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Montreal's Dudes emerging as powerhouse Can group

The Dudes, recently signed to Columbia Records, have bounced into the Canadian limelight, with recognition coming from the dailies as well as U.S. based magazines. Initial single release will be "Saturday Night", culled from their soon-to-be released album, "We're No Angels." The session was produced by Mark Spector at Andre Perry's Le Studio.

U.S. release for Smile's Studebaker Hawk single

Smile president Dave Coutts has completed negotiations for the U.S. release of "Rainbows, Pots of Gold and Moonbeams" by Studebaker Hawk. The deal gives U.S. rights to the Mums (Polydor) label which is now rushing a release.

The single is rapidly gaining in the programmer's circle and sales are beginning to show an encouraging trend. Major stations giving the single a number include CKLG Vancouver (26), CKXL Calgary (35) and CHED Edmonton (26). Other major market stations playlisting the single include: CKY Winnipeg, CFGO and CFRA Ottawa and CHUM in Toronto. Campus radio action has also been brisk with playlistings at Radio Sheridan, CRXL, CRBC, CCCR, CFRC and CKUM.

Canadian Opera Company to return to O'Keefe

The Canadian Opera Company wlll return to the O'Keefe Centre, following a ratification of a last-minute agreement between O'Keefe management and the stagehand's union.

The Canadian Opera Company cancelled at O'Keefe recently and rented the International Centre near the airport in case the strike of Local 58 of IATSE remained unsettled.

This new settlement will reportedly make the Toronto stagehands the highest paid stagehands in the world, raising their rate from \$7.25 per hour to \$10.70 per hour over a two-year period.

As scheduled the Opera Season will open next month. Ticket prices are not expected to rise.

A late tribute to Cannonball Adderly

This tribute is belated but worthy of a mention. Julian "Cannonball" Adderly died of a heart attack at the age of 46, 25 days after suffering a stroke on his way to a gig.

The son of a Florida musician who suckled his son on jazz, Julian arrived in New York in 1955 with a quintet including brother Nat on cornet. Headlined as the heir apparent to altoist Charlie "Bird" Parker, Adderly forged his own musical-energies with the Miles Davis Group from 1957 to 1959, and later on to cut dozens of records with his own quintet.

His easy banter with audiences and laid-back blow for improvisation, made the Adderly group one of the most respected names in jazz. "God smiles on certain individuals", he said "and they get the privilege to have certain beautiful artistic vibrations pass through them."

The man of "Mercy, Mercy, Mercy" demoed brilliant at Toronto's Colonial Tavern last year, and it was apparent that his pursuits were based on an effortless-drive . . . he drank with the patrons and seemed to be a great individual . . . nothing snotty about his regal proportion. His sax sounds-on, but the Cannonball is dead. MD

Can Entertainment Conference set for big weekend


The Toronto Castle Harbour Hotel will be the meeting place for a number of music industry figures taking part in the CEC, the National Canadian Programming Conference, between October 10-13.

Hundreds of phone calls have been made. Uncountable telexes have been sent and an enormous amount of time has been spent on this record.

If you think it's a fluke, talk to Chuck Camroux of CFTR who added it the week it went out and has had tremendous response. Ask Taylor Campbell at Pindoff Record Sales, or Shirley Harrison at Eatons, or Graham Coles at The Bay, who believed in this record, pushed it strongly and consequently sold a lot of it (and are still selling lots of it).

Or, ask our promotion girl, Heather Murray, who has spent day after day in stores giving them play copies, setting up displays and in general creating an aura of excitement.

Or, most importantly, ask any one who has bought the record. It is a beautiful piece of music, a tune that instantly evokes a positive response from the listener. As Bill Johnston at Muntz put it, "Any one who is not affected emotionally by The Homecoming doesn't deserve to be alive."

Finally, if it is a fluke, we hope we have many more of them. These last few months have been one of the most frustrating, tiring, and exhilarating periods that I've ever spent in the record business, and I would be really pleased to go through the whole thing again for our next "fluke".

New Arts Directory bows Canadian scene

A lack of recognition in the Canadian marketplace is one of the major problems encountered by the Canadian Arts. A new publication, scheduled to appear this September, may alleviate the situation - the Canadian Arts Publicity Directory, published by New Morning Communications Ltd., Ottawa.

"The object of this directory is to create more public exposure for Canadian artists and entertainers and at the same time, develop a process by which these artists and entertainers may create their own public exposure," says Geoffrey W. Holland, publisher of the Directory.

Listed within its manifold sheets of exclusive info are listings for newpapers, radio, television, magazines, trade papers, university radio stations and campus publications.

Corrected listings will be brought up-todate every four months to ensure that the contents are as accurate as possible.

The CAP Directory will sell for \$35. a copy per year and may be ordered through New Morning Communications in Ottawa.

Anderson & Tull firmed for Maple Leaf Gardens

lan Anderson and Jethro Tull, the musiccourt's finest will return to Maple Leaf Gardens Oct 7, 1975. The show is being touted by Canadian PR firm Charles-Dunne and Owens.

The current Tull line-up maintains with flautist Ian Anderson, he of the radiant trill and breathless approach to vocals, Martin Barre on electric guitar, John Even on keyboards, Jeffrey Hammond-Hammond on bass and Mr. Barriermore Barlow on drums.

Many observers believe that without a doubt lan Anderson and Jethro Tull have established themselves for years as being the finest and most innovative rock-musicians that can be viewed in concert performance.

Ian Anderson is a brilliant and sensitive composer whose dancing feet and madcap antics continually throw his audience off-balance, never assured as to what can be musically and theatrically expected.

A new executive power soon to be felt within the Canadian recording industry is Polydor Canada's new president, Tim Harrold. A rather frank and outspoken individual who likens change to "new life", Harrold has completely immersed himself in the everyday workings of his own company and the problems of the industry generally. He has already made himself known to radio and press VIPs in several major and breakout markets and has initiated changes within the company that indicates a heavy concentration on more communication with retailers, rackers, the trade press and radio.

Harrold was recruited to the Polydor ranks in 1970 by Roland Rennie (now with Chappell) who was managing director of the U.K. operation and who is regarded as a legend in the British pop movement. It was Rennie who made the original contact with Track Records and the Who (known then as the High Numbers). He was also very close to Robert Stigwood and figured in the development of Cream, Blind Faith and the British production of "Hair".

As marketing manager of Polydor, London, Harrold became familiar with the world workings of Polydor which paid off for him in January of 1974 when he was trans-

ferred to New York to take over Phonodisc, the newly established distribution arm of Polydor, formerly known as UDC and not connected in any way with Phonodisc Limited of Canada. He was involved in the move of the headquarters of Phonodisc from Los Angeles to New York and the setting up of the first budgets and the negotiations with Phonogram to join Phonodisc distribution.

No sooner had Harrold warmed up his new executive seat when he was approached to take over Polydor Canada. He yanked up his family once again and moved northward to Canada as president of the Canadian operation. One of Harrold's first commitments was to the trade press - or any other press that was interested and RPM was fortunate in obtaining the following interview.

What were the first problems you could forsee in Canada?

Well, I have a very short handover - lasting about three days and, of course, there were all those normal personal problems of finding a house and becoming operational as fast as possible, and I was pleased to find that my. French still survived and that I could actually make myself understood, which was rather reassuring to me. As far as the work side of things, I felt it was important, first

of all, to learn enough about the firm and to find out who was doing what.

Is it possible that being based in Montreal takes away from the English entity of the company?

I wouldn't say so, if you were to talk to people in Quebec, they would say, if anything that we are an English company in Montreal, and I want to have a proper balance. I believe that the Quebec market is a very vital element of our business and it would be completely foolish to say that we're not very strongly represented in the rest of Canada. We have people right across Canada who have one characteristic and that is professionalism and that's what I attach a great deal of importance to - that we should employ professional people, whatever language they speak. They must be good at their jobs.

Polydor was one of the first companies to set up a central warehousing - are you still satisfied with this type of operation?

Yes, I am a believer in centralization. There are many advantages derived from it. First of all you get greater efficiency; you reduce the risk of double stocking and an excess industry. It means that all our orders, from whatever part of Canada, come into one area which generally will result in better fill because that depot has to service all different repertoire types.

What about the freight rates?

The saving on double stocking certainly counterbalances the losses on the cost of freight. Our main worry at this time is obtaining supplies of the hot product which we have, because of the strike at MCA. It has effected us seriously, so far as our singles and albums are concerned.

How much importance do you attach to the singles market?

I think it is very important. I think it keeps the whole industry moving. It's the way we break product. It's absolutely vital to our business.

What percentage of Polydor's business would be singles?

One of the problems I've found is the statistics supplied by Statistics Canada. They just

don't help me gauge what the market is. We have tried to rack our brains to find a reliable estimate for market size and, so far, we have not found it. We make our guesses just like anybody else and these are partially influenced by album and tape product, the performance of our own record shops in Ontario and, of course, the feedback from our salesmen across the country.

Can you see more activity at Polydor insofar as Canadian content is concerned?

I'm interested in listening to product. I'm not intending to go flat out into an enormous expansion of activity, but I do feel that there are artists in Canada who should have international appeal and I think that our close association with Polydor and Mercury in the States and Polydor/Phonogram

in Europe and across the world, enables us the opportunity of getting their records reviewed and listened to by important people in the music industry, internationally. We have a record by Basic, Black and Pearl being released in the States, the U.K., Mexico, Holland and South Africa, and this single has really only received major play in Canada. So, here is a single that hasn't necessarily hit the top of the charts which we still can obtain release for overseas and I think this is an important role of a company like our own which has such a wide international network of branches.

How do you intend to find this product?

You'd be surprised how many budding A&R people we employ or, at least, have contact with. Everybody secretly believes that they

are the A&R experts and, as a result, we have a great number of groups drawn to our attention and a considerable number of tapes flow through our office doors.

Do you offer a finders incentive to your people?

Generally speaking, if someone refers an act to us and if we go with the act, their initiative is noticed, shall we say.

How do you view the radio situation in Canada?

Radio does play an enormously important part in the development of record sales and I think we should recognize that without radio we should find it very much harder, in this market above all, to make people aware of the records we've produced. We really depend on radio to play our records. However, we are selling a large number of records in the Montreal market without any radio airplay at all - through disco clubs.



Is that an alternative?

It's not an alternative - it's an additional market, as far as I'm concerned.

Can you sell as many records in the discomarket as you can through radio play?


No, that's not quite true, because a major radio hit can sell right across Canada and, as far as I know, there are many places in Canada where there are no discos, at all.

Do you go along with the common thinking that the record business is recession proof?

This is always theory. I think in the U.S. there's a lot of companies who have issued instructions that inventories were to be cut back and that had an effect in Canada with U.S. owned companies who were influenced by their parents. We noticed, as a result, that we were having to take back substantial returns which we should not have normally expected to have received. However, I think this was an over-reaction in my view. The market still feels very lively to us.

We've got a lot of hot product. Our main problem, again, is to get the supplies from the Canadian manufacturers, on whom we rely. We only have our own factory - we're



Cliff Edwards has been involved with the music business for ten years and is known as a recording artist, a producer and a television personality. Formerly a lead vocalist and producer with The Bells, Cliff was featured on "Fly Little White Dove Fly" and the million selling "Stay Awhile." His syndicated television series, "The Cliff Edwards Show" led the way to an hour long music special on CBC TV.

Edwards recently signed with A&M Records, which was followed by his debut single for the label "Singer Of Songs."

What prompted you to leave The Bells?

After 6 years in the band, in 1972 I felt it was time to make a change and try and do something on my own. That really was the only reason. A minor reason was that I was the only member in the band who had a family and I wanted to spend more time at home. The pressure of the single people in the band to work all the time kind of effected me.

You have a new record just released?

Yes, this is the result of my signing with A&M Records. The single is entitled "Singer Of Songs". I will have an album coming out probably in the fall.

Any plans to tour?

Yes, we have a seven piece act rehearsing now. This is a new band with 5 guys and 2 girls. We are doing nightclubs in western Canada. We start the tour the week of the 24th in Peterborough for a week at The 401 Inn. From there we drive to Thunder Bay, then we get to Calgary and we're there for 3 weeks. We then go on to Kelowna for a week, Penticton for a week, Red Deer for a week, Saskatoon for a week, Winnipeg for a week, and Ottawa for 2 weeks.

Will your wife perform with the group?

My wife is expecting our third child at the moment. I have two children, a son 5 and a daughter 3. My wife will be singing again as soon as this one arrives. We have been singing together on and off for the last couple of years.

Do you prefer country rock music to the ballad type sound of The Bells?


The country rock sound is probably closer to me. I think what The Bells did suited the group at that time. When I left The Bells, I thought that I would search out my own thing and country rock is probably closer to what I'm into now. It hasn't been anything that has been done purposely. I started singing at seventeen in a country band. I then went through the Elvis Presley and Bill Haley and the Comets rock and roll era. I became a singer in a rock and roll band. I then formed The Bells and became a night-club type singer. Now all those things that I have done are coming together and I just sing a combination of them. It just seems

to be naturally what I do. I'm not specifically aimed at this or that, I'm just a singer. There are country leanings because I started there, there are rock leanings because I went through that period, there are pop leanings because The Bells were that. The combination of everything is what I am.

Are you still active as a producer?

Yes, I'm getting more active. I produced The Bells. The last major thing I did was a film sound track for a Canadian movie that's yet to be released, called "Lions for Breakfast". Nick Whitehead wrote most of the music with a couple of other fellows. I produced a single that's out now called "Bright Side of Tomorrow" which was recorded by a group called Black Creek, I'm co-producing Tom Gallant at the moment. I'm getting back into producing, but not heavily. I'm concentrating on doing one thing at a time and trying to do one well.

Bee Gees and Dudes set for major tour

Toronto rock outlet CFTR, in cooperation with Concert Productions International, will present the Bee Gees at Maple Leaf Gardens Sept 29th at 8:00 PM.

Opening act will be Montreal's rock-ragers The Dudes, recently signed to Columbia Records. As opening act for most of the Bee Gees' Canadian tour, the Dudes will include dates in Thunder Bay's Memorial Gardens Sept 22nd, Sault Ste. Marie (23), Sudbury (24), London (25), Kitchener (26), Ottawa (27), Kingston (30), Montreal's Forum October 1st, Moncton (2), Saint John's Beaverbrook Rink (3) and the Halifax Forum

The readied album-release for the Dudes is entitled "We're No Angels", produced by Mark Spector at Andre Perry's Le Studio, which is situated just north of Montreal. Billed in Phonograph Magazine as "Montreal's New Pop Goldmine", the Dudes have been given a full-cover centre-section foldout treatment by the Hollywood consumer

In the article, written by Greg Shaw, the Dudes are expected to be the "new hope for the pop-starved masses".

"They won't be the first to attempt an invasion of the States", writes Shaw, as he explains that Mahogony Rush, April Wine and Moonquake: "have all made stabs at it, but they are the first to do so with any of the style and sophistication that Montreal represents, and the first to try it with the support of a major record company".

He goes on with "the music is strongly rhythmic, polyrhythmic even, with a dance beat right out of the discos - but it's white disco music, not Average White Band, but real teenage music grounded in the Elvis-Beatles tradition, applied to the new universal beat of the Seventies".

Montreal may have a music-maker or originality in their midst. The Bee Gees are the Brothers Gibb, Barry, Maurice and Robin.

Known for years as the white-cream of top-40, the Bee Gees have finally layed down on the Soul Train tracks. Their album, "Main Course", signals the beginnings of the Englishboys to the disco-sound scene.

Their single, "Jive Talkin", is a sought-after monster, which moved into the No. 1 position on RPM's 100 Chart (Aug 16), seems hard to believe that the song is delivered by the three writers in question

Whatever, with Arif Mardin's production, the number and entire album effect a sparkling expectation of gold. Their "Nights Of Broadway" seems to be popular with the BEE GEES continued on page 16



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



CBC transcription service shutting out independents

A CBC-Radio decision to devote more air time to recordings produced in their own studios has riled up some of Canada's independent record producers. Producers are claiming that their own emerging Canadian talent will be blocked from the country's only national radio network.

The Corporation's overall 50 per cent Cancon airplay will remain the same, although by next June ('76), 40 per cent of the Cancon will be produced by the network for broadcasting and not for sale to the public. Current broadcast recordings represent 25 to 30 per cent of all music played on CBC-Radio

Greg Hambleton, president of the 25-member Canadian Independent Record Producers Association has said that "it's quite unfair that the CBC decides to block us off to this degree, just when we're starting to build stars and starting to get records on important charts."

Of the total CIRPA membership, 12 represent all-Canadian owned record labels and the other, 13 unaffiliated producers. "CBC is shutting us out", Hambleton said, but Bill Armstrong, the head of CBC-Radio has said that, "I'm not aware of such a vast library of privately-produced Canadian stuff that's available. The 40 per cent seems reasonable to me. We did it out of need, not a perverse desire to compete with the private sector." Armstrong implied that the

production of broadcast recordings won't increase by much, but records that air made will be aired to a much greater extent.

Al Mair, president of Attic Records, which in its first year of operation has put 10 performers under contract, produced four albums, and has scheduled four more for a fall-release said that "it's a definite slap in the face of struggling Canadian recording


"All this is going to do is put more money into the hands of studio musicians who are already doing very well, and into the hands of some performers who either aren't ready or who can't get recording contracts. CBC should be trying to help give support to recording companies that are putting their own money on the line."

A gradual increase of air-time between this week and next June will achieve a 40 per cent in-house content according to Armstrong.

"Many of our better stations already have a 70 per cent Cancon, so that would leave 30 per cent for the privately-made recordings", he said.

The private producers on the other hand, say that those stations are few and far between.

According to Armstrong his 40 per cent would include pop to classical tastes. . . the classics being in very short supply from the private sector.



Montreal's oldest radio outlet, CFCF, is receiving "approximately four bomb threats a day" according to press reports. John Robertson, CFCF Hot Line host, has stood up publicly against Bill 22, Quebec's official language Act, Therefore placing him in the unlikeable position of having a 45-calibre toting body-guard sit in the livingroom of his Ste. Agathe home, to protect the broadcaster's wife and two children.

George Springate, Liberal backbencher in the Quebec National Assembly, has supported Robertson in his petition against the Bill. Within ten days the petition has reportedly gathered the names of more than three hundred thousand Quebekers.

The headquarters for the petition is the lobby of CFCF.

Quebec Premier Bourassa was quoted as saving: "He will never receive my support", adding: "The attitude of radio station CFCF contributes nothing to the understanding between different ethnic groups and is a very negative attitude which won't help us find a solution to the complex problems facing Quebec."

Well-known and controversial broadcaster, Gordon Sinclair Jr., summed up the situation as: "For all those who live outside Quebec, our new language regulations will bring a million laughs - we must carry French signs, even if we are English workers striking against an English boss - but when you live here, it isn't funny. It's sick, with perhaps the sickest feature being that nationalists in our society are going to be encouraged. Bourassa, you and your ministers sometimes appear to be a bunch of foolish, childish, petulent, vindictive jerks. And, by the way, what's the French word for jerk?"

According to Sun staffer Mark Bonokoski, Bill 22 "excuses" French for English-speaking Quebekers and "excuses" English for French-speaking Quebekers.

Robertson has said " . . . the extremists they're the ones . . . all they read is about some rebellion against the French. It's a sorry day when you can't record a democratic protest."

Mass Attorney General gangs up on drug ads

Massachusetts' Attorney General, Francis X. Bellioti is seeking to outlaw drug advertising on all television shows which are aimed at a "kid-audience."

He has urged the attorney's of the United States, to join him in petitioning the Federal Communications Commission on this matter. "The proliferation of narcotics addiction in this country has a great deal to do with what children see on television" he said in an address to some 46 attorney generals at their 69th annual meet of the National Association of Attorneys General.

"If the FCC can eliminate whiskey and ciga-

rette advertising, then they can do the same thing with drugs", he said.

He stressed that "reliance on industry selfregulation has resulted in unrestricted advertising of over the counter drugs to audiences comprised of large numbers of young children.

Paul Gold, chief of consumer protection in Bellioti's office, told the delegate members that a rerun of "Hee Haw" was aired on a station in their 10:00 AM Saturday children's slot, in which the station broadcast ads for "Geritol", "Sominex", and "Alka-Seltzer."

"The battle to change the drug habits of adults is uncertain", Gold said, "so I would like to prevent youngsters from being baited into the myth-ridden culture."

Both men believe that children under 12 are influenced by over the counter drug advertising, whereby a salvation from distress is instantly available with no adverse conse-

"In the first six months of 1972, the amount of money spent on advertising sedatives, sleeping products, and headache remedies was \$40.6 million on network television alone", Bellioti said.

And it happened.


The King is Dead, Long Live the King. So who's next asks the broadcast industry, to tell us how we live and under what conditions?

There are three guesses and I give them to you in their order of best bets: 1) John Hylton; 2) Real Therrien; 3) Harry Boyle. Boyle is presently vice-chairman of the CRTC but the former CBCer hasn't been too well, so there are those who feel he'd decline if asked. John Hylton is the youngest and newest member of the Commission and some people feel he was brought on specifically to take over when Juneau left. As for Real Therrien, well, he has all the credentials including the important fact that he's bilingual and a Francophone.

Let me tell you why I am going to pick Therrien as a longshot. Recently I interviewed Mrs. Patricia (Pat) Pearce for a feature article I was writing. When the interview was over she asked me if I had ever met Monsieur Therrien, I said only very briefly. Whereupon she phoned him, over my objections, (I thought without an appointment that it would be an intrusion on his time) and asked if she could bring me in. He agreed. I planned to stay only a minute but we wound up, Real and I, (we had come to first names), having a long, interesting discussion about the state of the broadcast world.

Was Pat, who is a very astute woman, and a good friend, trying to tell me something by making sure I became totally acquainted with Real Therrien? I believe so, and I think that if Therrien doesn't get the chairmanship he will, at least, become vice-chairman.

For every broadcaster the person at the top of the CRTC becomes totally important to his existence. Pierre Juneau brought his philosophies to the chieftainship of the CRTC and strongly affected Canadian broadcasting. As the shadow used to say, who knows what danger lurks . . . ?

looking for records from a range of other companies and, in fact, if I can't fill orders satisfactorily, then I shall import from the States, because I cannot afford not to retain momentum.

What about the costs of duty?

I've read the official circular and it sort of says that special allowances will be made to bonafide companies doing importing product from overseas. What on earth that means, no one has yet explained or clarified. We import all our classical product. As I mentioned to you, we shall have to import some of our American product in order to fulfill demand. The record manufacturers in Canada have not been able, in light of the MCA strike, to meet all the commitments we have placed with them.

Will that mean a price restructuring?

No, it will mean that we will have to swallow hard and get less money. But I feel a responsibility where we have hit product to, not only to the artists but to the retailer and rack jobber - to furnish the product. I am aware that our fill rates have gone below the levels that I would like to have seen and accordingly I have to have supplies, and if I can't get them in Canada I'll have to go somewhere else.

What are your feelings about returns?

Returns in a market like Canada must be worrying to everybody because to ship product out over thousands of miles and to receive it back over thousands of miles would seem, to any objective observer, a really rather ridiculous proposition. It seems to me it costs everyone a very large amount of money, time and bother. However, it would be foolish to say that one can change situations which have been current for many years, quickly, and I think our feeling is - we have a very clear policy on returns which limits the amount that can be returned by rack jobbers and we have a different policy for retailers which permits exchanges to be made. I believe in general terms, returns are a very great evil which this industry should be looking for ways to overcome. It seems to me that we talk, at our company, in terms of net turnover, but when you add what returns mean, in terms of handling and so on, it really is a terrible burden,

Didn't you have a return problem in England?

No, because there are virtually no return allowances given to the retail trade and records are sold by the retail trade at lower prices if they cannot be moved. When I left England, we only took returns on quality defects and the situation is just not comparable with North America at all.

What are your feelings about the 30% Canadian content legislation for radio stations?

It's not working satisfactorily and it's not achieving what everybody wants it to do. I' don't really know the history of how it came about, but I suspect it is due to be changed and amended. What we want is legislation which is prepared with people who really know the music industry and we want legislation which brings results and benefits to the artists and to the record industry. I think there are a number of proposals in

this respect that really have my support. I think the CRIA is doing a good job in putting these forward. Government legislation, unless it is carefully prepared, can turn out to be a very clumsy tool. So, I hope that any future legislation will be carefully prepared with people who are experts in the field of the music industry.

Do you think legislation is necessary in a country like Canada?

I think that the music industry, as a whole, is not recognized in governmental circles as important as it really is. I don't think the government really believes the music industry is an important element. I think that people in government circles place enormous respect on films and books and culture in those two art forms but somehow, music is not given the same treatment and I think that's what we're after. We're asking to be considered seriously as an important industry which has come of age and should be treated accordingly. There are an enormous number of people in Canada who really live for music and it is a kind of generalism of the arts and, I feel that we should somehow bang the drum a little bit more for the music industry and make sure the government realizes just how many dollars flow back to Canada as a result of Canadian acts.

My most natural thing is being an entertainer.

Do you think you will produce your owngroup?

No, I think I'm going to cool that, too. We have been talking to some American producers. We want a big name. We have a couple of people who are interested and I think that is my next step. It's tough to be objective about yourself. Producing myself is a tougher job than I thought it would be.

Other people can be more objective.

How did you like working in T.V.?

Tough grind. It takes years to learn to be an entertainer and to learn to be in front of people and do it well and be natural. It takes just as long to learn that in television.

It's a whole different ball of wax. It would be a learning process and I'm not so sure I want to do that. I did it for a couple of years and I think it's the security of a T.V. show that one thinks about. I stayed with it for a couple of seasons because I had a family and I didn't have to travel. Unless you have the big bucks and are getting national exposure, it's a tough grind. I don't think it helps your record sales at all.

I've been approached to do a couple of specials and that's interesting. It shows the public that you can do television, but they can't turn you on every Wednesday night at 7:30. I don't want them to see me every Wednesday night at 7:30, I want them to pay money to come and see me in a club and to pay money to go out and buy my records. They won't do that if they see you every week. They won't do that unless you're a huge name and even then your records can suffer.

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
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
