BRITISH jazzmen compare very favourably with Americans. says Ronnie Scott. And at last, he adds, the British jazz fans are realising it. "In the past five years the critics and enthusiasts have come a long way, and the jazz scene generally is very healthy." Tenorist Scott, a pioneer of

Tenorist Scott, a pioneer of British modern fazz, wants to see more "jam sessions and sitting-in sessions" in the clubs. Young jazzmen need to be encouraged, he says.

Sit-in sessions

Hennessey: You both condemn this kind of narrow outlook. Does this explain why you play so well together, despite the fact that you are of different generations?

MAHALIA JACKSON gave a splendid, extended performance Albert

at the Albert Hall, Londen, last Friday. When she walked out to sing "In My Home Over There," the time was 7.40 p.m. When she finally re-treated, it was exactly 10.

Give or take a few minutes, she sang for two hours—without vocal support or the help of instrumental solos. To me, all of it was impressive—the kind of all-out performance few arists are capable of. Throughout the recital, which included traditional spirituals, modern gospel songs and even pious-sounding pops. Mahalia heid an audience of some 6,000 nearly quiet.

And at the conclusion of a present when her iliac-gowned figure disappeared from view for the last time, the thousands clamoured for an encore.

Pattern

and far-ranging. The style, which matches the voice, is broad and fervent, and rhythmically flexible. Both are filled with the accents of jazz.

It is these qualities which captivate non-religious listeners such as me: these and a certain integrity of spirit.

Unaffected

I cannot accept the message offered by Mahalia, but I am moved by the exultation she communicates when the inspiration is upon her.

"Joshua Fit" and "Didn't It Rain?" (all encored) were par-ticular favourites. In retrospect, and checking with recorded versions, it can be seen that the material was quite well diversified. But because the construction

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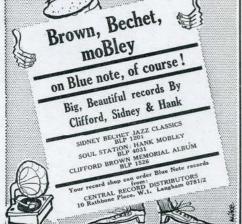
