



COLLECTOR PROFILE


Floyd A. Paul, a collector who specializes in horn speakers, has sent A.R.C. a photo showing a partial view of many of the horn speakers in his collection. Up front, lower center, is a pair of Music Master 14" diameter wood bells (Spruce on the left and Mahogany on the right). To the right is a 21" diameter Music Master Mahogany horn. Upper left is a wood neck, metal bell Winkler Reichmann S-5 (early). Upper center is a Hartman Electric Mfg. Co. 46" high floor pedestal model.

These are some of the more than 125 different horns in his collection. The horns are his prime interest in collecting, although battery sets, A.C. sets, tubes and test equipment are a part of the collection. Like Alan Douglas, some years ago Floyd found interest and fun in collecting magazines. There are over 700 magazines in his collection, vintage 1921 to 1935, from which he can trace historical events, ads, companies and people.

Wood horn speakers (bells, necks & bases) seem to be what collectors treasure in todays collectables. The Horn Speaker booklet he started publishing 3 to 4 years ago has found its way into some 145 collectors hands across the nation, including Japan, Canada, New Zealand and Australia.

Any collector who wants information about a horn speaker, for example... who made it, what year, how many were made, etc., can find a pen pal by writing to Floyd. However, you must include a SASE if you want a reply. There were over 300 manufacturers and over 600 models of horn speakers made between 1921 and 1927. 


COLLECTORS CORNER



The Transformer Corporation of America came on like gangbusters when they entered the radio manufacturing field in 1930 with their line of Clarion radios. Prior to that, they were well known in the radio industry as a manufacturer of iron core transformers and chokes, speakers, and power packs. TCA claimed, in a four page ad, in the June 1930 Radio Retailing Magazine, to have "perhaps the most modern radio plant in the world, where every part that goes into Clarion radios were fabricated from the raw material, finished, and assembled." It was located at Ogden and Keller Avenues in Chicago, Illinois.

TCA's president, Ross Siragusa saw to it that Clarion kept a high profile in the various retail magazines. Nearly every issue had photos of various personalities visiting the plant, Clarions's spiffy delivery trucks, or a Clarion display at some overseas trade show. Clarions were good sellers throughout Latin America and in the smaller countries of Europe.



Our featured set is the Model AC61, a six tube set introduced in January of 1931 selling for \$67.50, tubes included. It stands 193/4 inches tall, 15 inches wide, and 17 inches deep, weighing 35 pounds. A TRF circuit is used with type 24 tubes used in the two RF stages. Another 24 functions as detector being transformer coupled to push-pull 45's in the output stage. An 80 rectifier provides DC well filtered by two chokes employed as voltage dividers. The speaker field coil is used to provide bias voltage to the AF tubes. Volume is controlled by increasing bias on the RF and detector tubes and by shorting out the input signal at the antenna.


The early Clarion mantel sets are easily recognized by the asymetrical placement of the controls and tuning dials. The cabinet designs are also quite distinctive. The chassis is very well built, Clarion called it "battleship construction". All tubes are shielded as are the antenna and RF coils. A bulkhead underneath the chassis separates the RF and AF circuitry while providng additional shielding and strength to the chassis.

The Clarion AC61 is a good performer, very sensitive, and the tuned filters help to provide excellent fidelity. However, the interstage transformer is specially designed for this set since the push/pull output stage is coupled to a 24 rather than a 27 detector which was the common practice. Use of another mars reproduction to a great extent. Another problem is the use of a potted filter unit. The two chokes and seven capacitors are in a single container and replacement is rather difficult.


Clarion continued making radios until at least 1946 although the company was sold and moved to New York City in 1933. The Clarion name can still be found on radios but unfortunately, as with so much else, the Company is Japanese.

Next month a high quality mantel radio from England, the Marconiphone 42, Moving Coil Transportable III of 1931, will be featured.

WITH THE COLLECTORS

CONSOLE RADIOS - AN INEXPENSIVE COLLECTABLE

Collecting and restoring old radios is one of the finest hobbies that I have known and one that has attracted many new people in the recent years. It can be expensive or it can be reasonable whichever one wishes to make it. The satisfaction of finding a restorable set and the challenge to make it presentable again in appearance and to repair it to playing condition is fascinating.

We are always looking for something old and rare in radios and in this search there are still interesting sets to be found, even though they are getting scarce. The search, however, does not have to end with them. There are many fine old consoles to be found that can make good restoration projects, their disadvantage of course is in the storage space that they require.

I have had gratifying results in restoring two RCA's, one Zenith, one Trutone, one Philco, and one Atwater Kent, models ranging from 1929 through 1938, all consoles. They all turned out to be very fine playing sets as well as having nice

ATWATER KENT 60

The one that I especially like to show off is the Atwater Kent Model 60, 1929 Vintage. I found it in a flea market in a very bad state of repair. I knew that with enough patience, it could be restored because everything was there in it's original state.

I started on the chassis first, after a thorough cleaning, I got down to making it play. A contact arm was missing in the antenna selector switch, which wasn't too much trouble to make and install. The tuning drive required some work, a grid cap was missing on one of the old 24 RF tubes and had to be replaced, resoldering a connection under the chassis and some repair to the speaker cone completed the chassis restoration. I used a variac and gradually brought the voltage up to where the stations started coming in and was amazed at its sensitivity and selectivity, even though it is a TRF set.

The cabinet had to be clamped and reglued in several places. The walnut veneer had to be replaced on top and a busted grill replaced in front of the speaker. I stripped the old finish and used a light stain to blend the old and new veneer, then hand rubbed seven coats of brown Kiwi shoe polish into the finish. After replacing the grill cloth, I installed the chassis and speaker and am very pleased with the whole thing, especially the tonal quality.

If you don't have the space to store or display these old consoles, there is just as much kick in fixing up an old cathedral or tombstone or even an AC-DC table model, if it strikes your fancy.

There are many things to take into consideration in restoring old sets. We should never alter the circuitry to improve it's design, after all it probably reflected the latest in the state of the art in it's day making it a fine receiver and even one not to be scoffed at by today's standards, if we get it working properly.

So when we find the set and dig the parts out of the old junk box or wherever and finally get it to playing and looking good, if its not antique, its collectable by our standards at least. This "Value Guide" is an attempt to establish a relative value of many of the more common radios of the 1920's. The values expressed are the result of past market trends as indicated in recent auctions, flea market sales, sales by individual collectors, as well as information provided by other established collectors in the hobby. The factors affecting a value of a radio are many. One must consider the more obvious factors. such as condition of the radio, whether it is complete with tubes, in working condition, originality, age, rarity and etc. Other factors contributing to value include collector demand, collecting specialties (such as collecting wireless items, crystal sets, etc.), and geographic area. Thus when using this guide, you must consider these multitude of factors when valuating your radio. Of course the final value in the end, is the price another person is willing to pay for an item. 



PANDORA CRYSTAL SET: Both sets pictured are supposedly Pandoras. The set pictured in Fig. 1 is like the one in Vintage Radio for which a 1922 date is given. The advertisement shown in Fig. 3 came from a 1932 catalog of the American Sales company located in New York city. I really wonder if a set such as the Pandora had a longevity lasting over 10 years. Although with variations the Philmores lasted even longer. The Pandora in Fig. 1 is red in color and has a base diameter of 4.83 inches. The coil form is 2.83 inches tall and as can be seen in the photo, tuning is accomplished by a slider. Like most simpler sets of that era, resonance is a function of the slider position for the inductance and the distributed capacitance of the coil. I assume that the set shown in Fig. 2 is also a Pandora, however I have no documentation to back that up. It is very similar to the other set and everyone that has seen it has commented to the effect that it is a Pandora (comments through the mail are always welcomed). This set has a smaller base as it is only 3.75 inches in diameter. The coil form is 3 inches and the form diameter is 2.5 inches like on the other set. Another interesting difference is the fact that on the one in Fig. 2, the coil form is not mounted directly to the base, but it is raised about 1 inch. This set is gold in color. Like the advertising states, these sets came in various colors. All in all, the Pandora is a fairly scarce set as I do not recall ever seeing one for sale at any of the radio meets I have attended over the years. (Mike Feher, Manassas, VA)



















