FOREWORD

UST before this booklet was prepared, an old man recovered his hearing after being deaf for many years. Almost his first request was to hear a radio program. He listened. Tears slipped down the wrinkled cheeks. "I can't believe it. No wires. Thru the air. A little box like that—and music. A miracle! And I might have missed it all!" Incidents like that bring one to a keener realization of radio's real worth—a greater appreciation for the manifold blessings of this 20th century "miracle."

What Radio will offer ten years—even five years—from today is difficult to conceive. Certainly it is safe to anticipate refinements in reception—greater fidelity in the reproduction of programs; and, quite probably radio fans will fall into a new classification—there may be "optiences" as well as audiences, for it is only a step into the future when we shall see as well as hear things via radio.

To the great fraternity of radio enthusiasts, we dedicate this little booklet—in the hope that it may add a measure to their understanding of radio and to the pleasure it provides.

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CATARRH

Its cause, effect and remedy

ATARRH is an inflammation of the mucous membrane which lines the nostrils, the throat, and other organs of the body. It is a local disease greatly influenced by constitutional conditions.

CAUSES OF CATARRH. Anything that irritates or weakens the mucous membrane may result in Catarrh. The inhaling of irritating vapors or dust, sudden exposure to changes in temperature (heat or cold) and low vitality of the system due to various excesses, such as irregular meals, improper food, alcoholic drinks, not enough rest or sleep, improper clothing, shallow breathing, infrequent bathing, and drinking too little water.

NASAL CATARRH. The kind of Catarrh that is most common, and of which we wish to speak particularly, is Nasal Catarrh. The Nasal Cavity being most exposed, is more liable to become affected than other parts of the body. It usually begins behind and above the veil of the palate and extends upwards into the nose. It is an exceedingly troublesome complaint and affects great numbers. It is commonly known as Catarrh of the Head. The inflammation is not confined to the Nasal Cavities, but extends frequently to the small cavities called Antrums and Sinuses, which have openings into the Nasal Cavity. Persons sometimes feel as though the whole face was involved in the disease, so great is the amount of matter discharged.

This form of Catarrh often is the cause of Catarrhal Bad Breath.

The disease often creates an almost constant desire to swallow, but leaves a sensation of something in the upper part of the throat. When inflammation has existed a long time, puriform matter is formed and may drop down into the throat, sometimes causing general derangement of the health. Many times the person can breathe only with the mouth open. Upon arising in the morning a great effort is required to clear the head and throat. There is occasionally a feeling of pressure and tightness across the upper part of the nose and base of the brain, causing headache, vertigo and confusion.

CATARRHAL DEAFNESS. Deafness is sometimes caused by Catarrh. The mucous lining of the Eustachian Tube, or little air passage running from the throat to the drum of the ear, becomes inflamed and roughened and the tube becomes partially closed. This prevents the air from passing smoothly and causes a rumbling sound. Deafness of this character appears after the person has had Catarrh for some time. If Deafness is from any other source, we do not recommend Hall's Catarrh Medicine.

Health Suggestions for Catarrh Sufferers

- Use HALL'S CATARRH MEDICINE (Ointment) regularly as directed.
- (2) Take HALL'S CATARRH MEDICINE (Liquid) strictly according to directions.
 - (3) Keep the bowels moving regularly every day.

- (4) Keep the circulation active and muscles firm with moderate exercise in the open.
- (5) Have pure air, day and night, and breathe through the nose if possible.
- (6) Keep the skin normal by taking a dry rub with a coarse towel and by taking a bath at least twice a week.
- (7) Drink freely of water, avoid alcoholic drinks, and take tea or coffee only in moderation.
- (8) Eat regularly and freely of fruits and vegetables, sparingly of meats, sweets and pastries, abstain as much as possible from foods fried in grease. Boiled or broiled foods are better and more easily digested. Chew all foods thoroughly and don't drink fluids with meals. What you drink, drink after you are through eating.

THE PARTS IN YOUR SET

What they are and how they work

The Antenna. The antenna is the link between your receiver and the outside world, and acts as a collector of radio waves.

The Lead-In. The lead-in is the wire that conducts the radio signals from the antenna to the receiver.

The Ground. The ground is the connection from the receiver to the earth. It serves as a return path for the radio signals which are received over the aerial.

The Tubes. The vacuum tubes are the most interesting part of the radio. The radio frequency tubes take the signals from the antenna, over which they pass at a very rapid rate, and build up or amplify them until they are strong enough to operate the detector tube. The detector tube is so named because it takes the high frequency radio signal and slows it down, bringing it within the range of audibility. (Continued on page 7)

RADIO TROUBLES

How to find-How to correct

No Reception

- (A) A or B Batteries discharged, or defective. Test with a meter and hydrometer, and have charged, repaired or replaced, as necessary. Eliminator not functioning. Be sure the current to it is turned on.
- (B) Worn out or defective vacuum tubes. Try to rejuvenate tube by disconnecting "B" Batteries and burning the filaments at normal brilliancy for several hours. If not effective, have tubes tested by reliable dealer and replace defective ones.
- (C) Broken wire in headset or loud speaker. To check, connect one wire to one dry cell post and tap other post with second wire. A distinct, sharp click should result. Absence of sound indicates broken cord or connection, requiring repair or replacement.
- (D) Lightning arrester leaky or improperly connected. Aerial should go thru one connection to set. The other connection goes to ground.
- (E) Broken wire or disconnection in aerial or ground wires. Check and repair if necessary.
- (F) Aerial grounded. Aerial must not touch any surface which ends in contact with ground.
- (G) Batteries connected wrongly. Check connections carefully.
- (H) Set improperly wired. This applies to homebuilt, or reconstructed sets only. Check set with wiring diagram. If trouble persists, consult radio expert.

Weak Reception

- (A) Any of foregoing causes. Check as directed.
- (B) No detector "B" Battery Connection, or too much or too little detector "B" Power. Try increasing and decreasing voltage.
- (C) Poor ground connection. Go over ground wire, remove rust under ground clamp, or change ground connection. Make ground wire as short as possible.

Noisy and Distorted Reception

- (A) Induction from nearby power lines, or nearby electrical machinery. Turn on set to full volume then disconnect aerial wire. If noise ceases or diminishes it either is partly or wholly caused by nearby wires or electrical machinery. Try changing position and direction of aerial. If noise continues, endeavor to find source of trouble in neighborhood, and get owner to remedy if possible. If noise continues in full volume when aerial is disconnected, trouble is probably in set or battery wiring.
 - (B) Static. Cannot be eliminated.
- (C) Low "B" Batteries. Check with a meter. Voltage should never run below 17 on 221/4 volt battery; 35 on 45 volt battery.
 - (D) Faulty Grid Leak. Try new one.
- (E) Loose connections in plate, filament or grid circuit. Check.
- (F) Poor contact in tube sockets. Bend contact springs slightly to get greater pressure.
 - (G) Noisy detector tube. Try another tube.
- (H) Excessive generator hum or too great amplification at local broadcasting station. Usually only temporary.
- (I) Radiation from regenerative sets nearby. Investigate, and persuade owners to change, redesign or use extreme care in tuning.
- (J) More than one station on same wave length. Cannot be corrected in receiving set.
- (K) Defective amplifier tube. Check amplifier tubes by moving a new tube from one socket to another.
- (L) Too much "B" Battery to amplifier, loud speaker or headset. Try reduced "B" power.
- (M) Damaged headset or loud speaker. Test out on a neighbor's set or at any radio store.
- (N) Dead "C" Battery or wrong connection to same. Check with voltmeter.

The radio signal may be described as a rapidly moving train of electric waves upon which the sound waves ride. The function of the detector is to separate these two impulses. After detection the sound waves are passed on to the audio frequency amplifier which builds them up until they are strong enough to operate the loud speaker.

The tubes in the set actually do the work. The coils and condensers and the circuits in which they are hooked determine the kind of work that the tubes shall perform.

The Transformers. Both radio and audio transformers are coupling units that link one tube with the next. The radio transformers are tuning coils with an air core and are adjustable to different wave lengths by means of the variablé condenser. The audio transformer has two large coils of fine wire with an iron core between them. The secondary coil has more wire than the primary. The relation of the number of turns of wire in one coil to the number in the other is called the turns-ratio. The turns-ratio acting with the tube gives each audio stage its step-up ability.

The Variable Condenser. This part consists of two groups of thin plates, one of which is movable. It supplies the elasticity of the circuit. A change in the position of the plates of the condenser will alter the wave length of the coil to which it is connected, and thus bring in different stations.

There are other small units of lesser importance such as rheostats to control the "A" Battery to the filaments, the grid condenser which assists the detector in its functions and the grid leak which prevents the grid condenser from overloading and choking the detector tube. The by-pass condensers are electrical shortcuts in the circuit hook-up and provide paths of low resistance around points of higher resistance. They are usually connected around batteries and transformers.

Briefly, the parts in the radio contain a wonderful combination of almost every known electrical function.



Important Aids to Good Reception

- I. Use a short, direct ground wire, fastened to a water pipe just ahead of the point where it enters the ground or to an iron or brass pipe driven deep into the earth. An eight foot pipe is none too long.
- 2. Use an aerial of the proper length and construction, clear of all obstructions, with a straight unobstructed lead-in to set. Today, most sets operate best on an aerial, which, including lead-in wire measure not over 75 feet.
- 3. Fully charged batteries are, of course, vital to good reception. The "A" Storage Battery should never be allowed to fall below 1200 specific gravity. "B" Batteries should be replaced when they get down to 17 volts on the 22½ volt battery; 35 volts on the 45 volt.
- 4. Keep the plates of the variable condensers clean by occasionally running a common pipe cleaner between them. Also be sure that your tube socket springs make good contact with the pins on the base of the tube.
- 5. Have your tubes tested when the set appears to be sluggish. If necessary have them rejuvenated, or replace them.
- 6. The loudspeaker is another item which plays a very important part in good reception. Even the cost-liest radio receiver cannot give you quality reproduction unless the loudspeaker used reproduces faithfully. In selecting your loudspeaker choose one which gives clear, true amplification of both high and low tones. And, by all means, before buying, be sure to test out the speaker on your own receiver as all speakers do not work the same on all sets.
- 7. Keep all battery and wire connections clean and tight. Check over your entire receiving system from stem to stern occasionally to make sure everything is in ship-shape order. Do not tamper with the arrangement of the parts or wiring in your set unless you are thoroughly versed in the intricacies of radio construction.

A friendly last word
