
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

management upheavals at Chrysalis which they feel have worsened the situation. Overall, Spandau feel they have not enjoyed the support to which a band of their proven stature and success are entitled. They are estimated to be responsible for 25 per cent of Chyrsalis' record sales."

number two. A monster, this is a
real monster. There's been a lot
of conversation in the States
about rock and soul and whether
they go together, but here they
really do.

THE FARMERS BOYS 'I Built The World' (EMI) Problem — it lacks a distinctive hook. There's a certain attempt at a Spandau Ballet vocal but in this case it's not based on anything commercial.

THE ALARM 'Absolute Reality' (IRS) Good intro, I like this already. First of all I'm a Dylan fan, it's a very clear lyric with a Dylanesque sound, but the chorus is not the kind of thing that you'd associate with Dylan. Intros are so important, because they establish attention, and within 60 seconds of this there are changes that indicate it's not going to be a monotone. There's energy, attitude, it's a well-constructed record.

CYNDI LAUPER 'Money Changes Everything' (Portrait) These kind of records to me are like pop-video records. Without any offence, Cyndi Lauper is not a singer, she's a personality. It's not a record that I would like, however it's clearly a dynamic performance vehicle for that kind of performer.

CHRIS DE BURGH 'Sight And Touch' (A&M) PS: Irish singersongwriter . . . GB: I like this . . . excellent record. I like several different things about it. I would have thought something about Ireland had you not said it, it's flavoured with visual alterations. The lyrics are great, the voice is good, the arrangement's good . . . it's the basic pop format but I got an impression of a certain artistry.

FIRST LOVE 'Things Are Not The Same (Without You)' (10) PS: Kind of a Jones Girls sound about this one. GB: I've heard this, I love it. Yeah, it does have

TOTO 'How Does It Feel' (CBS) It's strong, definitely. But with a group like Toto, which is so good, you're almost more critical of this than of Cyndi Lauper. For someone else, it'd be quite an accomplishment, but for Toto, y'know, come on guys . . . it's just OK.

STEVE PERRY 'Foolish Heart' (CBS) PS: It's in the American Top 20 now. GB: I'd be shocked if it isn't a hit here. This is great. This and the Chris De Burgh, they both have what I think someone once called texture. The music is great but there's a kind of texture to the music as well.

BANGLES 'Hero Takes A Fall' (CBS) PS: A re-release, this was out last year, GB: This is excellent . . . good story and the vocals are excellent too. Someone was saying there's a lot of re-releases around. I think that's good, that the artist gets an opportunity to have another shot.

JOHN FOGERTY 'The Old Man Down The Road' (WB) PS: Quite a comeback in the States for this guy (the former Creedence Clearwater Revival singer). GB: All it takes is one . . . (listening) I felt it was going to go somewhere, but it didn't. PS: Pretty uneventful, wasn't it? GB: Yeah, the title was interesting, there should have been a good story too but there just didn't seem to be one. That's the best word for it, uneventful.


TC CURTIS 'You Should Have Known Better' (Virgin) GB: A great club record, that would be my reaction. I didn't feel they let his vocal stand out enough. PS: A little too similar to a few other tunes, perhaps? GB: Yeah, with the Loose Ends record it was like Shalamar but it had its own thing. This is just like a lot of others.

LEONARD COHEN 'Dance Me To The End Of Love' (CBS) GB: Needless to say it's not my cup of tea. PS: (To prove the point, GB sat drinking his tea while the record was playing. Cohen sounds as though he's turned into Demis Roussos, by the way.)

REO Speedwagon 'Can't Fight This Feeling' (Epic) I'm waiting for the chorus. It's coming — you can feel it sucking you in. A smart record. There's enough there on the teen level in terms of the story and the voice.

THE FIRM 'Radioactive' (Atlantic) PS: This is Jimmy Page and Paul Rodgers' new group. GB: It's a good record, but I don't hear something . . . maybe a bigger chorus, there's something missing.

Theme From Shaft'
(Phonogram) VAN TWIST
'Shaft' (Polydor) GB (about
version one): interesting so far
it's a funny record, very true to



the original, I don't know if this indicates an Isaac Hayes revival or what. I don't think I like it as much as the Van Twist version because Van Twist's so different. But what I really like about that is the flip, 'Hot Wax', I love that.

PAUL HARDCASTLE 'Rain Forest' (10): PS: Re-issued because of its American success, I guess. GB: I love this, I like Paul Hardcastle, he's interesting. Don't know too much about him.

JULIA & COMPANY 'I'm So Happy' (London) PS: The followup (at last) to 'Breakin' Down'. Julia's been appearing in 'Dreamgirls'. GB: Hmm, sounds kind of relic-ish to me, a kind of Seventies disco relic.

REDDS AND THE BOYS
'Movin' And Groovin' (DETT)
GB: I'll go with that . . . PS: What
do you think of the go-go trend?
GB: Well, you know, you grew up
on that. It's James Brown, there's
good and bad. There was just
never a name for it before.

TROUBLE FUNK 'Drop The
Bomb' (Sugarhill) Sugarhill
getting in on it, huh? The
difference between this and the
last one is that I got a kind of
belief from 'Movin' And Groovin'',
and not from Trouble Funk. It's

S 'THINKING Of You' by the Colour Field really the best single so far this year? Is Terry Hall really laughing during an interview? What is the significance of Toby and Karl and where do Andy Williams and Manchester United fit into all of this? Confused? You will be.

Q: 'Thinking Of You' has a very strong melody, reminiscent of the Sixties records by crooners like Andy Williams. Is this intentional?

Terry: "It's not especially the Sixties. I do like Andy Williams and I listen to those sorts of singers quite a lot because I buy those easy listening cassettes for the Walkman cos you don't really have to think about them - till it's time to write a song, and then you can decide what to nick off them.

'We're not that blatant about what we nick. Nobody's discovered — well, apart from the 'Trains And Boats And Planes' bit on this single, that got found out but they're only chords aren't they? We don't just listen to Andy Williams, we like other groups as well. Toby likes music, don't you Toby?'

Toby: "I don't like that Jack Jones tape you

bought for the car - painful! My mentors are Mancini and Rodgers and Hammerstein but that's outside of the pop scene.'

Q: What do you think of other pop around at the moment?

Terry: "People take it all too seriously. Songwriters take their work and their lives too seriously and I can't think of any that I admire. There're a few good groups around like the Bunnymen — they make good records, and King are a good group.

There's too much shit around, too much fashion and too many people who think they should be in a group because they've got the right clothes. That's not a good enough

reason.

Q: You knock fashion, but surely the Specials were the biggest fashion since

Terry: "Yeah, and I'll also knock that as well because that was shit. Not only was it fashion, but it was political fashion and that didn't do us any good, didn't do anyone in the

Specials any good so I can't say it was a good thing. It may have done someone somewhere some good but I don't talk to my fans so I don't know what they feel. It didn't do me any good; made me some money though, which was quite nice. It certainly messed up the Specials, they're all a bit messed up at the

Q: How important is Manchester United to Terry Hall?

"It's very important. It's very important to my relative good health again because it gave me an interest, it gave me a hobby. When I was in the Fun Boy Three I was working non-stop, but going back to watching football made sure that I did something once a week that had nothing to do with music or groups.

"I was happier that United knocked Coventry out of the Cup than that our record went in at number 45 and that's quite honest be-cause I wanted that so much."

Q: Toby and Karl seem to take a back seat in the public face of the Colour Field. Why is that?

Terry: "That's something I want to put right because I don't want to be the spokesman for

Toby: "This goes back to one of the first photo sessions we did where Terry was in the middle as he always is, and we were just sort of hanging around. The photographer got Terry lined up and then said 'OK you side guys come in' and that framed us for life. It's natural because Terry's face is the face of the Eighties and we accept it."

Terry: "I don't think it bothers Toby and Karl because they see me for what I am -- a nose! Well, it's quite a big one isn't it?'

Toby: "If he stands sideways on stage, he's a bit of a target!"

Q: Are you a happier person these days Terry? You've a reputation as a bit of a

misery haven't you? Terry: "That's not my fault. I'm all right, Jack. It's not something I put on and that's probably why I have mentals because I can't be sort of Wham! on stage and Mr Ordinary off stage - it's a bit difficult. I tend to be quite miserable when I'm writing because having to write something makes you miserable. If I'm happy, I wouldn't sit down and write a song I'd go out shopping or get something to eat.

Q: How important is music to you? Terry: "It's got to be important or I wouldn't be doing it, but it's not the most important thing in my life. I prefer Toby and Karl for what they are, rather than for us being in a group together. That's just something we all do when we're together."

Toby: "God, you're all heart Terry." Terry: "The group's not the end of the world, there are lots of other things that are nice





THE KANE GANG 'The Bad and Lowdown World Of The Kane Gang' (Kitchenware KW LP 2) LIKE THEIR cover version of 'Respect Yourself' (included here), the Kane Gang's debut LP is more worthy than inspired. That's not to say the stirrings of vital vinyl are totally absent hereabouts, only that this particular brand of blue eyed soul follows a mournful mood through rather ponderous, out of focus, execution

In short, the Kanes' singular view of the world — the hubble bubble of 'Small Town Creed' and 'Printer's Devil', the doleful 'Crease In His Hat' — runs aground amidst a bemusing mix of ideas, instruments and production going off at half cock.

In other words there is a distinct lack of gel here, a mismatching of pace and mood that is to the detriment of some fine songs.

Having said that, there's enough here to offer encouragement for the Kane's future output. 'Closest Thing To Heaven' was a neat single and on further inspection reveals itself as sublime pop-soul. 'Printer's Devil' has a lovely twist and turn and a beautifully layered spook out. 'Small Town Creed' 'Loserville' and 'Crease In His Hat' are just a gob of froth away from full realisation.

The Kane Gang approach their soul with a slice more intelligence than most. When they learn to pull their wit and wisdom into a more harmonious whole, they'll really be something to contend with.+++

THE SMITHS 'Meat is Murder' (Rough Trade, ROUGH 81) AH ME! The Smith's second (proper) album is among us — and can it survive the inevitable backlash that awaits a band who have been so

exhulted? Anyone with two ears, a semblance of intelligence and — of course — a heart, will answer 'yes'.

Whereas last year's debut had highs and lows, 'Meat Is Murder' is a more level, complete whole of an album. It takes perhaps three listenings to familiarise yourself with the quirky melodies and a truly the standard of the stan Morrissey throatal athleticism, but suddenly you realise what a truly wonderful experience listening to the Smiths is.

wonderful experience listening to the Smiths is.

In the lyrics department Morrissey offers very much what you'd expect — wry self analysis through a series of mini soap operas with a musical accompaniment rather better than Tony Hatch's.

The songs are a mix of familiarity and surprise. The sound is fuller,

with Rourke's bass starring powerfully on a number of tracks, particularly 'Rusholme Ruffians' where it's his country-folk 'riff' that gives real substance to one of the strongest tracks on the album.

Two songs stand out as potential singles. In 'The Headmaster Ritual' Morrissey's yodelling forms into a catchy chorus while 'Nowhere Fast' has jolly guitar and 'Puppet On A String' type bass and opens with the line 'I'd like to drop my trousers to the world'. Now who could argue with that?

One surprise comes with 'Barbarism Begins At Home' when the Smiths get funky and, again, Rourke's bass and Mike Joyce's drums are strong. On a softer note, 'Well I Wonder' is a slow and pretty tale of love from afar, and when the sound of rain comes in at the end you're just about ready to burst into tears. Not since Julie Andrews sang 'Feed The Birds' in 'Mary Poppins' have I been so moved. The album ends with the title track, complete with sounds of cows

and chainsaws and Morrissey's sombre tones informing, 'and the calf that you carve with a smile is MURDER'.

It's easy to go over the top about the Smiths. Morrissey is so charismatic — he's such a good, swoon inducing read that he could sing about picking the fluff out of his belly button and people would herald it as a masterpiece. A kind of 'Pop star breaks new ground in

personal hygiene poetry' reaction. What 'Meat Is Murder' proves though, is that the Smiths are a four man band. With this album, their disparate talents complement each other perfectly.

Johnny Marr's guitar is more confident, rich and willing to explore new ideas, Rourke's bass has developed a punch and power that gives the music a solidity that gels perfectly with Joyce's drumming to allow Morrissey the space to warble and wobble his chords to his heart's content and still produce compact, accessible pop songs. Every home should have one.+++++



OY GEORGE! Phooey! The first true gender benders with 'Style' weren't Bolan, Bowie or the Boy himself. They were four fresh-faced youths with long hair, platform boots and lashings and lashings of make-up.

The Sweet are back in the singles' charts with 'It's It's The Sweet Mix' — a sacrilegious meddling with some of their greatest hits, but a welcome chance to hear once again the dulcet tones of Brian Connelly screaming 'Ballroom Blitz' out of the radio. It's enough to make even Bruno Brooks bearable.

When Anagram released the greatest hits album 'Sweet 16...' last year, it introduced a whole new generation to the string of bouncy, bubble gum pop tunes penned by the mighty song writing duo Nicky Chinn and Mike Chapman. It also featured many of the group's own songs after they'd relinquished the 'glam' mantel and become 'serious musicians'.

The original Sweet split in 1978 when Brian Connelly left to go his own way. The other three followed soon after. Now though, with the success of the single and album, the question of the band reforming looms once more

"The main problem is getting all four of us to agree at once," drummer Mick Tucker says as he and bassist Steve Priest sip tea in their manager's office. "Plus the fact that Steve now lives in New York and I live in Hertfordshire, so it's a bit difficult to get to rehearsals."

While the four of them contemplate the pros and cons of such a move, Brian has continued touring the country with his band the New Sweet, while guitarist Andy Scott has rid himself of the beard and shaggy perm acquired when the group moved into their 'butch' phase and has been producing and establishing a solo career.

During the Seventies the Sweet progressed from the clean, up standing pop of 'Funny Funny' to a butch and hunky HM combo, complete with screaming guitar solos, laddish poses and the odd beer gut ... or two

"'We went through three stages really," Mick explains, "Firstly we had the 'Little Willies', the 'Wigwam Bam's — the straight pop records. We're most remembered for the glam period in Britain but we did it for a giggle really. The David Bowies and the Marc Bolans were more serious about it.

"Then we got to the stage when we said 'Can't you write something a little more sensible?' So then we recorded 'Ballroom Blitz' and 'Teenage Rampage'. They were all good songs, but...

"In the end we were putting out our own material like 'Action' and 'Fox On The Run'. People forget we were actually four rock musicians in one band."

"In those days you were either a singles' band or an albums' band," Steve explains. "If you did 'Top Of The Pops' you were a singles' band — and we did 'Top Of The Pops'.

"In the UK most of our audience were girls.

The boys were afraid to come because of our teenybop image — afraid of derision!





BORN TO A



BRUCE FREDERICK Joseph Springsteen was born in Freehold, New Jersey, on September 23, 1949. He's the eldest child of Douglas and Adele Springsteen. He also has two sisters, Virginia and Pamela.

THE NAME is Dutch, not Jewish as is normally supposed. Douglas Springsteen's ancestry is mostly Irish and his wife's is Italian. Bruce claims that his talent for tale-spinning — a feature of his songs and stage shows — is derived from his maternal grandfather Zirilli.

HIS FATHER, a bus driver, wanted his son to go to college and become a lawyer.

AT THE age of seven Bruce saw Elvis Presley on the popular American TV show 'The Ed Sullivan Show'. He was smitten with the image of The King and got his mother to buy him a guitar. But his hands were too small for the full-sized instrument and lessons became worse than torture. The guitar remained on the shelf for nearly five years.

BRUCE PICKED up the guitar again at the age of 13. Since that day Bruce has said: "Rock'n'roll has been everything to me. The first day I can remember looking into a mirror and being able to stand what I saw was the day I had a guitar in my hand."

BRUCE PLAYED in many groups that played along the New Jersey shoreline. One group was called Dr Zoom And The Sonic Boom. It only played three dates - including one supporting the Allman Brothers Band. The act featured four people sitting around a Monopoly board. "That was to give the people who didn't play anything a chance to be in the band," Bruce said later. "You know, so they could say, 'Yeah, I'm in Dr Zoom, I play Monopoly!"

AS A solo act Bruce was spotted by songwriters Mike Appel and Jim Cretecos — they were suitably impressed and became his managers. Bruce was equally impressed with them — they'd written a hit for teeny-bop group the Partridge Family, featuring David Cassidy!

BRUCE WAS auditioned for CBS by John Hammond — the man who had



discovered blues legends like Bessie Smith and Billie 'Lady Day' Holliday, recorded Aretha Franklin in the Fifties and signed Bob Dylan. "I couldn't believe it," says Hammond. "I reacted with a force I've felt maybe three times in my life. I knew at once that he would last a generation."

BRUCE TOURED America as support to Chicago in 1973. His last date as an opening act was at New York's Madison Square Garden — now virtually his 'home'

HE APPEARED as a co-headliner at the legendary Max's Kansas City club in New York for a week with Bob Marley And The Wailers. The venue only seated 200 people!

ROCK CRITIC Jon Landau wrote a lengthy review of Bruce and his band in May 1974, which was concluded with the phrase, "I saw rock'n'roll's future and its name is Bruce Springsteen". CBS Records used this as the basis of their advertising campaign.

THE HYPE got so intense before the release of the 'Born To Run' LP in 1975 that his previous albums ('Greetings From Asbury Park, New Jersey' and 'The Wild, The Innocent & The E Street Shuffle') both hit the American LP charts for the first time despite being out for over a year.

BOTH OF America's prestigious news magazines 'Time' and 'Newsweek' featured cover stories on Bruce Springsteen in their October 27, 1975, issues. He is one of the few entertainers ever so honoured.

BRUCE'S CAREER was halted for three years due to litigation with manager Mike Appel. During the time the Manfred Mann Earth Band topped the American charts in 1976 with 'Blinded By The Light' the first Springsteen composition to make number one.

BRUCE HAS also written American Top 20 hits for Patti Smith ('Because The Night'), Pointer Sisters ('Fire') and Gary 'US'

Bonds ('This Little Girl'), all of which have charted in Britain.

ROCK CRITIC Jon Landau became Bruce's manager in July, 1978.

THE SONG 'Born To Run' was named as New Jersey's 'Unofficial Youth Rock Anthem' by the State Legislature on June 12,

THOUGH BRUCE has steered clear of overt political statements he played benefits for MUSE (Musicians United For Safe Energy), an anti-nuclear energy group formed by musicians, and Vietnam Veterans of America, raising \$100,000 for the latter.

BOTH PRESIDENT Ronald Reagan and Walter Mondale referred to Bruce Springsteen as a fine example of the American citizen in their run up to the recent American elections. On being told of Reagan's statement he said, "Oh, yeah. I wonder which is his favourite album. It can't have been 'Nebraska'." The album features a savage examination of Reagan's policies on people's lives in America.

THE CHRISTMAS song 'Santa Claus Is Coming To Town', so eagerly played by festive DJs this year, was recorded as long ago as December 12, 1975, at a live show.

IN 1981 Bruce drew half a million ticket requests in two days for the opening of a 20,000 seater stadium in New Jersey. The sole radio announcement concerning the concerts was coupled with a few bars of the state song 'Born To Run'. It never once mentioned Bruce's name.

SPRINGSTEEN'S BACKING group The E Street Band had its first personnel change since 1975 when Miami Steve Van Zandt left to pursue a solo career with Little Steven And The Disciples of Soul in May, 1984. His replacement as guitarist was Nils Lofgren, a veteran with nine solo albums to his name and numerous tours as a solo performer and with Neil Young.

NEW VOCALIST Pattie Scialfa joined the E Street Band on June 25, 1984. Just in time to do three rehearsals and a year long tour that should hit Britain in the late spring.

THOUGH THE E Street Band have Bruce as their first priority they've also toured or recorded with David Bowie, Stevie Nicks, Dire Straits, Bonnie Tyler, Meat Loaf, Joan Armatrading, and Graham Parker. The entire ensemble once backed Ronnie Spector on her recorded version of Billy Joel's 'Say Goodbye To Hollywood'.

THE 'DANCING In the Dark' video was directed by top Hollywood director Brian De Palma — famed for his horror classics 'Carrie', 'Dressed To Kill' and 'Blow Out'.

How to cope with the pressures of being preposterously famous — part one of a Mick Jagger profile by Mike Gardner

WANNA tell you a story. This geezer walks up to Mick Jagger in a club and says, "Mick, I'll give you £100 if you'll come over to my table and say 'Hello, John'." Mick politely tells him to go away. The guy pleads. "Look, it's my first date with this girl and she'd be so impressed with me if she thought you knew me. Come on, Mick." Mick says OK. The night continues. Mick and his entourage are about to leave the club when Mick takes a detour to the bloke's table. "Hello, John," says Mick. The bloke says, "Oh, sod off Mick, can't you see I'm busy!"

Come on Mick, did it ever happen?

"Naw — but I know the joke," he says. His face breaks into a laugh. Not an ordinary cackle but one where his eyes narrow to Chinese-style slits, his lips are shown to their full-blooded glory and his face crumples like a new born baby.

"But people have gone to extraordinary lengths to meet me," he continues. "They've disguised themselves as head waiters or room service. I've had some real funny ones that've taken really elaborate cover ups.

"Trouble is, when they meet me they don't know what to do — they just stand there. A lot of them pose as press people and I'm rude to them anyway.

"They usually ask me how long I'm going to keep doing this for," he grins. "They first asked me that in 1963 or something. The answer's still the same — though I change it around a bit now and then."

Well, the answer in 1985 is clear. His first solo single 'Just Another Night' heralds an album and 60 minute video both titled 'She's The Boss' and available in March.

Then it's a quick round of promotional work interspersed with rehearsals as the Stones start rolling towards a new album and a summer tour of America. Then there's the little

matter of a possible movie with David Bowie.

"David and I have been talking about doing a film for ages," he drawls in his familiar mid-Atlantic cockney twang. "Contrary to rumours it won't be like the Tony Curtis/Jack Lemmon film 'Some Like It Hot' — even though David always likes to get in dresses if possible," he

"We were talking about doing a musical and we've done quite a lot of work on it. But we've still to come up with something we're both really happy with. I've promised David that I won't say any more than that — even though I might like to. We can't really start working on it until the end of the year."

So that's at least another year before Mick gets a gold watch from his mates at work.

N 22 years at the top Jagger, 41, has achieved a level of fame and notoriety to which few can aspire. As the pouting, preening lead singer of Rolling Stones, the very model of the 'wild man of rock', the shrewd businessman, the super stud jet-setter, the doting father of three daughters and the great unwashed enemy of decency and society — Jagger has done it all.

But does he recognise himself in the papers?

"I don't give a shit," he says. "I don't care. Sometimes I recognise the character in the papers but it usually sounds like somebody else. What I pick up is a real sort of big head — someone who's got completely different ideas.

"What the national papers do is take a relatively long interview and make two sentences the headline. Recently a headline made me sound like a right c*** but the interview had me come off as somebody who was actually too nice."

It's hard to believe that the person seated before me in the Paris offices of his new record label CBS was nearly as hated by the establishment as Adolf Hitler. He talks sensibly, but he has the enthusiasm of a cocky





fifth-former, a passion for his music that would put most of his contemporaries to shame, and he oozes personality.

But in the Sixties, he was the devil incarnate — the epitome of the anti-Christ and the bad influence your mother always warned you against.

They used to write things that were hilarious — but they were really serious about them. They'd get really scared of me. Being in a group you could accept it more and laugh about it but if you were on your own all the time it might get to you.

"It was kind of tough in a way but I learnt how to take the knocks in that period."

F COURSE, things did get serious with a spate of police raids and drug busts in 1967. Society hit back with a vengeance, in a way that it's only lashed out like once since, and that was over the Sex Pistols.

"It was a very scary period," he recalls. "Somebody once asked (fake American accent) 'Didn't it improve your music?'. I said 'f***ing hell, no, it was a nightmare'. I really felt that the nation was having a go. But we asked for it in a number of ways. Our PR people around us — whether we knew it or not - were stirring it up. Once you get the ball rolling, it's very difficult to stop.
"I'm glad that period went away.

"You can't let the national press get to you obviously there are some things you get upset about - but if you let them get to you, you've had it. I think that's what happened to Brian Jones," (original Stones guitarist who died in his swimming pool) "and other

But what about the dangers of fame? Didn't John Lennon's death worry you or that the youth killed at the Altamont festival was rumoured to be aiming a gun at you?

Mick looks away slightly and slowly utters a thoughtfully quiet, "No, I thought it was rather isolated.

Sorry, am I upsetting you? He bursts back into life. "It doesn't upset me. There's a lot of stuff in the press about how I'm living in constant fear — yeah, I've got a Harrier sub-machine gun," he mocks. "No, I think that politicians are in more danger than anybody. I don't think that entertainers are in that category.

But Jagger enjoys a unique relationship with the media of the world. Who else could stir up so many column inches over the different versions of the 'Undercover' video and then do it all again with the erotic 'She Was Hot'

Who else could get both the major tabloids trailering 'exclusive' interviews and pictures of him in drag on their expensive TV ads?

They love all that. They like the nasty bit, they like the family bit, they like the gossip, they like everything. But that's the press. They've always been like that with me.

"When they see someone they like they just keep going — it's like 'Coronation Street'."

Do you have as much fun as they make out? He lets out an enormous laugh.

Half as good . . .?

"I have a lot of fun but they don't write about the boring bits.

So the image of you being a debauched jet

setter with girls, girls, girls galore is a lie?
"Naw, it's true," he says, his face beaming and about to transform itself into a laughing cabbage patch doll, "but it's not like that all the time.'

RINCE AND David Bowie probably won't ring you and ask if they can stay at your house when they're on tour, but Big Sound Authority will.

They believe in getting as close to their fans as possible and they welcome

offers of a bed for the night.

"Usually one or two of us will be staying with somebody," explains keyboard player Mace. "But one bloke in Wales wrote us a five page letter and said we can all stay in his front room. We're all housetrained and we're all reasonably clean."

"We want to make a Big Sound Authority concert more than the audience paying their £3 and then going home after the

show," says guitarist Tony.

"We want to build up a close relationship with the people who come and see us and buy our records. We want to give something back. I think that's very important and I don't think it's really been done properly before."

It's not going to end with BSA popping around for a cup of tea either, as Mace

explains.

"As Big Sound Authority grows then a whole industry is going to grow with us as well. We also want to get our fans involved with that. For instance if one of our fans is a photographer then we might employ him and use his pictures."

"Instead of giving our business to people we don't know, we'd rather give it to the people we do know," says Tony. "We want to get our fans into merchandising, selling sweat shirts and programmes. Get them really involved with the way we work. Of course it will create some jobs as well."

"A lot of people write to us," says Mace.
"I think that if people are motivated to write a letter then they're motivated to do other things as well. Those are the sort of people we're really looking for. People with the attitude to get up, go out and do some-

thing for themselves."

"Our single 'This House' is a love song but at the same time it's about people motivating themselves," says Tony. "The next single will be called 'Call Me Soul Man' and it will be even more aggressive. Some day we'd like to form our own record company and sign the people we really believe in


"Money is a bit tight at the moment. There're eight of us in the band and nobody has been drawing a salary. We should make some money out of 'This House'."

OR THE time being, BSA will be clambering into a rented mini van and travelling around the country.

"We're a bit anti what's happening in 1985," says Tony. "The charts are too straight. I think it's time for a change, something new to shake it all up again.

"I think we're trying to touch people in a spiritual way so that individual people can change. I don't think there's much point in bands making political statements. I don't think it really works to approach it from that angle.

"In the band all the members have separate political ideas, anyway. We don't have

any fights because it's a democracy.

"When we had auditions for the band I knew instinctively if somebody was right when they walked through the door. We have a great chemistry. We believe in each other and what we're doing. I wouldn't say that Big Sound Authority will last forever. Eventually I think we'd all like to get involved in separate projects, but the way I feel now is that we're good for two decades."

ONY IS the songwriter of the line up. He sits down with paper and pen and then takes his ideas along to the others.

"Things I've read in books or actually experienced will start me off. I had a very romantic and unconventional childhood.

"My dad was a rebel, not like a typical father at all. He'd encourage me to be bad and smoke things! Once we were very short of money. It seemed to me that a lot of people had lots of money and I wanted some of it.


"I robbed a petrol station. The lady had left the till open and I lifted it. Trouble was I was caught, but that's all in the past."


Big Sound Authority will be starting work on their debut album soon and the working title is 'An Inward Revolution'.



RE ANIMAL fats the only ingredient you have to watch out for in a product if you are vegetarian? Or are there other substances too? Can you recommend a straightforward book on the subject? Andy, Mottram

 Not every product which contains animal fats is labelled as such. Biscuits and cakes, f'rinstance, simply described as including edible fat or edible oil, aren't being specific about whether this fat is animal or vegetable. If you don't want to eat fats which are from

slaughtered animals, go for items clearly labelled "vegetable oil" or "vegetable fat."

Keep 'em peeled for gelatines, extracts from animal hooves and bones, and for most varieties of hard cheeses, including parmesans and English cheddars and the majority of soft cheeses too. Non-vegetarian cheese use rennet, from the stomachs of slaughtered calves to coagulate

the milk.
Advice on additives to avoid, and a key to crack the coding of emulsifiers on food packets, (many emulsifiers listed simply as E plus three numbers are animal in origin), and a full shoppers' guide to places and products to use and those to avoid can be found in the new 'International Vegetarian Handbook 1985/86',

out in February. The 'Handbook' which also includes a useful guide to holiday accommodation, costs £2.50, plus 50p postage, from The Vegetarian Society, 53 Marloes Road, London W8. For those new to vegetarianism, the Society suggests trying out 'First Steps In Vegetarian Cooking', by Kathy Silk, price £1.50, and another 50p postage from the same address.

ODDS 'N' BODS

NOT MANY realise the incongruous origins of the expression "go go": amazingly it derives from the much loved 1948 Ealing comedy about thirsty Hebridean islanders hi-jacking a shipwrecked cargo of booze, 'Whisky Galore', which when shown in France to huge popular success was retitled 'Whisky-A-Go-Go'— a name subsequently adopted by so many Continental discotheques (another French name and invention), including the Whisky-A-Go-Go in Soho's French name and invention), including the Whisky-A-Go-Go in Soho's Wardour Street which is now the Wag Club (and was next door to London's original 1962 (La Discothequel), that by the mid '60s the term "go go" came to signify discos and disco dancing in general, and especially in the States, where unwittingly the Washington DC narty crowd still keen Washington DC party crowd still keep that forgotten French expression alive with their "go go funk" . . . I know all this partly because I did some of my with their "go go funk"... I know all this partly because I did some of my growing up in Paris during the late '50s, and well remember my parents coming home for the first time from an amusing new type of nightclub rapidly becoming all the rage, where there wasn't a band but instead you danced to records, which they told me was called a "discotheque" — the one they used to go to, often in a party with the Duke & Duchess of Windsor, was the fashionable if hardly smart L'Etolie (so Gallic that to get to their own loo the ladies had to walk through the standup gents, where my mother couldn't avoid seeing the Duke do the dirty!)...Record Mirror, where you must admit the names that get dropped have class!... GET READY for the rap saga that's taken American black kids by storm, and is already outdoing Johnnie Taylor's old tales of 'Jody' (although it's unlikely to be as long lasting as soul's endless 'Woman To Woman' — 'She's Got Papers' — 'Another Man' — 'I Don't Play That' saga). 

WIGHT DUKES has a Sunday band... and a rest of the week band. On Sundays it's down the local (church, that is) for a bit of hollering with the Calvary Inspirational Choir. Total records sold: none. Monday to Saturday, he sings 'Can I', and Cashmere say you betcha. Total records sold: quite a few...

"I listen to a lot of gospel music back home," says Chicago-born Dwight, skilled voiceman on one of the pleasantest surprises of the year thus far, the sorties by 'Can I' into the chart's upper floors. "I sing in the choir on Sundays as well, it gives me a new insight about myself. I really feel I've experienced this inner being.

"But some of those guys who sing on Sundays, they're just *great*, they're real singers. I think 'I don't want to sing with you, I'm not good enough'!"

He isn't fishing for compliments, but he'll get them anyway, because his performance on 'Can I' practically out-Michael Jacksons the boy himself. Dwight took over vocal control of Cashmere from young pretender Bryan Loren,

who made his name singing on 'Do It Any Way You Wanna', the group's previous chart appearance — well, number 87 if you really want to know — in April '83.

Loren went on to a solo album (remember 'Lollipop Luv'?) on Virgin, but Cashmere drummer Daryl Burgee picks his words tactfully when describing Bryan's departure from the band. Was there a disagreement between them?

"Not between us per se. Bryan was very young when he started this, he started when he was in high school, and it came to the point where there was a lot of confusion and the record company decided to give Bryan time to get himself together.

"One thing about life, you have to be able to work with people. He felt he wanted to do different things, and there were complications. But he's much better now, he explained that there were a lot of things he didn't understand then." Now when you're used to being number 87, it comes as quite a surprise to find yourself straight into the Top 40 from nowhere. "I couldn't believe it, I heard about it from McKinley," (Horton, keyboards). "He said 'Man, get ready for this one — we're 40, baby'!"

HE HIT features backing vocals from an uncredited but rising name... Eugene Wilde, another member of the Philly World stable, where they're all pals together. "The artists all work together which is great because if someone has success we all share in it, we all feel a part of it," says Dwight. "Like Eugene's record. That's number one in the States, by the way." Black chart talk, naturally.

Who else is on the Philly World roster these days? "Eugene, Terri Wells, Harold Melvin And The Blue Notes, a new artist called Joanna... New Experience... and a host of others," says McKinley. "I've played on most of those artists' records," Daryl adds, and he's also done time with Gloria Gaynor, the O'Jays and Fat Larry's Band.

Dwight's singing apprenticeship came in a group called Heaven And Earth, who recorded for Tec Records and were produced by Nick Martinelli. "The label's not going any more," Daryl says, "we all went to the funeral. But Nick's hot, he's been working with Loose Ends and he's doing Five Star.

"At one of the PAs we did the other day," Dwight says with some pride, "someone came up to me and said 'You used to sing with Heaven And Earth'. I just stood there, I mean no one remembers Heaven And Earth!"


Those PAs have been coming thick and fast during the lads' Brit visit, but like plenty of other acts they find the exercise somewhat frustrating. "A PA is really not enough," Dwight complains. "You do one song, and it goes great, and you want to say 'Can I do some more?'"

Have they found on their travels that most people are discovering Cashmere for the first time? "No, it's been very interesting," says Daryl, "just about everyone I've run into is aware of 'Do It Any Way You Wanna'."

There's a Cashmere album all set to go on UK release and the fellas are hoping for more Cashmere cash with the follow-up single. "There's been a response on 'We Need Love', that might be the one," says Daryl. "Kind of a midtempo thing." The album had a variety of producers including Bunny Sigler and Ron Dean Miller.

"They're people who've been working on and off with the record company, they're good people. There's a variety on there, hard-driving and smooth." All very well, guys, but where's my promotional sweater?

Imagination's single was written in equally romantic circumstances, as Leee explains.

"It was a day in the late summer. I was sitting upstairs looking out over my garden and thinking about all the good things in my life. I had written down the word 'Thank you' and I was wondering how I could incorporate it into a song. Then the melody came along and away we went. It's a very sentimental song but at the same time it's not a wimp out.

"I'm surrounded by so many good things; the people I know and my family. I would like to father some children, but not necessarily get married.

"I want to work with children and maybe I would adopt some. My sister has adopted a child which is very good. I love sharing my love. I'm a very romantic person and I don't think I'll ever change."





OME WITH me into the heart of the dark and decaying, scurvied and scurrilous 1980s. Ride iron-heartedly into the pulsing corruption and hideous hell holes of city life.

Well, Hammersmith actually, but it'll do. For tonight at least, pain suffering and sores rule

supreme. Marc Almond is the conveyor of the messages and 'gutterhearts' everywhere are present to drink in the tale. The people assembled at the Palais tonight are here simply to ADORE,

Marc Almond tells of the depths and depravities of human existence, but in such a jolly way you want to give him a big slobbering kiss. He can sing a bit too. The thing you can't take away from Marc is the strength of his following. As you enter the Palais tonight you're met by some of them. These are the programme sellers — all members of Gutterhearts, the official Marc Almond appreciation society. Andrew Hewett wins the top marks as best Marc look-a-like of the night.
"I come from Wales and I've been following the whole tour," he tells you through mascara-clad

lashes. "Marc's just a really nice man, always friendly."

Molly from Leighton Buzzard was previously a member of Cell Mates, the Soft Cell society. On the Almond appeal she waxes lyrical. "It's the music innit . . . it's very atmospheric. And Marc's got a wonderful body - nice and skinny. He cares for his fans too.

The man eventually makes his entrance to the sound of Donny Osmond. Slow bass and flamenco

guitar follow, and Marc does a little twirl to the delight of the squashed bodies down the front.

Much of the set comes from 'Vermin In Ermine', with the odd new number and fun fave from the Mambas' 'Torment And Toreros' period to back it up. 'Tenderness Is A Weakness' is introduced as one of those gut busting, ball bursting ballads I'm loved for — or hated for . . . ". It's belted out with pure suffering power as Marc becomes Edith Piaf for a day.

The set lasts over two hours with the voice never faltering and the repartee getting more and more like a personal conversation. The Willing Sinners (has that man a way with words) provide quality backing (with only the odd burn note) particularly Annie Hogan on piano.

As he returns for an encore, Marc stands alone under the spotlight as his voice rises up, working its way into your guts and tickling your spleen . . . if you see what I mean. The whole thing finishes with a screaming version of 'Black Mountain Blues'. Sweetness singing about slime — Marc Almond is a showman with a heart of pure gold.

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
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



RAZY OR great. Or both. Jaz Coleman, of top 40 pop combo Killing Joke, is playing me a tape of his group's forthcoming LP 'Night Time'. The volume is LOUD, the music is banging harder than a Hyde Park khazi, and Jaz is just standing there playing his imaginary guitar.

The man is totally absorbed, nary a thought of video or Hippodrome or ORS '85 in his head. As they used to say, he means it maan.

"'Love Like Blood' is uncompromising music," he says of the group's current hit. "For me it's a very disturbing piece of music. I was disturbed when we recorded it. I don't give a f**k what chart position it reaches, as long as people hear it.

"A lot of younger people seem to be picking up on our music at the moment. It's important to us that we don't patronise anyone. We won't budge from our position or start employing new tactics just to get up the charts.

"Our relationship to our music is disturbingly close... we become our music. The way we live our lives determines our sound. The way we live constitutes our music. We've been to hell and back for our music."

Jaz says a lot of things like that. He looks you straight in the eye and just talks. So do the other Killers, dressed in leather and brogues and angry young man stares.

"We thrive on what we're doing," says drummer Paul. "We have our own style and it's irrelevant what anyone else is doing. Our gigs are victories and we treat them as such. Nobody can touch us live."

That's as maybe, but there's something about Killing Joke's obsession that's a touch worrying.

"As individuals we don't have much to do with the musicbiz on a social level," says Jaz. "Outside influences don't affect our lives." Paul chips in: "We just live very volatile lives, get as much out of things as we can. Our music explores all sides of our emotions, there's a depth to it.

"We definitely don't isolate ourselves, though. I think we're aware of what's going on, we're not hermits."

HEY'RE CERTAINLY not hermits. As the fervour dies down, Jaz tells me of forthcoming dates in Japan, Rio, Thailand and New Zealand. Not bad for a group without a hit single pedigree. And mention of hit singles sets Jaz off again...

"We want to be the musical summary of the decade," he says. "The insanity out there — we rejoice in it. We don't want to create an illusion like all the rest. Killing Joke is our sanity. It's music not just as a pleasure principle, but because we need it. If we didn't do this I don't know what would happen to us. That feeling is 'Love Like Blood'..."

Paul: "We have taken that 'Love Like Blood' too far to ever return from it. We can't do without it." Jaz again: "With 'Love Like Blood' we feel that man doesn't get what he deserves but what he resembles, we're trying to explain our fanaticism. With other groups the relationship between artist and subject is so weak."

And on they go, so convinced that you can't help liking them. So right about the gutless parade of top 10 pop that you can't help wishing them well. And if they did well what would they spend all the money on?

"I'd spend it in the right direction," says Jaz cryptically. "Killing Joke is a vehicle for our own freedom, an expression of our own personal politics and a way of being in control of our own destinies. To be in an uncompromising band is a dream come true for me."
