"Roustabout"... and grieved on ! He said: "I see most of the newspaper cuttings about me—and I must say I'm very grate-ful that so many journalists take an interest in the things I do and say. But what baffles me is the way they keep harping on about my BODYGUARDS. "I feel I'm being made out to be some mysterious sort of figure, sheltered all the way by these five husky gentlemen who prevent anybody getting into my private life.







# Jeans for Scandinavian

THE SWINGING BLUE JEANS are now set for a tour of Sweden, Denmark, Finland, and Norway, from September 26 to October 7, inclusive. But before that they will be going to Germany on August 10/11, to do a TV spectacular, and the possibility of tours of both USA and Australia are said to be

"strong". The group have been in the recording studios two days this week cutting material for a new LP. The Blue Jeans play their most unusual date ever on September 5, when they will play for "the opening of the pie". On that day, the villagers of Denbeigh Dale in Yorkshire will bake and eat a giant beef ple,

weiching six tons and measuring 18 feet long, 6 feet wide, and 1 ft. 6 ins. deep. Such a pe has only been baked seven times in the last 200 years. The last was in 1928. As the pie is cut, to provide food for 30,000 people from neighbouring areas, the Blue Jeans will be there to herald "the beginning of the end".



# TOP JAZZMAN SC

THOSE who believe, or fear, that there ain't no justice in the world had better take a look at the current charts. For just look whose throaty, gargled "Hello" has made the deepest impression with Dolly: a man who is as old as the century — he'll be 64 on July 4 — and who has been a leading figure in the world's entertainment for at least half that time. Louis Armstrong. And, besides his monumental achievements as a popular entertainer, the unique Satchmo has contributed more to the art of jazz music than almost anybody you can think of. Jazz is just about unthinkable without his influence. What an incredible climax to his career is this triumph with "Hello Dolly," a career that started long before anyone else in the charts was born.

Louis' humble beginnings, in a Waif's Home in New Orleans, are well known. So are stories of his early days playing a cornet in the cabarets of the town's notorious Red Light District. Louis has written books about them, and so have many of his devotees, who often seem more interested in his wild early days than in his later more glittering circumstances as a popular bandleader and film personality. After achieving great fame as the most popular jazzman in the late 1920's (an era when the jazz of those times was much more closely identified with the pop scene than it is today) he went on to captivate even greater audiences as a trumpet entertainer and gravelly vocalist.

# **Critics knock the Beatles!**

HERE'S a couple of headlines from staid New Zealand newspapers: "Screaming Beatles Fans In Near Riot: Desperate Moments At Final Concert" and "Don't Say It Can't Happen Here: Frenzied Stampede Show Reaches Climax."

Sounds wild, doesn't it? And of course there have been some frantic scenes but in general the audiences here in New Zealand are a little less wild than in Australia, far more like an average British pop concert audience. Sure, the fans get excited the Beatles are bound to get them that way. But things haven't been half as crazy as the local press has tried to make out.

# IGNORED

As a matter of fact we've all sot a bit of a chip on our shoulders at the way the newspapers have chosen to report our doings—when they've bothered to write anything, that is: sometimes we've just been ignored. Without meaning to brag we've had the whole audience shout-ing for more at practically every show. Yet reporters have be en outte bitchy, running headlines like "What Sends The Girls? It's A World Mystery!"

By the mid-1950's Satchmo had numerous films and recordings of all kinds (from serious jazz to strings-laden pops with Gordon Jenkins) to his credit. He was still a renowned and formidable jazz-man, though many of the art's more "undignified" clowning. But it was this very willingness to be his jolly, unabashed and unpretentious self that accounted for his tremen-dus commercial success. A great musician he may be, but Louis' papeiness to people, from bringing agreat entertainer. There can be even, if any, aims in life more creditable.

He had his reward. Disc is, in fact, "Tobacco Road," backed with "I Like It Like That," the Chris Kenner million-seller. On Decca.


The boys have travelled as semi-pros for two-and-a-half years. They come from Weybridge, Surrey. There are six of them . . . each with a personal fund of anecdotes.






