What cost — promotion?

Mickey mousing around with nickel and dime promotions has long been the only method of promotion used by record companies. Buy off a couple of radio stations with a bundle of promotional albums - sponsor a dinner for two lucky listeners with their favourite "zing-digger" jock - lay an album on a lucky record buyer - and get enough press to tell the folks back home (head office) that you are "gettin' the message across". Now, there is early indications that a new breed of thinking promotion man - and liberal head office, are about to emerge. How about a promotion that can almost guarantee a sale of more than 100,000 copies of an album?

First, you must have an album or an artist, Canadian or otherwise, to turn the trick. So, you shelve your nickel and dime promotions until that right product comes along. Then you get your boss involved in "the promotion of a lifetime". It might happen only a half dozen times a year, but you are moving product and building your own and your company's image.

That happy, creative face on your right belongs to Scott Richards, national promotion manager for MCA Records (Canada). He has just wrapped up a promotion that stirred his industry counterparts and chalked up "another successful promotion for MCA Canada".

MCA had the product to begin with - "The Sting" soundtrack, and their sister firm, Universal Pictures, had the film......an advantage over some, no doubt. Richards

CRAZY DAVID BAND OFF WITH SINGLE

Crazy David Band will shortly bow the record scene with their initial single release for Crazy David Records, "U.I.C. Blues" (Unemployment Insurance Commission). The Canadian T-Shirt King, David Keller, has taken a unique approach to the record distribution business and will market and distribute his record product coast to coast in Canada — themselves. The firm's promotion manager, Jim Watson, will deal directly with interested record dealers and asks that enquiries be made to the firm's Toronto offices at 545 King Street West.

The single (CZY 001) is also being marketed in Germany, Austria and Switzerland through Crazy David's International of Gleisdorf, Austria.

The Crazy David Band comprises John Mackntosh, lead; Bill Yatsula, 2nd lead; David Monis, drums; Bruce Barrow, bass; and Keller on organ and vocals. The group have been involved in a number of promotional activities primarily in the Toronto area including "Miles for Millions" and

according to Watson: "during the coming months the group will gradually emerge from playing stores and schools into a club and concert act".

A heavy national promotion push is being planned for the record in Canada and in Europe to include the production of a special T-Shirt to be marketed nationally.

LIAM MULLAN BACK ON PROMO SCENE

Liam Mullan, former national and west coast promotion manager for A&M Records, has returned to the record business via Mushroom Records. The west coast firm has hired Mullan to do independent promotion for the label in Quebec and Ontario. He will work in conjunction with GRT, distributors of the Mushroom label in eastern Canada.

Mushroom first came into prominence with single releases by Songbird ("I Believe") Tom Middleton's backup group, and Alexis ("Hands Across The Dining Room Table"). Productions are handled by Mike Flicker and Steve Douglas for Can Base Productions.

LIGHTHOUSE PACTS WITH LABATT'S

Canada's Group of the Year (Juno), Lighthouse, and Labatt's Brewery have worked out an agreement that should be beneficial to both parties. The GRT group will commence their fifty-nine stop tour of Canada (May 28) prior to which they will produce a series of radio commercials for Labatt's. During the seventy-five day tour, the brewery will host a series of media and industry receptions along the way. On completion of the tour Lighthouse will perform ten goodwill concerts on behalf of Labatt's with proceeds being turned over to charity.

The pact as well as the tour is rather unique for a Canadian group. Although the strength of Lighthouse has come from the major markets, the group's management and leader Skip Prokop have always made attempts to play the smaller communities that often miss the excitement of a top name group. This tour will be no exception with perhaps more concentration on less populated areas than ever before.

Labatt's have been one of the few major Canadian firms to utilize Canadian talent and with this Lighthouse tour will open the door even wider for a Canadian-identity with a Canadian product. Mr. D. J. McDougall, president of Labatt's, stated: "We're delighted to undertake this agreement with Lighthouse, adding, "Corporations are often accused of being insensitive to what is really happening. Lighthouse is what's happening in music, and we're proud to be a part of their success."

AMERICAN RED CROSS APPLAUDS SINCLAIR

CFRB news commentator Gordon Sinclair attended the annual American Red Cross convention in Minneapolis, Minnesota last week. Mr. Sinclair received thanks from the delegates for his donation of an estimated \$200,000 to the Red Cross from royalties on the sale of his hit record "The Americans".

Sinclair, wrote the editorial last June upon hearing of the financial difficulties of the American Red Cross. A special dinner party was thrown for Sinclair as a formal recognition of his contribution. Sinclair's visit to the Red Cross convention was the only occasion for which he will travel to the States.

CHESEBROUGH TAKES OVER CANADIAN MUSIC SALES

Mr. Terry Regan has sold his interest in Canadian Music Sales. The Corporation is now under the ownership and management of a group headed by Douglas E. Chesebrough and Paul D. Chesebrough. The latter, until recently, managed A&M's recording artist Lorence Hud and was initially responsible for bringing this young artist into the recording fold.

Former CMS president Terry Regan will remain with the company in the capacity of consultant while former owner, T. St. Clair Low has also agreed to remain in an advisory capacity. Low has been involved in the Canadian music business for more than forty years. The status of key personnel will also remain unchanged while additional staff will be brought in to supplement the company's expansion plans.

In making the announcement of the takeover, vice-president Paul Chesebrough indicated that the new owners "have planned a new and aggressive approach to marketing and sales for the company, while emphasizing Canadian ownership and interest in Canadian talent".

New lines and signing of artists will be announced over the next few weeks.

APPEARANCE MARKS RELEASE OF ALEXIS ALBUM

Mushroom Records will release this week "Alexis". The Steve Douglas produced album features Alexis plus an impressive array of studio talent, including Howard Leese, Billy Strange, the Clydie King Singers and Cat Kendrikse. Release coincides with the appearance of Alexis at Rohan's Rock Pile, Vancouver. Stage back up consists of Duris Maxwell, drums; Tom Lavin, bass; Jerry Doucette, lead guitar; and Lesilie Law, rhythm guitar. Alexis plays keyboards and acoustic guitar in addition to performing lead vocals.

The album, produced at Can Base Studios, Vancouver with additional work at Gold Star Studios, Los Angeles, was engineered by Mike Flicker. All tracks are Alexis compositions, published through B.C. Music, BMI. "Hands Across the Dining Room Table", drawn from the set, is now out in single form.

GUESS WHO WOLFMAN TRACK BREAKING IN WEST


"Clap for the Wolfman", a cut from the Guess Who's current Nimbus album, "Road Food", is meeting strong reaction in western Canada despite the fact that it has not been released as a single. "Wolfman" is currently charted in Winnipeg and is also a hot item at CFUN, Vancouver, where a custom station 1D by Wolfman Jack is now running.

Release of the track as a single is being heid off in anticipation of continued United States reaction to the Guess Who's current, "Star Baby". Nimbus is distributed in Canada by RCA.

RADA ACQUIRES RIGHTS TO "JESUS A BIOGRAPHY"

Rada Record Pressings of Burnaby, B.C., has acquired rights to the ten album set, "Jesus a Biography". The deal was concluded between Rada's John Rodney and R-Productions of San Francisco. The boxed set, retailing for a suggested list of \$39.95, is described as a "compelling narrative presentation which re-clothes the recorded incidents in the life of Jesus with the human drama which must have surrounded them as they actually happened."

The release in Canada of "Jesus a Biography" marks the beginning of a long term relationship between Rada and R-Productions which will see Rada release "lines unlike anything presently on the market. According to Rodney, Rada will have to strain it's pressing capacity to meet with anticipated demand.

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thing became legitimate. It is hard to say when or why, but today's stars from Canada, and in Canada have a new status. Nationalism is becoming very voguish and the Canadian public is discovering itself.

In a recent conversation with Frank Rasky who writes for the Toronto Star, he told me of a series of on the street interviews with people that he conducted regarding Canadian artists. It was encouraging to learn that all the people interviewed were knowledgeable of the artists and anxious to see and hear them. So our stars are being born.

Not too long ago, the CBC fought to keep a star system from developing in Canada. Other than Wayne and Shuster and Juliette, there were few stars who could attain status as a star. In fact there were many stars that could tour Canada and be well received, but the star making media didn't accept their status and fought to keep them semi-stars.

Now, another media (records) has succeeded in building a star system. A combination of

McLAUCHLAN WINNING BATTLE OF AMERICAS

Many observers of the world record scene have long advocated that the next "record phenomena" will be generated by an artist unique to his own country — and probably an English speaking country. America has always led the way, with the British pulling the rug out from under them in 1964 and now there are two contenders — Australia and Canada.

Australia is still getting their domestic content thing together and Canada has been flogging "beaver fever" since 1971 which gives those, north of the 49th parallel — a slight edge, according to some observers.

True North recording artist Murray McLauchlan (a multi-Juno winner this year) could be riding that edge. He is unique in that he sings about life – generally, influenced obviously, by his Canadian environs – although he will probably rebel at the identity charge. However, McLauchlan's material and its vehicle - his voice, have caught the fancy of U.S. trade and consumer critics. His hard-core, citified lyrics and his ability to communicate, with an audience, impressed several U.S. writers on his most recent foray into that country. Ira Mayer, in the Village Voice (New York) found McLauchlan "a masterful narrator depicting a variety of scenes in vivid language while never losing sight of the musical lines best suited to bring each number effectively across". Mayer also suggested that, for McLauchlan, "the time will undoubtedly come when his name will be ranked alongside those of some of his currently better known national contemporaries.'

Billboard's Nancy Erlich also reported on McLauchlan's Bitter End concert and was more glowing in her review, suggesting that he "may be the most powerful singer-songwriter on the scene today, half observer, half participant in the assorted bits of living that become his themes. He structures his songs simply, gives them melodies and choruses that lodge in the mind and delivers them with a punch that drives the message home".

Manager Bernie Finkelstein, has found a gradual warming to his artist by record execs south of the border and expects to increase this interest over the next few weeks.

efforts (both voluntary and involuntary) has created a star system so strong that we are enjoying a subtle protectionism from other quarters that should be, but aren't suppressing our stars.

The world is looking to Canada for a new sound and a new miracle on record. No longer do we hear: "Who are you? What do you want?" Today the world knows Canada and the Canadian music industry.

Now ... there are still some non-believers, and in the fast race that is the industry, they are being left behind.

In 1964, the British invasion found many a company with their pants down and now in 1974 there are a few making only a token gesture to humour Canada with their feeble attempts to pay lip service to the emerging Canadian music industry.

Record companies are pulling back to be more quality conscious and less quantity conscious. Some of our biggest boosters of Cancon, talk more Cancon than they do. The great image of the nationalistic Canadian record company is now a lip-service to the trade.

But each day there are more and more Canadian records coming out and each day there is more and more interest in Canadian artists.

The international charts practically feature Canadian artists in the top of each chart and the industry is growing.

The qualitative lip-service is paying off and "corporative streakers" are waiting for the day they will have to pull up their pants and their socks.

That day may not be very far off, and the industry can relax knowing that they were warned.

FAY STEVENS RELEASES ON OWN COP RECORDS

Calgary country songstress, Fay Stevens, has released a single, "Go Back" f/s "It's Gonna Take Some Gettin' Used To" on her own COP label. Both sides were written by fellow Calgarian, Cal Cavendish, and are published by COP Publishing (BMI). Miss Stevens frequently plays around in the Calgary area, appearing in numerous night-clubs, including the Blackfoot Inn where she is now wrapping up a month-long engagement.

Miss Stevens has appeared widely in western Canada having played such diverse cities as Flin Flon, the Pas, Churchill, Yellow Knife and Hay River. She regularly appears with the Klassics Four.

"ROCK" AROUND THE WORLD

Whether it's a trend or just an accident, it's interesting to note that the following records are charted and receiving airplay: "Rock Around the Clock", "Rock & Roll Heaven", "Rock The Boat", "Golden Age of Rockin' Roll" and "Rock Your Baby".

In the UK "Rock & Roll Winter" by Wizzard, "Rock & Roll Suicide" by David Bowie, "Hey, Rock & Roll" by Showadywady as well as Bill Haley's "Rock Around The Clock" are all hits. In Belgium, "Rock & Roll Animal" by Lou Reed is currently in the Top Ten.

There is every indication that there is a return to rock — or at least, that the word keeps appearing in the titles of hit records.

BREAKOUT ACTION FOR HOOD SINGLE

Because of perseverence with the Hood single, "Cause We're In Love" by London's Ontario promo rep Jim Macdonald, he can now report increased provincial gains for the Goldfish single with CKLW Windsor opening the door to the U.S. market. The Hood single is a trip into nostalgia — written by the Beau Marks, of whom Joey Frechette is now an active member of the music publishing community. The single was produced by Terry Jacks in Vancouver with the Goldfish star taking an active role in the vocal and instrument backing. The name Jacks wasn't lent to the production because Jacks felt the group could make it on its own and — three months later — it is.

The Hood single received its first shot in the arm from CFTR, fast becoming a hit making station in one of the most important markets in Canada. CKOC's Nevin Grant charted the single for his Hamilton listeners and other Ontario stations now going with Hood include: CJBK/London, CKLC and CKWS in Kingston and Peterboro's CHEX and CKPT.

The Ontario action adds to the national scene and supplies a true breakout picture for Hood.

GILLAN AND CAMERON ENTERTAIN ACA CONVENTION

Recording star Marty Gillan, host of CTV's "Banjo Parlor", and singer John Allen Cameron from the Maritimes provided the entertainment for the 1974 ACA Convention dinner held May 7 in Toronto. Cameron appeared with a special vocal and guitar accompaniment and Gillan had an eight-piece back-up orchestra.

The 59th annual seminar focused on advertising in a shortage economy, emphasizing advertising as one of a few positive forces in business. The convention also contained sessions for Chief Executive Officers, a special session for business/industrial advertisers, the presentation of the ACA Gold Medal Award and new style marketing awards for outstanding achievements. Speakers at the convention included Pierre Juneau and ex-Global chief Al Bruner.

MURPHY/SLAIGHT/KEARNS APPOINTED TO OUALITY

Bill Kearns has been appointed to the position of general manager of publishing for Qualrec Music Publishing Limited (BMI) and Shediac Music Publishing Limited (CAPAC) effective immediately.

Kearns began his career in the record business with Quality back in 1954 and worked himself up to the position of Ontario Sales Manager. In 1964 he was appointed director of A&R and publishing for Columbia Records, later taking on duties with the Special Products division of Columbia. His most recent activity in the record business was as vice-president of Kanata Records, now being distributed by Quality.

Appointed to the position of national promotion co-ordinator for Quality is Gary Slaight who, previous to the appointment, was involved with several Ontario radio stations. He was also associated with MacLaren Advertising (Toronto) for several months. Slaight will assist in the development of publicity concepts as well as the co-ordination and distribution of material to the local and national press. He will work closely with Joe Owens, national promotion manager and report directly to Lee Farley.

IAN THOMAS COMES TO LIFE WITH NEW BAND

GRT recording artist Ian Thomas, nominated for a Juno Award this year in the category of Male Vocalist of the Year, recently returned to his hometown of Hamilton and a premiere performance. Thomas and his new back-up group performed in concert at Hamilton Place with the Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra — his first stage appearance in two years.

It was almost four years ago when Boris Brott, conductor of the Hamilton Symphony Orchestra, hired Thomas and his Tranquillity Base group, as an experiment, to perform with the Hamilton Symphony. The reaction was good and there was a repeat performance in Toronto as well as on the CBC radio network.

Now, four years later, Thomas, recognized coast to coast in Canada as a writer/performer, returned to Hamilton, hired the Hamilton

At the present time CBC Radio's signal is available to an amazingly high percentage of the Canadian people. The last figure I saw put it at an incredible ninety eight plus per cent. This coverage is achieved through CBC owned stations in major cities and elsewhere, and through privately owned affiliates in a host of more remote areas. Many of these affiliates are now rejoicing at the news that CBC repeaters will, in a matter of a couple of years, make their broadcast of CBC programming unnecessary.

Several secondary market programmers I have spoken to, talk with unrestrained glee of the day they will no longer have to carry CBC programming.

Unfortunately, it is all too true that CBC Radio programming is often a curse. Frequently and justifiably praised for its excellence, CBC Radio's offerings usually draw pathetic ratings. Even "This Country in the Morning", Peter Gzoski's excellent casserole of music, interviews, contests and humour, draws only a miniscule audience.

An argument is often advanced that CBC programming appeals to an older, more highly educated, more sophisticated audience than commercial radio. To a certain extent this may well be true. There remains, however the fact that a great deal of CBC Radio's fare is not particularly highbrow. It's downfall is that it requires the listener to listen. Unlike commercial radio, which for the most part, serves as background sound and demands nothing of it's listeners, the CBC demands attention. Perhaps the old adage that you can never underestimate the masses applies here.

Regardless of anyone's estimation of the listening audience, though, there remains the fact that promotion is required to sell a product. That fact doesn't cease to apply merely because the product is radio.

Private radio has long been aware of the value of promotion. In many cases, promotion has become radio. Some stations seem to exist only to promote themselves. CBC Radio, meanwhile, has taken a distant back seat in promoting itself.

The occasional format ad, the odd mention on CBC TV are simply not good enough. If CBC Radio is to reach a significant number of people with its alternative programming, then it must take a page from the book of private radio and push itself.

If all this daydreaming were to come true, and CBC Radio were to command a remotely

respectable chunk of the listening audience, it would do nothing but good for radio in general. Although not competing for advertising revenue with the CBC, private radio would have to become a little more inventive in order to maintain its ratings. A popular alternative from the CBC would do wonders for the radio environment. Of course, it's not going to happen.

BEETLE GAINS U.S. AUDIENCE

Beetle Magazine, Canada's only national entertainment monthly, has firmed an agreement with Capital Distributing of Derby, Connecticut, for international distribution. The deal calls for Capital to take an initial consignment of 130,000 copies per issue for distribution throughout the U.S. Beetle distribution to eighty-seven other countries is also handled by Capital

In making the above announcement, Beetle publisher, Moe Wortzman, advised that Beetle will retain rights to all subscriptions and record store distribution on a worldwide basis with an additional anticipated distribution of 100,000 copies by the end of this year.

The new publishing schedule for the Toronto-based magazine will begin with the June 15th printing of the September edition to be on the streets July 15. This issue will showcase Anne Murray on the cover with a four colour photo and will contain thirty pages of news on Canadian recording artists, with U.S. releases.

Capital Distributing is a member of the Charlton Group in Derby, Connecticut and and is in no way affiliated with the Capitol-EMI group of record companies.

ANOTHER 15 YEARS OF SNOW FOR RCA

Hank Snow, the original "Godfather" of the Maritime Mafia was thought by many to be ready to hang up his mike and retire. He has been with RCA for thirty-eight consecutive years but this past year in Nashviile (his adopted home) has created much change in the country scene and Snow wasn't about to step aside "in the prime of his career".

RCA's Nashville crowd called together Music City's news media and Jerry Bradley, director of Nashville operations for RCA, made the announcement that Snow had signed on for another thirteen years. The new contract will continue the Snow/RCA association well past the fifty year mark.

In making the announcement Bradley noted: "Over the thirty-eight years, Hank has had as many hits as almost any one alive, and it is very appropriate that the historic contract should be renewed right at the moment Hank's 'Hello Love' is the nation's number one country single". The single, Snow's biggest in recent years, topped the RPM Country Playlist May 11/74, after only six weeks of release, remaining in the No. 1 position for three weeks.

It was back in 1936 when Hugh Joseph, then head of RCA Records (Canada) discovered and signed Snow to a recording contract. A few releases and establishing himself in Canada led to a breakthrough into the U.S. market with "Brand New Heart".

The year 1950 saw Snow become a member of the Grand Ole Opry and that same year he created country hysteria with "I'm Moving On", which topped the charts for twenty-six weeks solid. The single remained in the top ten for fourteen months during the years 1950 and 1951.

NUMBER ONE WITH A BULLET ritchie yorke

LONDON, Eng.

Blake Edwards, the film director, is by no means one of the typical snivelling and grovelling types that infest Hollywood. Actually Edwards is among the few directors in America who have steadfastly refused to compromise their art. For that dedication, he is to be warmly congratulated... the flower, after all, being a rare and increasingly inaccessible strain in the Hollywood of the Seventies.

Blake Edwards' critical and audience successes include Days of Wine and Roses, Breakfast at Tiffany's and The Pink Panther: obviously not films, I admit, aimed at or about our sub-culture, but certainly relevant and revealing in their portrayal of some of our parents' dilemmas. Wine and Roses, for instance, tore all the veneer off the abominable antics of the booze generation.

A few years back, Edwards endured a falling out with the Hollywood hierarchy, shortly after the failure of his film, Darling Lili.

Edwards has always been commendably vocal in his criticism of the movie merchant phenomenon, and a recent interview in the London Times does much to put the old status quo in its true perspective.

After the box-office death of Darling Lili, Edwards says he was "strung up, hanged, drawn and quartered and thrown to the wolves. I'd been an opponent of the Hollywood system for many years. I was very aggressive, too aggressive perhaps. I don't regret the things I said but there may well have been better ways to say them. However, when Darling Lili happened, my enemies loved it. All the people I'd attacked said: 'OK, now we've got him'. They'd hired me happily enough when I was making hits but as soon as I made a bomb, they dropped me. It was pretty immoral."

Edwards feels that the initial mistake of movie makers was to regard films as a "business". He says the industry was set up by non-creative men whose chief interest was in making money. The basic problems were and to some extent still are "nepotism and greed," an exceedingly despicable situation.

"As usually happens when you have a potential goldmine, the movies attracted people who figured every way possible to make as much money as possible, and a certain amount of dishonesty crept into it and became accepted as part of the way of doing things."

Such dishonesty, Edwards feels, is still apparent in bad bookkeeping, excessive distribution charges and false budgets. "The people setting up a movie know that it'll cost 40 dollars. They put in a budget of 20 dollars to impress the head office. That way the film gets made, everyone gets a slice of the action and if there are complaints about overspending they have a built in scapegoat — the director - while his

pictures make a profit, okay. But the minute he blows it, they pounce like vultures."

Since non-creative people tend to run the machine, Edwards is equally unimpressed by the business trip. "Look, say I have a million dollars and I want to invest it in oil. Okay, I get the best available experts, the best advice, the best experience and I pay them to work it out for me and finally they say, 'This is the place to sink your well.' And at that point I step in and say, 'No, the hell with it, I'm not going to sink it here - I'm going to sink it over there.' I'd have to crazy, right, But that's what happens all the time in the film business. It'll continue to happen until artistic and creative people are persuaded, or permitted, to run the industry and they won't do that while they're forced to sit down and have the Bank of America tell them how much money they can spend on their pictures."

Blake Edwards also despises the bandwagon formats of Hollywood, and he cites the trends which slithered aboard Easy Rider, James Bond and the Mafia, as examples. This, he says, is because the decision-makers in the movie industry are people who are interested in money and not creation. "Merchants" is the word often used to describe the breed.

"There's too much emphasis on what the audience is believed to want and yet it's not the trend-followers who make the money, it's the trend-setters. And the trendsetting films are made by creative men who don't give a thought to the audience — they make their pictures for themselves. You'd think by now that the men who run the film industry would have realized that the public gets all the crap and pudding it needs from TV. What it wants from the cinema is something different, something original."

If you're speculating on whether this column is really just applicable to the movie business, you might be right. Sit down and think about it for a minute or two. It's enough to give you the goose-bumps.

TEEN ANGEL AND THE ROCKIN'. REBELS wrap up their three month tour May 25, which covered central and eastern Canada. The group expects to do a return in the fall, which includes dates in the Atlantic Provinces.

Turicchi and Rudman at C8

For those of you who weren't there

Tom Turicchi scared a lot of people at C8. Radio and music are such personal businesses, dealing with people on an intimate level, be it individually or en masse. Most other industries of comparable size rely on sophisticated systems and volumes of research, all fully integrated into the computerized business

world. But the heavy decisions in radio and music are usually left up to the hunches and educated guesses of a PD or an A&R man. Maybe such personal businesses will be proven best handled in this personal manner. At any rate, Dr. Tom Turicchi is the forerunner of what probably will be a growing trend towards a more in-depth researched, objective, computerized approach to the industries.

Turicchi's method basically involves wiring up a subject to a physiograph, measuring ongoing heart rate, breathing and galvanic skin responses to records and radio air-checks. From these involuntary responses, psychographic data, relatively clean of social. personal prejudices, is obtained. An example of how Turicchi overcomes this consciousunconscious taste discrepancy problem is illustrated with Blue Swede's "Hooked on a Feeling". Initial reaction towards the record from the subjects being tested was negative — they thought the "oogachucka" was ridiculous. But at the same time, tests showed that their bodies really liked it. As it turned out, despite their initial negative intellectual reaction, the subjects grew to like the song and of course the outcome is now history. Edward Bear's "Last Song" also scored high with Turicchi's method and Helen Reddy's two follow-ups — "Peaceful" and "Delta Dawn" — were pulled from the album on Turicchi's advice.

Turicchi has tested about one thousand records and claims 90% accuracy. Apparently, subjective judgments from programmers are only about 60% accurate. By testing all these records, Turicchi has also come up with what type of profile makes a hit record and what part of the record is strongest or weakest. For instance, the sax solo at the end of "Mockingbird" proved to be very strong and the church-like chorus in "Eres Tu" also scored high. In this way, he can pick a record apart, help put back hitpotential components, and retest the overall effect. Turicchi has worked for twenty record companies.

He has also worked for twenty-eight major radio stations, measuring anything from the strength of a new record, how long to playlist a record, how often to play a record, demographic strengths and weaknesses of items on the playlist, to what oldies to

play and the impact of various jingles, mixes and yes, even jocks. Air checks from the client and the competition at various times of the day are tested for comparison data. Turicchi's major success story was with WCFL. Apparently the numbers tripled since the time he began working with them. The Moffat chain is also a client.

CANCON...SERIOUS PROBLEM

Of course, the subject of Cancon was brought up and here, Turicchi dropped some very heavy facts. Canadian records being played as hits were tested in Vancouver. Of all the records that were found to be very strong, ten per cent were Canadian. But of all the records that were found to be extremely dangerous radio material, ninety per cent were Canadian. Turicchi said the problem may stem from over-play of Canadian product on the playlist but denies the involvement of any anti-Cancon prejuc-ice amongst subjects: "It's very hard to make your belly-button light up when you hear an American record and turn it off when you hear a Canadian record". One could go on indefinitely about the impact of these findings on the industry and the regulations. Turicchi just sums it up by saying "it's a serious problem".

Very impressive stuff, And most programmers were impressed. They all agreed that Turicchi's method was very valid and that they would like to subscribe . . . if they had unlimited funds. CKOC's Nevin Grant summed up what seemed to be the general opinion: "Had Turicchi found that the hits everyone was playing were not the real hits and that they were turning markets upside down with their own hits, we might have taken note. We are interested in any aspect of research and if 'OC had an unlimited amount of funds, we'd subscribe to every possible means of research. We found that we have come to the same conclusions as Turicchi and are satisfied that one more set of facts co-relate. We think the money could be better spent on other needed things.'

EDSEL...BUILT BY COMMITTEE

Nevin went on to say that he found it very hard to believe any one man, machine or method had the definitive way of doing things. As such, no one should become locked into his own thinking and not be open for any new input. "A station should be like a sponge, willing to absorb anything and relating it to the market, but not buying anything 100%. The ones who really gained from Drake are the ones that applied his concepts to their own thing." CFTR's Mike Marshall also warned against going totally with a number of inputs before examining them in perspective with your own station. "Remember, the Edsel was built by a committee". CHAM's Bob Wood said he was amazed at why more scientific

research hadn't been done in radio and blamed it on the egos in the business.

In discussing the use of radio doctors in general, most PD's seemed to have reservations. Nevin admitted that bringing in a Buzz Bennett or whatever might result in a non-confidence vote directed at the PD. "But it is up to the PD to do whatever possible to get ratings - which might include bringing someone with new methods or ideas. I've found that I've been able to keep on top by going to conventions, talking with these people and talking to programmers involved with them." Marshall said a radio doctor might be useful in psychingout the competition but saw the need for Canadians to develop their own industry and people. Bob Wood simply said that he would rather have Turicchi-type facts than Bennett-type ideas to work with.

I'D HEAD FOR CANADA

Kal Rudman deals exclusively in picking hits. His "Friday Morning Quarter-Back" tip sheet is the gospel for many North American programmers. Rudman talked a lot about the Canadian music industry. "If I were just starting in the business, I'd head for Canada. This is really where it's at. Canada is the 'Old West' — the early days of the business are happening here. Many Americans are leaving good jobs in the U.S. to score here."

But Rudman warned about the pressures and competition inherent in the industry that every one must acknowledge and work with if they are to succeed. "The record business is the last of the gold mine businesses — broke on Monday and made on Thursday. But business is a game and you must know how to play it. You've got to be smarter and get up earlier to make it. Nothing that is big ever happens by chance — you've got to know your stuff." Rudman used the example of Paul Drew who kept a set of file cards on him, listing each time the Quarterback was wrong.

TORONTO NEEDS BETTER RUNNERS

Rudman also warned about doing favours for friends and a lot of gold records by playlisting a lot of early product. After finding that the numbers were down as a result, the programmer tightened up. "There were no more gold records and no more friends but he was number one." Rudman referred to promo men as grains of sand, of which "only a few pop you in the eye and make you aware of them. You can't do it as a laid-back Lenny." In relating the American Hussle to Canada, Rudman used the football analogy. "This is for real. Step back twenty yards and punt and you've got the ball on the twenty and you'd better go—you'd better score. And if you're playing by Canadian rules, you've only got three downs to do it in. That's why Toronto had better get some better runners."

And as far as radio trends are concerned, Rudman pointed out that the rock generation has come of age: Bill Haley's "Rock Around the Clock" was a hit nineteen years ago. Fifteen-year-olds then are thirty-fouryear-olds now and, as such, are part of the key demographics for advertisers. MOR's are not playing Percy Faith anymore — their playlist is 85% identical to Top 40.

needed a gimmick and one that could tiein with the visual properties of the movie and the soundtrack. What could be more suitable - and eye appealing than an automobile from that era? Getting hold of a vintage auto created no real problem - and not too much of a cash outlay. Richards "ticked" his boss Richard Bibby and both agreed on a 1931 Model "A" Ford "in showroom condition and licensed as a Historical Vehicle". Bibby and Richards then laid a "heavy one" on CP Air and arranged a round trip for two to Vancouver (originating in Toronto) as an added prize, for that "promotion of a lifetime".

With a promotion this size you require a vehicle capable of reaching "a hell of a lot of people". Top forty radio is too concerned with those restrictive demographics. Pop (middle of the road) programmers are too busy and concerned compiling numbers on the obituary columns in the local papers to see where their listeners are going - and they couldn't possibly generate enough excitement to go justice to a promotion of this magnitude.

How about a rock and soulin', folk and poppin' FM giant? The choice was CKFM and the show to feature the promotion was hosted by Carl Banus - not exactly that "right on brother" type of jock, but nevertheless, commanding one of the largest radio audiences in Ontario.

A capacity crowd of 515 industry representatives attended the Canadian Television Commercials Festival April 25 at Toronto's Four Seasons-Sheraton Hotel. The Festival was open to all commercials prepared for use in Canada by national advertisers in which the creative concept and production supervision were Canadian.

The day's activities included an audiovisual presentation of U.K. commercials

by Bary Day, vice-chairman and creative director of McCann Erickson, London. The luncheon was followed by an afternoon of screenings of the winning entries and awards presentations to the respective producers. First, second and third place awards were given in nineteen different categories, with

three Bessy (Broadcast Executives Society) going to the best over-all commercials.

The Gold Bessy for the top commercial went to London Life Insurance Co. for their commercial "Birth" (Goodis, Goldberg, Soren Ltd. — Canadian Cinegraph). The second place Silver Bessy was awarded to TMX Watches of Canada for their commercial "Ladles Electric" (Ronalds-Reynolds & Co. — Rabko TV Productions). And Canadian Motor Industries won a Bronze Bessy for their "What kind of car" commercial (Ronalds-Reynolds & Co. — Canadian Cinegraph).

The presentations were followed with a screening of the winning entries in the 20th International Advertising Film Festival held last year in Cannes, France, and a cocktail party rounded off the day.

Co-chairman of the 1974 Festival Committee were Len Moore, president of the Television Bureau of Canada and Jim Inch, President of the Broadcast Executives Society.

QUALITY TO DISTRIBUTE UK'S EMBER PRODUCT

Ember Records, an English based firm, will be manufactured and distributed in Canada by Quality Records. The label will be distributed in the U.S. by Paramount as Paramount Ember. The pact calls for Quality to have exclusive rights in Canada to all product released in the U.S. on the Paramount Ember label.

The above announcement was made by George Struth, vice-president and general manager of Quality Records.

In keeping with the old record industry adage: "Promotion makes sales - sales makes promotion", vice-president Bibby has returned to that old "work and responsibility" policy that was so rampant in the industry - not too many years ago. He has given new responsibilities to several of the company's sales representatives, making for a tight coast to coast team effort.

Alberta resident salesmen Herb Forgie (Edmonton) and Ted Firman (Calgary) now call on their region's breakout and

pop stations on a regular basis. In Quebec, branch manager Bob Johnston is now looking after English promotion duties with sales rep Jean-Marc Corbeil handling French radio stations.

Similar responsibilities have already been in effect with Winnipeg and Atlantic Provinces personnel. The MCA man in Winnipeg, Jack Skelly, is in charge of promotion as well as sales duties and his branch managership. Jim Morrissey co-ordinates sales and promotion for all of the Atlantic Provinces.

Randy Sharrard has come "out front" with a promotion within the company, to the post of Ontario promotion rep. Bibby has covered Sharrard's former duties with the hiring of Dominic Postorino, former station manager of Radio Scarborough (CKSR) and a graduate with a three year degree in French and Italian and math. Postorino assumes the work load of Campus coordination, art layout, mailings and in-store display.

For western Canada, MCA's promotion activities are supervised by Barry Ryman, who is headquartered in Vancouver. His territory covers Thunderbay west and his personal promotion duties involve communication with B.C. and Alberta radio stations as well as totally co-ordinating all western information with western district manager, Jack Williams, out of the stocking branch in Calgary.

MCA Canada's nine man team is comprised of three sales managers doing promotion, three salesmen with promotion duties and three full-time promotion men..

What cost - promotion? Not much, considering the return. But, then it depends on who you are. Check with an MCA man.
