He just knew he had to be either an actor, a playwright or a lawyer. Anyway he became a member of George Pierce Baker's course in play writing and when he left Yale went on the stage. Just why he didn't stick to the footlights is not sufficiently explained since John S. has all the qualities that go to make a leading man, but he next appeared as announcer extraordinary over WBZ of New England. From thence he was summoned to New York to do his stuff from 711 Fifth Avenue and now you may hear him every evening doing some of the major programs over WJZ and WEAF

John is tall and slim and dark and in the lapel of his snappy suit one may usually see a tricky boutonniere. He takes his job rather seriously and his biggest thrill came when he announced a special short wave broadcast from the Capitol Theatre put on to entertain Rear Admiral Byrd at the South Pole. Among his treasures is a radiogram from the explorer thanking him for the

broadcast.

John says the biggest thing in the world is radio and the trust and confidence of the radio audience is some-

thing that must never be violated.

But to show that the lad has his frivolous moments be it known that his favorite program is Rudy Vallee's weekly broadcast from the NBC.

DOWN New York way they rate Milton ace high. In 1929 he won the gold medal of the American Academy of Arts and Letters for speaking the English language more nearly as it should be spoken than any other announcer. The ladies swear by him and no one ever swears at him. His large and benign presence makes friends for him both on and off the air and if there is a drop of conceit in his make-up no one has ever discovered it to date.

Milton was one of the first men to announce a program over the air being associated with Thomas J. Cowan when WJZ was located in Newark, N. J. in 1921. He has always been with WJZ up to and through its consolidation with WEAF and he has steadfastly refused any executive position in the NBC, preferring

his job as an announcer.

Mr. Cross was born in New York in 1897, graduated from De Witt Clinton High School and from the Damrosch Institute of Musical Art. He is a tenor and his singing is an important part of his radio work. Married? Certainly, and the delighted father of a four year old, Lillian Gale Cross.

"I've been on the air so long," says Milton, "That my family tells me that I can't even say 'please pass the

butter' without sounding like a radio announcer."

"Inferior screen-grid tubes are decidedly false economy," says Walter E. Holland, Chief Engineer of Philco.

Promptly at five o'clock Uncle pulls himself out of bed, rustles some coffee and steps into his little bus to make the trip across the meadows of Jersey and over to WOR's New York studio. It isn't only setting up exercises you get on WOR's wave at 6:45 each day, but a lot of fun and some philosophy and peppy music selected and directed by WOR's physical director.

John B. was born in Cambridge, England and he learned his setting up lingo in no less a school than the "King's Navee". He became chief operator on a transatlantic liner during the war and came into broad-

casting through the technical end.

John B. is married and the proud father of a very young Mr. Gambling. He is a splendid example of the health doctrines he preaches but when you tell him of the size of his radio following he gets quite red and uncomfortable and changes the subject. No fan mail following will ever spoil Uncle John. He's regular. And that's what you can't help but feel when he wakes you up in the morning.

A ND, we might add, of The World! For wherever radio has gone Mac's voice has gone with it and his watch chain is heavy with the keys of the country's important cities, bestowed on him by admiring mayors. When Mac goes to a town to make a personal appearance the entire population turns out to welcome him and yet there is no more modest celebrity in the country than this NBC star who looks on every broadcast as just another chance to make his best, better!

In 1923 a young church singer, lately arrived in New York, wandered into WEAF to see what made the waves wave. Something in the quality of his voice and the friendliness of his manner interested the studio executives and he became a part time and later a full time announcer. His first big chance was the World Series of 1923. The sports writer who was doing the broadcasting called on Mac to relieve him during the third game and since then McNamee has ranked as the leading sports announcer in the country. The Democratic Convention of 1924 was his next big job in which he worked 16 hours a day for 15 days.

The biggest excitement if not the biggest thrill Graham ever lived through was during a certain broadcast from Chicago. "Boy, I'll never forget those eight seconds" says Mac referring to the time when a young man named Tunney rested on his elbow after getting extremely fresh with another young man called Dempsey. "The excitement within that fraction of a minute with the world's heavyweight championship in the balance, if your judgment wavered, makes most of my

other broadcasts seem tame."

J. P. served in the Marine Corps during the World War. He is married, lives in San Francisco and, in his uneven moments, is bringing up Jennings Pierce, Jr.,

to be as good a radio man as his dad.

He was born in New Mexico but migrated at a tender age to New York where he went to school and graduated with local honors as a four letter athlete, football, baseball, basket ball and soccer. In 1925 he joined the staff of WJZ in New York and in 1927 became the chief of the Boston studio WBET. From there he went to the Columbia System with headquarters at WABC, New York, and from there jumps all over the country handling the major remote control broadcasts of the chain.

Sports events are Ted's favorite medium but he will handle a classical concert or a national convention or an inauguration with equal facility and enthusiasm. If his fan mail contains a knock or two, instead of getting sore, he welcomes the criticism as a friendly boost toward better work on the air. Ted is the last word in style and his double breasted extra short waistcoats have become famous. He is married to one of the prettiest girls you ever saw and second only to his interest in athletics is his enthusiasm for dancing. No grass grows under the Husing feet or cobwebs about the Husing microphone.



Mr. Peterson is six feet tall, weighs 160 pounds and is very fair. His hobby is golf but he doesn't talk about his score. That's not because it isn't good but because he doesn't consider himself as an interesting topic of conversation. His friends of the studio and of the air know better.

At five o'clock in the morning an exhausted quartette received official word that Byrd and his crew were safe off the coast of France.



The next thing we know he was hooked up with a dance orchestra, playing and singing baritone solos. It was but a step to the NBC announcerial staff where he can hardly be persuaded to either sing or play, such is the perversity of this brown haired youth whose serious mouth is betrayed by the ever present twinkle in his eyes. The coast to coast programs which he announces make him a nationally known radio figure and the fans hope he has at last settled down. Once in a while you might catch him in a quartet and still less frequently he ill tinkle the ivories of the NBC.

Bill's Southern drawl is the real thing and his sense of humor is spontaneous and perpetual. When he and Phillips Carlin get talking in the corridors of the NBC all work stops.


