The Canadian Association of Broadcasters, the organization of almost all of Canada's private broadcasters, celebrated its 50th anniversary and presented its industry awards during the association's annual meeting in Ottawa last week

CAB judging committees named

Celebration comes back after Harmonium loss

The Celebration label "is the one we've slated for French-Canadian acts," Quality's A&R director R. A.

(Bob) Morten told RPM:

"With our current acquisition of Opus 5, we've more than made up for the loss of Harmonium," Morten said. The initial French-language LP from Quebec's Opus 5 is now picking up in the U.S. (Quality had lost Harmonium

to Columbia's CBS Disques.)
While recording the Opus 5 LP at Montreal's Triangle Studios, Morten negotiated with owners LeBlanc and Alain Laloncette to record their own band, Encor'. Negotiating in December, Celebration signed Encor' for English and French product (terms reportedly unacceptable to Harmonium). In February, 1976, Encor' changed their name to Appropot, and Morten expects their first LP "within six weeks."



Nearly 1,000 people jammed Toronto's Harbord Collegiate Auditorium to honour the late Paul Robeson, singer, film actor and stage star who died recently. Participants from Toronto's music, dance, theatre and black communities staged a mixed-media tribute highlighted by the presence of songwriter Earl Robinson. Sponsors of the event included Lou Applebaum, Dave Broadfoot, Max Ferguson, Estelle Klein, Anton Kuerti, George Luscombe, Catherine McKinnon, Don Parrish and Paul Siren.

Winnipeg's CKY-TV top TV station of the year, Trois Riviers' CHLN the number one AM station and St. Catharines' CHSC-FM the FM station of the year

Sydney N.S.'s CJCB-TV won the H. Gordon Love award for quality newswork. The late Mr. Love from Calgary's CFCN-AM, FM, TV, is credited with setting up the first radio newsroom in Canada. CJCB was granted the award for its broadcast efforts to highlight a critical housing shortage in Cape Breton and provoking government attention.

Dr. G. R. A. Rice, president of Edmonton's Sunwapta Broadcasting, (CFRN-AM, FM, TV) was honoured with the Ted Rogers Sr./Velma Rogers Graham Award for "making the most

Currently touring Europe, Vannelli has completed filming a television special in Holland, and is planning to record his fourth A&M LP in Britain, before returning to Canada as official arts representative for the Montreal Olympics.




Anne Murray starts cross-Canada tour

RPM sets industry poll plans

RPM's Special Projects Coordinator, Stan Klees is putting the finishing touches on the first RPM Readers' Poll that will result in the Canadian Music Industry Awards, (The Cancon Awards).

Nomination ballots have been mailed to all Canadian readers of RPM Magazine asking for nominations in the following categories: No. 1 Canadian Recording Manufacturer and Distributor, No. 1 Record Company in Canadian Product, Most Aggressive Record Company Promotion Team, Most Cooperative Artist or Group, Top Canadian Personal Manager, Most Aggressive Canadian Independent Label, Top Music Publishing Firm in Canadian Content, Best Record Company Sales Team, Most Cooperative Radio Record Library Staff, Most Aggressive Canadian Recording Studio, and Most Cooperative Record Retailer.

Deadline for the nominations ballots is May 3. The ballots are to be forwarded to the awards' accountants in a self-addressed envelope and must be received by that date.

The results will not be known to RPM or the industry until the ac-

countancy firm makes the results available at a small industry gathering to be held June 7.

The RPM Industry Awards banquet will be a unique affair in that there will be a pay bar and tickets will take the form of a "meal ticket" available only by advance registration. The meal ticket will show the exact cost of the banquet fare. All other costs for the presentation of awards will be absorbed by RPM. The meal at the banquet (including sales tax and gratuities) works out to \$10.45 per person which will be the exact cost of the RPM Awards Banquet "Meal Ticket". These meal tickets will be available by advance reservation (prepaid) only.

Reception drinks will be available at a pay bar and wine can be purchased at the tables during the banquet.

The reader's poll has been planned to be an industry affair and it is hoped that this will become a yearly event for the industry.

Mya Lange is a Terry Jacks discovery from Vancouver who, despite a single release last fall (Ice And Fire, included on this album), has remained rather unknown outside of her home province.

London's national promo chief, Gary Chalmers, has personally taken charge of a massive national promotion campaign to bring Mya into prominence.

Although Jacks only produced three of the 11 cuts, his influence is always felt, and in fact Mya often sounds like the other half of the Poppy Family. The rest of the time she sounds something like Maria Muldaur, without the same maturity.

Production on the other eight songs is by Guy Sobell at Can Base. Sobell has recorded Mya's delicate voice over a tight, light rock base with accent on the rhythm guitar and electric piano. Excellent guitar work is by Sobell, Jerry Doucette and Jamie Bowers.

Mya writes her own songs, which create an image lyrically of her being the kind of woman who dares anyone to show her something new about love. There's an audience for this, and strong promotion with the MOR market in mind will be worthwhile.

RON BAUMBER China Doll ILN 1001





Hann is already enjoying crossover success with Almost Fell Into Her Eyes from the LP, and others like These Thousand Goodbyes have similar potential. Lyricist Paul White has a strange sense of humour, but is appealing with I'll be your Antique Freak and Salvation Annie. Produced by Holger Peterson, Tommy Banks on keyboards & arrangements.

THE MEMPHIS HORNS High On Music APLI-1355-N

Having backed just about everybody in studio sessions, the Memphis Horns, under the production of Booker T. Jones, have released an album featuring themselves. Ten brassy instrumental disco cuts, originals by Booker T. and by band members. Some good FM fare and singles potential, but LP could do quite well as a whole, due to good packaging.

BLACK SOUL Brasil Africa · SV 13003-K

Brazilian band entering international market with rhthym, simple melodies, loose energy, fast pacing, and more rhythm should make a dent in both disco and reggea markets, with good promo. Six members (2 drummers) sing in Spanish with no subtitles.

Also new and pretty at RCA's head office is Marghy Cox, who will be looking after all the press poop.



A platinum LP, \$million tour vintage Wine

The Montreal-based April Wine set a Canadian record March 15 when their Aquarius album, The Whole World's Goin' Crazy, shipped platinum which represents a walloping advance

order of 1,000,000 copies. The album, this week tops the RPM chart, rare for a Canadian album. Their title single makes it to No. 31 with a bullet this week on the RPM 100.

The band is currently in the middle of the Western half of a 45-date national tour that started in Timmins (March 31). After Vancouver (May 15), they'll play Ottawa, Toronto, Montreal and Hamilton in June (dates still to be announced). Following a break, the tour resumes in Campbell-

ton, N.B. (June 24) and continues through the east, winding up in St. John's (July 15).

Donald Tarlton, Aquarius part-owner and president of Donald K. Donald, the firm managing the tour, believes this tour will gross \$1 million.

So far on the tour, April Wine have set two records. On April 19, they became the first band from any country to sell out the Regina Stadium; and in Edmonton April 23-24, they were the first to sell out the Kinsmen Field House two nights in a

The tour and album promotion centres around the Whole World's Goin' Crazy theme. Aquarius hired Bob Lemm of Promotivation Art to develop a visual concept to boost the album, and the result was the nowfamiliar Mad Hatter character, who will continue to appear on posters, buttons, T-shirts and store displays to promote the tour. Saturation campaigns are aimed at leading top-40 and FM stations in each centre, supplemented by newspaper ads and TV spots in some markets.

April Wine's last tour, built around their LP Stand Back, visited 80 cities and grossed about \$750,000. The album became platinum some months ago. and sales are approaching the 160,000 mark. The three preceding

albums, On Record, Electric Jewels, and April Wine Live, have all reached

Averaging about 100.000 singles sales annually, April Wine have had a dozen national hits, including Bad Side Of The Moon, You Could've Been A Lady. Drop Your Guns, Oowatanite, and several others in the six years they've been together, putting them on the brink of being the premiere Canadian rock singles band.

However, certain factors have prevented them from achieving greater fame

They have no American distribution deal. They were signed with Big Tree but only two singles were released in four years. That contract expired some months ago, and now Terry Flood, April Wine manager and Aquarius president, is expected to announce a new major deal for American and international distribution, of the new album and all future material, by the end of May.

Another factor is unfortunate timing. This year April Wine was nominated for four major Juno Awards. Stand Back was up for Best Selling Album, and the band was up for Group of the Year. Myles Goodwyn, leader and vocalist, was nominated

for composer and producer Junos. But they stood little chance against BTO in the album and group categories, and this was the year of Hagood Hardy, who bagged the composer award for himself and the producer award for Peter Anastasoff.

Goodwyn. who's been trying his hand at solo production with Bronze, another Aquarius group, is the only member who was with the group when it began in 1970. in Halifax. After four

months there, the band moved to Montreal, where they secured a recording contract with Aquarius.

Their first album, April Wine, sold a modest 10,000 copies. After changing bass players, they recorded the On Record and Electric Jewels albums. Due to a familiar case of musicial incompatibility, the two remaining originals parted, requiring a full reformation. Moffet, Mercer, Goodwyn and bassist Jim Clench re-

The setting was the Centennial Ballroom of the Inn on the Park, the date Wednesday April 21st., and it was ACTRA's turn to put its best foot forward with their fifth annual Awards Dinner. The Ballroom has never been dressed up as it was for this event. The CBC with the cooperation of the Inn on the Park people, had literally changed the room to meet camera specifications, and they were still able to squeeze more than 800 anxious members of Canada's television and radio acting community into a banquet setting.

The two-hour (plus) show, produced by John Thompson, who also boasts production credits for the Junos, was televised on the entire CBC television network.

From the standpoint of audience participation, presenters polish and recipient enthusiasm, the ACTRA Awards overshadowed the Junos. One must be reminded however, that the must be reminded however, that these people are all professionals.

came with the William McElcheran creation) obviously means more to the recipient than it does to many of those who win Junos, borne out by the acceptance speeches which were much more heartfelt and humbly professional. It was an atmosphere of comradery. The members of the ACTRA union their people very rehave found ceptive to the awards and, even to an outsider, the honours bestowed were genuinely cherished.

The struggle of the Canadian actor, writer and producer, for radio and television, has been a long and often bitter battle for recognition. The degree of respect that one actor has for another is that which the record industry should first envy and then attempt to emulate.

dia) for "Lies My Father Told Me" (feature film); Max Ferguson and Allan McFee (Best Variety Performers in Radio) "The Max Ferguson Show"; Fred Sgambati (Best Sportscaster); Peter Kent (Best News Broadcaster) for "Report On Cambodia"; Elizabeth Gray (Best Writer in the Documentary Mode in Radio) for "The Supreme Court of Canada"; Harry Bruce (Best Writer in the dramatic Mode in Radio) for "Word From an Ambassador of Dreams"; Al Waxman (Best Performance in a Continuing Role in a Television Program) for his performance as Larry King in "King of Kensington": Birgid Koch's production of "Pro Nobis Peccatoribus" for (Best Radio Program of the Year); and CBC Toronto's production of "Emily Carr" (Best Television program of the Year).

The Earle Grey Award went to Jayne Eastwood for her performance as Hardy in "The Last of the Four Letter Words"; the Andrew Allan Award to Chris Wiggins for his performance as King Magnus in "The Apple Cart" and Adrienne Clarkson and Warner Troyer received the Gordon Sinclair Award for "The Fifth Estate"

One of the most touching moments of the evening was the presentation of the John Drainie Award to an unsuspecting Jane Mallett for which she received a well deserved standing ovation.

The person most responsible for this very thriving industry and there was a room full of working actors, writers and producers to prove it, wasn't overlooked either. Mr. Pierre Juneau, first Chairman of the Canadian Radio-Television Commission and now parliamentary assistant to Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, was honoured with a coveted Nellie and a standing ovation.

Much of the success of the evening was due the preparation for the awards dinner and the arranging of presenters and attendance of nominees - and all of it put together by the ACTRA team and in particular Margaret Collier and Elizabeth Malone - and of course, the driving force of Pierre Berton who emceed the show.





CBC boss describes net's Canadianism

Addressing the Canadian Club on the topic of "CBC And Canadianism", CBC president A.W. Johnson maintained, the purpose of the CBC "is simple and clear - the preservation and enrichment of Canadianism.'

Nearly 50 per cent of an anverage Canadian's leisure time is devoted to watching television, 20 per cent to radio: the CBC "must be relied upon to reflect through these powerful media, Canadian values, Canadian attitudes and perceptions, and Canadian institutions and history," Johnson emphasized.

He stressed television has become "the most pervasive and powerful broadcasting medium in the world" and Canadians have more choice in radio/television programming than any other people in the world.

"The country needs a CBC," he said, but currently, "English Canadians, now, are spending more than two-thirds of their television viewing time, watching U.S. programmes."

He cited cable as the prime culprit of luring away the television viewer, "capable of bringing up to four U.S. channels to some 50 per cent of Canadians, and by 1980, that figure is sure to reach around 65 per cent." Vancouver cable subscribers now number "80 per cent and Toronto 70 per cent. One hundred per cent American content ... on three or four channels. Then there is one Canadian network in English Canada, and another in Ontario alone, which brings us U.S. programmes nearly 50 per cent of the time ... much of this during prime time."

In Johnson's estimation, CBC televises U.S. programmes, "roughly 30 per cent," but "multiplicity of choice," is what he considers the advantage of CBC programming (although if viewers shift away from the network, the issue can become a "threat to Cana-

dian programming.")

He reasoned, "we in Canadian television, both public and private broadcasters must so improve Canadian an programming, that Canadians will prefer to watch it rather than American programming." Answering skepticism, Johnson explained, "we have already done it once... in the development of the strong and distinctive cultural life to be found in French Canada today.

The language barrier "forced" the development of French-Canadian programming, "since French-language programmes could not be bought as readily as English language programmes from the U.S."

"If the CBC was able to do this in French Canada," he insisted, "we can do it in English Canada.'

Johnson belives that Canadians watch more American programming, because "American networks spend fully three times as much in producing one hour of television as the CBC can afford to do. Until these odds are reduced, it simply is unreasonable to expect the CBC to be able to compete effectively with U.S. television.

"The CBC has not been able to afford to produce exclusively Canadian programming, simply because our budget would have had to be very much larger to produce Canadian programmes to replace the American and British ones we now carry.

"There is a price for remaining Canadian" but he added, "we must earn the right to your increasing support by producing distinctively Canadian programmes, not American copies.'

Randle scores 'W5 special

Composer Doug Randle has created an original music score for a CTV W5 special, The Children's Hospital, and a rare recognition by this television network of Canadian composers.

Randle, a Canadian composer and conductor who has been scoring film, radio and TV for over 30 years, was commissioned by director Pat Corbet to "hold the emotional strength of our story" of the relationships be-tween staff and patients in the reallife documentary as seen through the eyes of a five-year-old heart patient.

Ray Griff:

"A stranger in my own land"

Ray Griff is a little more than a bit perplexed about the fact that he, an accomplished Canadian singer-songwriter who has lived in Nashville for 12 years has never achieved recognition in his own country.

"In all of my U.S. appearances I announce that I'm from Calgary, the home of the Stampede, but I'm sort of like a stranger in my own land.

'An artist has an ego," he says noting he's never been nominated for any Canadian awards despite a number of hit song compositions and recordings. both here and in the U.S.

Griff was in Toronto last week to tape a segment of an upcoming CBC show, Catch A Rising Star, and to promo a new single release from his first Capitol LP, Ray Griff. Two cuts of the LP have already hit the charts, You Ring My Bell, released before the LP, and If I Let Her Come In, released with the LP. Griff is looking for a three hit LP with I Love The Way That You Love Me.

Griff toured the Canadian honkytonk and TV circuit up to 1964 but left for Nashville at the urging of Jim Reeves. "There was nowhere else to

go " says Griff.

Reeves died a few months later and Griff had to make it on his own in Music City working in a record pressing plant and other jobs before he settled down to compose and set up his own Blue Echo publishing com-

pany.

His first composition, Baby, was covered and became a number one song. Associated with BMI and later ASCAP, Griff has won 16 songwriting awards from the two performing rights organizations. During that time, he says, he "saw recording artistry as sort of a secondary thing.'

Griff cut his first record, a single, in 1968. He produced and leased it himself to ABC-Dot. He later signed with a smaller label, Royal American, and produced four of his own singles and an LP for them. All were successful, but the money just wasn't there.

In 1973 he signed with ABC-Dot and cut five singles and two LPs with the label, but didn't feel he had the freedom to produce his own records the way he wanted to. He asked for, and was granted a release from his



contract last summer. He immediately signed with Capitol (U.S.).

Griff produced eight of the 10 cuts on his Capitol LP, two he co-produced with Lee Hazen. Not only a singersongwriter, Griff plays four keyboard instruments on the album.

Griff came to Toronto to do the CBC show "not that I wanted the work that bad, but I wanted to meet people working for Capitol here, and work with (CBC producer) Randy Marcowitz." Marcowitz produced a Ray Griff country show before the artist went to Nashville.

While in town Griff did on-air, live or phone interviews with CJCJ's Charlie Russell, CHML's Johnny Murphy, CHOO's Neil Sutherland, CBW's Lee Major CKLY's Ian Cook and CKFH's Barry Nesbitt. CFGM's Dave Johnson aired one hour of conversation with Griff and cuts from his LP.

Donna and Lee Roy, thanks to Gary Buck are off to New Zealand and a shot at that country's national television. Nice to be recognized outside your own country.

Former MCA artist Russell Thornberry has signed with Edmonton's Royalty Records. Royalty's R. Harlan Smith has set a late spring release date for his first LP on the label.

Known as much for his songwriting as his recording, Thornberry will cut all new, original material on his up-coming LP. Songs from his previous MCA LP include Rosaline and Miss January, which were BMI award-win-

R. Dean Taylor signed Tim Meehan and Jackson D. Kane to his Autumn Records, a Canadian label.

Kane, an actor-singer who used to play bass with Roy Orbison, appears in The Man Who Fell To Earth, a film starring David Bowie and Lee Remick. Taylor produced his first release, Just A Little Bit.



15 years of radio's eyes in the skies

When hundreds of thousands of Toronto commutors line up bumper to bumper in rush hour traffic, waves are made in the music industry across Canada.

Drivers have little to do but turn on their radios. Toronto's biggest broadcasters, the ones who provide the biggest share of the royalty pie and determine most hit records in Canada, zoom in on broadcasting's most captive audience.

This is the time, especially the morning rush hour, when the big city broadcasters make their money. Class AA and AAA time rates zoom by anywhere from 33 to 100 per cent, to a high of \$160 for 30 seconds on CFRB

That doesn't scare advertisers away. CFRB time sales reports that this is their most demanded time slot, and often advertisers must be

Eddie Luther, Canada's first pilot-

broadcaster to air traffic reports from a helicopter, is celebrating his 15th anniversary in the air-on the air, during which he has logged more than 13,000 hours of flight time.

Rogers Broadcasting pay \$200,000 annually to keep Luther and flight partner Darryl Dahmer, hovering above Toronto's morning and afternoon rush-hour traffic.

Five radio traffic pilots currently fly over Toronto: Luther (Hughes 269) and Dahmer (Cessna 172 highwing plane) for CHFI-FM, CFTR; Bob Rice (Hughes 500) and Diane Pepper (Hughes 350) for CKEY; and Henry Shannon (twin Commanche low-wing plane) for CFRB.

CHUM-FM-Toronto's Warren Down (alias Geets Romo, alias David Haydu) broadcasts a traffic report each morning, but his traffic watch originates from a CHUM-FM studio accompanied by assorted chopper sound effects.

Prior to 1969, CHUM Ltd. dropped their Toronto helicopter traffic report, according to news director Dick Smythe, "because of the cliche, every-body was doing it."

"The most difficult thing about helicopters," Smythe told RPM, "is that when you need them most, they can't fly ... and that's in bad weather.

"He's right in a way," said Luther. "Certainly there are lots of times we'd like to get up. But we're also needed many times, not just in bad weather. Sure, it could snow overnight, but if it's clear in the morning, we're right

Non-profit radio fighting for its new life

Toronto's non-commercial and independent radio station, is attempting to raise almost threequarters of a million dollars a year to stay on the air.

The station is funded 80% by the Ontario government's ministry of Culture and Recreation, and has had to raise \$150 000 on its own, from listeners, corporate sponsors and donors and private charities.

As of March 31 the end of CJRT's fiscal year, the station was \$35,000 short of its goal despite innovative public and on-air fundraisers.

"We didn't meet our projection," station manager Cam Finley told RPM, "but the government said they'd make sure we didn't have a deficit."

Nevertheless, CJRT board chairman Mrs. A.K. Stuart told RPM that the station's activities in April brought in enough money to make the drive, launched in December, a success.

Last June CJRT was granted permission to boost the power of its transmission to reach all of Metro Toronto, and in September the CJRT board began a drive to finance the programming of a forward looking, new, and bigger CJRT.

The station lined up seven corpor ate sponsors. The Toronto Dominion Bank and Bell Canada-Yellow Pages each bought a sponsorship at the rate of \$8,000 a year, which gives each of

them an on-air mention a day for a year and Simpsons, Simpson-Sears' and Eaton's each donated \$4,000, entitling them to three mentions a

In addition by March 31, CJRT had 34 other corporate donors, and has added five since then.

Beginning December 31, CJRT solicited donor-members, for a donation of \$25 or more. By March 31, 821 individuals had become donormembers and another 1,071 had become donors (less than \$25 donations). By mid-April there were over 900 CJRT donor-members and 1204 donors.

Mrs. Stuart estimates that over 6,000 people have participated in the CJRT finance drive through contributions and attendance at CJRT fundraising music fests.

She stressed the "incredible help" given to the station by people in the music business who were backing the station's programming policies, especially in jazz, folk and classical music.

PAROSPOROS JAZZ PROPOROSPO

January 12-17, the station ran a jazz benefit at Toronto's Basin Street Club, three hours nightly live on-air and moderated by CJRT-FM jazz buff Ted O'Reilley. The event spotlighted Canada's finest music talent including

significant contribution in a single or continuing fashion to the Canadian broadcasting system or for exceptional community services in the role as broadcaster."

CHSC-FM topped all other stations on its band with a staff-produced series, titled Heritage, on the early history of the Niagara Peninsula.

CHLN-AM won the John J. Gillin Award as the AM station of the year for its broadcast efforts and political pressure to win improvements in the public transportation system in its listening area.

CKY-TV was honoured for its own

TV productions, including two, onehour musical variety programmes and a series of 13 half-hour documentaries on interesting Canadian crimes.

CKXL-Calgary engineers Gordon Kyle and Greg Jardine were presented with the Col. Keith Rogers Engineering Award, sponsored by Canadian General Electric, for "most successfully developing engineering or technical ideas ... to improve the extent or quality of service." Keith Rogers set up the first mobile wireless station in a Canadian military complex and had the first broadcast licence east of Montreal.

CAB also granted two scholorships and a student citation. Ryerson graduate student Bryan Ellis won the Harry Sedgwick Memorial Award. Last fall he was chosen by fellow students to executive produce an "Inter-Media" series in cooperation with the Global Network.

Ryerson grad Jayne Catherine won the \$1,000 Ruth Hancock scholarship and Loyola College's Nathalie Petrowski was awarded the \$2,500 Raymond Crepault Award. The Crepault scholarship, sponsored by the Radiomutuel Network, is awarded to French speaking broadcast students.

Oscar Peterson Moe Koffman, Teddy Moses and Ed Bickert, who donated playing time to the cause of assisting CJRT-FM. Supporters attending Basin Street became eligible for trips to the Montreux jazz festival and complete album libraries of Sackville and Pablo record product, donated by the labels.

"There were two snowstorms that week," said Finley "but Basin Street was continually packed," and, Sack-ville's John Norris added: "It was an opportunity to show people that we have a thriving Canadian jazz commun-A total of \$10,000 was raised general admission and donor pledging.

Two weeks following the Basin Street event, CJRT aired four nights of vintage out-of-print records, dating back to the 1930s, from the personal collections of Norris and fellow Coda Jazz Magazine editor Bill Smith. Listeners continued to phone in dona-

March 28-31 CJRT ran four days of special classical music programming between 10:00 am and 9:00 pm. Onair guests included George Crum, music director of the national ballet, and Eleanor Sniderman of Aquitaine Records. Every hour the station gave away a classical record prize to a donor. All records were donated by record companies.

On April 25 about 80 members of the Toronto Symphony and conductor Andrew Davis played a benefit concert at Toronto's St. Andrews Church with all proceeds going to CJRT. The concert, which had been pledged to the station by the musicians before the March 31 fundraising deadline, was graced by the "unofficial patronage" of Ontario Lt. Governor Pauline McGibbons.

On March 27. CJRT ran a noon to midnight folk benefit at Toronto's Harbourfront which featured dozens of local folk artists. \$4,000 was raised.

Even though things are looking up for the station, at the end of the fiscal year they had to cut back \$60,000 worth of programming, scratching free-lance commentators and one Ryerson Open College broadcast credit course.

"We've managed to balance our books,' said Finley: "After our staff takes a vacation we'll start it all over again."

up there, telling people what conditions are like."

Luther's \$60,000 helicopter is based at Great Lakes Helicopters, at the foot of Spadina Avenue on the Toronto lakefront.

He begins his mornings checking road conditions with the OPP and Ontario Motor League, and transmitting preliminary reports into the station.

At 7 am, Luther pushes his chopper out of the hangar and into the launch area, inspects the machine, and awaits clearance from Toronto Island Airport. He wears a headset with mike attachment that allows him to talk alternately with three local airports, and CFTR, CHFI-FM announcers (who cue him for the four traffic reports he broadcasts over each station, every hour).

"It's a service to our listeners," he said. "We find that it's much quicket and more efficient to be right over the scene, be able to warn, and sometimes figure why, traffic jams have happened. We're now realizing that because of our reports, drivers are becoming more educated. People do listen, and

pay attention."

A former staff announcer at CFRB, Saskatchewan-born Luther (trained to fly after the war by the RCAF) heard in 1960 that several American stations were employing aircraft to report on traffic conditions. Luther submitted a memo to CFRB and on May 1, 1961, became Canada's first traffic pilot.

In 1968, he moved to CHFI-FM. and Rogers invested \$10,000 to obtain his helicopter pilot's license.

Up to 1971 Luther was accompanied on his flights, but for the last five years, has been flying solo (excepting for the many guests - last count 10,000 - that have seen the airborne view).

By the end of May, Rogers will be employing a turbine (as opposed to piston) helicopter which will soar faster than 130 mph.
