

The opening ceremonies of the special session of Congress, to convene in Washington, Monday, November 15, at the summons of the President, will be broadcast over the NBC-Blue network, including WCKY, WLW and WSM at approximately 12:00 p.m. (E.S.T.).

An elaborate microphone set-up on the floor of the House of Representatives will enable listeners to hear the traditional proceedings of the

Microphones will be installed at the Speaker of the House's desk, at the Clerk's desk, and on the desks of the Majority and Minority leaders."

The names of distinguished guests, among them all the prominent members of the foreign diplomatic corps at Washington, will be announced by the doorkeeper over another micro-

It is probable that several of the more prominent Senators and Representatives will be heard discussing the prospects for the proposed legislation advanced by the President.

At intervals during the broadcast controls will be switched to a comafternoon program, "Musical mittee room near the Senate chamber Plays," over WLW through for description of events transpiring

Pierre Monteux, First **Conductor In New** Series

The newly organized NBC Symphony Orchestra will make its debut over the NBC-Blue and Red networks, including WCKY and WSAI, Saturday, November 13, from 10:00 to 11:30 p. m. (E.S.T.), under the direction of Pierre Monteux.

Ninety-two distinguished artists, selected from more than 700 applicants in Europe and the Americas, form this new symphany orchestra, the first full-sized symphony orchestra to be established in the United States exclusively for radio.

Monteux, present conductor of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, will conduct for three weeks, at which time Dr. Artur Rodzinski, conductor of the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra, will take charge for a like number of broadcasts.

Arturo Toscanini, considered by many to be the world's finest conductor, will direct the orchestra for ten consecutive weeks, beginning Christmas night, December 25.

For the opening program, Monteux has chosen major symphonic works of Bach, Mozart, Franck, Debussy and Richard Strauss.

BOWMAN TO RELATE X STOKOWSKI IS OJIBWA LEGENDS FIRST CONDUCTOR Y FOR CARBORUNDUM ON BANK PROGRAMS

Francis D. Bowman, expert on Indian lore, will tell of a visit with Chief Bigwin, 97, the oldest living member of the once great Ojibwa tribe, on the Carborundum program, Saturday, November 13, at 7:30 p. m. network, including WKRC, WHIO and WHAS.

He will tell of childhood games, tribal customs and heroic deeds of the Ojibwa, the great Indian nation of Canada prior to the white man's arrival on this continent.

Edward D'Anna's 55-piece band, one of the veteran musical organizations of radio, will play marches and popular selections, including Friedman's "Slavonic Rhapsody No. 1."

Leopold Stokowski, whose name is synonymous with the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra, will conduct that famed musical organization Monday, November 15, at 9:00 p.m. (E.S.T.) on a program sponsored by a group of American banks, and broadcast (E.S.T.) over the WABC-Columbia over the NBC-Blue network, including WCKY and WLS.

> Stokowski, who has not directed the orchestra since last spring, also will conduct on November 29 and December 6.

> Concerts, radio broadcasts and motion picture appearances have made Stokowski one of the bestknown conductors of the day. In his numerous radio appearances, he has done much to humanize the traditional "high-hat" conductor, leaving his baton on the podium and trading banter with well-known come-

CBS-NBC To Air "Fireside Chat" From Capital

President Franklin D. Roosevelt will broadcast his second "Fireside Chat" of the year, a discussion on the "Unemployment Census," over the WABC-Columbia network, including WKRC, WHIO and WHAS, and the combined Blue and Red networks of NBC, including WCKY, WLW, WSAI, WLS and WSM, Sunday, November 14, at 10:30 p. m. (ES.T.).

The broadcast will originate from the White House studio, once the diplomatic reception room, on the eve of the convening of Congress for the special session called by the President.

The President will explain the voluntary unemployment census the Government is undertaking, November 16-20. More than 32,000,000 cards will have been distributed throughout the nation before November 16, and the President will undoubtedly stress the importance of co-operating in returning them.

It is quite likely that the President will present his legislative program for solving the problem, in addition to stressing full co-operation by the unemployed during the census.

This will be the tenth in a series of broadcasts which the President has made since he took office in March, 1933.

COOLIDGE QUARTET TO OFFER SERIES OF CHAMBER MUSIC

The Coolidge String Quartet, with noted concert artists as assisting soloists, will begin a weekly series of six Saturday programs of chamber music beginning November 13, at 5:45 p. m. (E.S.T.) over the WABC-Columbia network, including WKRC, WHIO and WHAS.

Quincy Porter, member of the Vassar College music department, who is one of the six American composers named to write music for radio by the Second Columbia Composers' Commission, will be the assisting artist on the opening program.

The series is to be given from New York under the auspices of the Coolidge Foundation in the Library of Congress. Mrs. Elizabeth Sprague Coolidge, founder, will make a brief address from Washington on the first program.

AN ANNOUNCER'S BIBLE?

Listeners who have resigned themselves to enduring English "as she is spoken" on the air, probably will cheer the news that NBC is going to bring out a manual for those who use the microphone.

Titled "Broadcast Speech-A Handbook for Announcers and Speakers," the volume is to be prepared under the direction of a committee of philologists headed by no less a bigwig than Dr. William Allan Neilson, editorin-chief of Webster's New International Dictionary. In addition to words often mispronounced, it will contain lists of place names, foreign words and phrases, famous names from the past, and musical and technical terms.

Though such a book, designed expressly for radio, seems to be an innovation over here, the BBC brought out a similar manual several years ago, after much work and controversy.

There is little doubt that spoken English as heard on the air needs intprovement. Too many announcers and speakers trip over common words, not to mention proper names. But whether NBC's handbook will solve the problem is something else again.

For announcers and speakers who want to do right by the mother tongue, there are already good dictionaries. Compared with them, about the only advantage the NBC handbook would have is compactness.

Still more troublesome is the question of which pronunciation is correct, anyway. Listeners who thought they caught announcers in an error have barked their shins on that difficulty many times.

The United States is so big and diversified that wide differences in speech are inevitable. The broad "A" and slurred "R" that distinguish certain sections are only the most obvious of these differences. One of our professors used to say he could tell which part of the country a student came from by the way he pronounced such a common word as "tincup."

These differences are so sharp that even the lexicographers sometimes cannot agree. In addition, usage works constant changes. The accepted form of one year may be outmoded the next.

So it is unlikely that the NBC handbook can establish a national standard of speech. Certainly it cannot freeze pronunciation in a straightjacket.

It is even doubtful that all announcers will conform to the standards NBC sets up. The control of American broadcasting is too divided to reduce its practice to a single pattern.

Yet with all these shortcomings, the NBC venture seems a step in the right direction. It not only recognizes that broadcast speech needs improvement, but offers practical help for those announcers and speakers who take the pride of good craftsmen in their work.

If radio is to have a beneficial effect on everyday speech, the number of these conscientious craftsmen must increase.

And this is one. A program has to stand on its own feet. If it can't, frantic blurbing won't prop it up.



he has seen the opponents show and tells the possibilities of other plays which might be worked from the various setups.

Systems have become so well known that scouts look for moves the players might make and, by so doing, give the play away. For example, the passer might wet the tips of his fingers before he is going to make a forward pass. The halfback might turn his body towards the side the play is called for. All these things, thanks to excellent binoculars, are the tell-tale signals which a good scout takes back home.

The names of the fellows who punt, the passers, good blockers are all catalogued. The way this or that man plays on defense, with the wrong foot forward, all these things are the commandments which must be obeyed by the scout's team.

The books, in which the opponents plays are charted by the players on Monday, are collected on Thursday, before the game. The coaches look over these maps and notes and make corrections on the same. In this manner there is no misunderstanding between coach and player and there can be none of the alibi, "I didn't understand that, coach."




