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Supertramp a record breaking success

A&M recording act Supertramp recently completed their Canadian tour, having broken house records at several venues in major centres, including Toronto, Edmonton, Calgary and Ottawa.

A total of over 400,000 fans were treated to the band's unique music and dazzling visual effects during the 16 show tour, which grossed \$5 million in Canada. This figure brings the band's North

American concert ticket gross to \$9 million since the March release of Breakfast In America, and an additional \$400,000 merchandising gross was realized on the Canadian dates.

Supertramp's Breakfast In America album has, to date, exceeded sales of 800,000 units in this country and this, coupled with the continuing success and

consistent sales on their classic Crime Of The Century LP, makes the group a probable contender for two separate million selling albums in Canada.

The CTV news and public affairs team from the popular W-5 TV program filmed the group's activities for ten days during the Canadian tour, and the segment will air early in the fall '79 season.

London to distribute Liddell's Tears in East

Composer/pianist Rob Liddell and his record company, Berandol Records, have completed a distribution agreement with London Records whereby London will distribute Liddell's current Berandol album, Tears, in Quebec and the Maritimes. Liddell has recently returned from Montreal, where he completed the agreement, and reports receiving a very favourable reception, notably from London's French Division head, Ginette Bonneville.

In addition Liddell reports, noted Quebec independent promoter Gilbert Morin has been given promotion responsibilities on the album in Quebec and the Maritimes. Among Morin's clients is Andre Gagnon.

Generation label active with reggae

Generation Records affiliated with Canadian independent Boot Records, is active again with a prestigious roster of international reggae acts, including 1973 World Pop Festival winner Ernie Smith & The Roots Revival, Ken Boothe, one of the first Jamaican artists to earn a gold record in England, ex-Afro Jamaican Rhythm member Audley Williams, and Canadian-based group Chalawa, who currently have a hit on Dutch and Belgian charts. Generation will also be distributing the world famous Harry J. product, but most of the label's releases will be Cancon.

Boot Records recognizes the importance of reggae in Canada, which boasts the third largest West Indian population in the world, and will be marketing the product to the black community through Ethnic Productions. Distribution to the regular retail trade will be done through London Records in Canada, and through Boot's Nashville operation in the U.S. market.

Generation's most recent release, Don't Down Me Now b/w To Behold Jah, by Ernie Smith and The Roots Revival, is presently enjoying airplay on over 50 stations across Canada, while two LP releases, Reggae For Lovers (Ken Boothe) and Hop, Skip And Jump (Chalawa) are being readied for release.

In addition, Boot has announced the appointment of Olivia Grange, of Grange-Walker and Associates, to the position of A&R and Promotional Consultant for the Generation label.

The Tears album was released in March, and launched unofficially at the NARM convention in the U.S. somewhat later, receiving attention from the industry internationally. A total of 10,000 units of the set have been moved, and the LP has also achieved a noteworthy amount of airplay throughout Canada, with Toronto's giant CFRB showing particular attention. Receiving the most airplay on the instrumental MOR set is Little People, a tune co-written by Liddell with Toronto

composer D. Dalton. A vocal version of the song is being prepared for release within a month.

The Tears album is Liddell's second on the Toronto-based independent label. Billed as Rob Liddell's Piano With The Ralph Cruickshank Orchestra, it follows Liddell's debut set, Swan Song. The first release achieved major airplay around the world, and prompted a successful European promotional tour for Liddell earlier in the year.

A&M launches Audiophile Series

A&M Records Canada has announced the release of The Audiophile Series, a selection of high-quality pressings of some of the label's most popular and successful LP releases.

Included in the series are Supertramp's Breakfast In America and Even In The Quietest Moments, The Grand Illusion by Styx, Chuck Mangione's Feels So Good, Gino Vannelli's Brother To Brother, and Cat Stevens' Greatest Hits. The series release follows the highly successful testreaketing of Supertramp's classic Crime Of The Century LP, which met with enthusiastic consumer response.

Each Audiophile release is treated with special care in the pressing, packaging, shipping, and storage phases and this, combined with the half-speed mastering process, ensures superior sound reproduction and quality.

The label's VP of Marketing, Joe Summers, and National Sales Manager Bill Ott are currently spearheading an intense national marketing compaign which includes The Audiophile Prepak, a permanent display rack for 100 units, a two-colour header card, special ad mat layouts, a bilingual display brochure which explains the manufacturing process, and a special Audiophile Sampler, an in-store demo record featuring cuts from each of the LPs included in the series.

"The Audiophile Prepak and special features of this series, the Japanese pressings, gatefold jackets and anti-static inner sleeve, are indicative of the high quality and fastidious attention to detail that is the primary concern in the manufacture of these remarkable recordings," stated Summers. "The Audiophile Series is a distinctive, highly attractive product, which has generated interest from our affiliates

CBS bows debut LP by Ellen Foley

CBS recording artist Ellen Foley is generating a lot of talk these days, and with good reason. The artist made her recording debut as the background vocalist on Meat Loaf's Bat Out Of Hell LP, and her unique sound and style soon cataputed her into a solo career as a talented vocalist in her own right.

The diminutive Foley, whose quiet manner belies the strength of the voice so amply displayed on her Nightout LP, was recently in Toronto for promotional work and spoke to RPM about her imminent performing career. "I can't wait to get out on that stage and unite everything." says the artist, who was an accomplished actress before embarking on a recording career. "Acting wasn't quite me, but now I'll have the chance to combine the theatrics with the music. I do songs that I feel I can sing, I mean really sing - songs that are dramatic, songs that tell a story visually as well as musically."

Foley, who grew up in St. Louis and now resides in New York, says her early influences "are scattered, but the voices I remember the most are those of the Rolling Stones, the Supremes, especially the toughness of Mick Jagger. The Motown era was a big influence, and I was a Barbra Streisand freak for awhile; I used to play her records and sing along with them." Those early influences are evident and well combined on the album, which was produced by Ian Hunter and Mick Ronson, and is being compared to the 'wall of sound' that Phil Spector made famous, "It's a big sound, a total rock and roll sound," says Foley of the venture. "It was produced like a rock album, rather than like a 'female singer's' album. The emotion is everything, as far as I'm concerned," continues the artist. "I actually cried through one tune on the album; it was that kind of song. We left it that way even though the vocal could have been better, technically speaking. But I'm always willing to sacrifice technical perfection for true emotion. I didn't want the album to come off sounding like 'corporate rock' - you know, those albums which are so highly produced they don't even sound like people did them. There's a lot of that kind of album around these days, but luckily, there are also a lot of real musical personalities emerging to balance it out."

Foley co-wrote one tune on the album, and intends to pen more of her own material in the future. "I used to write as a kid, but I let it go somewhere along the line. Now I feel more confident, that I can trust myself in that direction." The artist describes herself as "the kind of kid who always entered the local talent contests, the kid who got a bunch of girls together to sing. I guess I always wanted to do something in show business."

Foley met up with Meat Loaf while touring with the National Lampoon show, and after acting as the female back-up vocalist on his LP, declined his offer to tour with the act in order to pursue her

own solo career. When Carla De Vito took up vocal duties with the Meat Loaf show, most people mistakenly assumed that De Vitto's voice was the voice on the Bat Out Of Hell album as well. "That did get me a little crazy in the beginning," says Foley of the mix-up. "Not to take anything away from Carla, because she's great. But this time, with my own album, at least people will know it's me. If people think that this album is worth anything, I hope to get whatever credit I deserve."

The artist will soon be in rehearsal with her band in preparation for live performing, and Foley is more than anxious to enter this phase of her career. "There's no question in my mind that I can handle it; I know how to deal with an audience, and I know what I want to say to people through the music." A possible joint appearance by Foley and producer/performer lan Hunter at Toronto's El Mocambo is now being discussed for the near future.

MAX MOUSE & THE GORILLAS

Jungle Jukebox JJ-33.3 Rock

An unusually conceived group, label and promotion campaign. Visitors to Toronto's El Mocambo last year were treated to a gorilla, complete with electric guitar and tape deck, displaying and selling his E.P. single on the street. The single was titled Can A Gorilla Sing The Blues and the gorilla was none other than Max Mouse. Now on release with a self-titled debut album on the Jungle Jukebox label, Max & group turn out to be a rather tight, bluesy rock group of five players who perform Mouse's original material with a very live AOR sound. Self-distributed label is at Box 36, West Beach, Bowmanville, Ont. Recorded at Toronto's Inception, Comfort Sounds.

MINGLEWOOD BAND

RCA KKL-1-0325-N Rock/blues

With their second album and debut for the RCA label, Matt Minglewood and his six-piece rock/blues band are preparing to prove to the country in a big way that Cape Breton Island is capable of exporting more than folk and fiddle music. A veteran group who have paid a lot of club dues through the years, the Minglewood Band have now arrived as a tight group but very energetic manner. This set produced by studio veteran Claire Lawrence at London, Ontario's Springfield Sound, should establish Minglewood at the AOR level and might produce a hit single or two.

Stateless - Stiff/Epic JE-36102-H Rock

Suggested List \$8.98

A very powerful debut release from a very unusual vocalist, sax player and songwriter. Lovich, actually a Detroit native transplanted to Britain, has a strong and wide ranging voice which suits her material well. The songs range from straight ahead rock to somewhat progressive sounds to the occassional ballad. Foremost among the latter are Too Tender (To Touch) and Nick Lowe's Tonight. Most of the songs are co-written by Lovich and guitarist Les Chappell, who also combined on the production. The wide range of sounds fall basically into the AOR formats, but several cuts could make very successful singles.

MOON MARTIN

Escape From Domination - Capitol ST-11933-F Rock

Suggested List \$8.98

Behind those glasses and the rather soft look lies a rock & roller of the first degree. Martin is best known as a songwriter (Mink DeVille, Robert Palmer & Michelle Phillips have recorded his songs), but with a strong, clean voice and fine instrumental backing, his second release is brimming with AOR and even some Top 40 potential. Production, by Craig Leon in Sharon, Vermont, is commercial, energetic, yet very smooth and full sounding. Ballads and pop songs are blended in with the rockers, the latter including Rolene, a popular cut recorded by Mink DeVille. This set should be a major fall breakout item. Lyrics enclosed.

TORY BEAU

More Than A Love Song - MCA AFL-1-3119-N Pop

Suggested List \$8.98

Second album by five-piece group (despite jacket photo showing only four members) is a slightly campy pop set in a vein not too far removed from their breakout hit My Angel Baby. Recorded at Criteria Studios in Florida and produced by the team of Daniel Moore and veteran Norbert Putnam, the set features basically original material from Moore and from band members Danny McKenna and Balde Silvax, lead vocalists and guitarists. Although not strictly speaking a pop album, several cuts could become a major follow-up hit, notably Moore's High Roller and Silva's She Used To Be Mine. There's also some adult airplay here.



Toronto's Ultra label releases first album

Ultra Records, a young independent label based in Toronto, has released its first album, a set by O Ji Ji titled The Shadow. Elaine Golden, who heads the label, reports Ultra are currently organizing a full-scale promotional effort on behalf of the album, which is being distributed nationally by J.C. Enterprises.

The album is basically the effort of Rupert (O Ji Ji) Harvey, a Toronto resident who wrote, composed, produced and arranged the set. Harvey also performs on the album, playing a variety of instruments (guitar, Arp Pro, percussion, melodica and bass) and handling some of the vocals. He is joined by brother Carl Harvey, who handles guitar leads, former Troiano member Jacek Sobotta on keyboards, horn players Rick Morrison and Peter Jeffrey of Ravin', a top Toronto club band, Carl Otway on drums, percussion and vocals, and a host of additional musicians. Golden and Carstern Walters handle background vocals.

The album is largely instrumental, heavily influenced by various jazz forms but with several cuts compatible with Adult Contemporary formats. It was produced at Marigold Studios in Toronto, with studio owner Richard Dodson handling engineering chores. The Ultra label is hoping for solid radio and sales support on the album across the country.

Composer Patricia Cullen scores Portraits Of Power

Noted Canadian film and television composer Patricia Cullen has completed the scoring of Portraits Of Power, a major documentary television series studying the lives of 19 world leaders. The series consists of 26 half-hour segments. It was produced jointly by Nielsen-Ferns International and New York Times Productions, and has taken two years to complete. The score was completed by Cullen after a year's work, which also involved producing the soundtrack.

Most of the music in the series is original. In researching the project, Cullen studied over 130 hours of World War II footage and read numerous books. She had to she was born after the war ended.

The series will begin broadcasting in 45 countries around the world in September. The original parts of the soundtrack are published by the young Toronto-based Pangaea Music House.

Cullen is a highly accredited composer. The young Toronto native has already been credited with over 150 pieces of background music for television commercials and other projects. Her major credits include animated features Romie-O And Julie-B and The Devil & Daniel Mouse, OECA projects The Story About Us: The Last Illusion and The Ugly Little Boy, feature film 125 Rooms Of Comfort and CBC radio science fiction theme Star Maker. Current projects now underway include another animated feature titled The Laffalotians

NEW ALBUMS

JIMMY BUFFETT

Volcano - MCA-5102-J Pop

Suggested List \$9.98

Veteran singer-songwriter Buffett, a very prolific artist, returns with another very well produced set of country-rock tunes, with a heavy blend of pop and even island music, perhaps owing to the fact that the LP was recorded at Air Studios in Montserrat, West Indies. The Florida resident owes much of his sound to the sun and the sea, and his songs blend in elements of poignancy and an every-present sense of humour. Production is by veteran Norbert Putnam, and a heavy list of session credits is topped by background vocals from the likes of James Taylor (and brothers Alex and Hugh), and David Loggins, who co-wrote one cut.

DUNCAN BROWNE

The Wild Places - Sire QSR-6465-P Rock/progressive folk

Suggested List \$8.98

Although only beginning to become established in North America, British singer-writer Browne has been recording for 11 years, and this is his fourth LP, second on Sire. Classically trained as a guitarist and clarinetist, Browne was discovered by Stones then manager Andrew Loog Oldham and later produced by Mickey Most. Following his second album, he adapted his classical style to electric guitar. The result is a unique sound, very AOR adaptable and once well described as "wispy vocals, moody, poetic lyrics and multi-textured melodies." A very likely breakout artist for the very near future. Self-produced.

THE 8.52'S

Warner Bros. QBS-3355-P Rock

Suggested List \$8.98

Unusual, new wavish sound marks debut album by three man, two woman group. The set, produced in Nassau, Bahamas by Chris Blackwell for Island Records, features somewhat basic sound comprised of slightly progressive instrumentation under simple melodies, but it is in the lyrical content that the group stands out. Song titles include such examples as Planet Claire and Rock Lobster, and the lyrics, somewhat tongue in cheek, could be described as a new wave inversion of Beach Boys themes. The keynote difference is the instruction, on the record label itself, to 'Play loud'. Unusual sound may limit AOR airplay in some formats.

GATO BARBIERI

Euphoria · A&M SP-4774-W Jazz

Suggested List \$8.98

Master Latin American sax player is back with another very thoroughly produced set of basically jazz music, with a couple of selections which are more uptempo and funk sounding ranging down to very gentle jazz ballads and soft latin rhythms. Produced in New York by Jay Chattaway with associate producer Michelle Barbieri, and a very heavy line up of many of the top session musicians in New York gives it a sound blending Barbieri's own latin influences with the hot punch of that city. The LP will be very successful in most jazz formats, with a large amount of AOR crossover likely.

CAROLYNE MAS

Mercury SRM-1-3783-Q rock/pop

Suggested List \$8.98

From out of the healthy new singer-writer scene in New York's Greenwich Village which is earning much attention in local showcase clubs comes this debut album from singer-writer Carolyne Mas, who is already being touted by some as the 'female Springsteen'. The comparison is somewhat inaccurate, but well-founded. Mas' intense R&B/60's pop roots are obvious in her songwriting and captured well by producer Steve Burgh. Ballads, pop and rock songs are well blended, and the strength of Mas' operatically trained voice is evident throughout. Very strong breakout LP for AOR attention, with several possible hit singles.

THE KINKS

Low Budget - Arista AB-4240-F Rock/pop

Suggested List \$8.08

When they first came on the music scene in the early 60's with You Really Got Me and other such hits, Ray Davies & the Kinks were that era's version of new wave. Alternating through periods of ballads, social consciousness, hard rock and progressive, concept-oriented sounds, the group are back to basic, new wave-compatible solid rock music. Davies is still the writer of all the material, now also producer, and Low Budget is a somewhat more simplistic sounding, socially conscious set than the group's previous Misfits effort. AOR rock set includes some islands influence, plus the single Wish I Could Fly Like Superman in the new rock/disco genre.

IAN DURY & THE BLOCKHEADS

Do It Yourself - Stiff/Epic JE-36104-H Rock/pop

Suggested List \$8.98

The New Boots & Panties man is back, this time with a much more pop-oriented effort than his previous release. Dury still writes all his own lyrics, and various band members, notably producer/keyboardist/guitarist Chaz Jankel, suppy the music. The music is very modern, pop and even disco sounding, and the lyrics, while still very unusual, are somewhat toned down and less blatantly sexual than on the previous LP, a fact which should lead to more solid AOR radio support and even a few singles. The singles will have to wait, though - a limited edition seven-inch release of Hit Me With Your Rhythm Stick is enclosed with the album.



Sharon, Lois & Bram - Elephant debut strikes gold

Sharon, Lois & Bram are at it again! The popular folk trio, who specialize in children's music for the family, have just reached the gold mark of 50,000 non-returnable units on their first album, One Elephant, Deux Elephants, on their own independent label, Elephant Records. Aside from the album's significance as one of the

rare children's records ever to achieve gold status, the LP is equally significant for the label's distributor, Almada Corp., a Montreal-based firm which specializes in a huge catalogue of basically low-selling individual titles. The Elephant release is Almada's first gold in many years, since scoring with a Living Languages release.

The label was started by three Toronto-based folksingers, Sharon Hampson, Lois Lilienstein and Bram Morrison, plus one producer/percussionist, Bill Usher. The three singers had been performing in the Mariposa In The Schools program, a program started by the Mariposa Folk Festival to bring folk music to the Toronto area school children. Although they had never worked together, the three were old friends, and they decided to collaborate on a children's project.

"...we never even considered going anywhere else with it..."

"Our initial impulse was to make a record," Morrison notes, "and we never even con-

sidered going anywhere else with it. We just decided to do it ourselves. One of the consequences of that was that we had to form a company to do it." Usher explains, "I'd had a lot of experience playing on a lot of the home-grown albums - people who couldn't get record deals and decided the only way they could get on record was to do it themselves. I came into this situation with an understanding that nobody would touch us anyway, that it would take a certain amount of money to do the album, that there were certain distributors around, like Almada, that would take it if it was good enough, and that there would be no problem." "So," laughs Morrison, "we didn't waste any energy at all."

Thus was the Elephant label born, and Usher and the trio set out to record the debut album. Usher, who has done a lot of CBC Radio production as well as hundreds of record sessions as drummer and percussionist, took Sharon, Lois & Bram into Toronto's Kensington Sound. Unusually, for a label debut, for a kids' album, for a fledgling self-owned label, One Elephant, Deux Elephants features a full range of highly accredited session talent from a wide variety of fields, brought together by Usher's own experience.

The material was then chosen. Unlike other novices to the realm of children's recordings, Sharon, Lois & Bram had a combined four decades of experience in singing for young people, and each had a fully developed repertoire of children's material and knew which songs went over well. So the three brought their songs into the meetings. Usher recalls, "The process was one of getting some games, some rhyming things, some participation things, action songs, and so on. So we came up with songs

that we liked and we knew that the kids liked." "This was 90% proven material," Bram Morrison adds. "We threw in a couple of new things, just as an experiment." The singers' vast experience in singing for kids, coupled with Usher's knowledge of how to compensate for the difference between recording and performing, were aspects the four participants felt very strongly about.

One Elephant, Deux Elephants was released last September 1 and immediately took off, much to everyone's surprise. Boosted early be a very favourable column from the Toronto Star's Michele Landsberg, the album earned instant retail requests from parents who had read the column. Usher recalls, "It just started to rocket, through a lot of hard work from Almada and Jonathon Lipsin, their Ontario representative. Jonathon went to all the major distributors and racks, knocking on doors and telling people the album was going to be really big. At first, he just made small sales, and then things started to snowball from there." Morrison points out, "I don't think they had ever had anything like this in their catalogue. I think this was their first sort of hit record. They really went all out."

At that point began one of the most successful grass roots marketing campaigns ever undertaken on a record in Canada. Blessed with radio profiles from the CBC and a few other adult-oriented sources, and spread further by word of mouth in parents' groups and from children who had heard the record at school, sales continued to grow through the year. In addition to

the retail distribution agreement with Almada, Elephant also marketed the LP directly into the educational system, with distribution by GLC to the schools, libraries and educational suppliers.

And the sales came quickly and steadily, in numbers that seemed massive. "To us, it was massive," Usher notes. 'The album came out September 1, and by the time Christmas came, we'd sold 27,000 copies." Morrison continues, "We started out very conservatively with 5,000, because we'd had no clue about what our sales were going to be like." "Then we got caught in the fall rush," adds Usher. "We bowled over the whole thing."

Now Sharon, Lois & Bram are readving a second album. Smorgasbord, for imminent release. Again produced by Usher, the new set was recorded at the newly moved and upgraded Grange Studio, now located in North York, with engineer Rick Knight. If anything, Smorgasbord was even more carefully arranged and produced than the debut, "This time," Usher comments, "we really went overboard. We used people we really wanted, people who were fully versed in the first album and knew that we have a certain love for genres." Usher used Quebec's Phillippe Bruneau on diatonic (button) accordion on some French-flavoured cuts, Academy Award nominee Maurice Solway on violin, Newfoundland accordionist Harry Hibbs on some jig material, and on the multicultural title cut alone, bazouki player Leigh Cline, Egyptian ganun player George Sawa, Bruneau, and fiddler Eric Nagler, with Morrison on spanish style quitar and Usher on Chinese percussion. The LP also includes a full horn section and a string section, with arrangements by big band leader Shelly Berger.

Musical styles range from pure folk to bluegrass to disco.

Morrison points out one reason for the group's breakthrough success. "There's a huge demand for good children's stuff that has been satisfied only to a limited degree." There are a lot of kids, and very little product to meet the demand. "We were plugging right into a huge gap in the market. We knew that, because we'd been around that market. We knew what parents and teachers wanted. It's not as if we were competing in the pop market."

The Elephant albums are distinctive in that they do not turn off the parents. "In a lot of households," Usher notes, "the parents either suffer or enjoy the albums along with the kids. We decided to put something together that the parents would enjoy too." This was achieved, states Usher, through a combination of "fine musicians, careful arrangements and not 'schlockey' stuff," Morrison adds. "We call our concerts 'family concerts', and we call our albums 'children's records for the whole family' - and we really mean it." In addition, both albums come equipped with an illustrated 16-page activity booklet, including full words and music, anecdotes about the music, and instructions for games and activities that accompany the sonas.

With Usher, Sharon, Lois & Bram put together a live act last year. Touring basically in Toronto at first, the group has already moved across the country westward. The show is as entertaining as the records. Usher states, "We do a very energetic show.

Bram plays guitar, Lois plays autoharp and piano, Sharon can play some guitar, and I'll play a rudimentary kit or all kinds of other percussion effects. We program a show for the four of us that uses a lot of singing, rhythm, punchiness - and a lot of participation by the audience, always. It's more of an involvement." Participation includes singing choruses, actions and games of all kinds.

The group will be increasing their tour dramatically over the next nine months, in Ontario, returning west in March, April and May, and hopefully debuting in the East, also in the spring. Cantours, a major tour booking firm run by Sergei Sawchyn in Toronto (Cleo Laine, Moscow Circus, etc.), is lining up the tours. The group have also taped two major TV specials. One, a CTV special live studio concert, is being broadcast Sept. 1. The other, a CBC network special kicking off a children's series will air Oct. 6. Titled Sharon, Lois & Bram Downtown, it's about a day in the life of inner city children.

The Elephant label is also growing and gaining credibility. "We have larger ideas for the record company," Usher points out, "but you've got to start with your first and second records, and for the most part, we've got to stay with us until we can get established and start looking at recording anybody else." "But as it turns out," Morrison adds, "as a side effect that we really hadn't visualized, Elephant Records has become a genuine record label. We've had people approach us. But so far, we haven't felt that we've had the energy to do any promotion for others - we're working as hard as we can with our own music."

Troubadour's Raffi takes chunk of market

In 1975, folksinger Raffi formed his own label, Troubadour Records, primarily as a vehicle for his children's records, a concept which has blossomed into a highly successful operation. The artist's three children's LP releases, Singable Songs, More Singable Songs and The Corner Grocery Store, have sold in the neighbourhood of 78,000 48,000 and 25,000 units respectively, and as any Canadian artist can tell you, that's a pretty successful neighbourhood.

Glen Sernyk, who acts as Projects Co-ordinator for the label, discussed the marketing of this product with RPM. "First, you have to get the records into the schools, the daycare centres, and the nursery schools," begins Sernyk. "This is where the decision is ultimately made as to whether you have a good record or not. Once a record gains acceptance in these education centres, retailers open up to it."

Troubadour recently signed a distribution agreement with A&M Records of Canada, an agreement which has proven quite satisfactory to both parties. "Regular record companies are not really designed to promote children's records," says Sernyk. "It's a whole different area. But we now

have a track record with the retailers, which is a great help in getting the product out there. I think that one of the biggest reasons that A&M is happy with us is that there are no returns - records that go out don't come back. Our records used to be sold in smaller specialty stores, but now A&M is getting the line into the larger chain stores, which should result in large numbers for us this Christmas season."

Serynk points out that one of the biggest obstacles in marketing children's product is the fact that most retailers "lump all kids" records together. And the idea of a \$7.98 list price LP for children was really something odd initially." Sernyk feels that, in addition to the musical merit of Raffi's product, the recording and pressing quality has been a factor in their success. "Our quality is one of Raffi's stickiest points; the quality has to be there all the way. The last LP went through four lacquers and several test pressings before he was satisfied. The pressing has to be of good quality with a smooth playing surface, which means top grade vinyl, in order to sound good on a kid's \$20 stereo set."

But marketing children's product also

has its positive side. "This is a huge market and a lot of people don't take that into consideration." explains Sernyk. "There are 580,000 families in Canada who are English-speaking, own a record player, and have a child under 8 years old - exactly the market we're looking for. I think it's possible to be more specific in marketing children's LPs than contemporary records because you can narrow your market down more easily."

A major ingredient in the Troubadour success story has been Raffi's touring schedule, which Sernyk describes as "interminable. Since the beginning of January, Raffi has done about 85 concerts, and if we have our way, he'll do another 50 this fall. He's gone from Vancour or to St. John's and is going to Victoria next month, so he's literally covered the country from coast to coast." And touring, for a children's artist, presents its own unique set of problems. "The venues have to be small so that all the kids can see what's going on, and their attention span is limited, so the show has to move quickly and last no more than about 50 minutes. The people we usually deal with are not professional promoters, either," continues Sernyk. "They're usually early education people and that world and show business do not overlap at all! Sometimes we're told that the hall we'll be playing in is equipped with stage lighting, only to find out when we get there that by 'stage lighting' they meant two overhead lightbulbs with an on/off switch. Other times we might be assured that the venue holds 600 people, and find out when we arrive that chairs aren't provided for any of those 600! In order to tour effectively, you have to be prepared for a lot of these little surprises."


Sernyk, who also acts as Raffi's personal manager and often travels with him, is consistently amazed at the crowds which seemingly come out of nowhere to line up for Raffi concerts. "We hadn't been in Vancouver much, but Raffi was there in May and sold out five shows in one day. Sometimes there's no publicity for a show and I don't know how they sell out, but they do! The support that Raffi has is really something else."

One thing that the children's artist must contend with in 1979 is the sophistication of its young audience. They are exposed to children's music via TV and school, along with more adult fare through their parents' radio and listening habits. This combination can cause rather eclectic musical tastes, as evidenced by one five-year-old who informed an amazed Raffithat her two favourite songs were Da Ya Think I'm Sexy and Frosty The Snowman! "For this reason, it's very important for an artist not to 'talk down' to the kids," explains Sernyk. "They're too bright for that and you'll lose them if you do."

Raffi, in conjunction with early child-hood educationalists, does extensive research prior to each recording session in order to know what will most appeal to the age group which comprises his particular market. "Figuring out exactly where our market should be is something that we know better than anyone else," says Sernyk, who adds that Troubadour is often consulted by others in the children's field who consider the label a leader in the children's market.

"Raffi took a big chance in the beginning - the first album was done on a bank loan; but he's done rather well for himself, I'd say. We feel that with proper promotion and aggressive sales, things which A&M does very well, we should be able to get sales of 200,000 on a good children's record. This market is really going someplace, and as soon as people discover that you can be commercially successful in this field, we'll see a lot more children's artists coming into the forefront."

Sernyk reports that it is not unlikely that Troubadour may be signing additional children's artists in the future, and adds that Raffi himself will be "more visible in the public eye. It's important that Raffi be visible to kids as a person, not just a voice on a record. This is something we became aware of through concerts, and Raffi always makes a point of going out and talking to the kids after each show." One wide-eyed Raffi fan recently asked the artist, "How did you get off the record?" "That was easy," laughed Raffi "It's getting on a record that's not so easy!"

Year of the child figures in success of Pickwick

The growth pattern at Pickwick Records of Canada has been steady since the label mounted an all-out offensive to capture a large chunk of the market. That was last year and by November the label was rewarded with a certification for gold on its Sesame Street Fever album. The stage was set and within a few short weeks that same album moved Pickwick into the realm of platinum, its first.

Now, in the Year of the Child, Pickwick can boast another gold record with its Merry Christmas From Sesame Street album. It's been thirty months since the release of this album, considered a seasonal item, which makes its success rather unique. It's now expected to reach platinum status before the end of this year.

Pickwick Canada, headed up by Alan Reid, and General Manager with Allan Matthews, National Merchandising Manager representing 24 years in the record business between them, and Ned Talmey as Operations Manager, have utilized their knowledge of the business well to spearhead a movement into the relatively unknown market of children's records. With disco as popular as it is, it was only natural that the Sesame Street gang should culture the world's future music/dance lovers with a recognizable element at a young age. What youngster wouldn't be happy to relate to disco with their favourite television stars. Sesame Disco used one of the famous Bee Gees, Robin Gibb, to bring attention to this new music form. The album was an immediate success and prompted the powers that be to release an all Sesame character disco album, Sesame Street Fever, with special guest star Kermit The Frog.

So now, it's "move over" to the Top 40 and album-oriented crowd, and make room for the progressive children's records. Perhaps the Year of the Child and all the hooferah that went with it was timely for Pickwick. The Sesame Street television show has reached new heights of popularity in Canada in its tenth year, Pickwick's Allan Matthews notes, "Sesame Street's success lies in its ability to educate and entertain the pre-schooler without the use of patronizing methods." He continues with "The effective utilization of visual and audio dramatizations and effects attract and retain the child's attention without inducing boredom and the characters involved all have human elements which are easily recognizable." It was obvious that with the release of their disco album last year, which was somewhat of a revolutionary idea combining elements of their successful formula with disco. "They proved yet another point", explains Matthews, "The unparalleled popularity of 'Sesame Street Fever' verified the hypothesis that while four and five year olds have no tangible effect on the trends of contemporary music, they are themselves subject to strong musical influences via their older siblings, their parents and, of course, omnipresent power of radio and television." Matthews adds, "Even at this tender age they have the capacity to formulate

opinions on, and enjoy the sound of more 'mature' types of music. The success of subsequent emulations of the Sesame Street Fever venture have added considerable strength to this theory."

Generally speaking, there are indications of new emphasis being placed on the quality

of children's records and their relative importance to the record industry. Looking at the domestic scene, Pickwick is looking seriously at the Canadian market and there is a strong possibility of a Canadian children's album before the end of the year.

J.C. Enterprises report substantial sales

J.C. Enterprises, a Markham-based distribution operation, is quite involved in children's record product and reports substantial success for many Cancon children's records.

"The kiddie market is a very rapidly growing market," says J.C. President Jim Corbett, "especially as far as the Canadian product is concerned. We do very well with product like Danny Coughlan's songs from his Treehouse TV show, which goes right across Canada. It's a growing process to get the product into the stores and coordinate with the TV show, but the TV exposure is, of course, a great help in marketing the record.

"We're also doing extremely well with product by Joan Northcott," continues Corbett, "who has an album of French songs for English-speaking children. It's a very classy package, which includes a booklet of lyrics, and it's done very well for us." Northcott also has an LP of folksongs, poems, and original tunes for elementary school aged children, and Corbett reports substantial sales on both LPs.

Corbett points out that there is "still a reluctance on the part of retailers to handle Canadian product of any kind, and this is especially true in the area of kiddie

albums. Even with the encouragement of the Half Back program, many retailers still wouldn't take Cancon children's records which is unfortunate, because a lot of Canadian product in this field is selling very well because it is so different. It's not the usual Cinderella, Three Blind Mice stuff you usually get - it's more contemporary and the kids today are into more contemporary music, disco, R&B, whatever's happening at the time. In order to reach these kids, the records have to be versatile."

Corbett feels that a \$7.98 list price on children's LPs have not been a problem in selling, because "the parents do the buying not the kids themselves. They'll buy an album as a gift, or because they see an album that's from a TV show that the kids like. A lot of parents will go out and buy a budget-priced album for themselves but think nothing of spending a higher price for a record for their kids."

J.C. Enterprises also reports substantial sales on product on the Select label, which includes records of poetry, singalongs, and original folk tunes for the French-speaking children's market.



Walt Disney Music of Canada leads international market

Even in the face of growing competition from other popular children's lines. Disney product continues as a leader in the field and Product Manager Ron Saila reports that the operation recently enjoyed its biggest year ever. "And our records sell for \$3.98 retail as compared to others which sell at \$7.98 retail, so when I say we had our biggest year, it means we've sold a lot of product!"

Disney has kept a firm grasp on the market by keeping alive the traditional Disney favourites while releasing more contemporary stylings with the same Disney flair. "We have six new releases coming up in the next few months," says Saila, "and our priority product will be Mickey Mouse Disco, which will include tunes like Mickey Disco and Macho Duck. I must admit that I'm not much of a disco fan myself, but heard the record once and fell in love with it. It's very well done and we're anticipating some good results from this one."

Saila attributes the Disney success to several factors. "We take a lot of care in pressing and this, combined with quality production, makes for a better record. And we try to promote the records through tie-ins with other Disney occurrences. The TV show, Disneyworld and Disneyland, and the Disney movies have all helped to keep Disney in people's minds." One example of the tie-in promo technique will be evidenced in this fall's heavy promo

push on the soundtrack of the classic Sleeping Beauty, when the film returns to Canada and U.S. theatres this October.

"We also try to utilize the Disney art in our promotions as much as possible," says Saila. "People are familiar with the artwork and the Disney characters." Promotion is geared for both the adult and the child. "There's a bit of the kid in all of us," explains Saila, "and I've been in stores and seen adults attracted to our displays even before the kids are. Disney is a tradition, passed on from parent to child. The parents see a Disney record display, and they

remember liking those records themselves as kids, so they buy them for their own children."

Another upcoming event that everyone at Disney is talking about these days is The Black Hole, an outer-space adventure film which, Saila reports, is Disney's most ambitious project to date, with a budget of some \$20 million. The music for the film is being done by John Barry, of Goldfinger and Born Free fame, and the film and soundtrack will premiere this Christmas season.

SQN Records takes market share

SQN Records has just entered the children's music field with I Lost My Pet Lizard, an album which features the talents of Canadian artists Bob McBride, Don Franks and Dick Smith. The LP was written and produced by Brenda and Paul Hoffert, the latter being well known for his work with Lighthouse.

"The album is subtitled Pop Songs For Kids," explains SQN President Peter Clayton, "because it's done as any pop record would be done. The kids today are listening to pop music all the time; they graduate to it at a very early age. So, that was the concept we had in mind going into the project. The album has a great disco tune, which should be a number 1 disco

song for adults, no less for kids! There's also a reggae tune, and songs done in the styles of Neil Diamond and the Beatles. It's the kind of album that the kids can listen to without driving their parents out of the room."

The LP immediately generated interest at a major label here in Canada, and representatives from the company's head office in the U.S. are presently negotiating with SQN for distribution rights on the LP in both the Canadian and U.S. markets. "This is certainly encouraging," says Clayton, "and judging by the reception we're getting on this album, I'd say we'll definitely be doing more recordings in this field."

Bear n Doll Records Bryant features Cancon ballads

Bear n Doll Records, a division of Berandol, has established itself as an innovator in the field of children's music, and have enjoyed great success with product by the Offenheim Family, Canada's Favourite Folksongs For Kids, and the LP from the popular TV show, Polka Dot Door.

The label's President, Ralph Cruickshank, has succeeded in exposing many talented Canadian artists in the field of children's music in an attempt to create good domestic product for Canadian children who often grow up on a diet of U.S. imports.

An upcoming project that reflects this approach is the Music Builders series, the first of which will be released this fall. The series will include seven double-unit packages, complete with books, which will be individually geared for pre-schoolers and children in grades 1 through 6. "No one here has ever done kids records specifically for use in the schools," explains Cruickshank. "There are records of this type from

the States, but these records feature all Canadian talent; Canadian songs performed by top Canadian acts. (The Canadian Brass is one of the acts featured in the series.) Hopefully, schools across the country will be buying this series for use in their schools, and Canadian children will be singing along with Canadian songs by Canadian artists."

Another Bear n Doll product ready for release is Disco For Kids. "I thought it was about time that someone did a high quality instrumental album for children using contemporary rhythms and musical styles," says Cruickshank. "I've always done our records as pop records for kids, devoting the same time and money that I would for an adult pop LP, and this one is no exception."

Wiz Bryant, who is currently performing two children's concerts nightly at the CNE's Better Living Building, will also have a release on Bear n Doll, an LP titled Ballads Of Canada. Also debuting this fall will be

a contemporary version of Oh, Canada, produced and arranged by Master's Workshop's Howard Baer. The single, which is sung by children, features an English side and a French side, and was the concept of Marilyn Harde and Elaine Mason, two North York school teachers who were also the force behind the Music Builders series.

Also upcoming on the label is Popsicle People, original songs for children penned by Larry Day and Dave De Carle.

Cruickshank is especially enthusiastic about an album project proposed by the Canadian Commission for the International Year of the Child, which has approached Bear n Doll to produce an LP of children's songs by top Canadian artists. The project will be a non-profit venture for the label, with all royalties going to the Commission. Sandy Offenheim has already agreed to participate in the project, and Cruickshank hopes to acquire the services of other Canadian musical luminaries for the recording.

Gary Taylor's Bares its Musical Soul photos

More than one Toronto music executive has complained about the lack of a night-club in Vancouver that, while catering to the general public, can also provide a meeting place for those in the industry; some-place cosy where an out of towner can expect to bump into club regulars from big name acts, record companies and the media.



The Rock Room may be the answer. Located in the heart of the downtown district, it offers live music and hospitality from host Gary Taylor.

With the exception of The Boyd Shop, nightclubs in the city's core have lately forsaken live rock for disco and/or Vegas style entertainment. Give Taylor full marks for jumping into this vacuum. By booking such seasoned dues payers as Roy Loney & The Phantom Movers, One Horse Blue, Les-Q and the Foreman-Byrnes Blues Band, Taylor is establishing a separate identity from The Body Shop, which tends to bring in more youthful 'power pop' bands.

A veteran clubowner, Gary Taylor's trademark over the years has been a very classy presentation of exotic dancers. Understandably, this has given him a three piece suit/expense account type of clientele. While the curvaceous beauties remain in a downstairs show lounge, Taylor is now directing his energies to bringing in a new kind of customer - the aficionado of good rock and roll music.

Considerable publicity has already been generated from CFOX's live Monday night broadcasts from The Rock Room. To

improve the fidelity of the hour set, Taylor and CFOX PD Roy Hennessy have worked out a deal with Challenger Sound whereby a mobile van is set up outside the club to mix and master the music onto a half track Scully, before sending it on the station transmitter. Soundwise, things will get even better when Taylor finalizes the installation of an in-house PA system.

Taylor has lately flexed his muscles in another area, concert promotion. He

recently presented Casino recording artist Bim at the Commodore Ballroom. A former musician, Taylor has good rapport with Vancouver's rock community and he's adamant that The Rock Room will showcase the best original talent around. He's willing to gamble on unsigned talent, and in this respect The Rock Room could become an important stepping stone for the many fine western Canadian groups that are looking for their first record deal.

Dixon House Band Fights It Alone

For a young man whose day in the sun seems to be just around the corner, Ted Dixon House is remarkably calm about the recent developments in his career. In Vancouver to conduct a number of media interviews, he seems just as at ease reminiscing about his days as ship's entertainer on the Vancouver-Victoria ferry run, as talking about the Dixon House Band's fortuitous signing with Infinity Records. Currently one of the hottest independent labels in North America, Infinity is probably banking on Dixon House's calm determination to help mould the other four group members into a cohesive touring unit.

Dixon House originally made his home in Victoria, but came over to the maintand at the insistence of Howard Leese, who wanted to employ his keyboard and vocal skills in Songbird. Largely a studio creation of Leese and producer Mike Flicker, Songbird was just coming off of a pair of back to 1974 hits - I Believe and Dirty Work - and was planning to expand beyond the confines of Mushroom Studios. Fate intervened shortly after Ted joined - Mike Flicker got the call to produce Heart. Howard Leese soon became a part of the studio band

behind the Wilson sisters, and was then asked to become a fulltime member. Despite their own rapid promotions, neither Flicker or Leese forgot about their old cohort in the by-now defunct Songbird. In 1976, Dixon House was invited down to Seattle where he renewed contacts and met Heart manager Ken Kinnear.

Once relocated, Dixon House began to compose in earnest and to search out compatible musicians. The Dixon House Band was initially formed with the group's namesake on keyboards and lead vocals and James Kenfield and Fred Zuefeldt on bass and drums respectively. Both men had previously played with Bighorn - another Seattle group that has gone on to develop close ties with the Canadian recording industry. After finding guitarist Chuck Gardner, Dixon House seemed to exercise the Equal Rights Amendment by bringing in Chrissy Shefts.

The Dixon House Band has to be one of the dark horses of 1970. They seem to come out of the Supertramp school of artistry, and their new disc - Fighting Alone - abounds with the kind of subtle complexities that will make listeners sit up and

listen carefully. Well aware that his group will be playing third on the bill to heavy rock acts like Styx and Blue Oyster Cult, Ted Dixon House indicated that his band will compromise to please a particular audience.

"There's a delicate balance to putting shows together, and you have to learn to adapt. Whatever concert we play, we try and feel the audience out. When you're an opening act, you need to have visual impact because most people aren't there to see you - they're there to see the headliner. When you're playing something like the Texas Jam, you have to exaggerate and almost overstate yourself musically. You just can't come out and do a ballad - you have to play well and blow the customers

When it comes to crowd pleasing, the Dixon House Band will find it quite an asset to have Chrissy Shefts. You can count on the fingers of one hand the number of good women guitar players who are no frills rockers - Shefts is one of them. She spent many years playing the club circuit in Southern California, often jamming with such greats as Jeff Beck. Even though they excell in different fields, Shefts and Nancy Wilson from Heart have discussed the possibility of doing a future guitar project together.

Close connections to Heart will likely play to the advantage of the Dixon House Band. Not only will they have a compatible touring partner, but they will also have at their disposal the multitude of contacts made by Heart, manager Ken Kinnear and producer Mike Flicker. Still, don't expect to find a long list of stellar guest credits on Fighting Alone. Once ensconed in Sea West Studios, the Dixon House crew wanted to do their own album and the only outside help came from Howard Leese.

"I just wanted the music to be us, but of course Howard and I are old friends, and I really wanted him to be on the album. After all, he was the guy who discovered me in the first place!"

THE MUSIC BUSINESS - Career Opportunities and Self Defense by Dick Weissman - Crown Publishing \$6.95

This book is not so much a how-to book as it is a guide to what careers are available in the music industry. The author writes in a general way about what careers there are and what they entail.

It covers the spectrum of careers andmight be considered an excellent primer of the music industry.

Reference pages at the back of the book will lead the reader to a large selection of further reading available on the music industry and this alone is worth the price.

Copyrighted in 1979, the book is already outdated in an industry that experiences so many changes overnight. It lists a Canadian trade publication that has been out of business for over two years, and omits one that has been in business for over 15 years. A few other Canadian references are also incorrect.

Another West Coast success story appears to be looming on the rock music horizon with a highenergy Inifinity promotion for the Vancouverbased Dixon House Band. Edward Dixon House formed his group in 1977 after a short tenure with Songbird. House was quite close to Mushroom producer Mike Flicker and this close association continued over the years until House was ready once again for a recording session. Flicker did the production honours at Seattle's Sea-West Studios and the result was Fighting Alone which established the Dixon House Band as a unique new rock group from the coast. Members include drummer Fred Zeufeldt, dual lead guitarists, Chuck Gardner and Chrissy Shefts, bassman James Kenfield and House on keyboards..

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Umbrella Records - taking over their own distribution

Umbrella Records are changing their act. The company is expanding its marketing focus to encompass more record retailers as well as audio outlets. The label is already established as a top-line producer of audiophile recordings, notably direct-to-disc. Now, in an effort to consolidate and widen their marketing approach in Canada, Umbrella have discontinued their domestic distribution arrangement with Superior Electronics, and are handling their own distribution.

In charge of this entire process is Wendy Shore, who has been involved with the Umbrella people since before the label was started.

The label began a couple of years ago as an offshoot of Nimbus 9 Productions and Soundstage Studios in Toronto. The first product was an album by local rock group Carol Pope & Rough Trade, Canada's first direct-to-disc LP. Like future direct-to-disc releases on Umbrella, the Rough Trade effort utilized the highly esteemed Soundstage recording facility in instantaneous tandem with JAMF, the company's new mastering facility across the street. The set is still a popular buy with audiophiles and the group's fans alike.

Making a name in directto-disc LPs

More direct-to-disc recordings followed an LP by percussion group Nexus, the big band sounds of Rob McConnell & Boss Brass and the Humber College band, and several chamber music albums, including a set from Efram Zimbalist Sr., noted violinist, and his son Efram Jr. (better known as Inspector Erskine on the FBI TV series). Other chamber releases include an LP from the Canadian Brass and two from the Toronto Chamber Orchestra.

The direct-to-disc system is an audiophile recording process whereby rather than taping and mixing all the tracks in the studio, the artists' playing is recorded directly onto a lacquer disc. The advantage of the system is that in bypassing two levels or generations, of magnetic tape, background hiss and other noise normally caused by the tape are avoided, resulting in a disc of such high quality that it is normally sold in audio stores as an accessory to a fine sound system, rather than in record retail outlets.

The disadvantages of the system are that in recording, the artist must do a whole side at a time, in two tracks, without any stops, overdubs or mistakes. Furthermore, since there is only one master lacquer and no tape to make another from, the total pressing is limited to the number of discs that can be manufactured from one master. One top of that, if anything goes wrong with the recording, lacquer or metal master, the entire project is wasted.

The birth of Generation 1

It was of just such an adversity that Umbrella's latest release was born. The company had recorded another two-record.

set from the Boss Brass (their first Umbrella set had earned a Juno Award in Canada and a Grammy nomination in the U.S.). Titled Again!, the album was lacquered and then shipped off to the plant for matrixing. But when the metal parts were examined, it was discovered that the sound quality was way below standards (standards are very high for a set that will sell from \$20-30). Sick at heart, Umbrella had to scrap the project.

However, when the recording was made at JAMF, a two-track 'first generation' safety tape was recorded at Soundstage. After a period of consideration, Umbrella decided the album was simply too good not to release. And so a new process, Generation 1, was born.

Wendy Shore explains, "Because we did lose one generation, and because Umbrella Records is an audiophile label, in order to keep our standards up, we decided to do everything that we could to keep the quality as high as possible."

In Generation I, the sound differs from direct-to-disc only in that there is one generation of magnetic tape between the studio and the lacquer. The recording is totally live off the floor, with no pauses or overdubs, in two tracks - left and right. Umbrella took the tapes and moved to do everything in their power to regain the slight loss in sound quality. Rather than lacquering at JAMF, itself a top-rate facility, they took the tapes to Los Angeles and remastered them at the JVC Cutting Center. JVC, already one of the world's top lacquering facilities, have a few new features Umbrella took advantage of. The tapes were mastered at half speed, enabling the stylus to cut a smoother, stronger path through the grooves. Also in use was a new, special and as yet rare diamond cutting stylus just recently developed in Japan.

Umbrella then took the lacquers across town to the world-renowned Sheffield Labs for matrixing - plating the lacquers and producing a metal negative. The Sheffield Labs people, in fact, are true audiophile pioneers and the originators of modern direct-to-disc. As a last step in ensuring sound quality, Umbrella pressed the album on a special new antistatic, low noise and low-wearing vinyl, giving the buyer long and faithful reproduction. And to further enhance its marketability to big band fans and audiophiles alike, the jacket contains very thorough notes about both the album cuts and the Generation 1 process.

Selling good music to the general public

Of course, Umbrella are selling more than just audiophile discs. "We're careful to choose good content, good music," notes Shore. "We don't want to sell on the audiophile quality alone. We want a good program of music, played by excellent musicians and recorded in an excellent way."

Shore's function with Umbrella keeps her very busy indeed. As the label's distributor, she is responsible in Canada for taking and filling all orders. She is also in charge of the entire marketing campaign, including press, radio promotion, and any merchandising moves the company might launch. And she is in constant touch with Audio Technica, the label's U.S. distributor in Fairlawn, Ohio, as well as around the world distributors in Australia, England (for E.E.C. countries), Mauritius and even behind the Iron Curtain.

Umbrella Records have been popular around the world. Much of the North American product is pressed right in Toronto and shipped throughout the continent. Most of the international product is pressed in Germany by Teldec, although no final decision has been made on the new McConnell LP, Experimentation is an advantage that belongs to the independent label. Shore points out, "We've changed procedure on almost every single record. But we haven't had any problems. In fact, we've been really lucky as far as having albums returned or having any problems at all." That's important, because you can't re-do a run of direct-to-disc albums.

Since the label has taken over its own distribution, Shore and Umbrella have had to learn the ropes of marketing basically from scratch. Shore will be paying more attention to the standard record retailer, in addition to the audio stores, than Umprella had done in the past.

There is one big advantage to handling their own distribution. By eliminating the middleman, Umbrella have been able to pull their prices down to a level many of their customer's can't believe. The McConnell set, for instance, a double album lists at \$19.98, the former asking price of Umbrella's single records. The publicity and promotion, the prices, and of course, the quality of the product, are all paying off. Orders are coming in hot and heavy, and business is booming at Umbrella Records.

Busy fall schedule for Berandol's Wiz Bryant

Berandol recording artist Wiz Bryant is preparing to enter into the fall season with a full slate of work, a new marketing thrust on his debut album and a number of television appearances.

Bryant, a B.C. native currently living in Toronto, is on release with an album, Ballads Of Canada. The album is a very unusual folk blend of almost totally original material, songs Bryant has written and performs about Canadian wildlife, history and legends. The album has achieved notices throughout the country, and has attracted numerous live performance engagements in schools, parks and folk clubs. Among them have been a series of summer school shows for children in Toronto and a number of concert tours for Ontario Parks & Recreation in Sudbury and Kingston. Bryant has also been performing regularly at the Canadian National Exhibition as part of a program called Ethnic Entertainment. He has appeared every night of the CNE but three, outside the Better Living building at 7:30. During the last two nights of the Ex (Sept. 2-3), he will do the entire show, with sets at 7 and 8 pm. Bryant has written a theme song for the Exhibition, appropriately titled The CNE Song. It's being considered for commercial use by the CNE in future. The artist will be singing the song at a number of Exhibition functions as a sort of unofficial CNE ambassador.

Television will be a major part of Bryant's exposure over the next few months. He appeared on CHCH Hamilton's Midday August 15, and he has completed filming a CBC network special for national broadcast in the fall. Titled Supershow, the special is in honour of the international year of the child, and Bryant is featured as host and performer. Bryant has also cowritten, along with Mike Sylvanie, a pilot for a TV series. If accepted by a network, the show will feature Bryant and two young friends travelling throughout Canada, making music and showing the various parts of the country to Canadians. The tentative title is That's In Canada Too, and Bryant reports favourable response from a number of Canadian networks.

On the recording side, Berandol first released Ballads Of Canada in March, but with a limited release consisting of a few units and a partial radio mailing. The company is readying a major distribution and marketing campaign around the beginning of September, leading into the heavy fall and Christmas season. The label is hoping Bryant's increased TV and tour exposure will generate solid sales on the album. Berandol have also issued a debut single, Bluenose/The Gift Of Peace, which is currently being played on over 100 stations coast to coast and across the format board in Canada.

Bryant's main endeavour is to make Canadians aware of their country and its heritage, and in a manner they will find palatable and enjoyable. To support the album, Bryant is scheduling a series of tours throughout the country (he has songs for just about all parts and constantly studies to improve his knowledge of Canada). He

will begin in the Maritimes and work his way west to B.C., performing for schools, in clubs and at festivals, meeting with radio station people wherever he goes. He

is hoping to establish his own name (Wiz is short for Wizner, his real name) and to entertain and teach Canadians about Canada in the process.

McKinnon & Harron firmed to celebrate RYH's 50th Anniversary

Canada's Sunshine Girl, Catherine McKinnon and her husband Don Harron have been firmed for the Royal York Hotel's plush Imperial Room, the week of October 15 through the 20th. The date is of particularly significance as it also marks the 50th Anniversary of the grand old lady of Canadian hotels.

The Imperial Room date is the first joint nightclub engagement for the couple who have just completed their first dramatic pairing in Same Time Next Year.

Catherine was one of Canada's first Maritimers to command national status in the record industry, much of it through her 1964 album release of Voice Of An Angel. She has since moved into the very lucrative commercial field where she is probably best known for her orange juice commercials. She also won a CLEO Award, a top North American prize, for her Come To Ireland commercial.

Don Harron is currently in his third season as host of CBC Radio's Morning-side and is one of the successful regulars on the U.S. syndicated Hee Haw TVer.





JBL issues Cabaret club sound portable systems

The California-based James B. Lansing Sound company has announced the introduction on the market of the new Cabaret Series, three pieces developed for club sound reinforcement. The series consists of the model 4602 Stage Monitor, the 4622 Lead Instrument System and the 4680 Line Array. All three pieces provide flushmounted road handles and are built with JBL's K Series musical instrument speakers, providing accuracy, efficiency and power handling capability.



The 4602 monitor offers wide frequency response of 50Hz-15kHz. It can be placed in an upright position or tilted at 30 or 60 degrees to the floor. The sound is provided by the K-120 12" speaker, 2402 high frequency ring radiator and a specially designed crossover network. The 4602 handles up to 100 watts continuous sine wave power.

The 4622 Lead Instrument System uses two K-120's in an enclosure engineered for distortion-free power-handling (up to 200 watts continuous sine wave) with clarity characteristic of the K series. It is suitable for lead guitar and keyboards.

The 4680 Line Array includes four teninch K-110's and a 2902 High Frequency Power Pack for clean, crisp reproduction between 55Hz and 15kHz. The system is basically a JBL Professional Series 4682 Line Array housed in a Cabaret Series enclosure. Like the other two pieces in the system, it is designed with road toughness in mind and built with protection for the drivers and grilles.

Toronto traffic reporters from radio stations CKEY and CFRB were issuing reports of a massive snarl in rush hour traffic around the Avenue/Chaplin area. The

total gas bill of the stunt came to \$1,056.81 which was paid by CFTR to Imperial Oil at regular cost per gallon; however, the overwhelming response and media coverage more than made up for that expense.



DISCO HYPE by Vince DeGiorgio

Many import disco discs have found their way into the shops, the most talked about on Carrere Records of France, The two discs are equally different, but both are double side smashes. The most talked about is by a group called Discotheque, who have Intro Disco on the A side and that's exactly what it is. There are intros of hits like Shake Your Body by the Jacksons among others, and the disc does not get boring at all. The surprise of course is the B side, called Disco Special, and it is identical to Herb Alpert's Rise, Reported this week by Disco Charly's Anthony Mancini, it does have a tinge of European flavour to it, but still does not lose any of its quality. Very, very hot.

The other disco disc is by a group called Ladies Choice. Again both sides are excellent, Last Train, has a great stringhook as it rapidly moves with excellent hornwork in the background. Styled very much the same as Peter Jacques Band's Walking On Music. this is sure to be a prime time smash hit. The B side Sailor Boy, is a synthesizer altered track that also features a strong horn section and good bass drive. The break is very unusual, also included is a marching band sound, sounding somewhat like the J. Geils Band. This surely will find its way into the discos and is among the best imports to be heard in quite some time. Also, via Fifi Records Italy, is Roxy Robinson's Out Of My Life (6:20), which has seen some play in Toronto. Very Euro-disco styled, Roxy supplies a strong vocal here atop a ripping synthesizer which carries the track. Guitar work is very good and it dominates the break, as a sweet vocal blend floats on top. Great follow-up to her LP of last year.

Liquid Gold, the four member group from England whose My Baby's Baby scored very heavily in the clubs worldwide. have returned with their premiere LP on Parachute Records, distributed by Casablanca. Included in the LP is their forementioned hit, plus three other cuts that could find some success as well. The strongest of the three, is a disco version of Doris Day's Secret Love. As in My Baby's Baby, lead vocalist Billie Hope carries the track, with the help of a sweeping orchestral background as it enters the refrain and good bass-electronic teamings throughout. Although spots in the production are weak, Hope's vocal is outstanding here. Two others, Mr. Groovy is very rocky, with a bass that is kind of funky and because of its difference in sound has a chance at being a sleeper, and Anyway You Wanna Do It, sounds very underground, and could use a re-mix to give it a new life.

Also on the Parachute label is the muchanticipated release of the West Side Strutters LP, which has an LP of George Gershwin's classics done in a disco format.

Besides the standards of Rhapsody In Blue and I Got Rhythm, the eleven minute medley of The Man I Love & Embraceable

Sutton Place opens rooftop Stop 33 disco

On September the 11th, Sutton Place will officially open their new restaurant, bar and disco on the top floor of their 33 storey hotel in downtown Toronto.

The club is now open for business but the official opening will not be until September.

A visit to the club indicated there has been extensive renovations and the atmosphere and decor have upgraded the bar restaurant into a plush but easy-going disco that seems to attract all ages. Some

dance, some watch.

One innovation worthy of mention is the DJ booth which is hidden behind one way glass above the dance floor and behind a neon display. From this booth spinner John Webber has a good view of the dancers and his lighting effects.

At the door, genial host John Ferreira looks after finding tables for the many customers who have the advantage of a wall to wall panarama of the city, available on three sides of the disco.

You is perhaps the strongest cut on the LP. Very impressed here by the vocal show by Sue Raney, and a stunning chordshow on the piano. Raney's tone is backed by a very good hornline, taking Tuxedo Junction one step further. The bass and guitar are very well played in Embraceable You, which has a very hot intro and a good break. Production here is superb, so if you still love Greshwin, this is definitely a welcome addition.

There is never a better way to describe Boris Midney's LP's than classic. In his first Warner/RFC LP, Midney has brought further concepts in his production of the concept group Caress. In his usual style, Midney uses an awesome orchestra to highlight the vocals, their movement throughout the production and his own stalwart keyboard playing. The LP is comprised of two side-long medleys the stronger of the two being You Got It Up Too Tight/Love Spell. Running 13:42, the second half of the medley is supremely strong, there is a much involved sound with a female lead vocal that is echoed vibrantly while Midney's stringhook array fills the gap in the production. An electronically-dipped percussion break is used here, while the beautifully melodic chorus does its job up front.

The instrumentation as in all of Midney's production does tend to drift, as well in Catch The Rhythm which has an interesting note to it: Midney for the first time one can remember, lets the instrumentation groove, and is almost laidback, but still words equally as well in this medley which is about sixteen minutes long. There is supposed to be a disco edit done for disco DJ's on this cut as well.

Future product

Here is a short list of upcoming product that should be out in the next week or so. Grace Jones' new LP Muse, excellent in its entirety, includes her hit On Your Knees, Casablanca will have a new Pattie Brooks 12", Giorgio Moroder's digitally recorded E=MC2 LP an excellent concept LP by Lightning, produced by Howard Merritt (Merritt was responsible for the re-mix of Ultimate), Freddie James' premiere LP on Unidisc which features a cut called Hollywood that's quite good, produced by Tony Green, also on Unidisc The Break by Dat Mandu, is called the return of the instrumental, Midson has Charlie Cellelo's LP coming, Cory Daye's much talked about LP, which features Green Light, Bruni

Pagan's debut Elektra LP, AKB produced by Kurt Bouscewicz, the man responsible for Hot Shot, with Stand Up, Sit Down. Tony Green's own U.N. LP coming for T.G.O. Records. Attic has three hot discodiscs on the way, among them are Hello's Feel This Thing, Australia by Good News and Jesse Towers' Give Me Your Body While We're Dancing (turning out to be a smash hit in Toronto). GRT is expected to have the new Kathi Baker LP & 12" ready, Fa Fa Lais featured on this Deco LP, mixed by Doug Riddick. Three new Butterfly LP's from Destination, Bob McGilpin & Tuxedo Junction. CBS will have a new Martin Stevens' 12", Ritz LP, Greg Diamond's Starcruiser 12", Mercury has a very hot Robin Beck 12" coming, produced by Kenny Lehman (Chic's Ist LP, Lemon) and the return of Kool & The Gang with Ladies Night to be among the featured cuts on the LP on DeLite. Watch for Busta Jones on Polydor, produced by Gino Soccio and a brand new re-mix of Fever by Roy Ayers, which was totally re-mixed by Doug Riddick. More to come!

They are back, wow are they back

Cerrone's fifth Atlantic/Malligator LP titled "Angelina" is perhaps the continuation of his progression of not only an artist, but perhaps as a writer-arranger. Many different steps have been taken in the preparing stages of the LP: initially, it's the first time the Franco-Italian has recorded outside Trident Studios in England, and uses mostly American musicians. Perhaps through these changes, he has again changed his direction, which began with the release of Rock Me, his disco disc hit, released last month.

Besides the forementioned offering, there are three totally different styles he has used here: Not Too Shabby (5:01), is laidback, and has hints of almost everything in it, and really starts going swiftly after the breaks. Living On Love, has been recorded here by Cerrone using a different title (the original was titled Living It Up. recorded by the Cerrone produced Revelacion that was never available domestically) and has been totally re-worked, using a different rhythm arrangement and Georges Rodi's effectiveness on synthesizers. Paulino Da Costa has also joined Cerrone on percussion, but the real surprise is Call Me Tonight and eight minute future "classic untouchable" that starts off slowly, like a continuation from Alec R Costandinos' Sumeria LP. then zips into a synthesizer track that bubbles into an intro, which is captured

by guest vocalist Michelle Aller. Miss Aller, who is well known for her writing abilities with partner Bob Esty (they penned Cher's Take Me Home), shows that she also carry a note. Splendid production here, Greg Matheison's piano work is supreme as is the choral background supplied by two of the best in Kay Garner & Sue Glover. This cut is sure to be compared with Jean-Marc Cerrone's earlier works: the man always has one track on each album that leaves you breathless and he has indeed done it again.

From the graphics on the outside of each album jacket, one never knows what to expect from the incomprable Grace Jones. Combined with the vocal talents she has now attained, producer Tom Moulton has her sounding better than ever in her latest album titled Muse. Released in Canada. on Island Records, Jones captures the ear with her "hell to heaven" medley featured on side one. Shinning, the opening stanza, the highlight cut in Suffer, where arranger Thor Baldursson makes his vocal debut with Grace, in a panful duet; Baldursson makes the title stand giving Jones a number of electronic whipslashes, Repentance (Forgive Me), has the lady giving up to start a new, and like all of her product, she sings a Robinson-Bolden-Robinson composition in Saved (the forementioned writers penned Do Or Die), which takes a number of drastic progressions in the process. It speeds up very quickly and rides into a gospel style melody (Dorothy Morrison, are you still there?) that floats into a great break to finish the first side

Not in any way to be considered a disc that doesn't have content, the B side has four excellent tracks, featured is On Your Knees, currently enjoying success in disco disc form and three other cuts, among those is Atlantic City Gambler and I'll Find My Way To You. Mixed by Tom Moulton, this indeed has no soft spots, all cuts playable, but proving perhaps that time is the right ingredient for masterful work like the forementioned.

Casablanca Records have released Giorgio Moroder's fourth LP, suitably titled E=MC2. Using the patents that have not only copped him an academy award in his score for Midnight Express and made superstars out of Donna Summer and the Munich Machine, Moroder has turned in a stellar performance using not only his electronic wizardry on synthesizer, but perhaps setting a precedent by recording the album digitally, giving the reproduction a more genuine sound.

The LP itself, features six cuts, three of which comprise a medley on the first side. Baby Blue (4:53), which features the "mystery voice", vocoded electronically, and a well blended chorus of Moroder's own falsetto vocals, blended with Chris Bennett and others. As always the harmonies are stunning, standing strong atop of the synthesizer bottom below. What A Night (4:55) and If You Weren't Afraid (5:16) complete the medley in an excellent fashion, the latter of the two cuts sees Giorgio at his best with his synthesizers. The second side features two playable cuts: I Wanna Rock You is the strongest cut, using a funky bass drive

Is There More To Life Than Dancing - Virgin V2126-Q

Noel, at first glance, adorns a rather new wavish looking cover with song titles like Dancing Is Dangerous and Is There More To Life Than Dancing; but a venture on to the surface of the LP reveals otherwise. True, the tracks might seem tedious at first and take some time to develop, but what lies within is curiously captivating and warrants a good objective listen. Vocals are woven well towards the end of the title track and provide the initiative for an effective mix. Produced and written by Ron and Russell Mael for Sparks Productions with engineering by Bob Stone.

MIGHTY POPE

Sway - Quality SV-2023-M

It's no surprise to see many of Canada's best come together to produce this long awaited effort by the Mighty Pope. They include names like producers John Driscoll, Robert Ouimet and Gino Soccio, vocalists Heather Gauthier and Laurie Niedzielzki, and a host of other notables. Unfortunately, as in many such cases, the glamour is limited by too many cooks in the disco kitchen, often overlooking the dexterity of Pope's voice in favour of a cozy blanket of technical wizardry. Because Of The Night and Sweet Blindness come the closest to achieving the mighty part of the Mighty Pope.

ETHEL MERMAN

The Ethel Merman Disco Album - A&M SP-4775-W

Ethel Merman - "The heart and soul of the American Musical Theatre" is back. Her glee-ful character remains untarnished and the acknowledgements on the back cover by Peter Matz and Paul Jabara speak for themselves. Production as well as vocal and orchestral arrangements by Peter Matz are first class, capturing and retaining the flavour of an era that saw hits like There's No Business Like Showbusiness, Everythings Coming Up Roses and I've Got Rhythm become global successes. The LP will no doubt become somewhat of a novelty item on the dance floor and should find a home among many generations.

along with Moroder's vocoder supplying the vocals and E=MC2, which not only gives the album un-mentioned credits, but completes his latest album that will surely have him remain with the unprecedented billing as disco's finest artist/producer.

Tuxédo Junction, the concept group that last year had dance floors screaming worldwide with the stirring rendition of yester year classics done disco-style like Chattanooga Choo Choo and Moonlight Seranada, have returned with their second Butterfly Records album titled Take The 'A' Train. In their new compilation of big band era classics, producers Laurin Rinder and W. Michael Lewis have given rebirth

to such tunes as Cole Porter's Begin The Beguine, Duke Ellington's Take The 'A' Train and That Old Black Magic, done in classic fashion back then by Billy Daniels. As in the first album, the horn work is surperb, and the vocal lines very strong, especially in That Old Black Magic and the album's finest cut is title track, where the vocals are great. To close off the second album, the group has delvered a rendition of Hoagy Carmichael's Stardust, slowing down the pace as they did with I Didn't Know About You on their last album. With the number of oldies being re-done, Tuxedo Junction captured the ear and enlightened the nostalgia again with another fine project.

Food for thought for this year's Big Country seminar

The Big Country Weekend is almost upon us and perhaps we should weigh the value of such a weekend. For years we have been listening to the complainers who, by the way, attend each year, ripping the seminars apart, suggesting that they hear the same thing year after year. They're right, to a

point. We do seem to get embroiled over silly little matters that just takes away from the real value of the seminars.

It might not be a bad idea to come to Big Country this year and be prepared to take part, particularly in the seminars. Some of the questions you have been asking each other could be levelled at the experts who are sitting on the panels. If you've got questions you would like to ask about the retail market, who could be better suited to answer than Jeffy Wipf, of A.R.S., John Ford of RCA, David Redgers of Mister Sound/Sherman's, or Johnny Murphy, who heads up his own J. Murphy Enterprise firm. What's going on at the radio station level? You must have a question or two to ask of CKLW-FM's Johanna Solima, Peter Grant of CHMM-FM Winnipeg, or Charlie Russell of CJCJ. What's your record company not doing for you? What bigger role could they play in promoting your product? Here's your opportunity to have some of the problems of the record industry answered for you by R. Harlan Smith of Royalty, RCA's Barry Haugen, Bob Johnson of Change Records or Cachet's Ed LaBuick.

Big Country only happens once a year and you should take that opportunity to ask as many questions as possible. Your question could spark a solution to a major problem.

What about the public? Is the consumer really being considered when it comes to record releases? One of the reasons for the Big Country Music Week, to precede the RPM Big Country Weekend was to show the country industry off to the public with proclamations of Country Music Week by the local Mayor, much

more country entertainment in surrounding clubs and a heavy concentration of Cancon country music on area radio stations. It worked very well with Ron Sparling's Host Committee in Ottawa and again with Fred King's Host Committee in Regina. A very aggressive effort by the Mississauga Host Committee under Bob Cousins indicates that this year's Canadian Country Music week will also be successful. There's a great deal of interest by the public in country music. An example of this interest was recently expressed in a letter from an Ottawa reader, who will remain unnamed, because we don't have permission to use his name. He writes: "I agree with and support the idea of buying Canadian music wherever possible. We have a lot of really good talent in Canada, equal to the best from other countries. But, mainly in the country music area, it has been extremely difficult and often impossible to find country music in the stores. Some songs are available only on an album (I'm suspicious of albums with one good song and lots of filler) and some songs are not available at all - this includes Canadian artists in their own country." He continues with "If I hear a song on the radio, I think that record should be available in the stores. It is the responsibility of the record companies and the retailers, working together, to make sure that this is the case. I shouldn't have to dig all over and write letters to find the music that I like, Country music is hard to find here in Ottawa, However, I should note that most rock and roll records are available on a single or album."

Our reader was interested in contacts for Royalty Records. "I have never seen anything on a single from Royalty except Hold On To My Heart by Chris Nielsen and R Harlan Smith. He was also interested in a single by Gail Davies, thought to be a Canadian releasing on the Lifesong label. She apparently has an album released but no single and our reader, as he explained above, is suspicious of albums without singles. Other product he can't find that have appeared on the RPM Country 75 include Johnny Burke and Eastwind's Wild Honey and Ronnie Kartman's Lady and Honest Love. Apparently the local radio station - and that must be CKBY-FM - is doing its part in playing these Cancon releases but the record stores won't stock the records. Not that this is a problem unique to Ottawa, most radio stations are programming much more than their required 30% Cancon (some as high as 45%) but the problem exists at the retail level

Which brings up another point. Is it conceivable that if a group of independents got together to form their own coast to coast distribution network, would it work?

It must be kept in mind that it costs money to press records. It costs more money to mail these records to radio stations and to ship them to record stores. It should also be pointed out that Cancon country productions far outnumber rock and adult-oriented releases. One country

recording artist was once quoted as saying, "I don't care what the record sounds like. I just want to be known as a recording artist." Apparently having a record release helps on the bar circuit - but it sure as hell does nothing for the image of the record industry. Sure, the promotion sounds very important and showbizzy - Club Blanko proudly presents Noxious recording group. Big Blast and Little Wiff, Why :hey might even sell a few records during the show. but what does it really do for country music? How do we remove the krud from the well-produced and well-intended record releases? A few questions we might want answered at Big Country.







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CHARTOLOGY TRACES CANCON HISTORY HIT BY HIT FOR OVER A DECADE

Although the telephone directory isn't the greatest reading, we find that we can't be without it. In any reference that shows the names and numbers and figures, the story line is missing, but to many the story is told by what happened and who made it happen and the plot unfolds over the years.

In this chartology, Brendan Lyttle shows the history of those early days and names the artists who gallantly tried to cut hits in Canada. Often they did succeed on a regional scale or a national scale, and some even succeeded on an international scale.

It's all here. The names, the figures, the dates. If you follow the story line, it will lead you through the shabby three-track studios and the copy-versions of foreign hits, to the first poorly equipped four-track studio and eventually the 30% CRTC AM radio ruling that lead to Canada's superstars and the luxury of 24 and 32-track studios, the finest in the world.

The cast of characters reads like the who's who of Cancon. The plot thickens as some artists expatriate. The mystery of many artists' nationality. Are they Canadian? Is it Cancon? Explore the mysteries of the MAPL logo and find out about the CRTC regulation designed to solve the problem.

International intrigue enters the picture as some artists score with international chart listings and you'll hang in suspense as you watch a single climb to number one on Bill-board and wonder if it will get a bullet.

This study is like a vault of Canadian gold, platinum and chrome and tarnished silverplated stampers. Many of the records listed are collector's items while others are hits again on television promoted composites.

We wish we could list every composer of every song and every producer of every master and every manager, promoter and roadie who built this history of Cancon, but the research contained here was vast and only the dollars from the CRTC Research Directorate could make such a project possible, and the work of someone like Brendan Lyttle to bring it into being.

It doesn't end here. Today, the industry has a great deal of glamour and the new faces doen't really remember that it had a lack lustre beginning and some of them don't care. Fore those who do care, this is a history book and an adventure that some of us were lucky enough to live through.

In the words of Pierre Juneau, "The prophets of doom, the messengers of mediocrity, will be overwhelmed by the new generation of competent, creative, confident artisans and by all those of preceding generations who have already demonstrated their freshness of mind, their talent and their capacity for inspired leadership."

That says it all.
