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In a small back room of their apartment, which serves as an office, Irene and Maurice Bodington set up another page of Bod's Scrapbook. Across Canada there are many who listen to the show today who can remember "Bod's" voice reading stories to them in the early days of radio when they were children. With his wife, "Bod" spends many long hours in this room, drinking innumerable cups of tea, planning and writing the programs of friendly wit and wisdom which are regular features on the CBC Dominion network—Sundays at 8:00 p.m. and every weekday at 9:45 a.m. CST, 10:45 a.m. MST.

The Bodingtons

ON August 24, 1949, at 4:00 p.m., a new matrimonial partnership was formed—a partnership which was soon to make its mark also in a professional field. Irene Halliday married Maurice Bodington, and Rene—as "Bod" calls his wife—loves to tell the story of the ceremony in Toronto's Carlton Street United Church.

"We were married between shows," she recalls, "and as soon as the minister had said the important words, Bod turned on his heel and marched off down the aisle. For a moment we all stood in stunned silence, and then the minister, in a fine melodramatic stage whisper, said, 'Sir, don't you know that it is customary at this point in the ceremony for the groom to kiss the bride?' Bod stopped

dead in his tracks and then, looking very ashamed of himself, came slowly back to the altar. His only excuse was that he was lost without a script!"

He says that he is convinced that without Rene's constant help and tireless research in the last two and a half years he would often have been at a loss for material to use in his programs on CJBC and the Dominion network. Frequently they go off together to visit the small second-hand book-

shops scattered throughout Toronto, in search of fresh material. Their home-made library shelves are filled with their "finds"—books sometimes over 100 years old, pamphlets long forgotten but containing gems of everyday wisdom, old magazine clippings and many 20th-century editions which are now out of print.

Festival Summer

By ANDREW ALLAN

The Festival of Britain, 1951, was more than just a device to alleviate the dollar gap. It was a national act of reassessment and a declaration of faith. The Past was recalled to illumine the Present and to signpost the Future.

In my series of talks, Festival Summer (recorded in London before my departure, and being broadcast at 11:15 p.m. on CBW, 10:45 p.m. on CBK-CBX on Fridays), I have not tried so much to paint a complete picture of the Festival as to report to my fellow Canadians the things about it I find it impossible to forget. Some of these things may seem trivial in themselves. The memory has an unorthodox way of proceeding. But, it seems to me, added together they gradually begin to suggest that to place a festival in such an unlikely year was not only valuable but, in a way, inevitable.

Just when so much of the world is sick with the Fever of Possessing, it seems as if Great Britain had discovered the Cure of Being Possessed. The Festival of Britain began to make this clear.

It was not just an exhibition, not just a fun fair, although these were included. It was not just a London festival, although old London gave the lead. It was Britain en fete, in city and country, in town, village, and hamlet. The Festival belonged to everyone-and no one too humble to play his part. Opulence, perhaps, was lacking; but there was wit and there was artistry. The artist and the craftsman came into their own. It was a healthy summer. Just when some people had begun to write Britain off as merely historical, she pulled us up with a demonstration that she is very much alive now-and intends to go on being alive

It is in curious details that one sees this most clearly. It is the details I have tried to recapture in my series. (See Note on page 7).

A Singing Victory

ONE OF CANADA'S best-known musical groups, the Leslie Bell Singers, recently completed its first American tour and the only adverse criticism anyone was heard to utter was that it should have been longer. During their two-week stay in the United States the singers visited nine cities, passed through seven States and gave 11 performances. The tour itself, which Dr. Bell described as an experiment, was highly successful. One American critic said: "Their freshness, their charm and their lack of sophistication are matched only by their efficiency.'

Two highlights of the visit were a television appearance and an appearance at Malin Hall in New York. The television appearance was with the Fred Waring Show in Manhattan and as this was a new experience for the girls, Dr. Bell was particularly interested in their reactions. He was well pleased with the results, although he considers that working with a choir in television is rather like trying to perform one of Wagner's operas in a telephone booth.

The performance at Malin Hall was attended by many of the American concert agents and managers and although this particular type of audience has the reputation of being "hardboiled" the choir won their spontaneous acclaim.

Each of the programs was divided into three sections. The first group of songs were liturgical, representative of divers religious denominations; the second part was a selection of North American folk songs of which the majority were Canadian, and the concluding section was a miscellany. Plans are already afoot for a second and more extensive tour, but no definite date has been fixed yet. The choir is heard every Sunday evening at 6:30 p.m. MST on the Dominion network.

First Great War, when he was employed as a junior teller ("with no head for figures," he says) in a Winnipeg bank. One day he was caught by the manager doing a most undignified impersonation of him. The offended manager forthwith gave "Bod" the proverbial boot and, as it turned out, thereby helped to launch him on a career in show business.

Packing his belongings into a suitcase, the young man left for New York with a letter of introduction to

William Morris, a great theatrical agent of the day. "Bod" recalls that his interview with Morris was short and very much to the point.

"What's your act?" the big man demanded as soon as "Bod" had been ushered into the room.

The young man groped vainly for

"Have you got an orchestration?" the king of show business asked impatiently.

Still there was no reply. The reaction this time came from two hefty henchmen who picked "Bod" up off his feet and hurled him out the door.

Too proud to return to Winnipeg, "Bod" spent the next year washing dishes, sweeping the streets of New York and acting as a counter man in a coffee stall. Finally he obtained a post as stage-doorman at the Globe Theatre. From this sinecure he was able to watch the ebb and flow of the entertainment world.

Then came the big chance. "Bod" went on tour with the No. 4 company of Zaza, a Broadway hit, touring the southern States for one-night stands in many of the small towns. After that show closed he joined a stock company whose days ended abruptly when the stage manager ran off with all the funds. Then there was another fly-bynight company which broke up when all the scenery collapsed during a performance at Spartenburg, North Carolina. The next job was with a more respectable group that seemed assured of success. "Bod" played the part of an opulent stock-broker who opened the show with the lines, "I won't sell those bonds at fifty." Our hero sensed there was something unusual from the moment he went on stage the first night. The audience was laughing. After he had spoken his opening line they cheered and roared. It seemed

they loved him. Then "Bod" looked down. His shirt-tail was flapping merrily outside his pin-striped trousers. Once again he got the boot.

(Today, "Bod" is a familiar figure around the CBC studios in Torontodressed always not unlike the opulent stock-broker. His clothes are immaculately tailored and his ties, chosen by Rene, are in quiet contrast. Even so, the memory of that opening night appears still to be fresh in his mind. Often, before entering a room, he may be seen to drop his eyes briefly for a last-minute double check.)

Later he got a job as a swimming clown. He had to plunge into a large tank of water and swim on his back, holding aloft an umbrella. The consideration was 50 cents a night. When the First Great War started, he returned from the States to Canada and enlisted. After the Armistice he joined the staff of CKGW in Toronto and began to build a reputation for himself by telling children's stories; on Station CFRB, still later, he developed this skill and gained a big following among young listeners, particularly for his characterization of "Little Wong Foo."

He left CFRB in 1944 and since that time has been heard on CJBC, and, more recently, on the CBC Do-minion network. Every week he gets letters and manuscripts from listeners all over Canada and the northern States. Mail comes in from other countries too, and a few years ago a man in Melbourne bequeathed some old books to "Bod" in his will.

Tragedy at Carman Unpredictable and Unavoidable

Temporary Antenna Erected and Broadcasting Resumed at CBW Within 54 Hours of Crash

Unpredictable and unavoidable tragedy marked the events which culminated in the collapse and destruction of the 570-foot antenna tower at Station CBW, Manitoba, on February 4 and 5. From noon on February 4, when an R.C.A.F. training plane collided with the tower's upper northern guy wire, to 12:30 a.m. on February 5, when the tower fell, efforts to remedy the damage which were well conceived and well forwarded by competent men nevertheless were pursued by implacable misfortune.

Sequence of Events

CBW's transmitter staff, stationed at Carman, Manitoba, worked efficiently and courageously throughout the emergency, but the nature of the

double tragedy was such that nothing that they could do could have prevented or modified it.

This was the sequence of events: February 4, noon, a Beechcraft air-

craft piloted by Flying Officer Charles Chow-Leong of Lethbridge, with two English student navigators, struck the northern upper guy wire at a level of 374 feet and brushed the tower itself. The plan crashed in flames on CBC property 500 yards from the tower, and the three occupants were killed.

CBW's transmitter staff, on duty at the station, heard or saw nothing, and only knew of the accident when a passing farmer came in to tell them a plane had crashed nearby. They ran to the burning plane immediately, with all available fire extinguishing equipment from the transmitter, but their efforts to save the airmen were

Tower "Kinked"

Returning to the transmitter, they saw that the antenna tower was 'kinked" at a point about 70 feet from the top, and bending toward the west and south to a distance of about 20 feet off perpendicular. The station was still on the air, and there had been no interruption or interference with programs.

R. L. Punshon, chief operator at Carman, telephoned Prairie Regional Headquarters, Winnipeg, to report the accident and asked for experts to check the condition of the tower and see what could be done to repair the broken guy wire and bent steel.

At 6:00 p.m. a crew of five technicians from the Dominion Bridge Company arrived at Carman. It was decided that the station should go off the air as soon as possible and a check should be made. At midnight, when necessary equipment had arrived, Frank Bryan, in charge of the crew, after a survey decided that they would attempt to attach a temporary guy wire to hold the tower in position until further assistance could (Continued on page 7)

Deeds That Live. This afternoon in the final talk of this series called the Summing Up, Harriet Hill looks back over the women who have been discussed on the previous broadcasts and analyses their childhood to try to find some factor that accounts for their rise to fame. She admits that she has found no definite pattern which foretells the future greatness of these women. "From the analysis," says Miss Hill, "it would appear as if parents never really know just what they have on their hands. Even if a child doesn't seem to be particularly gifted, she may have a burning desire which will carry her a long way." From Montreal.

arrive from the Canadian Bridge Company of Windsor, Ontario, who had built the tower. Three men started to climb the steel ladders inside the antenna structure. This was approximately at 12:20 a.m. The night was dark and cloudy. A Department of Transport truck had a searchlight trained on the tower, and this gave light up to about 500 feet.

Chief Operator's Story What followed is best told in the words of R. L. Punshon, who, with most of his transmitter crew within twenty feet of the base of the

"I heard a cracking noise, up the wer." Mr. Punshon said, "and Mr. Punshon said, tower. thought at once that the top portion, bent in the airplane accident, was coming down. Then I saw something falling, high up, and heard the foreman shouting: 'She's away!'

"The lower part of the tower did not fall at once. It seemed to stand

there trembling and wavering for a full second, and then began to fall to the east, in our direction-nearly opposite to the direction in which the top part fell. I guessed that the supporting insulator at the base had given away, and the antenna was slipping off its base. Then I heard the guy wires and steel struts snapping, and a terrific rushing sound as the tower came down.

'There were about 25 technicians and engineers around the base, and as the tower started to fall they all ran, trying to avoid both the falling tower and the broken guy wires that were whipping around. Some dove under the trucks, others took to any available shelter near them. It was a miracle that all on the ground escaped.

"The repair men who had climbed the tower were high up-one at about 400 feet, the others at fifty-foot intervals below. All three were killed.

"These two tragic accidents in the course of little more than twelve hours have cast a shadow over all our staff."

There had been no hint whatever that the lower part of the tower was in danger of falling, although the in-creasing bend of the "kinked" portion had led to fears that the top part might go. The decision of the Dominion Bridge Company's men to climb the tower and attach a temporary guy wire was logical in the circumstances and quite within normal technical routine. CBW's transmitter staff, working at other essential tasks in connection with the repair, could
