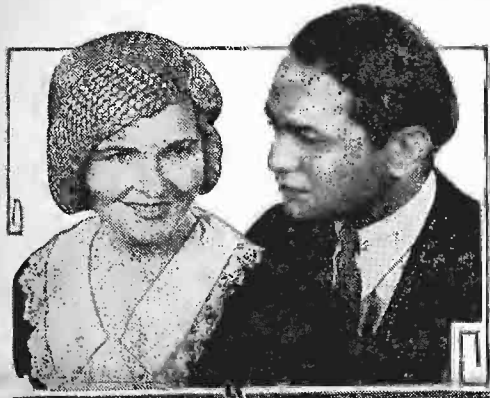

"Grand Canyon", New Symphony By Grofe, Has Radio Premiere

"Grand Canyon," Ferde Grofe's latest score, and one on which Paul Whiteman is said to have spent approximately \$20,000, will be played by that king of jazz in a special concert at 11:15 p. m. Sunday (November 28) on the NBC "red" network which probably will include WTAM (1020 kc.), WENR (870 kc.), and WGY (890 kc.) as well as WEAJ (600 kc.).

Freddie Miller, Billy Shaw Bout Is On WFBE Card

Freddie Miller and Billy Shaw will fight for the Ohio Featherweight championship, Monday night (November 30) at 9:30, with WFBE reporting the bout. Harry Hartman will re-report the match as the information comes to him by wire direct from the ringside at Sydney, O.

Radio happenings in November, 1931 have been recorded for posterity. Ray Lawill, traffic manager of WKRC, and Eugene Mittendorf, manager, saw to it that a copy of last week's RADIO DIAL was sealed in the corner stone of the new Cincinnati Union station November 20.

Grofe, a native of the West, conceived the idea of a descriptive symphony five years ago on a visit to the Grand Canyon, but the press of composing and his radio work (he directs the Florsheim Frolic on Sunday afternoons) has permitted him little time for the writing. In fact, he encountered some difficulty in completing the last movement, the Storm. In desperation, he finally went to the woods of northern Wisconsin for a rest. While he was there, a terrific thunderstorm gave him the theme. The symphonic suite has five movements: Sunrise, Painted Desert, Humoresque, On the Trail, and Cloudburst.

This broadcast of Whiteman is expected to equal in importance his first concert some years ago when, in Carnegie Hall, he made musical history by playing Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue," with orchestration by Grofe.

President Hoover Addresses Home Owners' Meeting

President Hoover's views on the relationship of the home to the nation will be heard throughout the country when his address before the President's Conference on Home Building and Home Ownership is broadcast over NBC and Columbia networks Wednesday (December 2) at 9 p. m. WKRC and WSAI will broadcast locally.

The President will be introduced by Secretary of Commerce Robert P. Lamont, and will speak from Constitution Hall, in Washington, at the opening session of the four-day conference.

The meetings, called by President Hoover to discuss the extension of home building and home ownership, will be attended by more than 1,000 delegates, representing national organizations. Among the associations included will be the American Federation of Labor, the American Institute of Architects, the Association of General Contractors, the Association of Life Insurance Presidents, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the National Association of Real Estate Boards, the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, the National Farmers' Union and the National Grange.

"La TRAVIATA" IS CHICAGO OPERA CHOICE THIS WEEK

The first act of Verdi's "La Traviata" will be broadcast to an NBC network by the Chicago Civic Opera Company, Saturday (November 28) at 8:00 p. m., with WLS (870 kc.) in the network.

Claudia Muzio and Charles Hackett will sing the roles of Violetta and Alfredo.

Damrosch Sunday Concerts to Give Opera in English

Foreign language operas will be heard in English during the NBC Symphonic Hour over an NBC network and WLW each Sunday at 1:15 p. m., it is announced by Walter Damrosch, dean of American conductors, who directs the orchestra.

Damrosch believes that "performances of opera in our country should be sung in the vernacular," and has arranged to introduce the first act of Wagner's "Die Walkure" during the Symphonic Hour this week (November 29).

Sunday (November 29). If reception is good, it should be dialable at KMOX (1070 kc.) or WABC (800 kc.). Walpole wrote the Jeremy books, "Portrait of a Man with Red Hair," and the recent "Rogue Herries."

Gigli is Next G. E. Soloist

Beniamino Gigli of the Metropolitan Opera company, will sing the General Electric Twilight program Sunday (November 29) at 5:30 p. m. on the NBC network including WSAI. The tenor will sing such songs as the Liszt "Liebestraum," Toselli's "Serenade," "Santa Lucia," "Song of India," and "O Sole Mio."

L. B. Wilson Takes Over Direction of Station WCKY

L. B. Wilson, owner of station WCKY, has taken over the management of the station himself and is improving the Kentucky station's programs with additional NBC programs and more extensive studio programs. The audience rooms and office space of the station have been enlarged to accommodate visitors who wish to see the broadcasts. Jack Snow, former radio editor, and originator of the Radio Dial feature, "If We Had Our Own Radio Station" has been added to the WCKY staff as announcer and continuity writer.

WSAI Signal Strength Is Improved Here

WSAI now is operating with a signal strength of 1000 watts or with a measured strength in Cincinnati of twice as much at night and four times as much in daytime as before the Radio Commission's recent grant of more power. J. A. Chambers, chief engineer of the Crosley stations, reports that alterations to the WSAI antenna at Mason, O., now throw the most of its signal strength in a southerly direction, making it more audible to Cincinnati listeners.

SPORT BROADCASTING TAKES IT ON THE CHIN

Sports broadcasting has taken it on the chin twice during the last couple of weeks. The first jolt came when Judge Landis, czar of the diamond, decreed that future World Series games shall be radioed only by qualified baseball experts. And the second half of the "one-two" landed when Harvard banned Ted Husing from the Crimson stadium because the Columbia wordster applied the term "putrid" to Barry Wood's work in the Dartmouth game.

Obviously, these two incidents are related only in that they concern sports broadcasting. The Husing affair may seem to hinge on whether Wood's work really was "putrid." But actually the question raised is whether a sports announcer shall speak his mind honestly, or confine himself to remarks inoffensive to the members of the two teams; which is simply the ancient freedom of the press issue in radio clothes.

If a sports announcer is to serve the listening public he certainly cannot be shackled by any such implied censorship. So it is to be hoped that the Harvard authorities will see what a dangerous precedent they are establishing, and revoke the ban on Ted.

The Landis decree raises no such issue of principle. But it does open up a question even more live. The Judge speaks the convictions of many listeners when he characterizes much of the baseball announcing on the networks as uninformed and careless. He might have added that much of the chain football announcing is guilty on the same counts. It is not necessary for one of the networks to declare the frank policy of making sports announcing entertaining first, and technically complete or correct only incidentally. That has been too apparent for a long time to anyone with a smattering of sports lore.

Judge Landis now demands that this arrangement shall be changed, that the emphasis shall be placed on technical accuracy and completeness. And in this stand, it is safe to assume that he has the hearty support of all real sports followers. Moreover, these fans who know their sports "onions" make up the real audience of baseball and football broadcasting.

There is where the radio moguls have slipped up. Listeners who merely want something entertaining may be beguiled for a few innings or a quarter. But only the honest-to-goodness fan sticks till the last man is out or the final gun.

So the white-haired czar of baseball may be doing a real service for listeners who want their sports broadcast as sports. It looks that way now, at any rate.
