

Chater heads CMPA for 2nd year

Toronto: Brian Chater of the Avenue Road Music Group, has been elected President of the Canadian Music Publishers' Association (CMPA) for 1984, marking his second consecutive year in that position.

Also elected were Chappell Music Canada's Jerry Renewych to the post of Vice President and Peer Southern Canada's Greg Hambleton who takes on the duties of Treasurer. John Bird of Gordon V. Thompson, morning Music's Mark Altman and ATV Music's Frank Davies were elected as Officers of the organization.

In accepting his appointment Mr. Chater made known his regrets that the Canadian government wouldn't have sufficient time to pass a new Copyright Act before the next federal election. However, he stressed that he was pleased that the government "had done a great deal of work on a substantial number of underlying policy matters, and were preparing to act shortly."

Mr. Chater also noted that "Government appeared to have a more complete grasp than at any time previously of the problems faced by composers, authors and publishers

Toronto's Lee Aaron signed to Attic label

Toronto: Attic Records reports the signing of local Toronto heavy metal queen Lee Aaron, who previously released on the Freedom label.

Initial album release, Metal Queen, scheduled for a late February release, was produced by Paul Gross, who has worked with Saga and The Tenants.

Shake It Up has been taken as the first single and will be released prior to the album. A video is also in the works.

Attic notes that Aaron is the first Canadian rock artist to release a concept video package for the home consumer market. The Belleville-born Aaron recently made international inroads with her appearance at the Reading Festival in England. While in the U.K. she also performed at the legendary Marquee Club in London.

Aaron, who has acquired an image of a sex symbol through a feature on her in Oui Magazine, has also attracted attention in Japan, France, Holland and Germany.

Pump Boys & Dinettes continues long run

Toronto: The Toronto production of Pump Boys & Dinettes continues its indefinite run at the Variety Dinner Theatre. The show opened Oct. 6 last year and now enters its 4th month averaging 70% houses with the dinner theatre grossing half a million dollars to date.

Tom Gallant has left the show, reportedly to return to his schooner in the caribbean where he will continue work on his novel. Replacing Gallant in the lead is Robert Maciag, regarded as "one of the most in-demand commercial jingle singers and performers in Toronto." His face and voice have become an important part of the success of Labatt's Lite, Molson, Nescafe, IGA, Eaton's, Canon, Christie and the mystery man on the Maria Christina Wine commercials. He has also made an impression on the record industry with an album that he recorded with Jackie Rae and Doug Riley plus a single produced by Rich Dodson.

A major plus for Pump Boys & Dinettes and a personal triumph for marketing consultant Terry McGee, is the monies raised for Toronto's Children's Hospital. McGee coupled CBS Records and CKFM with his project to raise money for the hospital and has, to date, generated more than \$10,000.00 in donations and hopes to raise another \$5,000. by St. Valentine's Day.

Death of Clyde Moon double tragedy for PRO

Montreal: Mr. T. Clyde Moon, passed away in Montreal (Feb. 3) after a brief illness. Mr. Moon was 73 at the time of his death, a double tragedy for the Performing Rights Organization which had only a month ago (Jan. 5) mourned the death of Mr. Moon's brother Harold.

Mr. Clyde Moon joined BMI Canada, now PRO Canada, in 1948, a year after the organization was activated in Canada and became a leading force in the advancement of French-language copyrights. He guided the French-language division until his retirement in 1975. He was also in charge of PRO Canada's licensing division across Canada.

Ironically, Clyde, who was a year and a half younger than Harold, retired from PRO Canada, only one year after the elder Moon had retired.

Funeral services for Mr. Moon were held in Montreal (Feb. 6) with interment at Dalhouse, New Brunswick. He leaves his wife Helena.

Toronto man guilty in counterfeit scam

Toronto: Following a lengthy trial in York Country Court before Judge Hoilet, a Toronto man has been found guilty for manufacturing and distributing counterfeit records. Paul Falerio has been fined \$3,500 and placed on probation for 18 months.

Falerio was found guilty of one count of criminal fraud under the provisions of the Criminal Code.

The charge was laid in 1982, following a joint investigation by CRIA and the Metropolitan Toronto Police Department. Found during the investigation were approximately five tons of records and related manufacturing equipment, including recordings by Rod Stewart.

A more subtle MIDEM adds to indie stature

Cannes, France: This year's Canadian delegation to MIDEM was up slightly over last year. There were apparently several indie label owners, publishers and producers who opted to go on their own rather than be part of the CIRPA/ADISQ contingent, and the attitude, for the most part, was positive.

Although some deals were made on the spot, those involved preferred to allow a little breathing space before making any firm announcements.

Steve Thomson, President of Backstage Productions however, was quite elated over his particular dealings, noting, "As a result of this year's MIDEM I have made tremendous steps forward in establishing Backstage and our artist's roster on an international level." Thomson continues with "Ronnie Hawkins, Backstage Productions' most established artist, will now be available in the U.K. on both disc and video through the Magnum Music Group, one of the U.K.'s leading independents." He went on to point up that "The future looks good for Hawkins in Germany, the Benelux countries and Scandinavia. Furthermore, on seeing the new live video, the Polish delegation has offered licensing and touring to Hawkins."

Thomson also scored success with other Backstage acts including Reckless, already established in the European market, and is now firm for licensing throughout Europe. Says Thomson, "It was also the year for development of 2nd generation rock 'n roller, Robin Hawkins, the Hawk's youngest son. There was a great deal of enthusiasm and interest in this new recording act."

There is also more remodelling slated for the Palais, which still doesn't sit too well with exhibitors and registrants. However, it's obvious that Bernard Chevry, Commissaire General of MIDEM, is quite concerned with the complaints and is making moves to correct any difficulties.

The MIDEM people were more than a little concerned over music people who had not registered and who were collaring registrants in hotel bars, to make their pitch. One observer noted, "Sure people are making deals in bars and hotel lobbies. There's only so much time in a day and you take advantage of everything available. People have been contacting each other this way for years and all of them, to my knowledge, have been registered. You'll always get a few outsiders who want to take advantage of the gathering but you'll find that anywhere you have a large get-together of entertainment people."

Perhaps the greatest interest at MIDEM this year was in video. Exhibitors that weren't equipped with music video clips of their acts were being passed up for those that did. As well, new video juke boxes were being hustled this year and MTV U.S. was represented by several of their New York people. Samples of MTV's programming were displayed on several monitors conveniently placed throughout the Palais.

French television has become quite interested in video music clips, particularly evident through local and Monte Carlo TV stations where they were using U.S. and British music videos as fillers. The same situation was noticed in Paris where they were using more of their own locally-produced videos, along with those by Michael Jackson, Culture Club and others.

Malcolm Silver, a consultant for Canadian video, attended this year's MIDEM and he was quite impressed with the video strength.

"I was quite surprised at the obvious importance of video at MIDEM," commented Silver. "I was able to make several contacts that will be worked on through the coming year."

So much emphasis was placed on the importance of video that sources close to Chevry's office indicated that there may be a coupling of MIDEM and VIDCOM in the not too distant future.

Another Canadian independent who was experiencing first time success was Toronto Chiropractor, Dr. Allan G. Oolo, known in Toronto music circles as Dr. O.. Armed with a highly professional promotion package and demo, he found it difficult to keep up with the number of appointments made by interested parties. His MIDEM aggressiveness paid off with further appointments in London, before his return to Canada.

Solid Gold's Neill Dixon, who was undecided until the last couple of days, about going to MIDEM, scored solid signings in

More details on these and other signings as the MIDEM delegates return to Canada. Many had arranged side trips to major European countries.


Amid the hectic wheelings and dealings of publishers and songwriters, which MIDEM is all about, were a couple of unwarranted instances that upset several in the Canadian contingent and both were government sponsored. Two receptions had apparently been arranged by Canadian government officials but several of the attending Canadians had not been invited. One in particular, hosted by Consul General Richard Mc-Kinnon, drew the most fire from those who were not invited. CIRPA's Mary Quartarone and Donna Murphy did their best to come up with invitations, which satisfied some but angered others the next day when they found out about the reception. Noted one observer: "I paid the full amount to come over here - I didn't receive any grant from the government, which may have been a prerequisite for getting an invitation. I'm damned mad that I wasn't included on the invitation list." McKinnon was asked about the situation and the fact that the invitations appeared to be in French only. It was his belief that the invitations were in both English and French and that all visiting Canadians had been contacted. He was appalled to discover that many of those attending the reception were, in fact, not Canadian and, on the spot, appointed Madeleine Castelluccio, of the Consulate General of Canada's office in Marseille, to look into the matter. The second reception was so badly arranged and publicized and, again overlooked many Canadians, that only a handful of delegates were in attendance.

Taking into consideration the main objective of MIDEM however, there were more positives than negatives and the coming year will reveal many of these positives.

The final tally for this year wasn't too much off last year. Overall there were 7,271 registrants for MIDEM '84, up slightly from last year. W.G.

A&M imports special AOR Police disc

Toronto: A&M Records Canada has imported a U.S. special four-track 12" EP by The Police. The disc is for radio stations only.

Doug Chappell, Vice President Promotion for A&M, told RPM "It's a good saleable record. Right now it's only for radio. We imported a limited number from the States, and they've been sent to AOR stations and select AM stations. We're just checking to see if we can release here for sale."

The disc contains the trio's current hit, Wrapped Around Your Finger, a live version of the track, which has never been released, as well as a never before released track. One To Talk To.

The fourth track, Murder By Numbers was the flip of Every Breath You Take and was included on the cassette but not on the album. The single became RPM's Top song of 1983.

Meanwhile, the Synchronicity album has surpassed eight times platinum (800,000) in Canada and is heading for Diamond status, boosted by the new single, the fourth from the album. the first person you meet when you walk through the doors is Brian and a wall, plastered with photos of more Brian - and his celebrities. They tell me the food is pretty good as well.

It seems logical that any programmer can predict that the CRTC will have to re-evaluate the ruling and either drop it as unworkable or increase the percentage or the number of parts Cancon. So the discussion turned to getting rid of the ruling because the artists, songwriters, producers and studios now exist and free enterprise would fulfill the needs of programmers. The answer was NEVER!

Controversy mounting over video violence

Toronto: A major battle appears to be warming up in Southern Ontario over recent rock video releases that critics charge contain scenes of sex and/or violence and which may be influencing viewers.

One of the attacks against the videos began when Paul Culver, supervising crown attorney at courts in Toronto's Old City Hall, reported that increased violence by young people may be linked to violence in rock music videos.

In once case before the courts, he said a teenage described a sequence in a rock video while telling police how he planned a murder.

Culver said the number of violent crimes may not have increased, but that the level of violence has.

"Not only do they grab a purse from an old lady, they'll put the boots to her while she's on the ground," he said. "When they see rock stars engaging in violence, it will have more of an effect than a Clint East-

Jack Green single coincides with tour

Toronto: British guitarist/songwriter, Jack Green, former member of T.Rex and The Pretty Things, has scheduled his new Canadian tour to coincide with the release of his latest single, I Really Love Your Money. The single was taken from Green's Mystique album.

Tour dates include: Toronto (Feb. 15), Winnipeg (17), Edmonton (19), Regina (21), Saskatoon (22), Lethbridge (24), Calgary (25), Vancouver (27), Red Deer (29) and Strathmore (March 2).

In a recent interview with RPM, Green noted, "My biggest following is definitely in Canada, particularly in the mid-West. To tell you the truth, I don't know why, but I've obviously got something that Canada likes.

"I look back pretty fondly on the old days. We were all friends and had a lot less responsibilities. The musicians I now use are old friends as well. I remember when Marc and Steve in T. Rex died and it was a real shame. Both were good friends of mine. I went to Portugal to see where they were buried. There wasn't even enough money to bring them back home."

Green speculated that the possible reason for Pretty Things never making it big in North America was because "we didn't try hard enough." The group rose out of the original British invasion, but didn't have the same impact as many others.

"But there always seems to be something interesting coming out of Britain. They seem to set trends. I guess I'm more out of touch these days. UB40 are one of my favourites, but there's also some terrible things on British charts."

Green has also been making a name for himself as a songwriter. It was through a music publishing deal with Sunbury/Dunbar that landed him his recording contract with RCA. Green's Walking In My Sleep is included on Roger Daltry's new album, Parting Should Be Painless. wood or Sylvester Stallone."

Also pointing the finger at music videos is David Scott, Director of the Canadian Coalition against Violent Entertainment, who cited the Michael Jackson video Thriller as a prime example. Scott zeroed in on this video as being the most violent, with 26 acts of violence in less than three minutes. He noted that the hero begins as his girlfriend's protector and ends up as her persecutor.

As a result of the recent allegations against the videos, beginning April 1, record companies will have to submit videos to the Ontario Censor Board, if they're to be shown in schools, bars or theatres.

Brian Robertson, President of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA) reports that the board has in fact, ordered record companies to comply with the Theatres Act. This means videos will now be rated according to film standards.

If the videos are being shown in what is considered a public place, the Ontario board can intervene in the province. The CRTC has total jurisdiction over television.

In speaking with RPM, Robertson stressed his belief that the issue has been blown out of proportion.

"We're holding a major meeting on the issue with all the record companies attending," he said. "The Ontario Censor Board has jurisdiction over the public exhibition of the videos. We're just going to have to submit them for classification."

Robertson pointed out that still what has to be determined is whether the videos will have to be classified for all provinces or just Ontario. The cost factor also has to be determined.

"The industry hasn't got the time nor money to go through all the red tape," he explained. "I think there's been a major overreaction of this from some parties. This Canadian Coalition Against Violent Entertainment is just looking for a newsworthy topic to hang a hat on."

Robertson said he's viewed many of the videos and has seen very few examples of "visual extreme". He noted that the Coalition Director felt the Jackson video was the most violent he has seen. "I've seen the Jackson video," said Robertson. "It's just a spoof of horror movies. Anyone who finds this video violent must have led a pretty sheltered life. I think these people are just extremists drawing attention to themselves."

Robertson pointed out that he knows of no studies that show proof that violent behavior can result from viewing the music videos.

"They're designed to entertain and promote records," he said. "Anybody producing a video to frighten is not fulfilling the original function. I don't believe it's in their interest to do that."

Robertson said there was no evidence of complaints regarding the videos and that he knows of none that the CRIA has received.

"It's just a matter of a couple of voices. We've gone through the most visable videos and there's simply nothing to back up the statements."

The National Coalition on Television Violence, who reportedly examined the videos, claim that 38 percent of those shown on TV contained violent acts, 35 percent showed sexual violence and 18 percent suggested violence.

The Coalition's Director estimated rock videos may be 50 percent more violent than the average TV program.

Meanwhile a spokesperson for the Ontario Censor Board reported that they have already been classifying videos for some time - 25 of them in the last year alone, claiming that none were classified restricted, with the highest as Adult Accompaniment. However, CIRA members claim they haven't had to submit videos until now.

Curtola prepares return with new product

Edmonton: Former Canadian Bobby-sox idol, Bobby Curtola, now going under the name of Boby, is taking another swing at the industry. He recently released a single, Have You Ever Really Been There, which he co-wrote with his wife Ava and Paul Napora and which will be followed up with an album release. Dave Van De Pitte produced.

"This is the first time in a very long time that I have felt confident enough to pursue every avenue, Curtola told RPM. "It's because of the material. I feel the songs are commercial with lots of crossover possibilities."

It was back in the early to mid-60's when Curtola was one of Canada's most popular and biggest-selling artists, much of it due his well-organized fan club that numbered almost 100,000 members. Many of his hit singles surpassed the gold mark, which was before Canada had a star system to speak of.

The charts at that time were dominated by American artists and later by British recordings. Numbering among Curtola's biggest hits were Don't Sweetheart Me, Hitch Hiker, Fortune Teller, Aladdin, Indian Giver, Three Rows Over and Forget Her. However, with the end of the '60s came new trends and musical tastes and although Curtola did keep his hand in, particularly playing impressive dates in Las Vegas, he moved out of the music industry to spend more time with his growing family and other interests.

Originally from Thunder Bay, Ontario where he got his start on the Tartan label founded by the Hurdon Brothers, Curtola now owns this label, now spelled Tarton. He is also looking for new acts to sign to the label.

Fort Payne, Alabama's favourite sons, Randy Owen, Jeff Cook, Teddy Gentry and Mark Herndon, better known as Alabama, have started the year off in great style. They have signed a new recording deal with RCA in Nashville and they are on their way to

metal honours with their January album release- of Roll On. The first single taken from the album, Roll On (Eighteen Wheeler) has already been established as a hit as it rolls up the RPM Country 50.

Alabama has now become one of the major keys in country music gaining that much coveted crossover status. They are still very much country but are now major players in music generally in North America.

Last October at Nashville's Country Music Awards show, Alabama took honours in three major categories: Entertainer of the Year, which they had won the year previous; Vocal Group of the Year; and their album, The Closer You Get, the only Nashville album to go platinum last year, took honours as Album of the Year.

The climb to the top of the country popularity poll hasn't been easy for the quartet. Alabama was put together by cousins Owen, Cook and Gentry, more than 11 years ago. Like many groups in the business, performing was their tonic but working at a part or full time daytime gig was sometimes necessary to keep the wolf from the door. They worked clubs and fairs on weekends and during one phase of their career, laid carpet in Anniston, Alabama.

Finally biting the bullet, they went for broke and devoted six nights of the week playing the club circuit in South Carolina, living only on the tips that were offered by their audiences. They raised enough money to produce their first record which

Movies and music clips show gains at RCA

Toronto: Barry Haugen of RCA's Ontario Video Sales, reports the video business as being "exceptional". Topping the list is the Tootsie movie.

February releases for the RCA/Columbia Pictures home videocassettes include Roxy Music (The High Road), Ringing Bell, Fire and Ice, ABC (Mantrap), Anna To The Infinite Power and Bob LeFlambeur (Bob The Gambler).

Haugen has also chalked up excellent sales for music videos which includes Diana Ross In Concert, Dolly Parton Live In London, the Montreal concert by Hall & Oates, titled Rock 'N Soul Live and the Eurythmics (The Video Album).

Also popular are Duran, Duran, Rush's Exit Stage Left and the Rock Opera Tommy.

The videocassettes, which are sold to stores for retail sales and rentals, retail for \$39.95 and up with an average running time of one hour for the music videocassettes. they hand delivered to radio stations in the area as well as sending a copy to the record companies in Nashville. They had only one bite - from GRT, which in 1977 released The Telephone Man and The King Is Gone. With a couple of records to their credit and their potential as songwriters beginning to take hold, the Nashville door was opened slightly and in 1979 MDJ Records and Larry McBride became interested in the group. He introduced them to Nashville producer Harold Shedd.

It was about this time when drummer Mark Herndon entered the picture and he was obviously what the group needed and is described as "the cataylst that tied it all

Country fan magazine cancels awards show

Ottawa: Country Music News has reportedly cancelled this year's fan awards show, citing a deficit of \$5000. from last year's event. In reporting on the cancellation, the Ottawa Citizen's Dave Mulholland quoted the magazine's publisher Neville Wells as saying. "We're a small operation and I don't think the paper would be able to support another substantial loss."

CKBY-FM, an Ottawa-based country station, apparently contributed \$10,000 towards the production of the show but that, along with its on-air promotion of the event, plus ticket sales, was not enough to create a profit factor.

One country music observer candidly noted: "There's a small but vocal group of 'no buck' wonders in the country music industry who are constantly pushing for more, more and more, in the promotion of country acts - mostly their own. They've been continually pushing for national televising of country music awards and the failure of the Ottawa show is indicative of just what public interest there is in such a show."

Network television executives are quite aware of the draw of domestic country and aren't too quick to repeat the embarrassment of Global's taping of the Big Country Awards, held in Regina a few years ago.

Carlton Showband set for U.S. Fair dates

Toronto: The Carlton Showband were invited to perform at the New York State Fair Board Convention in Syracuse and, says Scoot Irwin of Access Promotions, "They came off the floor with flying colours."

The Band, celebrating its 20th Anniversary, was signed by Variety Attractions of Jonesville, Ohio, a booking giant that represents Willie Nelson, Barbara Mandrell and the Oak Ridge Boys. The Carlton Showband will be doing the U.S. fair circuit through the month of August.

Says Irwin, "This is the break we've been after to launch this group stateside." The Band is currently on an extensive Canada tour playing 39 dates in 50 days. together". Shedd's first production, I Wanna Come Over, brought the group to national U.S. attention and set the stage for the big release of My Home's In Alabama which spread across the south like wildfire and made impressive moves up the national country trade charts.

However, it was their signing with RCA when the Alabama machine really got underway. Their first single under the new banner, Tennessee River, took over the charts. The single was taken from their album, My Home's In Alabama, which also included I Wanna Come Over. At that time, Randy commented, "We really never thought we'd be here today. One year ago we were about as low as you can get but instead of giving up, we decided the only way was up and started over again." Teddy perhaps summed up their feelings best with, "We spent years to get to this point, and it's only taken months for it all to fall into place. I guess we made the right decision."

Access signing for Armand Bellemare

Toronto: Singer-songwriter Armand Bellemare has signed a personal management agreement with Access Promotions.

Bellemare has experienced success in the country and contemporary adult fields with his recent releases including To The Edge Of The World, Trapped In A Summer Nights Dream and Living In California, released on the Miway label.

In making the announcment of the pacting, Scoot Irwin of Access, noted, "I first met Armand last fall while he was playing one of the inner-city bars and felt

"I was brought up listening to country and I'll tell you, after only a couple of days doing the country thing, I wish I had made this move earlier in my career. What they say about country people is right. They've got to be the most down-to-earth and happy go-lucky people in the business." Look out John, there's a couple of them out there who might change your mind. Don't put their record on the chart or take it off too soon and . . . zowie!!

Bailey gaining internationally

Mary Bailey, in her well organized selfpromotion campaign, has succeeded in opening many programmer doors across Canada as well as in the U.S. and U.K. Her current E&R single, Sincerely, has picked up substantial playlistings in every province and territory in the country. She is also receiving regional U.S. action on the single, which could see her repeat her U.S. charting on major trades which she enjoyed a couple of years ago. The single has also been given much airplay in the U.K. and just recently Joe Allan, well-known country programmer from BBC-Northampton, called her long distance for an interview. In the works is an album release, produced in Hamilton and expected by mid-May.

MBS touch for Janet Moore

Janet Moore and Larry Mercey will make a joint announcement from North Bay's Ramada Inn (Feb 13) of the MBS production for Janet's new single, My First Day Alone. This single will be released on Janet's own TCM label but subsequent releases will go out on the MBS label. The single, along with four more cuts were produced by Larry at Toronto's Eastern sound. The single features fiddle by Brian Baron. Janet is currently playing the Ramada Inn circuit.

McLauchlan hosts Timberline series

Murray McLauchlan, True North recording artist, bows his Timberline series on CBC Stereo's Simply Folk, Saturday Feb. 18 at 11:05 p.m. The 13-part series will evolve around song material written by McLauchlan about several Canadians whom he believes have had an impact on Canada or, as he puts it, "who in some way, have been deeply affected by Canada." Timberline is produced by Matt Blajer and Simply Folk is hosted by Bob Chemick and produced by Les Siemieniuk. McLauchlan's most recent single release, Red River Flood, has been added quickly to playlists and charts across the country and moves up the RPM country 50 to No. 33 this week.

Haverland to Nashville for album session

Toronto: Kelita Haverland is scheduled to begin work on her second album later this month in Nashville. The session will be produced by Glenn Sutton. The new LP will be her follow-up to Kelita, her debut. She is currently on release with My Only, the third single taken from this album.

Haverland recently represented Canada at the Neewollah International Music Festival in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma as well as in Independence and Baldwin City, Kansas. She won two awards at the festival which was sponsored by Jim Halsey who manages Tammy Wynette, Merle Haggard and Don Williams.

On returning to Canada, the young artist was honoured by Baker University with an associate faculty membership for her work with their music students.

One of the highlights of last year for Haverland was her sharing the panel with Rosanne Cash, Emmylou Harris and Rodney Crowell, at a CAPAC seminar. Ironically it was Cash's Seven Year Ache album that was considered a major influence on Haverland's career.

The new year has been particularly busy for Haverland, where she was featured at the International Motorcycle Show and was a featured performer on CBLT-TV's Look Out World ... Here We Come.

It was the CBC Radio Show, Six Days On The Road, which reported that Haverland's album had made their Top Five for 1983, apparently the only female in that group to make it on their top album list.

Baker sings for Save-Easy's 25th

Toronto: Carroll Baker, a native of Nova Scotia, has been firmed as the celebrity headliner and spokesperson for an all-new series of advertising and promotional events. These events have been planned to mark the 25th anniversary of the Save-



Jackson's physician says Epic star is fortunate

Los Angeles: After viewing the video of the commercial in which Michael Jackson's hair caught fire when a smoke-bomb canister exploded, the singer's physician said he was surprised the injuries were not more severe.

"Everyone was surprised that his whole head and clothes did not catch fire," said Dr. Steve Hoefflin. "He is very fortunate not to have been burned more seriously."

Jackson was being filmed for a Pepsi commercial at the Shrine Auditorium when, the canister, which was part of the special effects, exploded. The accident occurred in front of a packed house which included members of Jackson's family.

Hoefflin said Jackson could suffer some permanent hair loss, but would not require any immediate surgery. The physician noted that future cosmetic surgery would depend on the amount of scarring or loss of hair.

One of the two commercials filmed is expected to be shown during the Grammy Awards (Feb. 28).
