Heart-Warming Whimsy Spiked With Tensely Dramatic Scenes Is This 20th Century-Fox Film

EXCITING as any spy story ever written is this film version of Nevil Shute's best-selling novel by the same title. Shute, whose real name is Nevil Shute Norway, is an aeronautical engineer and a lieutenant commander in the British Navy. Writing is just spare-time work. Although his story of the twentieth-century Pied Piper is laid against the grim background of modern warfare, it's warm with human kindness, alive with humor, and yet tensely exciting. Woven around an irascible old Englishman who thinks all children are insufferable brats, Shute portrays his experiences when he is faced with the problem of getting a group of them out of German-invaded France into England. When 20th Century-Fox bought the film rights to the book, the studio hoped to get Shute as an adviser on production of the picture, but he was too busy "somewhere in England" working on aviation plans. He had written "The Pied Piper" at the rate of an hour a night, after putting in a fourteen-hour day as an aeronautical engineer in Britain's Navy.






Bambi "Learns" to Skate



RADIO OFFERS SINGERS A WIDE VARIETY, SAYS JEAN TENNYSON, CBS SOPRANO

Hollywood Notables Sponsor New Recording Company; Victor Presents Glenn Miller Version of "Conchita, Marquita, Lolita, Pepita, Etc."

HE job of an interviewer is, a good part of the time, unrewarding. People—especially artists—don't seem to find things to say. They run out of ideas when they are confronted with the "awful prospect of having to speak for publication." In such cases said interviewer does the only human thing; he plants ideas, subtly but efficaciously in the mind of the subject, and he even forms them into sentences and paragraphs and, thanks be, a complete story. The shrewd interviewer never gives his subject away, though sometimes things have been said by the reporter, allegedly quoting an interviewed person, that make the latter a wit or, perhaps, a brilliant conversationalist.

One of the stricter rules of journalistic reporting is not to insult the reader by telling him, in so many words, just what kind of person your interviewee is, how amusing, how rich in anecdotes her speech, and so on. The reader is supposed to gather that for himself, and he usually does.

I realize that I have violated that strict rule, but one meets up with the Jean Tennyson type so rarely that even a rule can be broken in singing praises to Allah for the good fortune.

She studied piano and voice a good many years, and she recalls with a strange pleasure the fact that her piano-teacher hated kids. That didn't keep her from continuing with her lessons, however. "I guess I was cussed, at that," she pointed out.

"One day, quite to the surprise of all, including myself, I made my operatic debut—at a very tender age. I appeared as a super in a performance of Carmen, and great was the to-do after that. My teacher, who was also one of Chicago's noted music critics, heard me on that occasion.

"I was put in the enviable position of having to lead the others—all boys, by the way—and I sang as lustily as I could, ever aware of the amazing fact that I was a member of the cast in a performance that boasted Mary Garden as the star.

"The next day my teacher got hold of me, and did he scold me and did he dress me down and did he let me know how impudent, as well as imprudent, I had been! 'Don't you know,' he kept yelling at me, 'that you

never once looked at the conductor.
"'The conductor is the important man in the performance, child,'-and he said 'child' as if it meant all sorts of nasty things. He continued, 'I can't guess what foolishness made you do what you did, but once you were in it, couldn't you remember my teach-

ings enough to know that opera is music and that music is divided into bars and beats?'

"Well," she laughed, "it's boring, I suppose, to tell you the rest of it. There is only this: I gave up the super career like hot lead. It meant too much responsibility; as I could see, it meant having to be a musician—yes, a musician even in such a small assignment. I later, much later, learned what dear old teacher meant.

Some of the most treasured days of

her life, Miss Tennyson said, were spent abroad, during her student days.

"There was a little town in France, Eauze was its name," she said. "I re-member it so well. The tourist maps all referred to it as a 'city of no interest'—but then, you know what tourist maps are. As you approached the town through the lovely country, you saw the church and, soon enough, a little building that towered over littler buildings so that it was almost imposing. It was the Grand Hotel. Cute, no? I'll tell you one thing; nothing stirred in little Eauze. There was the Town Crier, who used to go around breathlessly announcing the finding of a lost pair of gloves, and such. Thursday was market day, and everybody sat up the whole night before in anticipation.
"The bed in my room at the Grand

Hotel had a canopy over it, which

made me feel like a reincarnated Marie Antoinette. There was running water in the bathroom, which was some parasangs away from my quarters. There was also a bathtub in it. They used to wash it out with kerosene. I don't need to tell you that we remained much cleaner by not bathing.

"One day all of us got wonderful news—Ganna Walska, we heard, was coming to take lessons from Mme. Dinh-Gilly. Of course, the bridal suite in the hotel was immediately reserved

for her, a nice little cubby-hole.
"Finally Mme. Walska arrived with her entire retinue. Her first words to the manager were, 'I must have hot water.' She went up to her chambers -let's say-and she came down later dressed like Nedda in 'Pagliacci.' We were thrilled, as you can imagine. Besides, we all wanted to hear the distinguished personage sing.

"But there was intended to be no such pleasure for us. Mme. Dinh-Gilly laid down the law. 'I'll take Mme. Walska alone,' she said imperiously. You can imagine how all this affected a group of ultraimpressionable young people who had been told that Mme. Walska took lessons from seven teachers a day. We couldn't figure it all out then and, I must confess, it seems still a little strange now.

"However, as youngsters will, we found a way to listen to the lady. We all hid in trees and bushes around Mme. Dinh-Gilly's house. We kept very still, listening, listening, listening,

as Mme. Walska took her first lesson.
"When she left, in a cloud of dust that was blown up by her heavy Rolls-Royce, we went up to our teacher and asked her—innocent-like, you know -what she thought of Mme. Walska's voice. She said, 'I am very interested in doing what I can for Mme. Walska."

Miss Tennyson had an appointment, which meant that the interview was drawing to a close. She related that in her radio program she has already sung a great number of operatic roles as operetta roles. Her radio work is "practically enslavement," she remarked, "but I love it. If variety is what a singer wants—and by that I mean variety even in the field of soprano parts—then the singer had better do radio work. She gets to sing

them all on the air."

At the moment, Miss Tennyson is boning up on the Montemezzi opera. "L'Amore Dei Tre Re," which she expects to sing with the San Francisco Opera Company. The artist came to radio with a considerable background in opera and in concert. She has sung for the past several seasons with the Chicago Opera Company, and previously made appearances as a member of the San Carlo organization.

Glenn Miller has set style for many top bands

A^N unusually good assort-ment of popular records has been the reward of the faithful of late, so that a column devoted to the subject may not be altogether amiss. First of all there is Glenn Miller's swell version of that rhapsody of names whose title is "Conchita, Mar-

quita, Lolita, Pepita, Rosita, Juanita Lopez." His orchestra is assisted in this by Marion Hutton, Tex Beneke and the Modernaires. The other side of the platter (Victor 27943) is of the strictly jive instrumental persuasion. It goes almost without saying that the Millerians have uncorked another gem.

A Columbia album, featuring comedian Danny Kaye in a series of his specialties, is a highly recommended item. Alternating orchestras are conducted by Johnny Green and Maurice Abravanel. The beauty of these performances is that the comedian's personality has at last been caught on records.

Hoagy Carmichael appears as singer, piano accompanist, whistler and com-poser in a recent Decca album. Of course "Stardust" occupies a prominent place in the scheme, and there are other songs of the gifted young man to help you while away a few moments. Best bet is his composingnot that he isn't agreeable in his other assignments.

A new company, Capitol Records, which is sponsored by Hollywood notables, makes its debut with six interesting disks. The best of the lot, however, is the one bearing "I'll Remember April," soulfully sung by Martha Tilton, who is accompanied by an orchestra under Gordon Jenkins' direction. In different rhythm is the performance by Freddy Slack and his orchestra of "Cow-Cow Boogie," which pulsates with vigor and more vigor. and this, too, is an especially good recording.

Earl Hines, whose oblique pianistics are of the inimitable kind, leads his orchestra through a pair of honeys on Bluebird disk B-11567, consisting of "Stormy Monday Blues," with a good bluesy vocal by Bille Eckstein, and "Second Balcony Jump."

The Four King Sisters, who can sing with the best of them, do one of their most effective jobs on the currently popular "Kalamazoo." The other side of this Bluebird record (B-11566) brings forward "Over the Rainbow," from the score of the movie, "The Wizard of Oz." The sisters are supported by the Rhythm Boys.

NATURALIST BROADCASTS DIRECT FROM ROCKY MT. NATIONAL PARK

Two-Week Preparation Precedes "America's Town Meeting" Broadcast; Haven MacQuarrie Develops Another Promising Studio-Participation Program

Ersatz Vacation Trip

VER entertained more than a passing interest in such things as trees and birds and bees? If you have, try hitting the trail one of these hot rry hitting the trail one of these not Saturday afternoons with Raymond Gregg. His program, an NBC series titled "Nature Sketches," will take you on a nature-study trek in Rocky Mountain National Park.

"Nature Sketches" is not a studio presentation. A portable short-wave transmitter follows Gregg right out on the trail, where, surrounded by boys and girls of his nature-study school, he points out the interesting phenomena to be found in this great national park.

Park naturalist Gregg is a tall, rangy southerner transplanted to the setting of the Rockies. With a south-erner's traditional drawl and picturesque speech, he relates nature's creations to the commonplace objects and experiences of every-day life. A chip-munk, for example, is "a little con-vict" and the magpie is "the noisy magician." He tells stories of volcanoes that were never born, mountains that seesawed and rocks that had their backs scratched.

His clever use of similes may be further illustrated by the program he did on the habits and actions of insects and arachnids of the Rocky Mountain region. He referred to grass-hoppers as "skin busters," told an interesting story about the spider that "swings it," related anecdotes about the "window curtain" tongue of the nectar-feeding moths and butterflies, and ants that play carpenter.



short wave. Using mobile and pack the speakers and recognizes questions transmitters, some of the programs originate at points as far as twelve miles from the control center in the Moraine Park Museum. From here they are relayed to station KOA's studios in Denver and from there to the NBC network. The series has been on every summer since 1938, is the brain-child of Clarence Moore of station KOA, NBC's Denver outlet.

With the family bus up on blocks, it looks like vacation trips are out for the duration. The "Nature Sketches" broadcasts won't measure up to a trip to Rocky Mountain National Park, but they may interest your kiddies in some of the wonders of the natural world right in their own back yard. ("Nature Sketches," broadcast direct from Rocky Mountain National Park, may be heard Saturdays over NBC.)

Planning "Town Meeting"

"America's Town Meeting," to the casual observer, might seem to be a simple type of program to present. A perusal of the preparation for a "Town Meeting" broadcast will show that this isn't true. The job of planning and presenting these weekly forum discussions keeps two people busy. You'll recognize one of these as the modera-tor of "Town Meeting." His full name is George V. Denny, Jr., but we'll take the liberty to abbreviate that for convenience's sake. Suave, tactful Mr. Denny opens the meetings, introduces

from the floor. In addition he has the responsibility for policy-making and final decisions.

The other person "Town Meeting" keeps busy is Marian Carter. She never appears on the program. Her job is handling the mechanics of prebroadcast planning, lining up the speakers

who are heard each week.
Subjects to be discussed and the speakers who will discuss them are decided upon, whenever possible, two weeks in advance of the broadcast. The subject is picked first, usually by Mr. Denny and Mrs. Carter. Then they go into a huddle with the Blue Network public service department to make up a list of possible speakers for both sides. The speakers, incidentally, must be acknowledged experts, must have a fair radio voice and must be willing to stand up to the heckling of a highly articulate studio audience. (The latter has caused many poten-

tial speakers to back down.)

When this list is finally made up in order of first, second and third choices, Mrs. Carter takes over and gets busy on the phone. Many of the speakers have to be reached by long-distance. Very often Mrs. Carter has to run through a list of over twenty public figures before she tracks down a suitable—and willing—candidate for debate. And sometimes the speakers back down at the last minute.

Each speaker is advised in advance by Mrs. Carter exactly how much time he will be allowed on the air. The average amounts to five double-spaced typewritten pages. Most of the participants arrive with at least eight pages, very often with ten, eleven and even more. The speeches are cut for timing and, occasionally, for digressions—but, we are advised to add, never for opinions. When the speakers finally arrive at Town Hall on the day of the broadcast, they read their speeches to Mrs. Carter, who clocks them for length.

To the casual observer, "America's Town Meeting" might seem to be a simple type of program to present. But I'm sure you'll agree now that there's a lot more to it than the fiftyfive minutes you hear every Thursday

("America's Town Meeting of the Air" is broadcast Thursdays over the Blue Network.)

MacQuarrie acts as "word master" and Prof. Charles Frederick Lindsley, of the Department of Speech, Occidental College, is the "judge."

FEAR FILLS HEARTS OF EUROPE'S PEOPLE, LONDON "RADIO NEWSREEL" REVEALS

Less Than One Percent of Bombers Ferried to Britain Are Lost; Americans Expect War to Last At Least Two More Years, According to Gallup Poll

The Stench of Fear

ILLIAM BAYLES recently broadcast the following pertinent statements in London's feature program "Radio Newsreel."

"When you pick up your morning

"When you pick up your morning paper and read that four hundred Poles and Lithuanians were shot, or that whole Czech families were executed, or that another fifty French hostages were killed, the news probably doesn't mean a great deal to you. Living in a free country, you can't know what life is like in a country where you may be suddenly called to die for something that may not remotely concern you."

that may not remotely concern you."

Mr. Bayles went on to tell that for
the past two years he had lived in
central Europe and knew what it was
to have terror hanging over his head
all the time like a terrible specter.

He went on to say that when he was

He went on to say that when he was in Prague the people kept their window-shutters and blinds tightly drawn even in the afternoon. Friends he had known for years were afraid to speak to him. He didn't dare inquire about missing friends, because even family members don't dare to tell each other anything that might be extracted by Gestapo torture. The few persons who were willing to talk had nothing to say.

In the Polish town of Bromberg, where the stench of decaying human flesh is almost unbearable, there was an atmosphere of living death. The people greeted one another only with their eyes. To have spoken a single word would have given the Nazi police reason for interfering. Fear filled the streets and empty cafes, and during the two days he remained there he was not able to speak to even a single Pole.

In Vienna the women in the endless food queues don't speak to one another, and businessmen keep their office phone covered with a tea-cozy because they are afraid the Gestapo might tap it and listen to their office conversations.

conversations.

In Amsterdam it was the same. "Europe stinks with hate and fear," a Dutch professor told him. "You can actually smell it."

"Now, with the shooting of the Gestapo butcher, Heydrich and others, one

"Now, with the shooting of the Gestapo butcher, Heydrich and others, one can see that the long night of terror is beginning to have its inevitable consequence. The Germans have made life cheap in Europe. They have reduced it to a level where many people don't think it is worth living. You often hear Poles and Czechs and even Germans say that the most popular places in Europe today are the cemeteries. They say that the lucky Pole or Czech is a dead one, but doubly lucky is the one who has first accounted for a Nazi. And that is the reason why assassins now wait for the Heydrichs and Himmlers and Hitlers of Europe," he concluded

Meet Sydney Albright

Sydney Albright, long-time Far East resident, is one of NBC's staff men, now widely scattered, who were spotted at strategic points in the Orient in 1940 and 1941, when the ominous shadow of Japan spread over continental Asia and the rich islands of the southwest Pacific.

Big (six feet-one, 195 pounds), brown-haired and blue-eyed, Albright is one of ten children. He was born in 1906 at Oakland, Calif., reared and educated at Alameda. He sailed for the Orient in 1927, took up residence at Yokohama as representative of an American steamship company, later worked a year in Tokyo for an American motion-picture company. During a vacation leave in the United States he married Madelein Headley, of Beverly Hills. Eight years in Nippon were followed by three in Manila before Albright transferred his activities in 1938 to Batavia, capital of the Dutch East Indies.

Without radio experience before 1941, Albright stepped into the news spotlight during the tense weeks when the Jap military was hacking its way through Malay jungle and British defense lines to effect the collapse of vaunted Singapore. Albright's reports forecast the coming assault on the rich Dutch East Indies by oil-seeking Japa-

nese. Silenced finally as sea-borne Jap troops closed in on Java, Albright was an eleventh-hour refugee from the island, after evacuating his wife and two small sons on the last passenger vessel to leave Sourabaya. Albright is now stationed in Sydney, Australia. He can often be heard over the Melbourne short-wave station in its transmissions to North America, as well as on the "News of the World," broadcast Mondays through Fridays at 6:15 p.m. CWT, over NBC.

Here and There

Despite war conditions, broadcasts of the Metropolitan Opera will once again be short-waved to listeners in all parts of the world beginning November 28. Texaco will again sponsor the "Met" for the third successive season. Special intermission features will be included . . . Analyst Winston Burdett revealed over CBS that during Rommel's recent threat to enter Alexandria, the Berlin radio made an announcement to the effect that the General (Rommel) was to have luncheon in Alexandria on that particular afternoon. Burdett dryly remarked that the engagement was canceled . . . The Vichy radio recently alleged that "the Moscow population receives eighty grams of bread per capita." The Soviet Information Bureau replied to this

claim: "The Hitlerite underlings in Vichy are undoubtedly trying to please Berlin by circulating such a falsehood. It is well known that one Moscow resident receives more bread than a Berlin resident, a Rome resident and a Vichy resident together" . . . Lindley Fraser, speaking from London recently, stated that out of every one thousand bombers ferried from this country to Britain, 995 have arrived safely. Not a single bomber has been shot down by the Axis. Unfavorable weather conditions account for the one-half of one percent lost.

Gallup Interprets American Opinion

The American people are taking a "sober, far-sighted view of the war" and expect at least two more years of grim warfare to smash the Axis, Dr. George Gallup, director of the American Institute of Public Opinion, told radio listeners in all parts of the world in a broadcast over WRUL, Boston.

Day-to-day war news does not cause the public to revise its opinions on the length of time victory will require, Dr. Gallup said. He added that recent surveys show Americans now whole-heartedly favor a second front immediately, "even though all of the equipment may not be ready, or the last bolt tightened on the last tank." Surveys also reveal that Americans consider Germany as "our number one enemy," even though Japan was first to attack our soil. He added that eighty percent of the American people approve the way Franklin D. Roosevelt has handled his job as war President.

News About the Stations



Marcia Neil, soloist on "Johnny Presents" (NBC, Tuesdays, 8:00 p.m. EWT), passed her first audition with only half a voice. Now she sings with ease from G below middle C to F above high C, a phenomenal range for even a concert singer.

It took Ray Block, orchestra-leader for the program, only a few minutes to recognize Marcia's ability, even though she sang with only the lower half of her voice. It took him two months to show her she had those high notes and simply was not using them. He did it by putting her in the "Johnny Presents" Swing Fourteen choir and making her sing all high-pitched parts. She had not had any confidence in her high register since college glee club days, when she was given nothing but alto to sing.

Block takes no credit for training Marcia's voice. He says: "It was all there, every note perfectly placed. It was just a matter of using it with confidence."

The bandleader has had a hand in training such singers as Dennis Day, Benay Venuta, the Eaton Boys, Genevieve Rowe, Bill Hargreave and Audrey Marsh. He's sure Marcia "will go places.'

I was tired and I had no piano to accompany me, but his face lighted up so I felt the tears coming to my eyes, and I had to stop and give myself a fighting-talk: "A fine show you're making of yourself! These boys

don't want to be cried over, they want to be cheered up!" When I see what they have given up and how little I'm doing to help them, the days don't seem long enough.

I had one of my funniest experiences when visiting the Santa Ana (Calif.) Replacement Center. Singing a couple of hours had tired me badly, and when I get tired my southern drawl gets pretty heavy. The boys began kidding me about it and I wisecracked about the "Yankees" in the audience, and pretty soon we were fighting the Civil War all over-again and having a hilarious time.

As we were leaving, a slow voice piped up from the side lines: "Ain't you-all got just one kiss for me? I'm a Rebel, too,"

I said "Sure!" kissed him and ran, and he made the big mistake of bragging about it to his sergeant, who slapped him right into guard duty for the night. He wrote me a very forlorn letter about it.

BACK in the days when Cleopatra was knocking them dead with her charms, the glamour girls of the times thought that milk baths were a fool-proof short cut to beauty. They were right—milk is a beauty aid—but what they overlooked was that it works better from the inside than from the outside. Milk induces the beauty that is the direct pay-off of good health.

For milk is a food—the most nearly perfect food there is! More than any other single edible, it meets the nutritional needs of the body. As a matter of fact, milk contains some of all the food elements which are necessary for building and maintaining that body of yours in tip-top condition. And with that bit of knowledge tucked under your hat, you can't afford to overlook the nutritional possibilities of milk. Especially if you're one of those fighters on our home front who's taken on the responsibility of keeping the family ready and waiting for any war demands that may be made on their strength and energies.

Who needs milk in their diet? You do, friend, and you and you! Everybody should get his milk in some form every day. If you're an inherent skeptic who insists on somebody in authority giving the advice, maybe you'll take the recommendation of the Committee on Food and Nutrition of the National Research Council, which is: One quart of milk a day for every child, and at least one pint a day for every adult. And if you're looking for health, you'll heed this counsel. Just to give you an idea, here's what you get in a glass of milk:

Proteins are the foods that build muscle and tissue in your body. Milk contains two important ones, casein and lacto-albumin, which are "complete" proteins, since (if taken in sufficient quantity) they can provide all the protein the body requires.

Minerals are the stuff that teeth and bones are made of. Milk is the best known source of calcium, which is needed in larger quantities than any other mineral. They tell us, fact is, that the only really practical way to get enough calcium is to drink milk! Besides that, milk supplies all the other minerals in varying amounts.

Vitamins—Just let it be said that all the known vitamins are available in milk. You've been told time and time

again, of course, that vitamins are allimportant to the well-being of every individual.

Calories are what keep you going from day to day. They supply the energy you burn up with every move you make. And milk, being a food, has caloric value.

See what we mean—the perfect food? When you spend a part of every food dollar on milk, you're really getting your money's worth!

Just to help you get your daily "ration" of milk, the milk companies have put several different forms of this basic food on the market. Now that you know you've got to have milk, you can vary your way of getting it and presenting it to the family. Of course, there's the bottle of liquid milk that unfailingly is obtainable—brought fresh to your home from the barnyard via fairy-tale methods of transportation. Milk to feed and nourish your family, whether they drink it "as is" or whether you use it in cooking.

For your convenience, canned evaporated milk has also been made available. This form of milk is merely whole liquid milk from which sixty percent of the water has been removed in processing and which has been preserved by sterilization. It may be used in place of liquid milk when water is added to it. It removes the problem of refrigeration and is one way of answering the need for an adequate milk supply at a low cost. As a "plus" value, evaporated milk can now be had in "irradiated" form, especially enriched with vitamin D, which helps promote the growth of sound bones and teeth.

You're familiar, of course, with sweetened condensed milk, which also comes to you in cans and which is actually cow's milk (with the water removed) to which cane sugar has been added. It comes from the can thick and creamy and is, in itself, the trick in "magic cookery." Used in rec-

ipes, it reacts like a milk mixture that's been cooked for a long time—wonderful for making all sorts of cookies, frostings, puddings and ice-creams —in no time flat!

Mention must be made, too, of the powdered milks just coming into common usage. Dry milk can be a boon to any housewife who's budget-minded (and who of us isn't these days?). It's fun to use in

these days?). It's fun to use in preparing soups, cereals, puddings and almost any recipe that calls for whole milk. If properly stored it can be kept for weeks without refrigeration. In fact, we're exporting it right now in tremendous quantities to our allies. It has practically the same food value as fresh milk, and is extremely economical to use. Butter and cheese also are valuable nutrients and are sources of most of the necessary food values available in milk itself.

In your position as homemaker, encourage your family to consume more milk. See that every child and adult gets an adequate amount every day, whether they drink it glass for glass or you "dish it up" disguised in some tasty recipe. It's your duty—and for performing it you'll get your reward in priceless good health.


