glen Gould), always in good taste. The tone is rich, colourful and smooth; the sound almost tight. He does the arranging as well as some of the composing. In his usual un-



assuming manner, he claims; "We don't really do any composing. We have a few originals we always work on and if they're good enough to record, then we give them a name."

Like the "Bread Song"; one of the numbers on the album which once was used for a bread commercial. "It was done twice as fast, with strings and harpsichord." explains Brian. When they decided to record it, they toned it down, and gave it the only name they could think of.

In recordings as well as in person, Brian plays a fine cross-section of music ranging from rock - "Hi-Heel Sneakers", and folk - "If I Were a Carpenter", to ballads "What the World Needs Now" and jazz - Brian's own "Morning, Noon and Nighttime, Too".

Speaking of albums; "The Letter" seems to be paving the road well for the next Capitol album - yet untitled - which ought to be a gas. It's total Moog Synthesizer. Brian's recent single made good gains on the RPM 100 chart.

While waiting for the release of the next single or album, Brian Browne is doing commercials, backup work on CBC's "After Noon" show, as well as on albums (He did the first Anne Murray album).

Brian is well-supported musically by Skip Beckwith, bass, with Brian for eight years, and Bruce Philp on drums, with Brian and Skip for one year. Brian may be the leader but he doesn't steal the spotlight. All three blend to give a very unique sound that should click with all music-lovers.



When Mr. and Mrs. Lindsay Morgan moved from Cardiff Wales to Burlington Ontario, three years ago, there only wish was to be happy together, with a possible family, and maybe a furthering of their singing and songwriting careers. This son of Captain Thomas Morgan had, with his wife, been associated with a Welsh gospel group for six years which was a little difficult to fold into the memory chest.

Prior to coming to Canada, Lindsay had entered his composition "Rape Of The Fair Country" (previously entitled "A Song Of Wales") in a BBC "Song For Wales" contest conducted in honour of the investiture of The Prince Of Wales (1969). Out of 650 entries, Linday's took second place, which carried a cash prize of 70 pounds. They were settled in Canada when informed of the win. It should be noted this song was written over three years ago, when ecology was just another "smart college word". Lindsay had worked the Welsh mines and had become heart sick over the pollution menace becoming so much a part of the countryside day after day.

Married and happy they are, but settled, they're not, although they have just bought themselves a new home in Burlington, from where they hope to tour.

They played a few of the clubs around Hamilton and Burlington and continued to pen a large repertoire of original material. Lindsay formed his own pubbery, Rido Music (BMI) to look after his growing catalogue.


One of their big breaks came while playing Ottawa/Hull's Duvernay Hotel. Andy Anka, father of the famous Paul, who heads up a successful management firm, caught Jacqui and Lindsay's act and was completely gassed. He signed them to a management contract and since the signing many new doors have opened for the talented couple. They were signed to play the newly renovated Jarvis House, located in Toronto's "Hairy district" and managed to attract a better than usual class of customer. Toronto beer halls have long been notorious for Friday night fights, even without tele-

Currently playing the Brass Rail in Halifax, they'll be back for Ontario dates shortly including a return engagement on "Luncheon Date", July 17.



James Taylor At Carnegie Hall


James Taylor performed two sellout concerts at Carnegie Hall this past weekend, and it is obvious that he is the object of a growing cult....Hundreds of fans, (and there seemed to a lot of girls among them) applauded



his every move. He was unbelievably charming, very much at ease, and performed a variety of songs in a highly pleasing manner.

Accompanying himself on acoustic guitar, or with his backup band, which included the famed songwriter Carol King "Up On The Roof"), Danny Cootch on guitar - who is a real talent and his drummer and bassist. James Taylor showed constrasting moods. He was up for "Knocking Around My Soup" and "Don't Talk Now'', mellow on "Sweet Baby James", "Carolina On My Mind", and bluesy for "Steam-rollin' Man". Although he looks as if he isn't really aware that he's there, his music comes through loud and clear. And everybody was hanging on every note. Everyone I called on the phone the next day had the James Taylor albums on their record players something's happening.

The next night Melanie occupied Carnegie Hall's stage and, although I would rather hear James



Taylor sing "Carolina On My Mind" - she had her share of fans who cheered as she sang "Lay Down", "What Have They Done To My Song" and others, including a rather jarring version of "Ruby Tuesday". Wearing a magnificent gown of purple and brocaded velvet, Melanie was a huge hit. On the bill with her were Brewer and Shipley, a folk duo, who have an album produced by Nick Gravenites and Mike Bloomfield. They performed a few songs from that album and accompanied themselves on acoustic guitars. They were a pleasant surprise and I was sorry they didn't play more than they did.

Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young played six nights at the Fillmore and my feeling about their performance was that Nash and Crosby are going to eventually just be together and hopefully Stills and Young will re-form Buffalo Springfield, or do something together! Nash really offends me with his cutesy rapping, and the acoustic set is far too long. Each one of them has a little spot to themselves, and perhaps the real highlight of the night. I was there when Steve Stills played "For What It's Worth" on the piano and got into a whole long political, ad lib rap - chant-like thing. It was fantastic and had the whole Fillmore audience out of their seats. Neil Young also was great doing his own songs, alone like: "Cinnamon Girl" and "Down By The River". Other than that, the group played all of the material from both of their million selling albums, and some new material as well. The night they finished, Bill Graham gave a party for them and The Who and C.S.N.Y. jammed onstage for awhile and made some of the best music I've heard them do.

Other forms of youth culture..... ...''Harlan Smythe Grossfeld'' is a new book by author **Henry Ed**wards, a frequent contributor to underground magazines. The book deals with **Grossfeld**, who is a teacher in a ghetto school by day, and a combination social climber-celebrity-hippie by night. The characters in the book are all part of the underground-alternate culture scene in New York City, and many familiar faces can be seen.....It is a hilariously funny book, yet has a great deal



to say about the scene in general. Read it.

"The Strawberry Statement" was screened in NYC last week and was extremely well received. It is a moving film, a thinly disguised account of what happened at Columbia University during the student strike, and any faults the film may have tend to be overlooked (perhaps due to the emotional relationship it has to political events of late) because it is an honest attempt to tell what happened, what is happening and what will happen on the campuses of this country.



I see by a recent story in RPM that booking agencies are finally going to organize. It's about time. They've all been working at cross purposes and I feel sure if they can get together, they'll make many good changes. There are a number of things they can do. They can certainly improve their own public relations within the industry. I would say, that at the moment, booking agencies rightly deserve the low opinion the public has of them through some of the people representing this important arm of showbusiness. The lack of interest some booking agencies have in looking after their clients and their own businesses is good reason for the industry to look down at the lack of ethics and sloppiness of the average booking agency. The fact that many agencies do not abide by any rules, either industry or ethical, brings further disdain to the booking industry.

Unfortunately, when one booking agency is unethical, all the others are forced to join in the ruthlessness or close their business. It would only take one successful ethical booking agency to turn the tables and make all the others toe the line. A good agency could take over the cream of the business. It would put an end to the agency that cheats. threatens, books underscale and uses the musician as a pawn. It would upgrade the dignity of the agency business and the musician as well.
