

Vancouver setting adds excitement to Junos

Vancouver was once again an excellent setting for the Juno Awards, the second time the awards travelled west. Plumping the hometown spirit was emcee Beverly Hills 90210 star Jason Priestley, rock 'n pop recording star Sarah McLachlan (a Haligonian now living in Vancouver) jazz artist extraordinaire Diana Krall, internationally-acclaimed producer David Foster and veteran agent Sam Feldman. They obviously pleased the 15,000 assorted industry types and fans who roared their approval at every opportunity.

Producer John Brunton once again trumphed with a dazzling light show that appeared to make GM Place even larger than it is.

Having McLachlan as the opener was a stroke of genius, with her easily identified anthem designed for the targeted age group of 14 to 25, both in the GM Place audience and television viewers.

In fact, the whole performance line-up was geared to the younger market, with perhaps the exception of Leahy. The other performers were Jann Arden, Shania Twain and Ron Sexsmith, a last minute replacement for Our Lady Peace who had to bow out because of a recurrent back injury that

felled lead singer Raine Maida.

McLachlan further excited the audience by winning four Junos in all the categories in which she was nominated: female vocalist, best songwriter, which she shared with Pierre Marchand, best single for Building A Mystery, and best album for Surfacing. This was a big award year for McLachlan, who won two Grammy awards; best female pop vocal performance for Building A Mystery and best pop instrumental for Last Dance.

Paul Brandt was a surprise winner in two categories. He was a shoo-in for the country male vocalist award, but he also scooped the male vocalist category, winning out over Roch Voisine who had become the sweetheart of A/C radio over the last couple of years.

Toronto's Our Lady Peace, the Sony phenomenon of the year added to their national star status by winning perhaps the most important award, the fan voted Blockbuster rock album of the year for Clumsy and a Juno for group.

Also taking home a couple of Junos was the nine-member Lakefield, Ontario Leahy family of Celtic fiddlers and dancers, winning as new group and instrumental artists. Their performance was

also a show stopper laying down their instruments for an incredible in-line stage front Celtic dance that brought the audience to its feet.

Country superstar Shania Twain, sporting a new braided hair-do, was stunningly dressed which was in keeping with an equally-stunning performance. The Mercury recording star handily won the country female vocalist award.

David Foster, who was inducted into the Juno Hall of Fame, took what seemed like forever, to thank everybody who has touched his life over the past 15 years, including his first wife B.J. Cook. It was Cook who opened the doors to America's west coast music community for him. Cook, a masterful songwriter and much in demand as a back-up singer is still lending a warm and affectionate hand and advice to young aspiring artists and songwriters. Unfortunately, and no fault of Foster, she was seated so far back even the cameras couldn't get a shot of her, as were a number of other Foster guests.

Vancouver-based Sam Feldman, a giant in the promoter/agent/manager field, was recognized for his contributions in building the Canadian recording industry with the Walt Grealis Special Achievement Award.

On the negative side however, was how blatantly white the televised portion of the Junos were this year. And what a missed opportunity for the CARAS and/or CBC people. It was known well before showtime that Our Lady Peace lead singer Raine Maida was hospitalized, making for a quick decision to throw an obviously shaken Ron Sexsmith to the audience, a judgement call that could have career repercusions for the 19-year old St. Catharines, Ontario singer/songwriter. Fortunately, the audience was respectful, thanks to Priestley's introduction, who suggested that Sexsmith "should be given a medal for jumping in at the last minute." Sexsmith was presented with a Juno at the pre-television reception for his album Other Songs, which won in the best roots and traditional category.

However, what a coup it would have been to have asked Vancouver rappers the Rascalz, to fill the slot, or at least receive their best rap recording Juno for Cash Crop on camera.

As it turned out the Rascalz refused to accept their award, the presentation of which had been earmarked for the pre-television ceremonies. A band spokesman said they couldn't accept the award until urban music is given higher profile at the awards, suggesting that the music establishment was not showing their music categories due respect.

In spite of some negatives, the positives won out. The 27th annual Juno Awards created a media frenzy in Vancouver, all of which was positive,

which is what awards shows are all about.

The presenters were thankfully, predominantly recording artists, including Farmer's Daughter, Deborah Cox, Paul Brandt, Bruce Guthro, Fara, Moist's David Usher, McNarland, Holly Michelle Wright, Great Big Sea's Alan Doyle and Bob Hallett, Terri Clark and Robbie Robertson. Of non-recording presenters, Canada's famous snowborder Ross Rebagliati, almost stole the show. His fans among the audience were many, and

he rewarded them with a very funny one liner. Before presenting the Juno, he held up his almost lost Olympic medal, calling it "a little British Columbian gold.

WALT SAYS ...!



The post mortem of the Junos!!! The good, the bad, the ugly . . . and the awful! We look at the awards and tear them up to build them back! (EC: This is a new thing???)

THE GOOD: David Foster who sent out the message that this was an AWARD SHOW. He was a showman and did it well! Will this ever happen again? Jason Priestley who moved the show right along and scored a lot of brownie points! Way to go! Ross Rebagliati who knew what he was going to say and where he was going! (EC: Should take acting, singing and dancing classes . . . to be a big star!!!)

THE BAD: The set was so new at the pre-Juno Awards you could smell the paint dry! (EC: You could also watch it!!!) Pre-Awards just don't happen. You either do it on TV . . . or you don't! (EC: I know what I'd do!!!)

THE UGLY: Letting Bozo out there to upstage the truly honoured! Keep this guy off TV. Bad image! (EC: Let's make a rule when the new guy starts!!!) New guy?

THE AWFUL: No big names in the audience. Stars should be clamouring for tickets to be seen in the Juno audience. Over the years they have been shunted to the back and not shot properly so they don't want to be there. The prime seats are all people who really shouldn't be on television! (EC: Right on. I watch to see who's there, not the performances!!!) Thanks to David Foster for giving CARAS shit about the bad seating. More below.

The Junos must have been good!!! With a whopping 1.678 million viewers (overnite ratings), it was encouraging to see the dailies from the major cities across Canada being very positive in their critiques. What great photo spreads leading up to and after the awards show. The only dissenter I could find was the Toronto Sun's Claire Bickley (EC: What's new???), who headed her piece with "Excuse me, but I just nodded off." She at least used a photo of Our Lady Peace guys accepting their Juno without ailing Raine Maida and a nice shot of Shania Twain with her award. (EC: If she nodded off, how did she take the photos???)

About them Junos!!! It's difficult not to be too negative, even though Bozo attempted to keep Juno creator Stan Klees from being backstage, and there was an altercation, but some Klees fans came to the rescue and he ended up with a rainbow of passes and still got hassled. It seems Bozo believed Klees was responsible for an article in a national magazine that didn't think too highly of him. (EC: Flattering picture!!!) Klees denies the allegation but says he wishes he had something to do with the article and given the chance . . . would have!! (EC: I'm sorry! If you don't like your seats . . . LEAVE!!! Or Sue me!!!)

I'm disturbed!!! There were a couple of other things that were disturbing. With the Junos now

being targeted to the young, and very young, was it necessary to have role models like Jann Arden and Jason Priestley, sucking on cigarettes? Nothing wrong with being in the sack together, but even hardcore smokers were offended at this opening skit . . . the smoking I mean. The presenters, for the most part, were right on, opting to read the names of the nominees instead of trying to be funny. One exception, and he was very funny, Olympic snowboard winner Ross Rebagliati held up his gold medal and called it "a little British Columbian gold." (EC: I'm told he's really down to earth and a nice person!!!)

A touch of class!!! Nice to see David Foster give a bit of his long acceptance speech over to "kingmaker" B.J. Cook, who must have been on Bozo's shitlist too. She was so far back in the house the cameras couldn't even find her. But the gesture was worth it for B.J. I'm sure. Interesting to see Sam Feldman take a bow for winning that Walt Grealis Special Achievement Award. He had a look on his face like Walt who??? And, that was a nice gesture by Jason to say it and pronounce it correctly (EC: Should have been on television and I would have thought Bruce Allen would have looked after it!!!) Bozo has been trying to write it out of the annual event. (EC: Then again! I do think you deserve a few seconds of glory . . . once a year! Were you there???) No! Didn't want to take the chance of being embarrassed . . . again! But I watched every minute on the tube!

Roots, motherhood and the flag!!! When it comes to marketing, no one can hold a candle to Roots' Michael Budman and Raymond Perkins. They were everywhere at the Junos. Five RCMP guys in their red coats, all male, by the way, replaced their stetsons with the official Roots Olympic caps for a photo shot, which may have got them banished to the airport detail. They even got Bruce Allen to wear a cap. Also seen sporting the Roots finery were EMI's top brass who were in for the Junos. After the Junos, Budman went after even bigger game, the famous British Princes, Charles, William and Harry, and talked them into wearing caps and jackets. Budman is rumoured to have more money than the Royal House of Windsor, so he was in good company. (EC: But only for the official photo shoot!!!) You know you've made it when you are referred to as "unidentified" by a national daily?

A dirty rumour!!! An unmentionable radio guy from Montreal has been spreading the word that SM and TM were splitting and that CD's people are involved. That embrace on camera looked pretty genuine to me. (EC: Yeah! But it's not interesting news if it's not dirty news!!!)

What we didn't see!!! Our presenters and winners should work a little shock theatre into their stage presence. Even the hint of a beaver or honkers would get the media excited . . . not to mention the couch potatoes at home . . . just like the Oscars! (EC: No porn PLEASE. We're Canadians!!!)

What we did hear!!! Vancouver rappers the Rascalz refused their Juno because it wasn't on camera. It could have been, and it should have been. That presentation or even a performance by the band would have made great television as the Our Lady Peace replacement. These guys are masters at last minute happenings. A lost opportunity for the CARAS and CBC people. Remember when Stompin' Tom Connors sent back all his Junos? For a different reason of course! (EC: But he never refused them . . . they weren't on television!!!)

Mirvishes go Celtic!!! Well, it had to happen. A musical theatre spectacular to recognize Celtic music and, it's 100 per cent Cancon. Ed and David Mirvish held a press reception in the old spooky Gooderham & Worts turn-of-the-century distillery where they announced the staging of Needfire: Passion of the Heart. They've kept it pretty quiet. It's been almost two years that the \$3 million production has been in the pre-production stage. The all-Canadian company is made up of 60 performers from coast to coast, including, John McDermott, Mary Jane Lamond, Jim Fidler, John Allan Cameron and Duncan Cameron, Paul Lauzon, Sandy MacIntyre and 12-year old fiddling sensation Jeffrey Gosse, and more. Previews begin at Toronto's Princess of Wales Theatre on June 12 with opening night scheduled for June 16. This will be a limited engagement until July 12. We'll have more on this later. What a photo opportunity that opening night will be. (EC: A 100 per cent Cancon photo opportunity!!!)

...And God created Bif

With a handle like that to her credit, chances are pretty slim you haven't heard the name Bif Naked somewhere along the way. In case you truly haven't (and we're inclined to doubt it), then we're pretty sure you've caught a glimpse of this feline-eyed, tattooed and pierced diva on MuchMusic's kaleidoscope of flittering images. Bif Naked, or simply Bif (as she deems to be called these days), is the quintessential femenina non-domestica, a character trait she has lambasted onto the public in a mere three albums worth of career.

In accordance with that trait comes the singer's newest release, I Bificus, an homage of sorts (very tongue in cheek) to her own impending glory. I Bificus has all the elements to make the jest a reality, however, and one doesn't get the impression Bif herself doubts it in the least.

Born in India and adopted by Methodist Canadians, Bif is a contradiction in word and deed; she looks the part of a heavy metal nightmare yet has her heart firmly rooted in progressive rock. She has also become notorious for off the wall soundbites during interviews. Looking fully forward to more than a few, we were surprised to be confronted instead with her religious upbringing, still (somewhat) intact after seven years of rock and roll stage time.

"I enjoy delving into a lot of theology," she says. "When I was 18 I decided to become a Taoist; I got a tattoo of a Tao, a big Cantonese symbol on my arm. Then that faded away for me, and after a couple of years and two faded relationships, I studied Buddhism, then a little Hare Krishnaism. I found that I could take something from everything."

Though not religious in any formal sense, Bif has cultivated a long relationship with several "deities," the story of which has been written up and down her arms. She is a woman who likes to keep tabs on her past, who is unashamed of the places she's been, and who's also not afraid of cracking a good joke. On her album sleeve, big thank you's go to a whole whack of known and not so-known gods, demi-gods and even aspiring gods.

"It's supposed to be funny," she says. "I started doing that on my first record because I wanted to spoof R&B artists. They always are very heavily into thanking God and I always found that to be very funny because I found that a lot of their lyrics were quite violent and overtly sexual. It is quite remarkable they would be so considerate to let us all know they want to thank the Lord, so I made sure I thanked Jesus as well. And Buddha and Satan -- you've got to include Satan -- and Madonna of course, cause she's a demi-god."

Bif maintains she is serious about her beliefs, however, as serious as a once aspiring comedian can be. She reveals a certain awareness of things greater than herself, however, most obviously by being acutely aware and genuinely thankful of her career as an artist. Ironically enough, most of the material that she commits on paper for recording sessions turns out to be rather grey in content.

"I find that when I'm reflective or pissed off or hurt or melancholy, that's when I'm writing," she says. "Often it ends up being melancholic but I always tried to be really straight up. I tell it like it is, and a lot of the fanbase I developed over the last ten years of touring have come to know me that way."


Straight up is the term to describe her. Openly raunchy, spiritual and hilarious, Bif leaves nothing



to speculation; unlike most stars, she is willing to commit herself fully to the public. Which, quite simply, makes her one of the most highly visible personalities in the Canadian music scene today. At this point, she is adding to that interest through an amazing single, titled Spaceman, currently in heavy rotation at radio and MuchMusic (up to #39 from #46 this week on RPM's Hits 100). As expected, the singer is preparing a formal tour for I Bificus in the near future. Here's what we can look forward to:

"If I had my way, we'd have indian dancers, strippers on pillars, three drummers, fifteen conga players, everything," she says. "Even Tito Puente jamming with me and a couple of guys doing some salsa, just like a big circus. But of course financially, that's not where we're at."

THE WATCHMEN Silent Radar EMI 59031-F

For a band that broke into popularity with a sound that came dangerously close to The Tragically Hip, The Watchmen have certainly gone the distance to prove the first impression dead wrong. Last year's Brand New Day made the big ripple, maybe a little too big, as the band went on to switch labels in the quietest juggling act we've witnessed in a while. Silent Radar, their debut on EMI, is less overtly adventurous than Brand New Day and yet it hardly marks a return to In The Trees. What it is is The Watchmen's most fully conceived album, well focused, restrained when it needs to be, and chockfull of lasting, workable songs. Tunes like Stereo (the first single) and I'm Waiting will break this album easily at radio but it's tracks like Rooster and Silent Radar which reverberate long after the record is over. The guys have been professionally working together for six years now and have come together here with the full benefit of that association. Production by Adam Kasper (REM, Soundgarden) highlights melody and makes the versatility subtle without burying it in the mix. The result? A CHR shoo-in and top 40 breakthrough, and a great way to reintroduce the band under a new contract. Today, the great white north, tomorrow...?-RG

REVEREND HORTON HEAT -Psychobilly Space Heater

Interscope 90168-J


"Houston... we have a problem." Do they ever; psychobilly preacher Reverend Horton Heat and his twin lackeys, Jimbo Wallace and Scott Churilla, are still cooking five years after being officially fired from the kitchen. And they're doing it with the same attitude of simultaneous adoration and blunt disregard for their hillbilly, country and punk upbringing. The bogus religion shtick long behind them, Reverend and co. are still very much dedicated to punching out raucous, irreverent high octane rock and roll. Traditionally more of a club act than a commercial radio one, Reverend and Interscope have nevertheless given over a




tune called Lie Detector to see what's what. It will probably go nowhere and for that reason precisely will be worshipped by steadfast fans. A noticeable thinning fount of lyrical inspiration (seen most obviously in Jimbo Song, an overthe-top homage to Wallace), doesn't prevent the trio from achieving the kind of hard knuckled output expected of them. Their previous It's Martini Time showed glimpses of something happening between the psycho and the billy, and we see repeats here on the spanish Mi Amor and Cinco de Mayo, as well as the closing title track. Overall, however, the Reverend makes it pretty clear that he enjoys inhabiting the little place that fortune has bestowed on him and he's content to celebrate it by lettin' the music rip. -RG

PULP -F This Is Hardcore Island 314 524 492-Q

Within the confines of popular music, there is always the struggle to break the formula, to somehow, miraculously reinterpret a very old story, or build something new from a very old blueprint. Pulp have achieved something akin to that with This Is Hardcore, their first release in two years. The album benefits from the commercial segue-way of Great Expectations and will reap on advance promotion, heavy



advertising and highly touted launch parties across the country. The band have all but redefined the nature of the format in their native UK, but have had a bit of a struggle here in Canada, despite bona fide media personalities, international interest and of course, great songs. Whatever happens this time around, This Is Hardcore will undoubtedly be recognized as one of the most sophisticated and accomplished pop releases of the year. Buoyed by touching narratives, the cinematic sweep of full orchestra and the pop savvy of Pulp's six member collective, This Is Hardcore becomes difficult to overlook, harder still to dismiss. A release like this only comes along once in a while, probably due to the necessary bringing together of crucial elements. Well, it's happened, and you should really be listening to the results. Stylish, eclectic, courageous and triumphant.



MC MARIO MIXDOWN '98 -Dance Various Artists Sony Music Direct 24041-H

After a string of gold and platinum selling albums, MC Mario returns to well worn territory to reclaim the title for putting out smash dance comps. 1998's Mixdown is his weapon, an 18 dance hit collection aimed smack dab at the heart of club land. On content alone, the release is a shoo in: Amour/Porn Kings, Pony/Ginuwine, Take A Ride/Brooklyn Bounce, What's Up Daddy/Skuba, This Is The Night/

Jacynthe, Free/Ultra Nate and nine exclusive remixes including Diana King's L-L-Lies and One Nations' Bittersweet Symphony. It's the marketing that's going to send this into orbit, however, with national television campaign, including spots on Much, MusiquePlus and YTV, radio campaigns, regional promotions spearheaded by a CD sampler, a website launch and live appearances. The hullabaloo won't be over for a long while it seems, for obvious reasons and anticipated results. An atrocious remix of Tubthumping by No Smoking aside, Mixdown 98 may be excused for its ills on economic grounds alone. -RG

MILA MASON The Strong One Atlantic-83059-P

Closer To Heaven, the first single taken from this Blake Mevis production has been moving slowly up the chart, slower than it should have. Written by Aimee Mayo and Bill Luther, the song should have gone Top 10 by now. Here's a voice that's going to do a lot in country. She also does a beautiful job on The Strong One with lyrics by Canadian Cyril Rawson and Byron Hill, but no Cancon allowed here. Also key is the Kostas and Wally Wilson penning of



You And Only You and Let Me Cry, a song written by Tony Marty and Buffy Lawson. But don't overlook Blood Simple, probably the strongest vocal entry in the package. This one was written by Rick Giles and Susan Longacre. This is Mason's second album release, the first That's Enough Of Me, gave her a recognizable status in the U.S. This sophomore follow-up should do even better.

MELODIE CRITTENDEN - Country Selt-titled

Another powerful emerging young American country artist, who's breaking nicely with her first single, Broken Road, which was written by Marcus Hummon, Bobby Boyd and Jeff Hanna. Now, here's the interesting part of the



album. Crittenden puts a country spin on Amanda Marshall's hit of Birmingham, and it's got hit written all over it. The best part of this of course, the song was written by Canadians David Tyson, Dean McTaggart and Gerald O'Brien, and that means Crittenden has a Cancon track (ML). Crittenden also displays her writing talent, teaming up with Jess Leary to write This Thing Called Livin', and with Austin Cunningham for If This Ain't Love, both key tracks. But don't overlook Cunningham's solo penning of With His Arms Wide Open. Could be a sleeper. The album was produced by Byron Gallimore and Stephony Smith. - WG

VAN HALEN

-Rock

Warner Bros. 46662-P

Well the ship is in (not that ship), after years of media speculation, Internet cat fights and the bogus comeback of David Lee Roth. The news that, in fact, Gary Cherone had taken over vocal duties for one of North America's seminal hard rock acts came with a mix of disappointment and excitement. Especially since the inevitable speculation put

Cherone more towards the Van Hagar than the Van Halen end of things. Well, the hype was bang on in terms of that score. Case in point: on first listen we were frankly bowled over by the Cherone's seamless transition to his new post; there's a Hagar in him, no doubt about it. But the real surprise came from the music, and especially Eddie Van Halen, who has once again taught his guitar to breathe, to talk, to growl and scream on command. A few misplaced piano ballads aside, Eddie VH comes out dead centre on this release and moves the cyclone forward with a fury of chops and classic guitar licks that make



the freshest sounding Halen since the early days. The release will undoubtedly serve as one of Warner's biggest for the Spring and Summer, and probably well beyond that as well. The naysayers be damned, classic Halen is back, a chunky reward for those who've been waiting for it a long, long time.



subtly identified as "a patent blend of Chinese music with shades of Brazilian, Celtic and jazz." Well, there's more to it than that. These instruments were not designed to perform popular music of Brazil as in Popular Brazilian Suite, nor fit in so beautifully with an Irish flute (Loretto Reid) in Clouds - Irish Impressions, or, again with the Irish flute and tin whistle (Reid) on La Bastringue, a Quebecois piece and the Irish influenced Green Mountain Petronella, and certainly not with the cello, as played magnificently by lan Hampton, but they do. Effective programming allows a modicum of traditional Chinese music to permeate, and with class, Silk Road's musical diligence in capturing a more global-friendly market for their music. Guesting on the session, besides those mentioned are Chai-Man Cheng (dizi, xiao, xindi) Celso Machado (guitar, vocal, birimbau, jaw harp, percussion), Jian-Min Pan with dizi inserts on Autumn Moonlight On Ping Lake, and bassist René Worst. Most of the material is traditional, with He writing four of the songs. Produced by Edward Henderson and recorded at Vancouver's Mushroom Studios with Keith Stein doing board chores and with mastering at Pacific Line Music. The tracks are all 100 per cent Cancon.

RICHARD HILL/BEN KINGSLEY - Classical Images From Kubla Khan Honest-1020

Originally intended as music for a ballet, Richard Hill's Images From Kubla Khan is a virtual tone poem to accompany readings of the possibly opium inspired 1797 poem by Samuel Taylor Coleridge. To be honest, we haven't been able to ascertain how many times the poem has been set to music and are aware only of the version by his near namesake Samuel Coleridge-Taylor composed in 1906. The latter's music was muchly influenced by Dvorak and Tchaikovsky. Maestro Richard Hill, here at least, seems to have been influenced by Richard Strauss. One doesn't intend comparison or even similarity; one means only to suggest that Images has the same power and sometimes, gentleness of Zarathustra. He also conducts, with an apparent firm but loving baton, the Grosses Rundfunkorchester Berlin. The reader is renowned Ben Kingsley who gives full measure of interpretation to the poet's words. Still, the majesty and, dare we say it? enchantment of the work is the music itself. In our not so humble opinion, it deserves immediate inclusion in the repertories of all major orchestras.

CAROL SLOANE & CLARK TERRY - Jazz The Songs Ella & Louis Sang Concord Jazz-4787

The title is self explanatory. Two gentle giants, singer Carol Sloane and trumpeter Clark Terry, join forces in presenting well nigh definitive versions of 12 standards. They range from I Won't Dance to Sleepy Time Down South with generous portions of excellent jazz oriented interpretations of others in between. We're writing nothing more. The liner notes are by George Simon and there is no way they can be improved upon, certainly not by this scribbler who has never been noted for modesty.

GENE HARRIS & JACK McDUFF Down Home Blues Concord-4785 St. Clair Ent.

What's heard here isn't, strictly speaking, Blues or even The Blues (there's a difference.) It doesn't matter though, because a blues groove is omnipresent as two keyboard masters make memorable music together. Harris on piano and McDuff on Hammond organ work well as a team backed by good sideman and two fine vocalists in the persons of Curtis Stigers and Niki Harris, the daughter of Gene. And yes, she's the same Niki Harris who's been singing back up vocals for Madonna since 1985. There are even seven tracks including the title, J.& G. Blues, Soft Winds (the venerable Fletcher Henderson composition) and a powerhouse Smack Dab in the Middle in which Stigers struts his vocal



stuff in manner most impressive. True blues or not, it's a great album, a mandatory inclusion in one's blues library. -BW

ALEJANDRA NUNEZ - Latin Jazz & RAMIRO PUERTA Projecto Urbana/Urban Project

Latin American. The voices are smooth but with requisite edge of emotion evident even without recourse to the English translations. A work should be judged on its own merits and that's what we're doing. It's an excellent production and one that laudably serves its inspiration. Now, having written that, one should also point out that the album is 100 per cent Cancon (MAPL) and was produced with help from FACTOR, Canadian Heritage and the Ontario Arts Council; proof indeed that Canada is a multicultural mosaic. Produced by Nunez, Puerta and Roberto Occhipinti and recorded at Toronto's Reaction Studios, Comfort Sound and Wellesley Sound . -BW

VARIOUS ARTISTS - Worldbeat The Real Bahamas Nonesuch Explorer-79300-F

This isn't perhaps every day listening, but most certainly for those moments when one's soul needs restoring. First recorded in 1965 and




now digitally remastered, it's a two volume collection of gospel and folk songs as sung in the Bahamas. They're laid back and not at all like the sometimes frenzied spirituals sung in the American deep south with whom the singers share an affinity of blood. This listener is charmed by the common sense advice imparted in Don't Take Everybody To Be Your Friend as well as the devotion evident in such songs as God Locked The Lion's Jaw and Ain't No Grave Gonna Hold God's Body Down. Featured musicians are renowned Bahamian singers, Frederick McQueen and Bruce Green, the Pinder Family and Joseph Spence with his exquisitely simple but simply exquisite guitar playing.








Multi-media mag premieres to push indies

A new concept in magazine publishing has surfaced in Toronto to change the way print media represents music. Titled ProMag Audio Magazine, the new publication will include in each issue an attached compact disk that contains an audio rendition of its editorial contents. The idea, says General Coordinator David D'Oliveira, was to release a magazine that could be "read" in a variety of ways.

"The consumer buys the magazine and enjoys it one dimension, the dimension of reading articles," he says. "But they can also enjoy it on their computer, where they can play around with the multi-media, or in their car where they can just sit back and listen to it."

Far from merely providing voice overs and text read out loud, the audio portion of the magazine features exclusive interviews, reviews, dramatised segments, reader feedback and, of course, song clips from the artists featured.

Conceived by D'Oliveira and cofounders Roger Browne, ProMag Audio Magazine had its genesis in the idea of a "special kind of compilation," one that would have ongoing relevance, especially for independent artists. The concept eventually evolved into a cross between a compilation and a periodical and eventually into a magazine with multimedia capabilities.

"We didn't want to do something that was normal and usual," says D'Oliveira, "we wanted to promote artists in a way that was somewhat more unique. We thought it would be much more appealing and easy to get into."

D'Oliveira, who describes the project as a "labour of love," says the magazine has yet to receive sponsorship from the major labels, though their interest in the possibilities of the new magazine has been strong. He says ProMag is currently only limited in size and availability by finances, though he is optimistic that will change in the near future. He is also unfazed by the pressures inherent in major label backing, which could

conceivably compromise the publications' independent slant.

"It will remain a magazine that assists those artists that are not yet signed to a major record label," he says. "But it's also Canadian, so it has no problem focusing on other Canadian acts that might be signed but could do with a lot more exposure."

Universal Music's Headstones received top billing on ProMag's national debut, which depicts singer Hugh Dillon snarling through glasses tinted a Star Spangled Banner as the flag of Canada looms behind him. The image, says D'Oliveira, conveys the philosophical framework behind the magazine's editorial stance.

"It focuses on the issue of Canadian talent and whether or not we have to always keep looking to the US to be successful," he says. "That's one of the reasons we're doing ProMag, because we believe very earnestly that we have some of the best talent right here in Canada. But because the system that is in place -- in the way the labels scout bands and work them and the paucity of bands which they sign overall, the relationship between radio and promotions -- they all work against the musician a lot of the times. They don't do so on purpose, but they do make it difficult for the domestic artist to make it as he or she merits."

D'Oliveira also says the magazine will continue to evolve as the editorial board receives more feedback from readers, as they did on their two promotional issues which helped to shape their national debut in January. ProMag Audio Magazine is currently published six times a year with a circulation of 20,000 across Canada. Major market distribution for the US and Japan is currently in the works, but it's the Canadian market the editors really want to snag.

"The main problem is to get the magazine across this huge nation of ours in places where the public will actually see it," he says. "But we've gotten some great responses so far, and sold way more than we expected, so we're excited and optimistic."

Determine self-employment says tax advisor

With income tax season approaching, musicians and people who work in the music industry should consider whether their musical activity constitutes a business for income tax purposes. If it does meet Revenue Canada's definition of a business activity, then a lot of expenses become deductible against your income for income tax purposes.

Revenue Canada determines an activity is a business if it has a "reasonable expectation of profit." They also, however, acknowledge that "the nature of art and literature is such that a considerable period of time may pass before an artist becomes established and profitable." This means that Revenue Canada is accepting of losses from an artistic venture for a number of years. These losses are business losses which can be applied against other income to possibly result in an income tax refund.

Another important question to consider is whether an individual is an employee or a self-employed independent contractor. Many musicians and workers in the industry have more than one employer or several part-time jobs. If set up properly, the taxpayer can establish that they are in fact self-employed, which would entitle them to deduct many business expenses against their taxable income. The factors related to whether a

worker is self-employed or an employee are determined through numerous legal court decisions. They are as follows:

a) Does the worker work under direct control and supervision of a master? A self-employed person has control of when he/she does the work, and also works for more than one employer.

b) Is the worker hired to complete a specific task? A self-employed person is hired to complete a job within a certain period of time, and is not just hired on an hourly basis without reference to the completion of a job.

c) Does the worker have the opportunity to make a profit or the risk of a loss on the job? If

he/she does, then he/she is self-employed.

d) Does the worker appear to be part of the organization he/she is working for? A self-employed person should not appear to be part of the organization he/she is doing work for. The following suggestions will help establish self-employed status for tax purposes:

a) Have a signed contract for the duties to be performed, and times of work which are required.

b) Work for more than one employer (the more, the better).

c) Advertise your services as an independent contractor.

d) Pay for your own expenses of overhead.

HMV amalgamation closes US head office

In an unexpected move, HMV has announced the closure of their American head offices following an extensive business review which revealed significant savings needed before an increasingly competitive market. Effective in June, the company will have amalgamated head offices in Canada and the US with a number of big losses to the American counterpart, including VP Purchasing, Bob

Douglas, VP Finance Harvey Berkley, VP marketing Alan McDonald and VP Business Development Bob Williams. As well, a number of additional positions in the US office will cease to exist following the shutting down of offices there. The 16 existing American stores will be supported in part by the Canadian operation, with marketing, purchasing and operations maintaining key roles in the US.

Under the new system, HMV Canada President Peter Luckhurst will oversee the daily operations of the business, along with VP finance and business development John McLellan, VP Human Resources Marnie Falkiner, VP Purchasing Roger Whiteman, VP Operations & Systems Lesya McQueen and VP marketing Laura Bartlett.

The company has recently initiated the process of moving the finance systems and human resource departments into the Canadian operation. The daily store operations will be the responsibility of the existing HMV regional managers, Stuart Fleming and Gary Grills. Both Fleming and Grills will report directly to McQueen. The purchasing department, headed by Jim Freeman will report directly to Whiteman and the marketing department headed by Ken Feldman will report to Bartlett.

As of press time, no spokesperson from HMV was available for comment.

Denon Canada closes up music division


After several months of rumours, Denon Canada has finally decided to drop all of its music related business activity and concentrate on its hardware operations, which include the entire spectrum of home entertainment appliances, with the exception of television and VCRs. The loss of Denon's music operations will cause 12 jobs to be dropped, probably by the end of the month as well as numerous labels and artists who had distribution or record deal agreements with the company.

Among them are Canadian artists Beverley Mahood and Quartette and labels with jazz catalogues such as Savoy, Dark Light and Gramavision, reggae label Ras, and soundtrack specialty labels like CBC, Frontier, Skylark and Varese Sarabande. Rounder, Denon's largest single

label, will also be looking for a new distribution deal.

"We weren't losing money but we weren't making it either," commented Denon VP Doug Griesbach on the company's decision to move out of the music business. He said the company's dealings, mainly with specialty labels, required a high degree of inventory and servicing which wasn't balancing out in the long run.

"With the number of new players in retailing, we were getting bogged down in paperwork and the rates of return were not good for us," he said. "I'm sure all the labels will end up with the majors, but from our point of view we can make much more money from our established hardware operations using less people."

e) Supply your own equipment.

f) Prepare invoices for services performed, and ensure that payment is received without any Income Tax, CPP or El being deducted.

g) Ensure that the company which you are working for does not issue you a T4 slip (a T4A would be acceptable).

h) If feasible, incorporate your business. This

should only be done if your net income is in excess of \$60,000.

Your claim to be in business will probably appear more plausible if you keep business-like books and records in good order. The burden of proof is always on the taxpayer to show that particular expenditures were in fact made, and were related to a business venture. Once it has been established that a musical venture is a business, then all expenditures which are required to earn income are deductible. A partial list of tax deductible expenses are as follows: travel expenses, recording costs, promotion costs, insurance premiums on musical equipment, a 20% write off of the cost of musical instruments, union dues, agent's commissions, and the cost of office space in your home.

Included among the highlights of 1997 was the sold-out 3 Tenors Concert (50,688), U2's two POP Mart Tour Concerts (100,000), the NFL American Bowl game between the Green Bay Packers and the Buffalo Bills (53,896), the One + One Challenge of Champions, between Donovan Bailey and Michael Johnson (35,848), and the televised funeral of Diana, Princess of Wales on the JumboTron, North America's largest videoboard (5,000)

It was also pointed out that of the 302 event days, only 44 per cent (134) were for the three professional sports teams that call SkyDome their home: the Blue Jays, Argonauts and Raptors. All the remaining events (58 per cent) were a


