### The Concert Hour

WHILE "live" programs are the centre of interest for CBC producers, it is not impossible to find interest and variety in recorded programs also, according to T. M. Taylor, of Winnipeg, a

CBC producer whose attention is given chiefly to programs of serious music.

Tom Taylor was born in Alaska, son of a prospector who dredged gold in Ophir Creek in the earliest days of the gold rush, but he spent most of his youth in British Columbia's Okanagan Valley, and his years from 18 on in the R.A.F. He served through the Battle of Britain and at the time of Dunkirk was still in France. From there he

went to Bengal and Burma, But his chief interest still continued to be music.

While still an airman on active service, Tom worked as a librarian with Mr. Boyd Neel, eminent London musician recently appointed dean of the Toronto Conservatory of Music, and after demobilization continued his work as Boyd Neel's secretary.

The recorded program Concert Hour, heard daily on W-K-X at 4:15-3:15 p.m., is one of Tom's

important jobs at CBC, Winnipeg. Last year he extended it a little to include one day a week devoted to requests from listeners, and this will continue. Another extension is planned this year, to include short talks or interviews with musical personalities, who may be asked to play their favourite records and add brief commentaries. This week, on November 9, Tom and his announcer, Maurice Burchell, will be on the air during the Concert Hour to talk a while about plans for the coming winter season. (Please turn to page 8)

### **Empire Broadcast**

World-Wide Christmas Exchange Originates in Australia This Year

Advance announcements by the BBC indicate that the Sovereign's broadcast and world-wide exchange of greetings, now a traditional part of the Christmas season on the radio, will this year originate in Australia and New Zealand, with a script by Alan Burgess of the BBC and John Thompson and Mungo MacCallum of the Australian Broadcasting Commis-

Burgess has already left London, flying to Pakistan, India, Ceylon, Hong Kong, Singapore, Borneo and Sarawak. Also flying to Australia is Laurence Gilliam, of BBC, who will produce the program in Sydney, in association with Neil Hutchinson of the ABC. Gilliam will visit Cyprus, Kenya, Rhodesia, South Africa, Mauritius and the Cocos Islands, on the way out.

This year's broadcast, first to originate outside London, marks the 21st anniversary of the Royal Christmas message.





### CBC Wednesday Night

KING HENRY IV. Second in the series of Shakespeare's historical plays on CBC Wednesday Night is King Henry IV, a work of the dramatist's middle period, and so highly-coloured with the boisterous humour of Falstaff, King of Comedy, that it hardly fits into the historical sequence at all, the fictional characters-as Falstaff seems to be, despite rumours-quit outshining the historical ones. The tales of the misspent youth of the Prince-later Henry V-are mentioned in Holinshed, but the attribution of the character of Falstaff to Sir John Oldcastle, Lollard martyr, seems to have little foundation, and is specifically denied by Shakespeare in the epilogue to the second part, to be performed in this series on December 9. Even more farfetched is Balzac's remarkable error in identifying the mighty Shakespearian clown with the Sir John Fastolfe of King Henry V. But here in this greatest of English comedies is a marvellous evocation of the spirit of reckless youth, the wild heath about Gadshill, trickery and merriment at

the Boar's Head Tavern, and a wealth of mingled beauty and laughter. From the moment when he wakes in the Prince's lodging, to speak his oddlypoetic lines: "Marry, sweet wag, when thou art king, let not us that are squires of the night's body be called thieves of the day's beauty; let us be Diana's foresters, gentlemen of the shade, minions of the moon"-Falstaff dominates the scene, a blundering, uproarious, occasionally wistful character, the like of which was never seen on the stage before or since.

CBC Program Director Announces Plan

For some time younger talent on the prairies has had an opportunity to perform for the regional audience through the CBC program Prairie Showcase, heard on Fridays at 7:15 p.m. MST in the mountain zone, and 10:00 p.m. CST in the central zone.

On November 4, a new series was established, under the title Guest Appearance, which will provide further opportunities of this sort. This will be heard on Wednesdays at 4:15 p.m. CST, and 3:15 p.m. MST. These programs, as in the case of Prairie Showcase, will originate in various cities throughout the Region, to make them available to as many capable artists as possible.

In announcing the new series, Dan E. Cameron, CBC Program Director in the Prairie Region, drew attention to the fact that artists auditioned by the CBC are judged on a comparative basis.

"That means," he said, "that they are measured by our Audition . Board in terms of what is known to be available throughout the Region rather than what is available in their own particular town or district. Before auditioning, artists must complete our Application for Audition form, in order that their background of training and experience may be considered.

### A Yodel for Joe?

It's surprising that Fiddle Joe's Yarns have retained their authentic French-Canadian flavour lately, for as playwright Charles Wassermann prepares his scripts, he can look through the window to see not the red-andgold blaze of the Laurentian hills, as you might expect of someone who writes so intimately of St. Christophe, P.Q., but the dark green firs of an Alpine village. When he pokes his head out of the door to say hello to a passerby, he sees, more than likely, a figure in the traditional leather shorts, gaily-embroidered bretelles, short jacket and feathered hat of the Austrian mountain dweller, instead of Fiddle Joe's capuchin or Hormidas Grenier's tasselled toque. Austria is Wassermann's homeland, and for some weeks, now, he has been living in Altaussee, a summer resort situated on a small lake in the Steiermark district of Central Austria. Like St. Christophe, the Austrian countryside is rich in folklore and it was natural that Wassermann should take an interest in the French-Canadian equivalent when he settled in Onebec. . . .

### Toscanini at Home

Vacation at Lake Maggiore; New Series Starts November 8

RTURO TOSCANINI, now 86 A years of age, arrived in New York on Saturday, October 24, to prepare for his 16th (and perhaps his last) season as music director of the NBC Symphony Orchestra, which begins its winter series on Sunday, November 8 (W-7:00 p.m., K-X-9:00 p.m.). He was returning from one of his most enjoyable vacations in many years. This summer in Italy, surrounded by family and friends, he found new peace and enjoyment at his island home in Lago Maggiore, some miles north of Milan.

His life followed an almost regular routine for several of the summer months in the company of his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Toscanini, their son Walfredo, the young conductor Guido Cantelli and Mrs. Cantelli, and NBC general music

Mornings, after his usual early rising, Maestro Toscanini spent in his room working at the piano on music he is going to conduct during the coming season. At noon, he would appear for lunch, fully dressed, with his usual starched collar even in the hottest weather. After lunch in the courtyard, while he sipped his coffee, he would watch family and friends playing the Italian game of boccie, a version of bowling played with wooden balls. The great rivalry was between Cantelli and 24-year-old Walfredo. Toscanini cheered them both from the sidelines. As a youngster he was himself quite a good boccie player. This time he doubled as umpire and audience, since virtually everyone else played.

Evenings, after dinner, they all went up to Toscanini's sitting room where Walter had rigged up a high-fidelity sound system, and listened to recordings of the maestro's past performances of works he planned to repeat this season. Toscanini allowed friends to make up the programs, and he sat in his chair and conducted with his usual fervor and excitement. Sometimes he disapproved of the tempo the Toscanini on the recordings had taken, and decided that next time it would be different. Even at 86, he still feels he has much to learn.

The details of his 1953-54 broadcasts have not been announced, but a few years ago Toscanini gave a clue to his main ambition in his last years. He said: "I played the first Stravinsky, the first Sibelius, even certain of the first Wagner operas to be heard in Italy . . . I worked and I fought with all my power for the new music, which is what a young artist, above all others, should do. Now, let the young men take up this fight. I want to understand Bach and Havdn and Beethoven a little better before I die."

### U.S. Critics Comment on Carnegie Hall Concert

concert of Canadian music which Leopold Stokowski conducted in Carnegie Hall, New York (broadcast on October 18), may now be interested to compare their own reactions with those of two of this continent's most experienced music critics, who covered the concert for their respective papers-Virgil Thomson for the New York Herald Tribune and Olin Downes for the New York Times.

(The guest artists were Montreal violinist Noel Brunet, Toronto soprano Lois Marshall, and the Westminster Choir of New York. The program consisted of Pantomime, by Pierre Mercure; Violin Concerto, by Alexander Brott; Tabuh-Tabuhan, by Colin Mc-Phee; Antiphone, by Francois Morel; Two Mystical Songs (poems by John Donne), by Godfrey Ridout; and Coronation Suite, by Healey Willan.)

In the way of general comment, Downes wrote:

"The concert might have appeared as an event of special political and diplomatic significance, so far as ex-ternals were concerned. The hall was hung with the Canadian colours; representatives of practically every delegation to the United Nations were there. The program consisted entirely of works by Canadian composers and was heard with manifest approval by a brilliant audience. But that is of secondary importance where this review is concerned. The concert was of exceptional interest and artistic significance. Not one of the scores was of a merely conventional character. Not one of them but revealed an individuality of more or less strength on

ISTENERS who heard the recent the part of the composer, or that concert of Canadian music which failed to show an impressive degree of technical mastery.

> Thomson said the concert was notable for two "absolutely first-class" works (those by McPhee and Morel), and one other "almost as fine" (God-frey Ridout). The other three, he said, were "respectable."

> Some of the comments by these two critics on the individual works were as follows:

> Tabuh-Tabuhan, by Colin McPhee Thomson: "The whole piece is a delight for bright sounds, lively rhythms, and lovely tunes. It may be the ending-piece that all conductors are looking for, something to be used in place of Ravel's Daphnis et Chloe. For it is completely brilliant, busy, sweet and fun.

> Downes: "This score is fascinating for its timbres, for the use of overlapping rhythm groups and the dramatic accumulating power of its deep pulse and its superimposed rhythms."

Pantomime, by Pierre Mercure

Thomson: ". . . makes neatly angular motions but does not explain (or quite justify) its choice of instru-ments" (winds and percussion).

Downes: "One is not certain that the composer, born in 1927, has completely found his style, or perhaps exactly satisfied himself in his orchestral balances, conceived for brass, woodwinds and percussion instruments."

Violin Concerto by Alexander Brott

Thomson: The concerto is "percussion neoclassicism in which overstatement, though essential to the style, weakens the expression." Brunet was "agreeable for tone, if not always for pitch, in an ungrateful work.'

Downes: "Original, brilliant, technically resourceful, more than adroit

and individual in the way that the form is handled and in the manner of writing of the solo instrument and orchestra. One wonders here if there is not something really new under the sun in the composer's approach to the modern concerto form." Brunet performed "very efficiently and effect-

Antiphone by Francois Morel

Thomson: "A lovely piece, an orchestral meditation on model melodies of Gregorian chant." The harmonies were "wondrously mysterious and ever so suavely orchestrated. This piece by a young man still well under 30 has poetry and style. I should have liked to hear it right over again."

Downes: "A suggestion of the primitive, couched in a highly sophisticated modern technique-one of the most interesting, if highly experi-mental, pieces of the evening."

Two Mystical Songs by Godfrey

Thomson: "A neoromantic's need of paying homage to Bach seems to have been their inspiration. But their melodic lines have a grace as of Schubert, and their dramatic moments remember Berlioz and Meyerbeer . . They are lovely and can be used to advantage, I am sure, in the voice-with-orchestra repertoire." Lois Marshall's "clear, high soprano voice and lovely musicianship are ever a delight.'

Downes: "Admirable for the model harmonic quality far nearer to the esthetic of Donne's period than of ours, and admirable scored. Miss Marshall-not for the first time in this city—won an ovation for her per-formance."

Coronation Suite by Healey Willan Thomson: "The eclectic creation of an organist and choirmaster wholly formed in the last century. It is British official art at its most characteristic. The Westminster Choir "sang consistently out of key."

"A recorded program doesn't just happen," Mr. Taylor says. "It has to be planned and timed and organized just like a live program-if it is to have an idea behind it, and be of any real interest. It doesn't do just to throw unrelated, plotless batches of records at people.

'One thing I would like to say to those listeners who have written us at one time or another asking for certain records, and that is: Please try to remember the other listener, and remember also that need I have mentioned for a certain amount of planning in advance. We cannot just put your favourite records in anywhere. They should-and I think you will agree to this-have some proper place in the pattern of the program.

Downes: "A first-rate composition, one of dignity and substance of thought, majesty and not mere bombast, and done by a composer as accomplished in his writing of a cappella music for voices as he is skilled and

finely inventive in scoring for the instruments." The choir was "magnificent in tone quality, intonation and impressiveness of delivery."

Thomson did not mention the conductor. Downes said that an outstanding musical feature of the evening was "the superb conducting of Leopold Stokowski, who, when he is in this vein, has hardly a peer among presentday leaders for power, secure mastery, dramatic eloquence and richness of colour in his interpretations,"

Arts Board Appoints Florence James Full-Time Consultant

The Saskatchewan Arts Board has announced the appointment of Mrs. Florence James, formerly of New York, as full-time drama consultant on the staff of the Board. Mrs. James will conduct the Drama Workshop each year, and will lend assistance on request to communities undertaking plays, festivals, or pageants. Her assistance is expected to be specially valuable in the preparations for Sas-katchewan's Golden Jubilee celebrations in 1955.

Mrs. James produced a performance of a stage adaptation of W. O. Mitchell's radio play in the CBC series, Jake and the Kid, The Day Jake Made Her Rain, at the Workshop last August.
