Gordon Lightfoot and the CBC have gotten together for a live concert and TV special to benefit Canada's Olympic athletes.

Lightfoot got the idea when he saw the Hope-Crosby special last month, aired by the CBC and NBC with benefits split be-

Taking a look at the hole in the 45

The big hole which has characterized the doughnut-shaped 45-rpm single may be filled in after almost 30 years of spinning on the big spindle in North America.

A survey of singles received at RPM shows that most still have the one and one-

Ken Middleton, president of WEA Music of Canada, has announced a long term exclusive worldwide recording contract between Gordon Lightfoot and Warner Bros. Records. All future recordings will continue to be released on the Reprise label, both in Canada and internationally.

Interest, in the signing, from the international arena was considerable. Mo Ostin, Board Chairman and President of Warner Bros. Records, commented: "It's both professionally and personally gratifying to be involved with Gordon's career. Warner's looks ahead to this continuing association with a great deal of pride and the most optimistic prospects for success on all levels".

Ken Middleton, President of WEA Music of Canada and who negotiated the signing, noted: Gordon Lightfoot had been the best known and most important artist in Canada for many years and today his musical influence is felt throughout the world. Everyone at WEA Music is especially delighted and take great pride in the fact that Gordon has re-signed with our Canadian company for worldwide distribution."

Lightfoot has been Canada's top selling

male artist for many years and enjoys international recognition as a songwriter as well. Since becoming associated with Warner/Reprise back in 1969 he has built an exceptional catalogue of hit albums and singles which include: If You Could Read My Mind, Sundown, Carefree Highway, Rainy Day People and his big hit of last year, Gord's Gold.

Ready for a June release and the first album under the new agreement, is the Lenny Waronker produced, Summertime Dream. Waronker is Vice President and Director of A&R for Warner Bros Records.

On the concert scene, Lightfoot will be joining a host of other name Canadian acts for a benefit concert held at Toronto's Maple Leaf Gardens (June 11) in aid of Canada's Olympic Team.

Gordon Lightfoot day

The Broadcast Executive Society is celebrating this year's Canadian Music Day (June 8) with a tribute to Gordon Lightfoot.

Toronto Mayor has joined in the occasion by declaring the day "Gordon Lightfoot Day" in his city. half inch hole introduced by RCA in the late 1940s to set 45s and 45-rpm phonograph equipment apart from the 78-rpm forerunners.

But, as the singles market takes a back seat to the LP market, and as more listeners



have turntables with no fat spindle, or even record changer (essential for a singleslistener who doesn't want to be a deejay in his own home), some labels are moving to fill the hole.

Many new 45s have a built-in insert ("dink") to adapt the big hole to a nownormal, one-quarter inch hole for the standard LP spindle. The insert can be easily punched out (but can't be re-inserted) for radio stations, juke boxes and 45-buffs.

Record retailers report a very good response from customers. The inserts allow them to pile the singles on their turntables and sit back without worrying about sticking inserts into and punching inserts out of each disc.

Most "dinked" Canadian-pressed singles are manufactured on the presses which London's Montreal plant put into operation last year. The presses were imported from England where the small hole is the standard for singles; people from London Records say there was no major marketing decision involved in the conversion. 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Curtain falls on That's Showbusiness

That's Showbusiness, a fortnightly Canadian trade paper of the entertainment arts, suspended publication this month after more than five years of publishing.

Publisher Bette Laderoute, in an open letter on the front page of the May 19 issue, told readers that although funding was available from the Ontario Arts Council and Canada Council, the support from the

private sector advertising and subscriptions was not enough to keep going.

Laderoute told RPM that subscription and advertising revenue was improving, and the publication was just recently gaining some newsstand appeal.

When she published the last issue, she told her readers: "We simply wore out our shoestring. I will proceed to search out a new pair of laces and perhaps a new boot. Since then, she realizes she was too optimistic and now, she told RPM, she sees little hope of resuming publication.

She originally intended to cease publication long enough to collect some of the paper's outstanding accounts receivable and regroup its operations. But, with her announcement, the Canada Council held back

the final (May) installment of her current council grant.

With the loss of that expected income, Laderoute now says she will be lucky if she can cover her debts.

Money, she says, was the key to the death of That's Showbusiness, despite five years of struggle. The fact it couldn't retain staff in various Canadian centres, progress to weekly publication, or hire the business staff required, all stood in the way of the tabloid becoming the entertainment trade paper Laderoute knows that Canada needs.

Laderoute's immediate plans, after liquidating the paper's assets, are to concentrate on her Betterback Typesetting and Editorial Services firm.

That's Showbusiness covered the music, television, drama, and film industries. Stan Lepka provided regular coverage of the music business.

Laderoute's paper faced the problems created by too many grant-supported publications going after the same revenue. If one magazine or tabloid covered all of Canada showbusiness, instead of the many, often ego-oriented mags, That's Showbusiness would have survived. Laderoute's was one of the few Canadian entertainment trade books to come out regularly. Many others, with distributor-deceiving, glossy covers, appear only at spotty intervals.

One grant opens the door to others, and the Canadian market isn't big enough to support the mags the grants spawn. Publishing isn't like broadcasting, where the airwaves and regulations limit the frequencies and competition.

Government grantors and do-gooders too often subsidise people who want only to see their names in print. The industry here is too short-sighted to realize there are too many publications for any one of them to do the proper job. Now there is one less, unfortunately, the best one.

Canadian labels who use London's presses say they have heard very little complaints and much praise for the "dinked" centres.

Most of the records with the "dinked" insert are on labels distributed by London (Attic, Goldfish, Boot, Aquarius, Rodeo) but, Attic's Tom Williams told RPM, these labels don't have to press at London just because London distributes their product. Williams says he took his manufacturing to London last year because of the "dinking" of the records; he, personally, hopes all singles will be made that way.

Some parts of the singles business mostly radio stations, jukebox owners, discos - use mainly 45-rpm, big-hole equipment. But for most, conversion to the small hole is not difficult.

The jukebox operators complained a bit at first, Williams reports, but soon found how simple it is to punch out the "dinks".

RCA's Jack Feeney told RPM that RCA introduced the big hole and the big spindle, almost 30 years ago, to present an integrated system quite distinct from 78-rpm phonograph records and equipment. At first, 45-rpm record players were quite inLETTERS TO THE EDITOR

CRIA and CIRPA meet cabinet reps

Canadian Recording Industry Association and Canadian Independent Record Producers Association leaders took the record industry's case to Queen's Park May

CRIA president Terry Lynd, VP Stan Kulin, past president George Struth and executive

secretary Terry Lynd

Brian Robertson, along with CIRPA's Tom Williams and Jack Richardson discussed the Ontario Ministry of Industry and Tourism's recent report on the state of the recording industry in Ontario with ministry fficials.

Industry and Tourism minister Claude Bennett, with his deputy James Fleck, clarified to the delegation, according to Lynd, "that the report was produced as a discussion paper only and its purpose was to open up a direct line of communication."

The recording industry officials presented the industry's views on a wide range of topics, but centred on the inequalities in the sales tax paid on studio recording services and lack of incentives for investment in local record production.

expensive; RCA was almost giving them away to seize a large market for the new 45-rpm line.

In addition to its obvious distinction, the big spindle and hole made for more stable play on the unsophisticated phonographs of the day. At the time, the corporation was planning to use the big hole and 45-rpm turntable speed on all of it's recordings, experimenting with the 10 and 12 inch 45-rpm disc.

Soon, however, Columbia introduced the 33 1/3-rpm LP which swept the non-singles market. Columbia did release some 33 1/3 small-hole singles in the 1950s, but couldn't beat the pattern RCA had already established by the 45-rpm spindrome in the jukebox and radio markets.

Deja Vu settles down in Toronto club date

Deja Vu, the reluctant "supergroup" produced by former Lighthouse leader Skip Prokop, was introduced to Toronto by Capitol at the Gasworks the week of May

The band features three lead vocalists -Cal Dodd, Paul Gorden and Bob Bonnell backed by former members of Bob McBride's group. Terry Wilkins is on bass, John Sheard is on a fleet of keyboards, John Pimm is on guitar, and Wally Cameron on drums.

Capitol has been promoting the group heavily, and recently Prokop publicly denounced the supergroup tag. Part of the hype due to the fact that Jimmy Ienner, known for his work with Blood, Sweat & Tears, Eric Carmen, Grand Funk Railroad and Three Dog Night, is executive producer of the band's first LP, A Song For Everyone.

Deja Vu perform a variety of material in various styles, including songs by Three Dog Night, Average White Band and the rockier Beach Boys, plus several originals by Toronto songwriter David Bacha. The band's sound ranges from pop to progressive keyboard rock, with the three singers trading leads and filling out the textures.

The single Dance was released last week playlisted at several stations as an LP cut before pressing as a single.

Roy Smith - producer dies in boating mishap

Roy Smith, well-known Toronto musician and music arranger for the Tommy Hunter Show (CBC-TV) was drowned along with his sixteen year old twin children, Kelley and Kevin.

The bodies of the 46 year old veteran record producer and his daughter Kelley were found near Oshawa May 26. The body of Kevin has not yet been located.

Mr. Smith was one of the first Canadian record producers to attain international acclaim in the 50s when he collaborated with the late Ron Metcalfe in the hit, Twisting At The Woodchoppers Ball. He was responsible for the launching of many careers in the music business.

WEA's Doobie Bros. bail out promoter

The Doobie Brothers bailed Calgary promoter, Dave Horodezky, out of what could have been a tight jam, Monday May 25, by returning to McMahon Stadium to perform before 9800 fans after a previous engagement was cancelled four days earlier.

The WEA group were booked to appear Thursday (May 20) but heavy rain and gusting winds forced Horodezky to cancel the outdoor engagement.

The Doobie Brothers completed their tour by performing in Portland and Spokane but agreed to return to Calgary for the Monday date.

"It was a bit of a scramble but we did manage to get the concert off," said Horodezky, head of Brimstone Productions. "We lost a lot of people. I guess we had about 4700 tickets returned after the Thursday cancellation.

"The Doobies and their management were fantastic. They wanted to play Calgary and they cooperated fully in setting up the alternate date.

The Doobies played a two hour set with no warm-up band and were well received by an enthusiastic Calgary audience. The original warm-up band, Pablo Cruise, were unable to return for the re-scheduled date and a Calgary band, Fosterchild, missed the concert due to equipment problems.

LaBlanc adds new acts

Larry LeBlanc & Associates, a Toronto based PR firm, has added Blood Sweat & Tears, Domenic Troiano Band, Cliff Edwards, and Concept 376 to its current roster. Other LeBlanc roster acts include Sylvia Tyson and The Mercy Brothers.

LeBlanc, a free-lance music writer, will be filing Canadian copy to U.K.'s Melody Maker and New York's Music Gig Guide. To take care of his increased work load, he has added Debbie Green as promo coordinator for his firm.

Toronto studio owner Willie Webster sounds like Thunder

Times have never been better for Thunder Sound, one of a number of modern recording studios mushrooming around Toronto over the past five years.

Owner Willie Webster sat back in his studio's tasteful, rustic setting and casually remarked: "I've been losing money."

But he's quick to add that the good years have begun.

Thunder was conceived in January 1970; The following summer Webster and former partner David Briggs converted leased space near downtown Toronto's Davenport and Yonge Streets into the city's second 16-track studio. They unveiled it January 1971 with a Briggs-produced Tom Rush LP for Columbia Records.

January 1975 Thunder opened its 24-track facility and since then they've tracked a string of top Canadian LPs including: Ian Thomas' Calabash, Sylvia Tyson's recent and upcoming LPs, Murray McLauchlar's Day To Day Dust, Joe Mendelson's No Substitute, Bryan Way's debut LP, Shirley Eikhard's Child Of The Present, and LPs by Ron Nigrini and The Good Brothers.

Thunder's easy atmosphere has attracted some of the new wave of "Homemade" productions for LPs by Stringband, Woodshed's David Essig and Willie Bennet, and Cedric Smith's Perth County Conspiracy.

Doug Smith, who recently became Thunder's chief administrator, told RPM the studio has to book 50-60 hours a week to make money. Through March they logged only about 40-50 hours weekly but since then Thunder's control panel has been switched "on" 60-70 hours every week, by a variety of artists.

This month, for example, Gary Blye is pre-recording soundtracks for David Steinberg's TV show, Sea Horse Films is doing soundtrack work, Sackville is tracking jazz, Tom Wilson is producing Little Caesar And The Consuls, Rob Morten is in with Coyote and Grant Smith, Thunderbird is cutting country music and there's numerous jingle sessions.

Webster insists that the Toronto studio business has turned the corner; but points southward when he talks of reaping the rewards of recent years' investments:

"When you think of all the money they take out of Canada, and the taxes they pay for taking it out, you know they have a good reason for wanting to spend some of it here".

Webster feels that it has only been during the last year or so that Toronto studios gained the "professional depth", session men and technicians, to compete with Los Angeles and New York studios.

"Branches of the international record companies don't spend enough of the (corporate) A&R dollars in Canada," he continued, explaining that avoiding taxes paid on profits taken back to the U.S. and the lower studio costs here should be enough to encourage budget-minded parent firms to record here.

Webster is ready for an influx of studio work with a staff of 10 and two free-lance engineers working at Thunder.

Staff engineer Alan Thorne specializes in rock recording. He handled recent sessions

of Goddo and David Clayton Thomas' reggae band. With Thome are free lancers Bill Seddon (mostly country music), Phil Sheridan (mostly big band and pop) and Mike Hogg handles 8-track studio B.

At one time Thunder management planned to create a relaxed, country atmosphere

by moving the studio near Orangeville, Ontario, but they couldn't close the land deal. Webster, though, has worked to create that casual atmosphere in town. He invites industry people to drop in, even if they don't use the studio: "I think it's possible to have a free atmosphere and a professional atmosphere in the same place."

A quick tour of the studio reveals coffee lounges, a pinball game room and a sauna. There's a vault, left by a security firm former tenant, for Thunder's master tapes.

With the studio only now beginning to break even, Webster has had to broaden his business interests:

"The logical thing to do, he told RPM, "is to get into production (Webster has interests in the production side of several young artists) but I don't see how that puts me in competition with my clients."

In general, producers and studio owners have the same interests; they both want the best possible productions for the lowest possible costs.

Right now, one heavy cost they both carry is the federal manufacturing and provincial sales taxes they pay on the total cost of producing master tapes: a 19% surcharge, in total, on the entire session costs. (Quebec and New York, for example, don't charge sales tax on studio sessions).

Duty paid on imported master tapes (from which over 95% of all records sold in Canada are made) at the Canadian border is based only on the cost of the plastic tape the music is recorded on.

But, studios have to pay duty on all the imported equipment they buy, very little of it is manufactured in Canada.

"My idea of a tariff," says Webster, "is that it protects indigenous industry. We have no industry making 16 and 24-track consoles, but we do have a growing recording industry." Instead of discouragement, he adds, there should be incentives, possibly

counting Canadian production more heavily when determining Canadian content for airplay purposes.

Webster wants to see an association of recording studio businessmen to deal with some of these problems and to promote Canadian recording facilities in the U.S.: "We have to go to the source."

MAKING TRACKS

Capitol's Suzanne Stevens is in Hollywood to track five songs with producer Spencer Proffer at the Producers Workshop Studio. She's working with local musicians including guitarist David Wolfert (from Melissa Manchester's band) and pianist Joe Sample (from the Crusaders). Her recent LP and new single, Knowing How, Knowing When, were just released in the U.S., and the LP in Spain and Australia.

SUNDOWN (Edmonton)

Royalty's R. Harlan Smith finished up production on Jimmy Arthur Ordge and Russ Thornberry. A new single was completed by Tuxedo and local group, Mission put the finishing touches on their single. Laying down bed tracks were Shonderiah, Norman Mitchell and the Dunster Magic Show. Polydor's Hammersmith firmed plans to produce their new album at this 24-track facility. Torontonian Peter Matheson produced a session with Gaye Delorme and producer Wes Dakus looked after a session for Mavis McCauley and Fustukian. Composer Roger Deegan laid the basics for a film score. Commercial work has also been heavy for the Sundown studio with Canadian Concepts, Francis Williams & Johnson and Vinnie Trouth, continuing with their projects. Engineering chores are being performed by Barry Allen, Ron Vauge ois and Morrie Eaman.

Mariposa sets line-ups for June 25-27 festival

The Mariposa Folk Festival last week announced plans for this year's Toronto Island weekend of craft workshops and live folk, bluegrass and country music.

This year's festival, which will take place June 25-27, boasts a list of talent that includes John Arpin, Willie Dunn, Dave Essig, Friends Of Fiddler's Green, Steve Goodman, Humber River Valley Boys, Myrna Lorrie, Marip osa Morris Men, Bram Morrison, Mike Seeger, Shingoose, Sweet Honey In The Rock, Toronto Sacred Harp Singers, Sneezy Waters, Dave Wilcox, Robert Pete Williams, Taj Mahal, and dozens of others.

There will be seven different stage areas, an area for the Native People's program, and a children's area. All kinds of craft sales, demonstrations and workshops will be held, including instrument making.

Tickets for the festival are available from the Mariposa office at 329 St. George St., Suite 4, in Toronto, by mail order. A cost of twenty-two dollars covers events and performances for all three days, a single day's admission is \$9.50.

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Canadian nets set next year's variety

CBC and CTV have each prepared tentative schedules for next fall's prime-time programming, listing more than a dozen mostly-music variety shows between them.

In only three cases (CBC's Tommy Hunter and Sunday night variety Super Special and CTV's Funny Farm) are variety shows pitted against U.S. network shows on the other Canadian network.

Only four scheduled network variety shows are outside of the 6:30-8:00 pm slot, after which the Canadian networks have to compete with network programming of the three U.S. networks via their affiliate stations just over the Canadian-U.S. border.

Tommy Hunter no longer competes with Ronnie Prophet's Grand Old Country. He's scheduled dead against The Rockford Files on CTV (and NBC) and movies on CBC and ABC; Prophet's show is moved to Thursday (6:30PM) where it rivals local programming on all other networks.

In the pre-prime-time slot, CTV is run-

ning Bobby Vinton (a network-U.S. coproduction) at 7:00 pm Tuesdays, followed by Stars On Ice (an Alex Trabek varietyon-skates show) at 7:30, running dead against CBC's half-hour Pop Goes The Wolfman (a network-U.S. co-production).

Thursday nights at 6:30, CTV will air Grand Old Country (switching to Rolf Harris in mid-season), scheduled against local programming on CBC and the three U.S. networks.

Fridays, CBC's Diane Stapley and CTV's David Steinberg, both variety shows, go at it for the 7-7:30 spot audience.

On Sundays, CTV will run Funny Farm against Walt Disney on CBC, and CBC's Canadian Variety one-hour Super Special (7:30-8:30) runs against Six Million Dollar Man and Sonny and Cher on CTV and CBS.

In prime time, CTV's, Pig and Whistle is running in the 9-9:30 spot on Mondays, against CBC's Front Page Challenge and U.S. border station network shows. CTV's

CBC's Tommy Hunter (I) won't be competing head on for country television audiences with CTV's Ronnie Prophet (r) next year. Last season they were scheduled in the same Friday night slot, but next fall Prophet's Grand Old Country show will be aired Thursday at 6:30 pm.

Bruce Murray on tour looks to TV and new LP

will then move West to Saskatoon, where he will play the Saskatchewan Provincial Exhibition. August will see Murray in a Maritime concert tour, then in the studio with his new band hopefully in the fall.

Murray has appeared extensively on TV shows including Midnight Special and many Canadian music and variety series.

Jim Shaw will produce the show, heading up six camera crews to track the estimated three hours of performance, and overseeing the expected weekend wonder required to edit the tapes into 90 minutes before show time.

Carling-O'Keefe put up \$100,000 through its sports foundation to prime the benefit. The performance and broadcast are expected to raise as much. All proceeds will be split between the Canadian Track And Field Association and, through the Olympic Trust, to the Olympic team.

Kid brother Bruce can make it alone

Don't worry, Anne Murray. Your kid brother is going to make it on his own.

Bruce Murray, 24, who is understandably a bit touchy about being reminded that he's being managed by his 31-year-old Big Sister Anne, is making his nightclub solo debut this week at the equally new 300-seat Hacienda Restaurant Tavern at 171 Carlingview Drive near the Airport Strip.

And the good news is that Bruce is a natural showman with all the potential of becoming a bigger star than his sister.

He's got the voice. It's a wide-ranging baritone-tenor

that reminds you of the best elements of his two idols the evangelical strain of soul singer Aretha Franklin and the free and easy crooning style of Bing Crosby.

He's got the engaging good looks of an up-and-comer. He's a skinny 6-foot-1, but with his sister's curly taffy-colored hair plus a dimpled chin and a hand-some profile.

Above all, he's got that indefinable and magical star's stage presence. He's a cocky strutter who comes onstage automatically knowing that he's got what it takes — waving his arms like semaphore signals, giving guidance to his fourman backup group of musicians with the assurance of a life-long pro.

What's most surprising about the Kid from Spring-hill, N.S., is that he's picked up such a broad repertoire of old and new ballads.

In a one-hour set he ranged from Neil Sedaka to the Beatles, from funky rock rousers like If I Ever Lose This Heaven to ragtime gospel ballads.

He's been a pro for just two years, with a single Quality album behind him simply titled Bruce Murray, but it's wonderful to be witness to the birth of what is bound to be a star.

One of the biggest disco hits of last year was King Of The Kops. It surprised a lot of people that the song was written by a Canadian, Oshawa's Barry Authors.

Kristine, who sang the song, wasn't Canadian; she is now because she married Authors and became a landed immigrant. Kristine's recent single, Devil Woman, is just now completing a healthy run on national playlists as an APL composition.

I'm A Song contains both hits and several other cuts that could be. There is a variety of material here, from disco to MOR to pop. The LP was recorded both in Toronto and in London by three different producers, using the material supplied by three composers. Part of it's diversity comes from the flexibility of the Ireland-born singer's voice.

Authors, who is also known as J.J. Barrie when he records himself, has co-written every cut, making all selections at least two parts (artist and lyrics) Canadian content. (Except King Of The Kops, which is still ML since Authors also wrote the music.) Four of the cuts - Devil Woman, Bohemain, Till You're Lovin' Me Again, and Grampa Tell Me One More Story - were produced by Bill Amesbury in Toronto at RCA studios with Milan Kymlicka, making them three parts Cancon.


There's still good single material here. Just A Few Words could easily become a country and MOR hit, while I'm Gonna Love You (AL, 2:34) might see some action on MOR and top forty charts.

DEMIS ROUSSOS Happy To Be Philips 9101 027-K



Thoughtful composition combined with personality and wit should make this LP a must for FMers, MOR programmers and fans.

Second LP by former Family members features rough vocals by Roger Chapman, raunchy guitars by Charlie Whitney, both of whom also write. Some may remember Bob Tench as former Jeff Beck vocalist. Best FM bets are Decadence Code and Daddy Rolling Stone. British band opened Joe Cocker's Toronto date.













DEJA VU A Song For Everyone ST 11527 Capitol



Ex Lighthouse leader Skip Prokop's first attempt at producing since Lighthouse has resulted in this seven-membered band, heavy on the vocals. Choice of material is varied, in an effort to fulfill the title's promise. Good rock, good pop. Dance is the single, try also Brian Wilson's Sail On Sailor and Two Lane Highway. 'Super' promotion by Capitol makes the future bid.

SHAWN PHILLIPS Rumplestiltskin's Resolve SP 4582-W A&M

Esoteric singer-composer is alded by Peter Robinson's keys and arrangements. Guests include John Gustafson, Caleb Quaye, Paul Buckmaster. Odd sense of rhythm is best used on Hie Away, best FM cut. Best overall cut is Wailing Wall, but only the most confident FMers should risk it, Its very progressive.

STEVE GOODMAN Words You Can Dance To Asylum 7ES 1061-P

A collection of 10 songs, most originals, all expressing Goodman's musical optimism and lyrical sense of humour. No singles releases, but Banana Republic and a fine interpretation of (That's) The Glory Of Love, should find their way to FM turntables, while the Oavid Amram-arranged Old Fashioned, might interest MOR programmers.

Death rests in peace on this Stone

From Carrie's Gone to his current release Laura's Song, J.C. Stone has been known for less-than-happy lyrics. Whatever future directions he may take, he's presently identified as an artist to cry to. By no means is this a handicap. Certainly the tragic ele-

ment in the early Bee Gees product never interfered with their attaining fame and fortune. Neither should J.C. Stone worry about inhabiting that area. He's the only Canadian pop artist to have consistently put out sad tunes. Furthermore, he's had positive results. Carrie's Gone was a tremendous seller in Canada. The U.S. tipsters loved it. Only some complications which arose between Stone and the Stateside record company prevented a duplication of success.

Stone has a few startling things to say about his reputation as a 'tear jerker' artist.


"People are by and large very attracted to maudlin thoughts about death and lost love. But my point in doing that kind of music... is to show that death is a passe theme. The serious side of me says, 'Forget all this garbage about death and unhappiness'. Death and lost love are unimportant and irrelevant, albeit as commercial as they may be at the present time. If you stand back and place yourself on a star and then look at the earth, you suddenly would understand the insignificance of your existence".

One wonders whether Stone's young audience is going to have this objectivity about death. Aren't they just as likely to be interested in what happened to Laura or Carrie? Stone believes his audience will eventually reach the point he has, where they can question the entire relevance of death. At the same time he offers a reason why he performs songs of such ultimate insignificance. "It's like injecting a person with a disease so he can build up antibodies to overcome it. Inject people with something their system can rebel against and they'll develop the strength to overcome it".

Stone claims there is more to his being an artist than the lyrics he writes. "The object of a musician is to be an entertainer. You want to take people away from their day to day routine, to give them different aspects of a given situation. Perhaps many people haven't had the (philosopher's) stone turned in the right direction to see all the angles of an event. It's much like a painter who paints a picture. You look and say 'Hey what's that?' and then realize that the artist has purposely twisted the scene to a completely different point of view. You suddenly see different aspects to a house, tree or landscape that you've never seen before".

J.C. Stone has a followup to Laura's Song in the can and awaiting a June release. Called Don't Shoot Me, it's been recorded at the new Singwell Studios in Vancouver. "I think it's going to be a hit. Musically it's in vogue right now with a little bit of reggae and rock. Lyrically it's interesting and actually expresses some experiences I went through".

Up to the present, Stone hasn't toured. That's about to change. He's put together a band which he hopes will give audiences a new perspective of him. "The group involves a totally new sound to what I've had before. It will be a far more progressive situation". Band members include Ramon Donati and Ken Pierce (guitars), Mike Casper (bass), Rod Dirk (Keyboards), Wayne Wynn (drums), Craig Holden and Suzanne Fairley (back-up vocals) and J.C. Stone (piano and lead vocals).



Different from all the others

Vancouver

Unusual things happen in British Columbia. For instance, hasn't Vancouver achieved a certain notoriety for hating all things French? Don't we hear, almost daily, the argument that Japanese should be the province's second language? Can't an eager-beaver MP like John Reynolds get thousands of names on a petition protesting a French TV station (and then literally dump it on the laps of the CRTC)? Yet, out of all this, two Vancouver artists have had success through a French-speaking Belge called Jacques Brel. Qu'est-ce que c'est? Jacques Brel is significant?

Seasons In The Sun recorded by Mr. T. Jacks was written by Brel (as was the followup If You Go Away). The longest running play in the city's history was Jacques Brel Is Alive And Well In Paris. The musical premiered in 1972 and pundits still claim it would be running today if the promoters and cast had so willed.

That production marked a turning point for another local talent, Ann Mortifee, when Norman Newell saw the New York performance of the show. He was impressed enough to work a deal for her with EMI in England. The result was a transatlantic flight and recording sessions, produced by Newell. The product of all this activity was Baptism, recently released by Capitol in Canada.

Mortifee is an artist different than 'all the others'. She is a fine actress, paying her dues through years of theatre musicals. Only now is she attempting a recording career (the soundtrack album from The Ecstasy Of

Rita Joe was just that, a soundtrack, and not a serious attempt at becoming a recording star).

Because of her experience in theatre, Mortifee is miles ahead of the competition. Here's an artist who can move from songs of bubbling optimism to those dealing with the darkest depths of despair. She can recite Margaret Laurence's Hagar Shipley, and she's the only person I know into performing Collectors material.

Catch her version of the group's One Act Play. It succeeds because she grasps the whole range of emotions that Howie Vickers used. But from that, she'll likely jump into a frivolous Broadway number like Vanilla Ice Cream. It seems like such a contradiction and you have to ask 'what does she mean by all this?'.

Let's start with an observation by Chilliwack drummer Ross Turney. He believes that making music and critical talking about it can be two different things for some artists. Mortifee must be one of these artists because as well as playing the music, she can offer comments that illuminate what it's all about.

In her eyes, we are on a kind of journey, the journey of life. The whole thing is a pilgrimage and we are 'Pilgrim's All'. Although life is looked upon as full of fun, it also contains some serious times. This may explain the sombreness of much of her material. Perhaps she has a clearer explanation.

"What I've done in the show is expressed a lot of the things I've felt. To ignore pain

is very unrealistic because it is a very real part of life. None of us are immune, but pain is something that causes us to grow. Those people who try to avoid their pain by endlessly getting into a hundred different trips, end up very unfulfilled. Pain is not something to be shunned and run away from, but is something to be looked at, accepted, worked through and then used to further your own understanding."

Peter Allen charts hits along with Toronto date

A&M pianist, singer and songwriter, Peter Allen, was featured at Toronto's Colonial Tavern the week of May 24. Allen's single, The More I See You, is number 41 on the RPM MOR chart this week.

Allen's Toronto stint was the only Canadian visit of his current nightclub tour,

which will take him next to the American East Coast. Accompanying Allen at the Colonial were three fine Toronto musicians: Whitey Glann on drums, known for his sessionwork with Alice Cooper; Chris Vickery on bass; and Fred Keeler on guitar. Allen told RPM that he had been aware of the availability of good musicians in Canada, and decided to use some of them instead of bringing his band from the States. They rehearsed the weekend before the engagement.

The More I See You was a hit for Chris Montez in the 60s, and written 30 years earlier by Mack Gorden and Harry Warren in Hollywood. The cut is from Allen's new LP, Taught By Experts, released in Canada last week to coincide with his Toronto appearance. It's Allen's second A&M LP. The first was Continental American, which, along with two now-rare Metromedia LP's established Allen's cult following in Toronto.

Other Canadian appearances have included a similar engagement at the Colonial last December, several guest shots on the Tommy Banks Show in Edmonton, and a feature on Global TV's Entertainers series.

The Australian-born Allen is not new to the charts; he wrote Olivia Newton-John's I Honestly Love You as well as Helen Reddy's Pretty Pretty. Allen is also known as one half of the Allen Brothers, regular guests on the Tonight Show a few years back, and as the former husband of Liza Manelli.

Country Week

Country comes to western Canada on FM waves

June 4, 1976 at 6AM, CHMM - Stereo 97.5 on the FM dial will open a page in Canadian broadcasting history. The Manitoba station will be the first independently-operated, wholly country station in Manitoba "dedicated to booming out everything from bluegrass to country boogie; to traditional ballads - and doing it 24 hours each day."

Boasting an FM signal of 310,000 watts reaching a potential of one million, which includes parts of Ontario, North Dakota and Minnesota, CHMM's Program Manager, Peter Grant, claims thousands will be bitten by the CHMM country bug. "Country continues to grow in popularity and has done so even more rapidly over the last few years." Grant continued with "It's my opinion and one

that is shared by the industry, that country is gaining ground because it mirrors every-day life and in some cases the music's influence even shapes life styles. People can easily associate with what the songs have to say." Grant knows business, probably better than any country programmer in Canada. He's been associated with country music for more than 16 years and has built a solid reputation as an authority on the country scene.

CHMM's format will be unique in the west. Grant explained that "the station will feature country music 24 hours a day, seven days a week. We'll be featuring all of today's hits plus the music that came out in the 40s, 50s and 60s. Because country music audiences are very parochial in their listening preferences, music will be selected with this (Winnipeg and environs) market in mind. The station will endeavour to establish itself with audiences as a friendly, informative, easy-to-listen-to adult country sound.

The station will introduce open line programs and utilize their facilities to support community projects. They will also present in-depth interviews, album reviews and a news policy with special appeal "items of local and national concern will get more in-depth coverage than they do on most AM stations."

Extensive research before establishing their country format convinced CHMM's National Sales Manager, Ralph Warrington, that the Manitoba market could support such a station. "The listeners are demanding a good 24-hour country sound", noted Warrington, continuing with "We also recognize the advertisers need for a country influenced audience in this market. The demographic profile of listeners even now surprises a lot of potential advertisers. Listeners are between 25 and 49 years of age and are, to a great extent, in the uppermiddle income range. And they're good listeners too - averaging eight to nine hours a week - much more than the pop group."

Even the highly influential Winnipeg Free Press is aware of country music. A writer recently wrote: "...a truth about the Winnipeg music scene: country music stars have the edge on support. They have a built-in audience, the most dependable committed, unpretentious, enthusiastic and knowledgeable in the city."

On-air lineup at CHMM will be an impressive one with many voices already

The Goods have their own brand of "blues grass" with heavy emphasis on Canadian writers, Bob Ruzicka (Rodeo Red), Adam Mitchell (We All Get Lost) and others including some of the more traditional, Hand Me Down My Walking Cane, "done every way imaginable but with a clever Goods' twist; and Redneck, with the cute little kicker, "... justa kickin' hippy's asses and araisin' hell", and all keyed to bring out the best in their banjo, fiddle, auto-harp, electric bass and electrified acoustic guitar.

Currently making good gains on the country and MOR playlists and charts with their single, That's The Kind Of Man I Am, the Good Brothers shared the billing with Santana during their Ontario dates. They are also set for a three-day showcasing at the Carslisle Blues Festival (June 4-5-6) and at Edmonton's newest club, Grand Central Station. While in Edmonton they will be taping the Bob Ruzicka CBC-TV show. They return to Toronto and the El Mocambo June 14 through the 19th.

'Top-40 radio" is a term used loosely these days to describe a kind of pop-rock format. But as many people are aware, very few middle and major market stations actually compile hit charts that list 40 titles. All except three of the charts received by RPM from the breakout market stations, for example, are composed of 30 songs. Some stations list only 20.

This indicates a general change in play-



lists and programming since the days when the term 'Top 40' was first used. Bill Drake, an American who is credited with developing the sound linked to the format of the fast talking, quick-witted deejay, believed that people listen to pop radio to be enterand the gold. So hit playlists started getting shorter, and a few stations cut theirs down to 25.

Camroux said the only significance in the general acceptance of the top-30 format is that "most stations just aren't playing 40 songs that are hits. We're playing between 30 and 50 depending on the week, but the 31 to 50 songs are getting very limited play; they're all new records that are more or less being tested.'

CKOC Hamilton is one of the few remaining stations in Canada with a top-40 chart, plus picks. Music Director Nevin Grant told RPM that his station doesn't really work with any more hits than any other station, and that the bottom chartings are really only a service to retailers. "We asked the retailers what their feeling's were and they were very upset at the possibility of our cutting down our chart; some retailers have been stocking from our chart for



tained; therefore, programming momentum had to be maximized to keep listeners interested. Stations around North America flocked to the new format, following in the footsteps of KHJ and WRKO and others. Critics claimed that it dehumanized radio, supporters pointed to the success of

In 1967 or so, when the system gained prominance, top forty radio really was top forty radio. What do today's trimmer playlists mean?

Not much really, according to CFTR's Chuck Camroux. CFTR has been distributing a consumer-oriented top-30 chart with picks since March.

He explained that when top-40 formatting first began, there wasn't a wealth of old hit material to work into playlists as most stations do now. "Eventually", as hit radio progressed, "the gold started getting mixed in and a problem arose when you couldn't play all the picks and the top 40

"There's no reason for us to cut to 30 to go with the trend," Grant said. "We haven't been hurt in the ratings.

Camroux agreed that the real value of the chart was seen mainly by readers. "The chart has no real value for the radio



station other than promotion. But the stores need something, so people can walk in and say, 'Oh yeah, Happy Days, that's what I like, I'll buy that one.' They might not have bought it if they didn't have the list in front of them." Also, with the distribution of the chart, record buyers will be aware of the new picks, "because at least they're written down, and that has become a tremendous help in stores, we've noticed."

Disc brass answer CHUM Cancon query

In December, the monthly CHUM Report listed Canadian Content standings by company for 1975. They concluded from the figures that "the amount of Canadian production has remained virtually static" over the past five years. Record company executives were then asked to comment on CHUM's findings. Their comments were reprinted in the April CHUM report; here

Alexander Mair, President - Attic Records

Limited.

The quantity of Canadian singles has not increased substantially, but the quality has. More albums are being produced, as this is the market the record companies are really after. Most companies don't release singles from these albums unless they are obviously chart oriented. An interesting statistic would be the number of Cancon 'sides' released, be they singles or album tracks. CRIA statistics indicate well over 500 Cancon LPs were issued in 1975 (including French LPs). At ten 'sides' per LP, this would indicate over 5,000 Cancon 'sides'."

George R. Struth, President - Quality Records Limited.

"It is difficult to tabulate the total dollars invested in this market, but I think it would be safe to say that in recording and promotional costs, the investment runs into the millions. The return on this investment can only come from the exposure of the artist recorded via the broadcast media which in the English language markets appears to lack the support or the desire to support, that is given in the Quebec market by the French language radio broadcast, television and print medias. This fact coupled with the lack of incentive to invest in the Recording Industry as afforded Canada's film producing industry, has not encouraged outside investment."

Gerry Lacoursiere, Vice President - A&M Records of Canada Ltd.

"In my opinion, the reason the quantity of Cancon recordings has remained static in the last five years is that A&M like many other companies are spending more dollars to produce quality records rather than quantity. In my conversations with Program Directors and Music Directors, their comments in most cases bear this out.'

Arnold Gosewich, President - Capitol

"There has been a growing recognition that the Canadian marketplace is limited in potential profit return on investments made in record productions based on exposure of a recording in this market alone. With a

small profit return on single records and the emphasis on developing acceptable album artists in this market, with its limitations, would lead naturally to a levelling of singles releases." Mr. Gosewich was also quoted as saying "since singles, by themselves, do not totally create hit-selling album artists but more emphasis needs to be placed on the artists development off-record towards public acceptance, this may have also had an effect on the number of content releases." CHUM's Conclusions

Additional French language product is of little help to English stations. Added quality is welcome but there is still a serious lack of quantity ... even seven records a week isn't enough to meet "Cancon."






