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Nomination ballots mailed for Industry Awards Banquet

RPM has now firmed May 30, 1977 at which time it will hold the second annual Canadian Music Industry Awards at Toronto's luxurious Hotel Toronto. The results of the RPM readers' poll of the industry will be announced at the banquet.

Last year the event was attended by industry notables from across Canada and is regarded as the social event of the year.

Nomination ballots have been mailed to RPM subscribers and, from the nomination results, the Awards auditors will determine the five nominees in each of the 12 categories. A voting ballot will follow and the winners will be kept secret by the auditors (not even RPM will know the results) until the envelopes are opened at the banquet. This system revealed many surprises last year and added to the suspense of the presentation.

This year, the category, Top Music Publishing Firm in Canadian Content will be changed to Best Promoted Canadian Content Composition and awards will be presented to the composer and the publishing firm. This has been designed to eliminate the confusion caused last year in this category.

Readers of RPM from all parts of Canada are eligible to vote and Special Projects Director, Stan Klees would like to see a better national representation. "We would like to encourage the participation of readers outside the Ontario hardcore of the music industry to voice their choice". noted Klees, continuing with "Last year there was a lack of response from across Canada and these people felt left out of the Awards".

Nomination ballots are now in the mail with an April 22 deadline for return.

Advance registration for the banquet has been tagged at \$20, per person (if received by Apr 30). The regular prepaid registration price is \$25, per person.

Gerry Lacoursiere named President A&M Canada

As part of the first major organizational restructuring in the 15-year history of A&M Records, Gerry Lacoursiere has been named president of the Canadian operation.

Lacoursiere joined A&M in 1969 and moved to Canada a year later to open the Canadian branch. He has been vice-president and general manager since 1973.

Company founders Gerry Moss and Herb Alpert are now titled chairman and vice-chairman respectively. Gil Friesan becomes president, Bob Fead is named senior vice-president and Chuck Kaye becomes president of the company's publishing firms, Irving/Almo Music and Rondor Music.

In making the announcement, Moss stated, "This restructuring is necessary for our label to fulfill the promise of the first 15 years. We are about to begin our most exciting era. These changes will enhance our growth and productivity for the next 15 years. I am delighted about the prospects for the future".

It was in 1976 when A&M Canada was voted Top Major Canadian company in RPM's readers' poll.

Rebuttal to Alan Guettel

I have been reading with great interest your column of March 26th and there is indeed one thing which disturbs me greatly. The question that I must ask Alan is why is it that every time someone discusses the negative attitudes of radio in the 70's, they tend to centre in on the D.J. You have said for example, "when was the last time you heard a D.J. say . . . " "did you ever hear a D.J. complain . . . etc.,".

As a former radio person (you will note that I did not say D.J.) I must come to the rescue, or indeed the support of guys who are still on the air. The reasons Alan that D.J.'s or radio personalities do not make comments regarding products, records and services that could be construed as negative, are very simple. A guy on the air doing so might as well have submitted his resignation prior to making his comments!! It is unfortunate that people listening to the radio feel confident in believing that the D.J. has total freedom. This is simply not true. At the same time, it is not true that the D.J. is selling out in order to make a few bucks - all he is doing is a job and it is not unlike any other job. If the guy who signs your cheque each week tells you that you

should be wearing a tie then the possibilities are that you will be wearing a tie, for the very simple reason that you must eat and the system dictates that we have got to have a couple of bucks in our pockets to do so.

I will be one of the first to stand on the tallest building and scream from the roof tops that creative radio is the answer but Alan, management tend to look at the bottom line and it is that bottom line that dictates the policies set forth by radio management. In support of radio management I will hasten to add that they have very little choice in the matter. Without a respectable "bottom line" they would be unable to give that D.J. the cheque that he is originally working for.

You see, what we have here Alan very simply is a mad vicious circle. That unquestionably is unfortunate but true and possibly is the reason that I am currently not on the air. I, like yourself, look forward to the day when our ultimate fantasy of a radio station and D.J. in tanden can compliment the listener's ear as to what can be construed as creative radio. But you know Alan, in that regard, in order for you and I to be happy and the rest of the listeners in the world to be happy also, we would each have to have our own exclusive private radio stations, for undoubtedly we all hear differently, see differently, feel differently and interpret the word "creative" differently. The success of a radio station is therefore based on a programmers ability to appeal to a large core of the listeners and have each one believe he/she is hearing exactly what he/she wants at that moment.

In closing, let me say that it is nice to see someone interested in the advancement and improvement of broadcasting and I do not intend to ever give up and I hope that you won't either. In fact, no one who is involved with a career as exciting as broadcasting should give up. Now, can we hear some straight up comments about the price of records, the price of concert tickets, the exaggeration of the industry ads, et al from RPM or are you too protecting your clients. Of course you are, and rightly so!

The Family that works together

Contrary to some of the stories being circulated, the record business is in a healthy state and the future doesn't look all that bad. As Clive Davis recently told a gathering of RPM delegates, it's possible to start from scratch and make a good living in the record business.

Vito Ierullo will drink to that. He and his wife Lynn started from scratch in 1974 with a total investment of \$9,800, and, three years later, has bankrolled his meagre investment into a \$3 million entity, stocking 35 stores across Ontario. Records On Wheels is now considered a major supplier of record product.

Starting out in the record business with \$9,800 isn't really anything to write about, but it was the way the Ierullo's did it. They gambled \$5,000 on record product and the rest in rolling stock, an old school bus, and rumbled around the Toronto area hitting universities. "Sure, they laughed at us", recalls Vito, "but we were happy to be in the record business. I'd rather work 80 hours a week hustling records than 40 hours a week tied down to an office desk at General Motors". Vito, with University of Toronto training, left his cushy job at General Motors to take on the "exciting challenge of heading up my own business".

The bus was actually a good experience in crowd control, they could only handle 15 customers at a time, and it supplied the Ierullo's with the opportunity to analyze an age group that represented an important part of the record buying public. They also experienced a break-in and loss of \$1,500 of uninsured goods, a disappointing but not a major setback.

Records On Wheels made its initial bid for a northern Ontario market that same year (1974) and parked in Sudbury. They were so successful that brother Don opened Records On Wheels' first stationery store. The bus returned to Toronto where a second store was opened in downtown Toronto. The bus was sold and Lynn and Vito concentrated on catching the ears of the passing crowd. Their new venture proved too successful and another move, to larger quarters, was necessary. They opened their new store, a little closer to the core of the

city and that's where they remain today with a unique clientel. Says Vito: "We found a market for oddball product. Like, one day a guy ordered an album by an Italian rock band. I couldn't even pronounce the name but I found an Italian distributor who sold me the albums at \$5.00 each. I sold more than 200 copies within a week - at \$8.00 a copy". That, among many other experiences led them into a lucrative end of the business. "We like to gamble new product", explained Vito, "and keep in touch with suppliers all over the world. We even pride ourselves in having our competition buy from us. They feel that Records On Wheels is the one place where they can get obscure

"We don't concentrate on hit product only, we like to build an act and if it's successful our reward is more than the profit. For example we took Frampton's first album. We played it, sold it, played it, displayed it up front and made money on an unknown Frampton. We were there before anyone else and when Frampton Comes Alive was released, we went gangbusters."

The whole secret of success for Records On Wheels is the family participation. Besides Vito, his wife Lynn, brother Don, sister Rosa and younger brother Bruno, they've now brought nephew Anthony into the field.

"We've studied the record business". noted Vito, "we feel fairly confident that we're on top of trends as well as creating new ones. We may double our business at peak times but our business is always steady and I think it's because we have the real enthusiasm to make it work. Our clientele all over Ontario now know that Records On Wheels is a good place to buy records". In view of their growing business, it was necessary to create a large warehouse facility from which to supply their accounts 18 of which are franchise stores.

Any criticsm of the business Vito? "Record companies should concentrate on promoting record stores that sell records and tapes exclusively, not appliance stores that use records only as a secondary item to

promote their hardware. That means advertising monies and discounts"

There is also evidence of a demand for that personal touch in record stores. "I There is also evidence of a demand for get calls all the time to open new stores. Record buyers are looking for that record store staffed by people who will take the time to find a record for them and even sell them on a new release. In our 35 stores we have about 20 super knowledgeable people. They really know their stuff - and that's what sells records".

Could you start from scratch again Vito? "Sure, anybody could. I remember, I nearly died when I had to sign my first \$ \$10,000 cheque for purchases. Now I'm signing the odd \$100,000 cheque", which says something about the no frills, family organization that bussed its way into the

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What's the state of the industry: All of us? RPM asked those who What's the state of the industry? Are we could best sum up our present situation and who could give us some idea of the future. Four basic questions were asked of the top executives of the major record manufacturing and distributing companies, which will constitute a weekly series.

They were asked the following questions: (1) How did your company fare in the first quarter of 1977? (2) What do you anticipate for the rest of the year? (3) Do you see any revolutionary changes coming about in the industry this year? (4) What other area of the industry would you like to comment about?

TERRY LYND President CBS Records (Canada)

CBS Records, Canada has just completed the biggest first quarter in its history. We earned five platinum LPs for Boston, Pink Floyd, Neil Diamond, Burton Cummings and Barbra Streisand. We earned six gold LPs and two gold singles. We have been



just thrilled with the products and are particularly proud of our people's achievements; from earning the first gold album for Murray McLauchlan to earning a gold record for a product from Italy by Rafael Carra. Our people are candily achieving great success breaking artists from around the world. Naturally, I'm very optimistic about continuing this pattern of the development of Canadian artists and artists from elsewhere in the world.

I believe that we're going to have a strong year this year in the Canadian industry. There will be some weak spots occasioned by the political pressures within the land, but generally a strong market.

There are no forever revolutionary changes in my humble opinion. I see a continuing pattern of the existing beautiful music that's being offered to the market. I'm truly upset and concerned about the lack of knowledge and the lack of understanding by federal government officials concerning the Canadian recording industry.

We have a very positive feeling and

excitement about the forthcoming pavilion at the CNE where the wholehearted efforts of both CRIA and CIRPA are going to cause and create a major event in terms of 100 years of recorded sound, a major event that, to my mind, has not had its equal anywhere else in the world this year. I'm very excited about this project,

ED PRESTON Vice-President & General Manager RCA Ltd. (Record Division)

RCA had an excellent first quarter and moved into 1977 in a powerful industry position. Our sales were at an all time high and we experienced the lightest first quarter

The reasons seemed to be the perfect balance of big volume "hit" albums, strong "Best Of" and country catalogue items and



really strong sales performance by our Canadian talent releases. We introduced a new mid-price \$5.95 country series called

Country Club in February and it's taken off nationally. The packaging and repertoire are the key to the success of this new series and it's exclusive with RCA Canada in North America, at this time.

I'm particularly impressed with the sales of Carroll Baker, Nestor Pistor. T.H.P., Patrick Norman and the new Blacklight Orchestra. We're far ahead on local talent sales and our new local releases indicate that this trend will continue in the second quarter. We're also delighted at the increase in our classics, jazz and imports. The increases are very PRONOUNCED.

For the rest of the year, the industry talks about a certain softness coming in the summer months however, everyone seems to be positive that there will be another strong second half with good increases by most companies. We also hear further talk of increased manufacturing costs in vinyl and containers, but I believe everyone has been expecting it.

Not too much in the way of revolutionary changes this year, other than the continuing increase in sales of cassettes however, 1978-79 will be the start of Revolutionary Changes.

The 12" 45rpm singles has been a successful development for us. Since we first introduced these in Canada, we've released 13 and have realized sales of over 150,000 copies. There's definitely a good market out there; and if you consider that these sales would have previously represented retail sales of \$193,000 on 7" singles, they represented \$447,000 on 12" singles.

So the cry that "singles don't sell anymore" doesn't hold water with us. We've just come off No. 1 singles with Mary MacGregor's Torn Between Two Lovers and Rich Girl by Hall & Oates. Carroll Baker's It's My Party hit No. 1 on the country charts. So we're havin' a great

More than just another pretty voice

David Pritchard thinks the CN Tower's revolving restaurant club would be an ideal place to stage a series of performances of the world's best futuristic electronic audio artists:

"Imagine," he asks you to picture in your mind - as he inspired his late-night audiences so many times on his old CHUM-I'M night show - "these sounds among banks of electronic equipment and synthesizers - and we could create laser shows off the clouds. People would come from all over the world to see it. Wouldn't it be neat?"

Neat? That's Pritchard, a straight-looking guy who could be more easily taken for a high-school teacher than Mr. Spock. In conversation his strong broadcast voice, that people hear every day on a variety of radio commercials and heard for years on the most FM of Toronto's FM radio shows, warms into an excited chatter puncuated by a few giggles.

But Pritchard's not fooling around. He's the first Canadian to be signed by Island Records; and he's enjoying a good run of media attention following the release of his first LP, an orchestrated sonic library of common and electronic sounds called Nocturnal Earthworm Stew.

He strongly believes electronic music has grown beyond the "experimental" stage where it's slotted by most critics, radio stations and record companies;

"We thought the LP would be just something for posterity, a musicians' piece, but people are playing it."

Three years as all-night man on the

tightly-formatted Toronto country station CFGM and six years on what was initially freeform radio on CHUM-FM makes Pritchard well aware of the limitations and possibilities of commercial radio and recording.

He joined CHUM-FM when it was born in 1968 and left the all-night show in 1974, "for, you might say - yes, that's exactly it ideological differences. They want to be midstream."

He later produced specials for CHUM-I'M, who needed more up-front programming to comply with new regulatory demands. But when CHUM management asked for material with more commercial appeal.

Pritchard quit and supported himself, creating commercials in a studio he set up in a spare bedroom in his home.

That's where he produced the tapes that became his Island-label LP, with drummer Martin Deller and violinist Jeff Plewman (who are now performing as an electronic act called FM). As well as handling the production, Pritchard played sythesizer, guitar and a number of other stringed instruments (one cut is a duct of a dulcimer with a synthesizer).

The LP is a presentation of sounds Pritchard collected and synthesized over a period of two years - sound ranging from the street noise of Toronto's Cabbagetown to short-wave signals. The B side is the title performance - sort of an electronic, Satanic Sorcerer's Apprentice. The A side is a series of audio studies; some sound a

bit like commercial synthesized music.

Pritchard has a good idea what audiences will tolerate. When he was on CFGM, he recalls, people would call up and complain when he played a little bluegrass or Bob Wills. They wanted Buck Owens. When he went to CHUM-FM, listeners complained when he played Buck Owens; but they liked Bob Wills.

"All my friends put me down when I was a country DJ," Pritchard explained: "I was in a rock band and I worked for CFGM."

Pritchard's real baptism in the media came when he was a bored high-school student at Toronto's Northern Secondary School. He put some radio equipment in the basement of his folk's home and launched CBIG - a pirate AM station in suburban Willowdale, broadcasting regularly on the open 880 frequency.

He recruited a few friends as DJs and produced AM-sounding radio complete with commercials and jingles.

"How did we get commercials? I went to the downtown ad agencies and told them that my friends and I had this radio hobby and wanted to be announcers and did they have any recorded commercial spots we could practice with. I walked away with bags full of commercials and jingles. We even had things like 'Hi I'm Bobby Darin, and now the Bog-Sound weather'"

CBIG's signal was transmitted through an antenna Pritchard rigged up by tying wire to a string and throwing it over every TV antenna on the block. He later hooked it up to the telephone lines.

The station was shut down by the federal licencing agency after three years on the air. The fellow who came down from Ottawa - with a Mountie - said they were aware of the station for a while but never did anything about it because nobody ever complained. The fateful tip came from a teenager who ran a rival, less elaborate pirate station in the area.

But when Pritchard could never convince kids at school that CBIG wasn't a real station, he learned something about the simplicity involved in AM radio.

"The simpler-the-better formula for AM radio will be on the way out if FM radio ever gets to be standard equipment in cars," he now predicts:

"AM radio is not normal. Announcers even have their own soundboard settings to make their voices sound as similar as possible."

AM radio will be pushed out by FM, that is, if the FMers don't continue to tail the AMers' style. And that's exactly what happened during Pritchard's experience at CHUM, he says.

But that's all behind him now. His LP "is just another personal objective" of the sort he left CHUM to attain. He's working on another based on the sounds of Algonquin Park.

Most of all he's keeping his ears open and hooking them into the equipment in his small backroom studio in an office he shares with an architect behind a dry cleaning store: "I love miniaturization."

One thing Pritchard's CHUM-FM nighthawk fans never knew about the guy: He's almost always smiling.

Harmonium & Cockburn - a cultural exchange!

One of the basic concepts of our historic but brief romantic period was to interpret the environment. The artist in that time became the medium through which the chaos of the world acquired some understanding through art. The worldly interpretation of Harmonium has earned them, since the release of their first album in January 1974, a stature in Quebec of not only leading influences in progressive music but also as pioneers in the province's rapid development of cultural identity. In an interview prior to their April 3 concert at

Toronto's Convocation Hall, the band's co-founders, guitarist lead-singer Serge Fiori and bassist Louis Valois, discussed their disappointment with rock music interpretation.

The talk started with comments passed on the March 22 Peter Gabriel concert held in Maple Leaf Gardens. Robert Fripp, progressive rock legend formerly with King Crimson, appeared that night with Gabriel off to the side and relatively out of sight when only a week before innovator David Bowie had taken the same position on stage

with Iggy Pop. This is not out of character for either of these leading figures but rather out of character for the music they set. Harmonium remains one of the full bloomers of the British progressive rock invasion of the late sixties/early seventies and wants to hold fast to that reputation, keeping music up front.

Fiori attributes much of the stage sensationalism, which subsequently puts music in the backseat, to be the result of the impersonality of mass appeal. The band's rising popularity could very easily allow them to fall into that position of play to a crowd instead of to the people, especially with the addition of drummer Denis Farmer and Serge Locat; however, they plan to keep their audiences small.

Intimacy is no stage gimmick or stranger to Toronto folk artist Bruce Cockburn either. While Harmonium is trading territories with Cockburn, Cockburn's been giving near sell-out performances and taking encores and standing ovations in Quebec.

In an interview prior to his In The Falling Dark tour Cockburn, like Harmonium, was not without political attitude but stressed that music was the main interest behind national identity. His admiration for the Quebec music culture, which is obvious by this year's tour, was expressed in a desire for Canada to develop one common musical culture and being a likely candidate, elected himself for the job of doing so. Performances in Montreal, Ste. Anne de Bellevue and Quebec City, spoken entirely in French, make the wish whispered in Falling Dark song Vagabondage to share personally in that definate Quebec culture, a little louder. The feedback which Fiori announced as "essential" has not only been rewarding for Cockburn but encouraging.

New ground will be covered by the release of In The Falling Dark and by Harmonium's third album L'heptade as they are distributed across Canada to coincide with cross-culture performances.

Paul McGrath, of the Globe and Mail, summed up nicely the effect and cause of these two prominent culture-healing artists in talking about Harmonium's April 3 performance in Toronto. "Here's hoping that these people do to the rest of Canada what they did to Toronto last night. It won't do much to effect the politicians who seem to control the dynamics of this growing Canadian rift; however, it might change the attitudes of a new generation."

Les Humphries Singers Attic single is Cancon

German group the Les Humphries Singers, whose records are released in Canada on Attic Records, have recorded two songs on their upcoming Jazz Is Dead album by Canadian songwriter Greg Adams. One of them, the title song, is being released by Attic as the first single from the album. The album is slated for an early April release.

The Les Humphries Singers have an outstanding track record in Europe, where they have achieved 20 gold albums and three gold cassettes.

Greatful Dead planning full-length feature film

New Arista signees The Grateful Dead are planning the release of a full-length feature film in the early spring. The self-produced film, funded largely by Dead leader Jerry Garcia, includes live concert footage of the group, taped candid interviews and animation. It will focus on the group's cult following, known as Dead heads.

The film has been described as "Garcia's statement on what the Dcad are all about."

Theme From SWAT back in demand in Quebec

RCA Records reports the T.H.P. Orchestra's Theme From SWAT, which won the group its first gold record, has begun picking up sales again in Quebec. The new demand was created by the TV series SWAT, which was recently started there.

The single was a Canadian cover of the U.S. version, which was not released in Canada because of a label dispute.

RCA reports the single has also been recently released in Spain.



CAREERS IN THE INDUSTRY???

At the Talent Buying Conference in the fall of "76" you held a symposium titled "Careers in the Industry". I stood up and started talking about the difficulty of building an artists career in Canada, lack of management skills, lack of newspaper support, etc. I was ruled out of order - the subject turned out to be how to progress from shipper to controller in a record company. You then proceeded to discuss careers in selling and business administration which could have applied to any manufacturing industry. I sat down feeling that I had made a fool of myself. I have been doing some soul searching since then and I have come to the conclusion that I was not out of order at all. How could you discuss careers at a "Talent Buying Conference" and not be discussing artist's careers? Do you believe this industry only consists of merchandizing pieces of plastic or do you believe, as I do, that it is people providing people to entertain people? The overwhelming problem for talent in Canada is how to climb from obscurity to star status without the support of the newspapers, the CBC, the entrepreneurs, and the lawyers, bookkeepers and MBA's that run the foreign-owned major part of the record industry. And that is the problem that should be addressed at a symposium titled "Careers in the Industry" at a Talent Buying Conference in Toronto.

Mollin and McCauley, best known for producing Dan Hill's two gold albums on GRT, are also finishing production on an album by Los Angeles group The Rockies.


International music class at T.O. college

Other courses offered by the school will be a Gilbert & Sullivan production course and a six-week dance course.

Elton John is reported to have claimed he'd hire Wembley Stadium in London and dance naked on the stage if Bob Seger's Night Moves ever reached number one. The Capitol single is presently rising steadily on British charts and has reached the top five.

Seger's album of the same title is presently gold approaching platinum both in Canada and the U.S. Seger is presently touring the U.S.

Capitol to release live studio LP by The Band

Capitol Records is releasing Islands, a studio album by The Band. The album, the band's first since their famous Last Waltz concert, is slated for release by the end of the month.

A live album from the concert is being prepared for a later release. It will be 80 percent Canadian content.

The concert was intended as the last live performance by the group, which originated in Toronto.

Holdover and opener for A&M's Bradstreet

A&M's David Bradstreet, who has just released his debut album for the label, has been firmed as opening act for Joan Armatrading. The latter, also an A&M recording act, will be appearing in concert in Montreal (Mar 28) and the following evening at Toronto's Convocation Hall.

In addition, on the success of his week's engagement at Toronto's Riverboat (Mar 22-27), Bradstreet has been held over for one more week. A&M invited press, radio and retail VIPs to an opening night where Bradstreet showcased material from his new album.

February figures for Ontario Arts Council

Last month the Ontario Arts Council awarded \$779,317 to 23 arts organizations and 779 individual artists for their work in music, theatre, dance, literature, film, photography and the visual arts, the Franco-Ontarian Community, arts in education and regional arts development. The council has granted over \$9.6 million to 998 groups and 1,232 individuals throughout Ontario during the current fiscal year.

WEA to release Roots by author Alex Haley



New album, world tour for A&M's Supertramp

A&M has just released Supertramp's new album, Even In The Quietest Moments (see RPM's New Albums). The album was produced between December and February at Cariboo Studios in Colorado with the group handling production chores themselves. The album is shipping platinum in the U.S. and is expected to enjoy the

The British group, who presently reside in California, are also prepping for a world tour, to be opened by another A&M group, Gallagher & Lyle. A&M reports the Apr 9 Winnipeg concert broke box office records by selling out 9,500 seats in four hours. A second show has been scheduled for Apr 8.

Following the North American portion of the tour, the group will tour the U.K., Europe and the far east, ending one year later in April of 1978.

Third single for Great Rufus Road Machine

Axe recording artists The Great Rufus Road Machine have received airplay on CHYR, CFNB, CFQC, CFRB, QCFM, CKEY, CHSC, CHML, CHFI, CKNX, CFOS, CKAP and CJIC, prior to their unscheduled album release.

The band will perform in Toronto (March 14-April 2), Sakatoon (4-16), Regina (18-23), Calgary (25-30 and May 8) and Edmonton (16-28).

Eastern busy with local musicians

Toronto's Eastern Sound is busy full time this week producing local talent. Bernie Finkelstein has begun production on Murray McLauchlan's forthcoming True North album. Attic artist Shirley Eikhard is working on sides toward a new album with producer Sonny Limbo.

John Mills-Cockell, formerly with True North group Syrinx, has been recording synthesizer tracks for a CBC-FM program.

Canadian Talent Library produces Bobby Edwards

Toronto guitarist Bobby Edwards is slated to record an album for the Canadian Talent Library at Toronto's Manta Sound in mid-April. Edwards will arrange and produce the album himself, with CTL's Mal Thompson as executive producer.

The album will feature at least six tunes written by Edwards. He is also co-writing songs with Greg Adams, who has written for names such as Roger Whittaker and the Les Humphreys Singers.

Edwards will be working with a large orchestra and singers, something he has never before attempted on his own albums.

Music Shoppe installs information phone line

Music Shoppe International is incorporating an information telephone line featuring recordings of the agency's two radio spots. The spots tell the listener which acts are featured at a total of ten clubs booked by Music Shoppe, and feature the voices of Larry Wilson and David Marsden.

The service will be run free of charge to the clubs. Music Shoppe plans to expand the service to cover more clubs in the future

ACTRA Awards finalists to be announced April 5

The Sixth Annual ACTRA Awards (The Nellies) will be televised live by CBC from the Hotel Toronto March 14, starting at 9:00 p.m. (EST).

The 5,000 members of the Association of Canadian Television and Radio Artists (ACTRA) voted to nominate more than 120 nominees from their ACTRA locals in 16 categories. National panels of judges in each category vote to determine three finalists in each category, and then again to select the winners.

The hosts for the telecast will be Pierre Berton, Barbara Frum and Gordon Pinsent. Performers on the show include Bob Ruzicka, Rene Simard, Gloria Kaye, Jack Northmore and Billy Van, and Dinah Christie and Tom Kneebone.

ACTRA will announce the finalists in each category April 5.

Of the more than 120 preliminary nominees, more than 100 of them are nominated for performances or activities on the CBC.

Nominees in the field of TV variety are: Diane Stapley, for her CBC Winnipeg-produced show; Julie Amato, for her CTV show; Dave Broadfoot, for his performance on Global TV's Caught In The Act series; Jim Bennet, for his performance on the Halifax-produced, CBC series Sunshine Hour; and Rolph Harris for his CTV show.

Nominees for radio variety performances are: the cast of the Royal Canadian Air Farce, CBC; the cast of Inside From The Outside, CBC; Pete 'n' Geets, CHUM-FM; Mary Nelson of Jazz Radio Canada, CBC Winnipeg; and William Buck of Dr. Bundolo's Medicine Show, CBC Vancouver.

Motown releases second Wonder single from Life

Sir Duke from Stevie Wonder's Songs In The Key Of Life album has been released simultaneously in Canada and the U.S. as the second single from the album. The first single, I Wish, reached number one on RPM's Top 100 in the Feb 5 issue.

Motown predicts heavy success with two other singles released in the same shipment. Let Yourself Go by the Supremes and Jerry Butler's I Wanna Do It To You.

Album releases Marvin Gaye Live At The London Palladium and the Commodores' latest, a group titler, were previewed in Motown's hospitality suite at RPM's Three Days In March.

O'Keefe sets heavy ballet schedule

The O'Keefe Centre in Toronto will follow up the National Ballet of Canada performance which finished March 12 by presenting The Royal Winnipeg Ballet for the third time (Apr. 4-9) and The White Haired Girl, by the Shanghai Ballet of the People's Republic of China (May 9-21).

The Centre will feature, between shows, Pye's Des O'Connor with The London Palladium (Apr. 18-30) and Liberace (May 9-21) with Cole, a show based on the music of Cole Porter running May 30-June 11.

Capitol to release second Night Moves single

Bob Seger's Night Moves has acquired both Canadian and U.S. gold awards after the RIAA certified Live Bullet. Capitol Records - EMI of Canada Ltd. is scheduled to release a second, as yet undecided, single off the Night Moves album in approximately two or three weeks. With the title cut receiving strong AM airplay other cuts off Night Moves are also receiving heavy airplay on Canadian FM stations.

Capitol still reports heavy request for their radio album The Bob Seger Story.

Canadian Brass return from tour of China

The Canadian Brass have just completed their tour of four cities in China - Peking, Wuhan, Changsha and Canton and according to David Haber Artists Management Inc. went over "extremely well". The group performed in factories, schools, and libraries as they do in Canada, playing both renaissance and baroque music as well as contemporary works by Morley Calvert, Larry Crosley, Harry Freedman, Malcolm Forsyth and Howard Cable. The tour followed a visit made by the Cape Breton Choir The Men Of The Deep and precedes further cultural exchange to be made by the Toronto Symphony Orchestra early next year.

The Canadian Brass returned to Toronto March 27 and departed the next day for an immediate engagement in P.E.I. and a later one in Edmonton.

Liberace readies for extended Canada tour

Legendary pianist Liberace, whose current AVI album Liberace's Greatest Hits, Volume 2 was released by Quality early in March, has been firmed for a five-week set of Canadian audiences. Dates include a week of concerts at Montreal's Place Des Arts Ap.il 19-24, Ottawa's National Arts Centre (25-30), Hamilton Place (May 2-7) and two weeks at Toronto's O'Keefe Centre (9-21).

The dates will be opened by the Famous People Players, a group of mentally retarded children who put on a puppet show featuring puppets of famous people, including Liberace.

Hamilton and Toronto have each scheduled Liberace Days, during which the artist will be honoured with a luncheon, attended by political, press and broadcasting dignitaries. Liberace is slated to perform at the luncheons, to be held in Hamilton May 5 and Toronto May 12.

Quality Records has 15 Liberace albums in its catalogue, between the AVI and Birchmount labels.

Royal Winnipeg Ballet bring Cancon to Toronto

The dance programme being brought to Toronto's O'Keefe Centre by the Royal Winnipeg Ballet features a dance set to the music of Canadian bands Chilliwack and Syrinx. The piece, titled What To Do 'Til The Messiah Comes, is among three pieces on the programme. The others are ballet renditions of Bach's Magnificat and Stravinsky's The Rite Of Spring.

Chilliwack are a Vancouver-based band presently recording with Mushroom Records. Syrinx, a Toronto-based band featuring the keyboard work of John Mills-Cockell, is now defunct. The piece also features music by Phillip Werren.

The O'Keefe dates, April 5-9, mark the debut of the piece in Toronto. Choreography was done by Norbert Vesak.

Massey Hall tops Moxy concert headline series

Polydor group Moxy, whose current single Cause There's Another is getting solid airplay and is presently moving on RPM's Top 100 at number 87, have been firmed for a May 27 headline concert date at Toronto's Massey Hall. Opening act is not yet announced.

The Toronto concert is the climax of a series of Ontario headline dates, including Oshawa's Civic Centre with Attic's Triumph and A Foot In Cold Water (April 8), two shows with Brutus at Brampton's Century Gardens (16), and the Belleville Memorial Arena (30). The group then moves to the U.S. for two and a half weeks of concerts, their third tour there since their 1976 debut.

Moxy's third album, Ridin' High, is being prepared for release on Polydor, slated for April 25, and U.S. release on Mercury at or about the same time.

Grandstand committee outlines 77 program

At a Grandstand Attractions Committee meeting held at Toronto's Exhibition Place Feb. 23 acting Chairman the Honourable Claude Bennett, Minister of Industry and Tourism, proposed the following performing acts appear at this year's Grandstand shows: The Scottish World Festival Tattoo (Aug. 18-21), Bay City Rollers (22), Rush (23), Olivia Newton-John (24), Vera Lynn and The Irish Rovers (25), Joni Mitchell (tentative 27); Beach Boys (28-29-approved), Charley Pride and a proposed appearance with Carroll Baker (30), Eagles (31-approved), replacing Neil Sedaka - Captain & Tennille or Sonny & Cher or Valdy and Gino Vannelli (Sept. 1), Burton Cummings (2-approved), Gordon Lightfoot (3-pending) and Paul Anka (4).

Fifty per cent of the proposed schedule would allow for Canadian status acts to appear. The Committee, consisting of Julian Porter, Richard Horkins, William

A debut, not yet titled, album by noted jazz guitarist Ed Bickert has been leased by producers CTL to United Artists Records for scheduled release on the U.A. label May 1. The album was produced at Toronto's Soundstage Studios by Rick Wilkins, who also did the arrangements. David Greene was the engineer.

Featured on the album are performances by three top B.C. musicians; Bickert, bassist Don Thompson and drummer Terry Clarke. Also contributing on the sessions are Toronto pianist Gary Williamson and percussionists Marty Morrell and Memo Acevedo.

CTL's Mal Thompson, executive producer, reports CFRB in Toronto began playing a tape of one of the selections, It Might As Well Be Spring, the day Toronto experienced it's last major snowstorm.

Steve Gibbons to appear in Toronto

Dan and Bob Lanois previously owned a 4-track studio in Ancaster, outside Hamilton.



Global TV deal

The CRTC's recent decision to approve the transfer of 45 per cent of the ownership of Global TV from IWC Communications to Global Western contained the statement that the move was indeed subject to commission approval, even though it was called for by contractual arrangements between those two parties that previously shared ownership of the Ontario network.

The purchasers and some other witnesses on their behalf argued at the hearing that the parties were legally bound to carry out the transaction. But the commission ruled that the transfer of shares constituted "a change in the effective control" of the network, and thus required approval by the licencing body.

Station reps assoc. announce name change

The Station Representatives Association of Canada have changed their 25-year old name to The Broadcast Representatives Association for the purpose of defining the group's functions more closely. The 18 members, representatives of companies engaged in selling broadcast time for Canadian radio and TV stations, include President Rodger Hone, Vice-Pres, of Radio Dick Moody, Vice-Pres, of Television Bob Alexander and Secretary Treasurer Andy McDermott. The group's annual business year ends in June when new officers are elected.

This year the organization added chapters in Vancouver to established ones in Toronto and Montreal.

Charles appointed PD for Toronto's CILQ-FM

Dave Charles has been appointed Program Director for Toronto's newest progressive rock station, CILQ. He is joined by Dan Chevrette (formerly of CKFM) as Music Director; John Parikhal as Creative Director; and Tony Viner (formerly of CFCI) as General Manager. Charles, former PD at Toronto's country outlet, CFGM, will commence broadcasting 30% Canadian content as a tentative date set for late May. He hopes to feature more live programs and more live concerts.

Two of the basic principles Charles will employ will be radio personalities and the element of surprise. He also hopes to hold on-air discussions which will become, according to Charles, "a serious expression of issues".

CRTC to streamline public-hearing process

The CRTC has adopted new rules of procedure to streamline the public hearing process.

All applications will be publicized and scheduled for hearings 45 days in advance (instead of the present 35) and interventions will have to be filed 20 days (instead of 15) before the relevant hearing.

Documents will be considered served on the fourth day (rather than third) after they are mailed. Interventions will be required to be made in one copy only.

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Clive Davis - Starting from scratch

The coverage of RPM's Three Days In March (Ci1) was capsulized to give as much coverage to each event as possible. However, in view of the importance of Clive Davis as a figurehead in the international record industry and requests from our readers, we have asked J.J. Linden to expound on his coverage of the Davis speech, which follows.

One of the highlights of RPM's recent Three Days was a speech given by Clive Davis, who founded Arista Records after leaving CBS, where he had been head of A&R, and watched Arista become the sixth top company in the U.S. after only two years in existence. Among the artists Davis has collected and broken on Arista are the Bay City Rollers, Barry Manilow, Eric Carmen and Melissa Manchester.

Davis first came into the record industry in 1965 from a background in law, when Columbia Records hired him to revitalize their sagging A&R department. At that time the company had specialized in MOR artists and Broadway shows under Mitch Miller (of Sing Along With Mitch fame), who had built an MOR empire in that music form's golden age in the 50s.

At the time, many of the artists Davis inherited were beyond their prime. Of the three major MOR names that remained, Mitch Miller stiffed overnight, and Johnny Mathis left the company for a better offer, leaving only Ray Coniff. Further, the first two Broadway shows out on Columbia under Davis, Mame and Cabaret, sold well below expectations.

Davis had been working with an inherited A&R staff, talented but MOR-oriented. One of the basic concepts in MOR was to develop the personality of the artist, as opposed to the rock field where, in the early days, groups such as the Shirelles were virtually interchangeable with other groups.

In Davis' first year and a half at Columbia, the company had seen virtually no growth. In fact, with the stereophonic revolution over, people were no longer buying stereo copies of records already owned, and the company had to fight to break even. At this point, Davis came to realize that he had to trust his ears and to be heard at the creative marketplace.

He signed his first artist in two years; Donovan, who had been put down for sounding too much like Bob Dylan. He then signed Simon & Garfunkel, an unknown folk act. Just as they were beginning to break, he had the good fortune of seeing them perform at the 1967 Monterrey festival. At the time, Davis was unaware that new talent would be showcased, but at the festival he saw an act whose name he didn't catch at first. The act turned out to be Janis Joplin, who later signed to Columbia with Davis.

The new stable of Columbia artists was marked by being different and original. Names such as Laura Nyro, Spirit and Electric Flag were signed, and Davis quietly decided not to release anything until he got a hit star. Then in 1968 he launched the contemporary rock revolution. By this

time top acts, such as Blood, Sweat & Tears and Sly & The Family Stone were flocking to Davis, who had discovered what not to do by watching other companies' mistakes. According to Davis, the greatest mistake is to take a non-creative approach. The artist should be seen by his public as a unique talent, rather than purely a slick package. It is important for the record company to understand the importance of an individualistic approach, and the essence of music. If an artist has a great talent, it isn't difficult to build a great band around him.

By 1970 circumstance had crumbled part of the Columbia empire. Simon and Garfunkel split shortly after launching Bridge Over Troubled Water, the most successful album ever to that time. Joplin had died, and Sly was at a non-productive stage. Davis was left with the chore of another rebuilding job. To do this, he began looking for established talent whose careers were still ahead of them.

Davis signed on Neil Diamond, Earth, Wind & Fire, and in a coup, took on Pink Floyd a year before the group's previous company knew they were gone. Columbia was back in the forefront.

Davis has since had occasion to start from scratch again, this time with his own company, Arista (pronounced AIR-iss-tuh). He started with little more than options on artists with the now defunct Bell label. He elected to keep only three of them. None had been successful in North America. and only one, the Bay City Rollers, could claim major success anywhere. The other two, Manilow and Manchester, could claim only minor sales successes.

Davis is very pleased with the progress of Arista in its two year history, and experiences the particular pleasure of knowing that his artists are attracted to him, rather than to the name of a major label. He described his formula for success:

According to Davis, the record company executive doesn't make the trend; the artists and the public do that. The exec, if he is looking, simply spots the trend and helps bring it to the forefront.

Creative source, both on the part of artist and company, is the major reason an artist will or will not break. The company can help.

It is important to find the right producers for the artist. The marriage of the talents of artist and producer is often the key to the best possible effort. The best songs for the artist must be found. Davis attributes Manilow's sudden climb to fame largely to finding hit songs that fit the artist's voice and personality.

In terms of the company, Davis stresses the importance of finding executives who know their business. Everybody tends to blame somebody else when problems occur. Davis feels that a well-co-ordinated, professional company shouldn't experience the problems in the first place.

Another key to success is finding artists capable of breaking, and staying with them as long as they remain likely to break. CBS has succeeded after much effort to break

artists such as Boz Scaggs, Aerosmith and the Blue Oyster Cult. Davis describes Peter Frampton's sudden success as one of the incredible stories of 1976. And Arista's own new signing, the Kinks, slumping with low sales on a previous concept album, have produced a new effort, Sleepwalker, described by Davis as a "breakaway best seller" in the U.S.

In essence, Davis has shown the industry that personality did succeed in the world of rock music.

Davis has advice for the Canadian industry as well: not to be so concerned with the fact that an act is Canadian. The act should be judged by standard of quality. It isn't vital to have the end-all in music. Good songs and original talent, packaged and produced well, will be successful. Before recording, the act should also be capable of strong live performance.

Big Country syndication to accent Canadians

The Big Country syndication produced by St. Clair Productions in Toronto will begin the first week of April with cornerstone stations CFRB Toronto and CJAD Montreal taking an active part in the program. The three hour show will be taped from CFRB's live program every Sunday with host Bill Anderson for distribution to the six subscribing FM stations CJCA, CHMM, CKCY, CKNX, CKBY and CFFM, as well as AM stations CKWX, CFAC, CFPA, CHNS, CJVI, CKWS, CHOW, CHYR. CKAP, CFCL, CFJR, CKOX, CJRL, CFOB, CKDR, CHNR, CHOV, CKOV, CFBC, CJIB, CJDC, CKSP, CIVH, CHUB, CHPQ, CKRW, CFTK, CKTK, CKGY, CJDV, CFOK, CIOK, CJOK, CKTA, CJPR, CKSA, CJSL, CKLQ, CJCB, CJCN, CKEC, CKDH, CKCL and CJCJ.

Anderson plans to make use of RPM's top ten country singles, interviews with hitmakers with a special attempt to include all the major Canadian recording artists, as well as the management and record companies of those artists. He is currently planning a trip to Nashville for the purpose of interviewing some of those people.

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Rogers in crossover bid

Lucille appears to be an out-of-the-ballpark smash. (Pardon the symptoms of Bluejays Fever) The Kenny Rogers record is a strong number one on both Toronto

country music outlets, CFGM and CKFH (on both for the second week at number one, as this is written) and a challenging number two for Ron Foster at CKLW-FM in Windsor. By the way, Lucille happens to be the name of Kenny's Mom, and she took him to task recently for singing a song about a gal who was less than a devoted spouse, a lady named Lucille, when folks just might think that the words were connected in some way to the artist's Mother. There's a strong possibility of cross-over play on this record, and that has Dave Deeley and Al Matthews keeping their fingers crossed over at U.A. these days. This is not idle speculation on your reporter's part either. No less a pop music stalwart than CKOC's Nevin Grant has indicated that Lucille could well turn out to be just as big a pop hit as it is a country smash. Which brings me to the red hot flash that one of Canada's top contemporary music stations, CKOC, plays some country music. According to Nevin the Hamilton pop-powerhouse inserted an early morning, 5-6 a.m, segment of country music into their programming schedule about two years ago. It's not particularly presented as a separate entity to the balance of the

station's format, and until recently didn't even get much, if any, promotion. The regular host of the station's all-night show is the host for a blend of country gold (about 60% of the mix says Nevin) and the more pop-oriented items from the current country charts. Records have been started in that segment by CKOC reports Grant, gaining sufficient listener support to end up on CKOC's regular chart. Such will be the case apparently for the Kenny Rogers' hit, Lucille. It was only when CHML dropped their country segment altogether that CKOC took some daily newspaper ads to inform country fans in the Hamilton area that there was still country music on the local airwaves. More power to them. Lucille enters the RPM 100 at No. 91 this week.

CKWX in Vancouver gets the nod as the broadcasters who kicked off the current Red Sovine record in North America. I'm Just Seventeen is apparently creating some considerable stir among broadcasters on both sides of the border. But that's the kind of stir that every record plugger prays for. You are no doubt aware that the new Sovine recitation is based on the widely circulated article (it appeared in both Ann and Abby's columns) dealing with a severteen year old boy killed in an automobile accident. The original story was written by the chief of police of Burlington, Washington, Scott Hendrickson who Sovine met while he was appearing recently in Vancouver. A test pressing of Red's Starday waxing of the recitation, aired by CKWX, created such a demand for the record in the Vancouver area that artist Sovine

The most M.D. Jack Winter is prepared to say re: Red is, "Wait and see." I have to admit it does get pretty gruesome at places in the narrative.

A line this week from Jim Allison, bossman of Thunderbird Records. He reports that his excellent country group, Dustry Road has been extremely busy on the northern Ontario club circuit lately. The boys have now returned, and were set for an Opry North gig April 3rd., followed immediately by a Toronto nitery gig with that gorgeous Honey West at Bassill's Steak House. This week they are due in Pembroke, and have consecutive southern Ontario bookings through the middle of May. Jim reports the group will perform at the Calgary Stampede this summer throughout its two week duration, and will be featured with Tim Daniels on a daily radio show throughout.

A big bunch of our Canadian performers were set for an April 3rd, country music jamboree in the Lansing, Michigan Civic Centre. According to the last reports received here from promoter Country John

Abernathy his lineup of Canucks included Roy Payne, Smiley Bates, Mel Aucoin, Bobby Massey, Lloyd Mackey, George Pasher, Joey Sloan, Wayne Mack, Michael T. Wall, among others. Abernathy is a country deejay heard on WOCR-I'M in Michigan. Interestingly enough, Country John has just recently joined ACME, and is doing a fine job of promoting Canadian artists and Cancon records in his area.

Some unhappy country fans didn't get to see and hear George Jones as scheduled in Ottawa, Hamilton and Toronto in the last week of March, first week of April. The announced reason for George's absence was an automobile accident in Texas that resulted in severe injuries to the artist's son. His band, The Jones Boys, did appear on stage with the other scheduled headliners, Crystal Gayle and Billy "Crash" Craddock, and the way I hear it, not too many of the faithful were disappointed enough to ask for their money back.

Marty Robbins added a Cornwall, Ontario concert last week to the one already scheduled for Kingston, meanwhile his Adios Amigo bids fare to be his third number one hit in a row, the first in '77.

Ronnie Prophet starts his fall-season TV taping in Toronto on April 20th. Other studio sessions have been scheduled at the end of May and in August-September. No word yet on guest artists for the show produced at CTV in Toronto for the national network. That first taping session will immediately follow one of Ronnie's rare Toronto nightclub stands, at El Condor.

A new single by Canadian Zephyr will be out in about two weeks on U.A. For All I Care, that's the title of the song, not an editorial comment. The album from which that tune was lifted should be ready for release by mid-summer.

Ron McLeod, just back from Nashville and a Broadland recording session that produced extremely good results and a couple of singles, is expecting one to be released very shortly. The way Ron tells it, Who'll Buy My Posies isn't even the best of the new pair, but it will be available first.

It's entitled Sandy's Gonna Stay. No word yet on when Broadland will release it, assuming that it indeed will be released on that label.


