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

T is not every week that a player of Dickie Hawdon's class and cultivated taste returns to the ranks of the primitives. On Monday, he made his bow with Terry Lightfoot's band, and I went to the Welwyn Garden Jazz Club to witness the event.

At first it seemed curi-ous to hear this Dank-worth mainstay of so many years embracing once again such themes as "Original Dixieland One-Step" and "Tisho-mingo."

Like his playing his stance and stage manner are relaxed and contained. In both respects, his signt air of detachment contrasted with the band's general exuberance, though without damaging the total impact.

Once ear and eye had accustomed themselves to the situation, it became clear that Hawdon was leading and sololing with fair confidence for a newcomer.

#### No tricks

For the most part he was playing numbers he had not rehearsed. Perhaps that is why they were all traditional favourites "Fidgety Feet," "Panama," "Muskrat." and the like.
