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## This Week:

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FOR five years pig-tailed and pug-nosed pre-schoolers in thousands of living rooms across the country have learned to make their own fun and to play with others, through the *CBC Kindergarten of the Air*. Without budging from their own homes these little people have many of the advantages of a regular kindergarten, without cost or transportation problems. On Tuesday morning, September 8, the program begins its sixth season of Monday-to-Friday broadcasts on the Trans-Canada network. Each broadcast proceeds from an introductory theme to general information about life around the child and his home, exercises for good posture and rhythmic movement, songs, stories, handwork instructions, and suggestions for later activity outdoors or indoors. "Teachers" DOROTHY JANE GOULDING (at right in cover photo) and RUTH JOHNSON (left) alternate in conducting *Kindergarten of the Air*. Both are wives and mothers. Dorothy Jane arranges her own narration and music, and Ruth's scripts are prepared by Hazel B. Baggs and Gladys Dickson, two kindergarten specialists. This has proved one of the most popular CBC programs and has won high praise from educational authorities, who recommend its use in organized kindergarten groups and junior school grades as well as in the home.

**THE DAYS OF SAIL.** The story of *The Black Joke*, a strange ship which sailed into Halifax harbour in November, 1811, and of the Liverpool privateers during the Anglo-American War of 1812; written by Joseph Schull and produced by J. Frank Willis. From Toronto. The *Black Joke*, a slaver, was bought by Enos Collins for a passenger ship. No sooner did he have the ship scoured of her evil past than the war of 1812 broke out. Opportunist Collins quickly sought from the governor a Letter of Marque for privateering against the Americans. The governor could not give Collins such a permit since no authorization had come from England. The problem was solved when Collins obtained a Letter of Marque "against France, et cetera." Collins included America in the "et cetera." Warned by the governor that if his ship was captured and the Americans did not choose to recognize this "et cetera" the distinction between privateering and piracy would disappear,

Collins put his ship to sea under the name of the Liverpool Packet. The *Black Joke* is the swashbuckling and harrowing story of this privateer whose success along the American coast became notorious.

**CBC French Network**

Programs to be heard on the Western section of the CBC French network this week include: on Sunday—The NBC Symphony Orchestra; and La Fin du Jour, recorded program in which Adolf Busch's Ensemble perform Suite No. 2 in B Minor, by J. S. Bach, and a vocal quartet with Henri Expert sings Psalms 19 and 25. Monday—Revue d'Actualite, roundup of news by correspondents in Canada and abroad; Fete Au Village, a visit with a family in La Tuque, Quebec; a radio adaptation of Georges Simenon's novel Les Vacances de Maigret; and Tour de Chant, a concert by the Chanteuses du Belvedere, of Quebec. La Terre Qui Chante, on Wednesday, includes songs of Canada, and on Thursday songs of France and French Canada are heard on the program Baptiste et Marianne. In Les Livres Parlent, also on Thursday, extracts from famous works are read by French network actors. The play in the series Nouveaux Dramatiques, on Friday, is Le Dernier Mot, by Noel Guynes. On Saturday stories for children are heard in Les Plus Beaux Contes; Maureen Forrester, soprano, is heard with an orchestra conducted by Joseph Berljawsky, in Concert Intime, and on La Fin du Jour the day closes with music by Stravinsky performed by the RCA Victor Orchestra conducted by the composer.

# Television In Canada

Excerpts from an address to the Edmonton Rotary Club, by J. R. Finlay, Prairie Regional Representative of the CBC

YOU may feel that you can take television or leave it, and for your part you are going to leave it. But I want you to look objectively and coolly at what television is. It is first of all a means of projecting a stream of images combined with sound and motion right into people's homes. It has all the psychological impact of moving pictures, but you don't have to go to a theatre to see it. It sits there talking and being seen night after night, right in people's houses. And it is making a very direct assault on the minds of people in those homes, the assault that comes through vision and sound and motion. The only thing that's missing is colour, and colour will be added to it before long.

Looking at it coolly then, I think we can see that television is obviously an extremely effective means of conveying impressions to the minds of millions of people and doing it constantly, day in and day out, year in and year out. Whether or not the idea of that screen in your house appeals to you personally, there is no doubt that it does appeal to a great majority of people. There will be about 25 million sets in the United States by the end of this year. There are two million sets in Britain, and in Canada already there are more than 300,000 sets. If the rate of sale keeps on as at present, there will be over a million sets held by Canadian families in Canada, within five years.

I don't think there is much room for argument about television being a very effective, perhaps the most vivid and effective means of mass communication that man has yet invented. But what counts is not just its efficiency, what counts above all is

what it communicates in its very effective way. It is going to be a strong social force, a force that can be for the detriment or the benefit of society. It is going to form a good part of the mental intake of younger Canadians who are growing up now. And their sense of values, their ideas in the future, are going to depend to a considerable extent on what television is communicating. What our society is like thirty years from now will depend not a little on what television has communicated in those thirty years. . . . The worth of a nation, the worth of our own Canada, isn't just measured by the statistics of its production, of its output in physical things. Canada's place in the world, its function for its own people, will depend quite a lot on the things of the mind, as well. From the economic and geographical point of view, Canada is quite unique. We have arbitrarily sliced off the top of the North American continent and the fourteen or fifteen million people living in it choose to think of it and try to develop it as a nation. Yet all the natural ordinary economic factors work against it staying as a separate nation. The natural channels of communication on this continent run north and south. There's the immense pull of that great and vigorous economic organization, economic national entity, south of us in the United States. Here in Canada we have a country of two main languages, of a comparatively small number of people spread right across a continent, most of them living more closely to more people of another country than to other Canadians. In spite of all these facts, we have decided and still maintain that it is worth having and developing a

nation, a national entity, in this slice of the continent. We have taken a good many concrete steps to see that industries develop particularly here, although it might be cheaper for us as consumers not to have them develop here. We have had to decide many things to ensure that the national life of Canada did develop. . . .

Well, television is a big thing. It poses very big questions and problems to Canada, partly because of its own difficult nature, partly because of the difficult facts and conditions in our own country. Television broadcasting is very costly to install and to operate, and there are the basic facts of small population and big space, the magnet of the great and friendly country to the south of us, and the fact of our own national aspirations in the face of all these difficulties. . . .

The CBC was given the job of starting this development. Those of us who are mixed up in it sometimes wake up in the middle of the night with television spots in front of our eyes. It is an extremely intricate, complicated, expensive kind of operation. It is going to take all the resources and ingenuity of public and private enterprise working together to provide the kind of television service that we think Canada deserves. We hope that through the years it will develop in the over-all interests of the healthy development of family life and our Canadian society. We hope that through the years the minds of young Canadians have something added to them, not subtracted from them, that horizons are broadened and not just narrowed.

All this doesn't mean that television should be used to cram culture down people's throats. . . . We think it perfectly practical and sensible that television programming should be planned so that there is lots that is entertaining, and distracting and pure fun, and at the same time there

should be a good deal of material that adds a touch of beauty, new insight, perhaps a better understanding of things that go on in Canada. We want to stimulate as well as distract the mind. It does seem important to us that we should develop program production — not simply television transmission — in Canada. There should be a basic Canadian content in it. Not that material from outside Canada should be excluded. Canadians have a great deal of interest in things created outside Canada, in what goes on in other countries. We take a great deal of pleasure in knowing and seeing things that go on south of the border. But because of the impact and the profound influence that TV will have in the years to come it is important that at least a good proportion of the actual programming of television be created and start in Canada.

Let me put it this way: We are always grateful when the friendly people next door mind the children for an afternoon, but we wouldn't want our children to be brought up entirely by the neighbours alone.

Of course it would be far cheaper to import program material than to develop it here. The cost of an American program is spread over all the great market in the States. To develop a program here and spread

**REPORTER ABROAD.** In the last talk of this series Pierre Berton tells of a time, nearly a year ago in the French village of Chantilly, when he had the good fortune to be invited to the opening of the most exclusive of the French hunts, under the patronage of the Marquis de Roualle. the cost over a far smaller number of people, however it is done, will mean that the cost per person is greater. It would be cheaper and much more simple to be just consumers of program material, not creators of it. But in all sorts of other fields we have shown that there are great abilities in Canada to produce things, to organize for the production of concrete things. And we have taken steps to see that there are opportunities for those things to develop. If the production of physical things is important, isn't it also important that we do arrange—through the proper economic structure—an opportunity for Canadians to produce television programs, things for the mind as well.

At the present time the means are limited for production in Canada, but quite a lot is being done already. Last fall the CBC started Canada's first two television operations in Montreal and Toronto. These are not simply local stations serving the two great areas of dense population. They are primarily production centres from which will come a basic national program service to be distributed to all stations across Canada. We want to

expand and extend television service as widely and as quickly as possible. We feel that to the greatest extent possible Canadians everywhere should have a fairly equal chance at the benefits of this new medium.

The CBC now has three stations going. Toronto and Montreal are already exchanging programs over a micro-wave link which runs by way of Ottawa, so that it was relatively simple to put a third transmitter in Ottawa, which opened recently. We expect to open a station in Vancouver before Christmas and one in Winnipeg early next year. Another CBC station is planned for Halifax some time later. These points will also serve as regional production centres to add program material to the national television service. Private station licenses are being granted in other Canadian cities, and the present policy is to permit only one station in any one area, which will have available to it several hours weekly of the national television service, in addition to its local programs and material from outside sources. As soon as a reasonable degree of coverage is achieved across Canada then additional licenses will be granted in those places where the number of available channels permits duplication of service.

That, stated simply, is the pattern of development planned for Canada, which is now in the process of being implemented.

**CBC News.**—By using the facilities of six newsrooms, at St. John's (Nfld.), Halifax, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, CBC news bulletins are broadcast at suitable listening hours, local time. **CBC Wednesday Night**

**EVEREST EXPEDITION.** Colonel Sir John Hunt and members of his 1953 Everest-climbing team will give a considered account of their great achievement and put the story in its proper perspective, in an hour-long BBC-transcribed program. Colonel Hunt, who is the chief narrator on the program, will explain the strategy and tactics of the whole expedition, and introduce many of the climbers, each of whom will describe episodes which fitted into the general plan. Thus, in addition to hearing more details from Sir Edmund Hillary of that final effort through which he and Tensing, the Sherpa porter, got to the summit, listeners will hear about other things which contributed to the success of the enterprise. The program traces the assault step by step, and its matter-of-fact style adds greatly to the epic tale these men have to tell. Hillary himself describes his feelings and those of Tensing when they finally set foot on that "symmetrical, beautiful snow cone" that is the highest point on earth.

**WELSH CHOIRS.** The Treorchy Male Voice Choir; The Dowlais United Choir; by transcription. From BBC, London. Llangollen on the River Dee, in North Wales, holds an International Eisteddfod to which singers, dancers and musicians from as many as fourteen countries assemble. Some Welsh choral singing was recorded there by the BBC. The Treorchy Choir, twice a close second for the Eisteddfod award, has the reputation of having more young men among its members than any other Welsh group—average age, late twenties. Treorchy is a mining town at the far end of the Rhondda Valley. After World War II, John Davies, a

schoolmaster, formed the choir, of men most of whom had never sung before, but were Welshmen, and the descendants of Welshmen who had sung before Queen Victoria in Treorchy's first male choir. What they lacked in training they made up in enthusiasm, and today they have a varied repertoire, including shanties, spirituals, classics and modern music, as well as the traditional hymns and folk songs of Wales. Dowlais is one of the oldest mining and industrial towns in Wales, and is noted for its choral traditions. D. T. Davies, local rate collector and organist, formed the choir in the depression days to cheer the men up. A choir 247 strong won the Eisteddfod award last year. Better times have come to Dowlais now, and the choir is in great voice.


**GAZOOKA.** Though a gazooka may suggest one of the more airy flights of P. G. Wodehouse's fancy, it is, in

When the great coal strike of 1926 brought work in the South Wales coalfields to a standstill for many months, the miners cast about for some means of filling their days of enforced idleness and keeping up their morale. Being Welshmen, they turned naturally to music, and having no money to spare, it had to be music that cost little or nothing. So they formed gazooka bands, and tonight's program recounts the tale of one of the lighter aspects of that queer, fascinating period. It was written by Gwyn Thomas, and produced in the BBC's Cardiff studios by Elwyn Evans. Arthur Phillips is the narrator.

**THE VICTORIAN HOUSE.** Adaptation and dramatization by Earle Grey of Toronto of a narrative poem in blank verse by Philip Child; John Drainie in the leading role; harp accompaniment; Lola Thompson, producer. From Toronto. The poem was originally published by the Ryerson Press of Toronto in *Longer Works for Upper School*. Commenting on it in this edition, Dr. Child, who is the chancellor's professor of English at Trinity College, University of Toronto, wrote: "... Beneath the surface, this experience of selling one's old home is not, after all, a simple one. Much life has been lived in this house. To it young men brought their brides, in it their children were born, and to some of its rooms death was a visitor; men and women went forth into the world from its shelter and later returned to visit it; men went out to two great wars from it and some did not come back. But years have passed over the house while outside its walls the world has changed and men's ideas have altered. Now it will be torn down to make place for a Brand-new house... As the speaker of the poem thinks of these things, the house, tangible reality of bricks and plaster though it is, seems to him to become a symbol of the world itself, that home that contains all men as long as they live." Characters and episodes of *The Victorian House*, Dr. Child says, are invented, not reported from recollection. "It is true, however, that the convention of poetry requires an author to dip his pen in the blood of at least one or two slain reticences."

He went to Regina in 1929, and worked at various jobs, such as selling insurance, during the depression years. Later he spent six years in the army, and on discharge in 1946 joined the staff of a Regina daily paper as reporter. He spent one year as parliamentary correspondent at

Ottawa, and has in recent times graduated to editorial writing.

McLintock is married and has one daughter, Barbara, 2—"who should be in radio, never a second of dead air."

In addition to his editorial writing, McLintock does a political column when the legislature is on and some political reporting. He is a stringer for a U.S. weekly, and is heard on CBC and CBC-IS. His radio career began when Phil Carscallen pressed

Art Morrow's Quest

Seeking Right Instrument, Montreal Musician Now Plays 24

Art Morrow, director of many a Montreal broadcast of music on the lighter side in the last two years—including the CBC series *Songs chez nous*, *Trip to the Moon* and *Cue for Fun*—says his present arranging and conducting work is the culmination of a hunt he has been carrying on nearly all his life, a hunt for the right musical instrument.

"In that hunt I have learned to play about two dozen instruments," he says. "When I was in my 'teens I was one of the main props of the Montreal pawn and second-hand business, to say nothing of the installment plan, so fickle was my taste in instruments. Later, with the Canadian Army band, I learned to play a lot more, the main one being the flute. It has been in a combination of them all, the orchestra to which I would add a choir, that I have found most complete satisfaction."

It was on *Sunshine Society*, a CBC variety show of two seasons ago, that he first took the conductor's stand. His arranging debut was so far back that he can't place it definitely. Music has been his dish since he discovered the family piano, which immediately became his favourite toy—that is, until his mother gave him a ukelele for Christmas when he was six. Two weeks later he appeared in a local show playing *Old Black Joe* and *Swanee River*.

A big event in his life, and one he says he will never forget, came when he was 13. His classmates, angered

on hearing that Morrow's mouth organ had been stolen from his desk, took up a collection and bought him a new one. That same year he organized his first hillbilly band; during the next period of his life he recalls many an uneasy situation with his family. Late one night his father, a civil engineer, had to travel nearly an hour by street car to haul him home; it was the fifth night in a row that the band had been out playing at church, school and other entertainments. Needless to say, the homework had begun to pile up.

No doubt Mr. Morrow, Sr., had something to do with young Morrow going to work at a bank when he had finished at high school. He was a clerk for five years, but without relinquishing any of his musical activities. At first he conducted his own band, then he joined forces with Johnny Holmes when the latter started his orchestra.

By this time he had started his career as an arranger. "It began to gather momentum at a great rate when the war broke out and I joined up as a bandsman," he recalls. "Those years in the army were invaluable. Learning to arrange is just like learning to play an instrument. It has to be practised and I certainly got plenty of that." During one period he was arranging music for three bands—a military band, an army dance band and the Johnny Holmes band.

Eventually he was transferred to the Army Show and made leader of one of the Tin Hats Revue orchestras which went overseas. "That meant more invaluable experience. It was then that I learned about show business on a big scale, especially timing."

Returning to Canada, he went back to the bank. But he didn't stay long.

By this time word of his musicianship had been passed around in radio circles in Montreal and some of the leading conductors began handing arranging jobs over to him. One of these conductors was Jean Deslauriers who was soon to take over direction of *Le theatre lyrique*, a CBC French network feature which at first presented popular operettas and then switched to favoured operatic excerpts. Through his work on this show, it was found that Morrow was equally facile in both fields. Another of his arranging jobs more recently had been for the Montreal productions of the CBC's *Opportunity Knocks* talent show. In this program's contest for composers Morrow has entered two original works, one of which won a first prize.

On the *Sunshine Society* programs from Montreal, Morrow became a radio conductor for the first time. On his next conducting assignment, *Fiddle*

*Joe's Yarns*, he added the role of choir conductor. On *Cue for Fun* this summer he has been directing a vocal group as well as a 17-piece orchestra.

Apart from a few lessons on the piano, Art Morrow is a self-taught musician. "It was more than a bit of a grind," he admits, "but it is certainly paying off today. My practical knowledge of what effects are within the scope of each instrument is a great help." He says he has found that if he knows the musicians for whom he is making arrangements and whom he will be directing in the actual performance, he can get the best results. With some musicians, it is a question of not asking them to do the impossible, with others it is a case of spurring them on to use their talents to the fullest.

Even the years he spent in the bank taught musician Morrow a useful lesson. "They taught me that arrangements are somewhat like a ledger. Everything has to balance." He also learns something new every day, he says, from his three small sons. He's keeping a watchful eye on them and whatever talents he detects, no matter what they may be, he intends to foster them in every way he can.

Nat Christie is 80 years old, and when he came here as a young man, the Indians, the Sarcees, pitched their tents only a few blocks from the Palliser Hotel now in the heart of downtown Calgary. When Nat Christie came here from the East there were barely a thousand souls in Calgary. In his lifetime, he has seen it roll like tumbleweed—seen the boom rise and fix itself in the form of a great city.—John Fisher, on CBC.

**A Mari Usque ad Mare**

Rather startling confirmation of the wide distribution of a CBC Trans-Canada network broadcast came to W. H. Anderson, conductor of the Sunday Chorale series, and his producer, T. M. Taylor, last week.

Mr. Anderson had just received a letter from a listener in Chemainus, Vancouver Island. Looking out over the Pacific Ocean on Sunday, August 16, Mrs. Joan Chambers had been listening to the *Sunday Chorale* as she had done for many weeks. "I listen," she wrote, "and then procrastinate about writing, so today I am doing it immediately after hearing you, to tell you what a very lovely half-hour you give us . . . a most soul-satisfying period in a raucous world."

Mr. Anderson brought the letter in to the CBC Building to show to Mr. Taylor, and as he did so the telephone rang. It was a call from Mrs. Emily McLean of Winnipeg. On August 16 she had been on the shore of Prince Edward Island, looking out over the Gulf of St. Lawrence toward Cabot Strait and the Atlantic Ocean, and listening to the *Sunday Chorale*. She wanted to tell Mr. Anderson how much she had enjoyed it.
