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WITH THE COLLECTORS

An Obscure Jukebox

We have not carried a juke box article in quite a while. But now Ray shares some information on a little known juke box from a prominent radio manufacturer. (Editor)




Figure 1. The record changer, amplifier, speaker and coin mechanism are housed in this large cabinet. The record changer action can be viewed through the glass-covered window.

When we think about juke boxes, the names that spring to mind are likely to be AMI, Rock-Ola, Seeburg, and Wurlitzer. It may come as a surprise to learn that RCA made an abortive attempt to enter the juke box market. Its entry was the 1932 RCA Victor Coin Operated Automatic Electrola Model CE-29 shown in Figure 1. This model is described in the RCA "Red Book" for 1931-1932. The amplifier in this iuke box is a 3-tube unit that employs a Type 80 rectifier, a Type 30 as a 1st AF amplifier that is transformer coupled to the AF output stage. The filament of the Type 30 is DC-operated to reduce AC hum. The AF output stage uses a pair of Type 47 tubes in push-pull to produce about 4 watts. The speaker is an 8-inch dynamic with dual field coils. The use of dual field coils is unusual. But dual field coils were also used in other Electrola models. Otherwise, the amplifier and its power supply were typical designs of the early 1930s.

THE RECORD CHANGER

The record changer is described in the service notes as "a standard RCA Victor automatic record changing mechanism." It is unclear which mechanism was the standard since there were several Electrola models that used different changers. However the changer was probably the unit shown in Figure 3. The changer has the capacity to hold ten 10-inch records. The 8-inch turntable runs at either 33-1/3 or 78 rpm. The

pickup is a low impedance magnetic type that requires an input transformer.

THE COIN MECHANISM




Figure 4. This pictorial helps to understand the operation of the coin mechanism. The ratchet wheel is identified as item C.

The coin mechanism is perhaps the most interesting part of the juke box. When a coin, in this case a nickel, is inserted in the coin slot, it momentarily closes a normally-open coin switch that in turn energizes a dual electro-magnet. The magnet activates a lever-controlled ratchet wheel. The ratchet wheel advances for each nickel that is inserted. Since the ratchet wheel has only 23 teeth, the maximum number of coins that can activate the mechanism is limited to 23. The ratchet wheel is reset by one notch after a record is played by means of a subtraction switch. When the changer finishes playing a record and the changer recycles it operates the subtraction switch that in turn energizes another electromagnet that resets the ratchet wheel. Thus the number of records left to be played is reduced by one. Figure 4 shows the coin box arrangement.

SOME CLOSING THOUGHTS

There are some limitations to this machine. It can only play 10 records before repeating a record. Also, a patron has no choice in record selection. For a nickel, the customer gets to hear whatever record is next in the stack. But the owner/operator of these juke

boxes must have been happy to learn that the coin box can hold 300 nickels. The service notes state that "Due to the large area of the cabinet, excellent low frequency reproduction is obtained." True – the cabinet is nearly 4-feet tall and about 28-inches wide and 20-inches deep.

I was unable to find any production figures for the CE-29. It would seem that as a specialty item the number of units produced must have been fairly low. Also, I wonder just how many of

these juke boxes have survived. Perhaps some A.R.C. readers can provide additional information about this old and rare juke box.




Figure 5. Schematic circuit

EARLY BROADCASTING

Radio and Marjorie Lee Dodd

It's a pleasure to those interested in old radio when the executor of a will recognizes that something radio-related might be of historic interest. When we received photocopies of the notebooks kept by a lady radio listener of the 1927s, which were not in article form, we were not sure how to handle them. Of course, we turned to Jerry Berg, whom we like to call "the official storyteller of the history of shortwave radio." Jerry graciously agreed to look through the material and turn it into this informative article. (Editor)

What would you expect to be the late night pastime of an attractive young wife in 1927 Hollywood, California? If you are a long distance radio fan, the obvious answer would be "DXing." And in the case of Marjorie Lee Dodd, you would be right.

The late 1920s were the "in between" years for DXing broadcast stations. In the early part of the decade, everyone seemed to be a DXer, staying up late at night to seek out signals from far away cities and towns. By 1927, the fad had subsided, and shortwave broadcast DXing had not yet arrived. But radio in all its forms held great fascination. Stations had their own personalities, announcers had their own followings, and many listeners were still captivated by the prospect of "distance." There were many reasons to "listen in," as Marjorie Lee Dodd no doubt discovered.

Marjorie Dodd (her maiden name was Shearer) passed away in 1979 in Southgate, California, where she had moved after the war. Her interest in radio surfaced when the executor of her estate, Patti Kodel, her aunt by marriage, discovered her radio notebook, a combination of a log book of stations heard and a scrapbook of memorabilia received from the stations. It is a small looseleaf notebook, 5" x 7", where she made notes of reception and kept records of her listening accomplishments.

Serious listeners kept such logs in those days, especially if they wrote to the stations, which Marjorie did. Then, as now, you sent a reception report containing date, time, and frequency of reception, details of the programs heard and the quality of the signal, as well as some comments about the programs (such "applause" was important to stations in those days). You requested a QSL-card as an official verification of your reception, and then you moved on to the next station. Typically, it was hearing a new station, rather than listening to program content, that was the DXer's main motivation.

Marjorie's neat penmanship makes her notes easy to read. At the top of the each page she gave the station's call letters and location, and then the station's frequency in "kilocycles" and the wavelength in meters. She also made a note of the power of the station and its distance in miles, a common measure of DXing achievement in those days.

Although we don't know what kind of receiver Marjorie used, it must have been of better than average quality, for her notes describe good reception even from distant stations of modest power. Thousand watt KGW in Portland, Oregon, was "very clear," and like-powered KWKH in Shreveport, Louisiana was rated "clear, good volume." Even 500-watt WDAE in Tampa, Florida was heard "very clear and loud." Not all reception was strong. WORD, a 5 KW station in Batavia, Illinois, was received "faint but clear." And the fading that is common in broadcast band DXing is evident in her notes. KTHS ("Kum To Hot Springs"), the well-known 1 KW station in Hot Springs, Arkansas, was "very faint at first, later clear and good volume."

Lest we think that hearing stations was easy in those days, keep in mind that, although 24- hour operation and the RF pollution of today were still in the distant future, interference from other stations and noise from local electrical devices were standard problems. And the receivers of the day had many limitations. Distant reception was still a challenge, but that was DXing's great attraction.


Marjorie's notebook contains entries for 39 stations that she heard during the six months

from September 1927 to February 1928, plus a few loggings thereafter. I checked the powers against some old station lists, and her numbers checked out in all but a few cases. Of the 36 stations where the power could be ascertained, 11 were 500 watts, seven were 1,000 watts, and 10 were 5,000 watts. Only three were more than 5,000 watts. Many are stations with a well established place in broadcast history; e.g., KDKA, KOA, WGN, WOAI, PWX. The complete list is shown in Table 1.

Marjorie wrote to the stations she heard, and she must have written good reports, for of the 39 stations in her log, she received replies from all but five. Most of the responses are QSL cards or letters or the like, or EKKO stamps. Typically, she pasted the cards into her log book, and she cut out station names and graphics from the letters or envelopes, together with the text of the letters

Marjorie cut out various parts of the reply from KWKH and put them in her notebook. KDKA (notebook page) — As this notebook page shows, Marjorie kept good details of the program items she heard.

and the postmarks from the envelopes, so they would fit on the pages. She also decorated the pages with small newspaper cutouts of microphones and the word "Radio."

In addition, Marjorie's book contains a carefully written list of "Distant Stations," which includes those she had heard plus some others. There are lists of stations in Los Angeles, San Francisco and other parts of California, as well as Oregon and Washington. These include call letters, wavelengths, and, for some, slogans. Perhaps these were targets that she was listening for. There are also a few newspaper-style photos of radio personalities.

Several of Marjorie's loggings are noteworthy. One is 3XN in Whippany, New Jersey, on 484 meters. (I believe the station's actual wavelength was 475.9 meters, or 630 Kc) 3XN was an experimental Bell Telephone Laboratories station. and Marjorie has two form letters from Bell Labs stating that "the program to which you listened is a part of our development work on a 50 KW radio transmitter intended primarily for broadcasting applications, and it is helpful to us to know how its signals were received in your locality.'

An interesting logging is 6XAN, which Marjorie indicates to be a portable "aeroplane" station affiliated with KMTR, a

500-watter in Hollywood. Although she has no verification for this one, her notes say that the plane was flying at 2,000-2,400 feet at a speed

of 85-125 mph, and that the program included a description of the city by night, the names of many musical selections, and the reading of a telegram from Indiana (apparently she was not the only one listening that night). This was at 7:00-8:00 р.м. on January 27, 1928. Marjorie was probably listening to a broadcast of the plane's signal over KMTR. A 1927 issue of RADEX, an early magazine for DXers, lists 6XAN as being affiliated with KRLO in Los Angeles. Marjorie gives no frequency for her reception, but RA-DEX indicates that it was licensed to operate on one of the shortwave frequencies allotted for early shortwave broadcast relaying in the 2,750-11,400 Kc range. Was Marjorie branching out into shortwave? Probably not, as this would

have required special equipment.

One station I cannot account for is KFDL, the location of which Marjorie gives as Oklahoma City. She shows the station on 284 meters. There was a KFDL in Denver on the all-purpose 360 meter channel (833 Kc), but it had disappeared from station lists several years earlier. Could she have meant Oklahoma City stations KFJF, 272.6 m. (1100 Kc), or WKY, 288.3 m. (1040)? Whatever it was that she heard on October 28,

1927, at 6:20 P.M., she reports reception as "clear, loud" and describes the program from the Liberty Theater as including the songs "Me And My Shadow" and "Under the Moon." A quick internet search reveals a Liberty Theater in Hartshorne, Oklahoma, that opened in 1919. Hartshorne is about 125 miles from Oklahoma City.

One of the most interesting items in Marjorie's collection is a postcard dated January 15, 1928, seemingly from a station 6XT, Stoke-on-Trent, England. There is nothing in Marjorie's notes about this station save for a page headed "London, England (?)" to which is pasted an envelope with the handwritten return address, "London, Eng. W.C., 6XT Stoke-on-Trent." A card, originally contained in the envelope, is headed "The Carlton Hotel, Pall Mall, S.W." and contains the following message in very small handwriting:

Dear Miss Dodd: It's jolly ripping of you to make us aware that your radio or wireless contraption supposedly or apparently tuned in our majesty's broadcast in the wee small hours. How topping and all that sort of rot! Now we must release the feline from the sack! With titlers we must let you in, ha! ha! bah jove, how can we

keep it, it's too royal really you know. To abbreviate a lengthy tale, one of H.M.S.s - a seagoing tug of sorts picked it up on a Magnaformer [a receiver of Radiart Laboratories in Chicago] and re-broadcast it from K.F.W.O. Regretting that we must withhold our reception stamp and thanking you for your ambitious dial twisting, We are, Most respectfully yours, 6XT by Tom Thumb.

KFWO was a 250-watt station at Avalon. Catalina Island, about 22 miles from Los Angeles, which Marjorie should have been able to hear. I can find no record of a 6XT in England, but lists of that era do show a 6ST in Stoke, 1020 Kc. 200 watts. Marjorie could easily have misheard the call letters. However, surely no ship could have picked up 6ST and arranged for a real time rebroadcast on KFWO. Might KFWO have been broadcasting a recording of 6ST made some time earlier? Or was 6XT a Ham call? Or does the name "Tom Thumb" and the small handwriting on the card suggest that it was all some kind of spoof of 6ST by a "pirate" 6XT? We will probably never know. (For some fascinating reminiscences of 6ST in the 1920s, see the audio file "6ST Calling" at www.bbc.co.uk/stoke/content/ articles/2006/03/13/history_radio_stoke_documentaries feature.shtml).

While the pastime of scrapbooking had passed its heights by the 1920s, many people still kept scrapbooks, and radio is a theme that I have seen in other scrapbooks of the era. However, most fans focused in on radio personalities; Marjorie's interest was DX. Whether her interest in radio was short-lived, or whether this is but one of other notebooks that might have existed, we don't know. What is clear is that Marjorie had caught the same infectious DX bug that had delighted so many earlier listeners during radio's first generation, and would continue to do so in the future.

RESTORATION TOPICS

Fisher Custom Electra II Restoration

This article will discuss the restoration of a 1958 Fisher Custom Electra II Console Radio Phonograph (figure 1).

I've collected and repaired/restored antique radios and televisions for many years and in recently have become interested in vintage tube audio equipment.

Normally I don't collect consoles (due to my small house) but here is the quick story of how I acquired this unit. About 3-years ago my I was helping my friend Sandy clean out her storage room at the local storage facility. She had been storing many items since moving and down sizing where she lived. Buried under the usual furniture and boxes of books, dishes, photographs, and other things people accumulate was the console. At first I thought "Oh, another 100-pound monster to move." But then I noticed the Fisher name and some interesting tubes on the chassis. I took it home.

How did Sandy end up with a 53-year old console? It originally belonged to her father's cousin. When the cousin passed away in the early 1990s, Sandy's mother claimed the console and gave it to her as a present. The turntable never worked but she occasionally played the radio. It was in the

foyer of her home until she moved and then kept in storage until I found it.

When I got it home I placed it – where many of us place large items that come into their possession – in the garage. A few months later I sold the 1929 console in my office and moved in the Fisher.

RESTORATION

The first time I powered it up was on a variac. It worked, but barely. I wasn't surprised. The controls needed cleaning and the tuning eye tube wasn't working. The turntable was very dead.

It was finally time to remove the chassis and fully investigate the console. To get at the chassis bolts I had

to unscrew the back panel covering the speaker compartment.

The chassis had plenty of dust and dirt. My first surprise was that the console had three speakers: a 15" woofer facing down, an 8" midrange and tweeter facing front. The insulation needed to be reattached (figure 2).

Oh, did I mention this was a mono unit?

The console is Fisher model number NK-100 (figure 3). In 1958 it came in two cabinet versions – Provincial and Mahogany. Fisher also sold the Custom Electra II in 1957 but with 4 cabinet variations – The Chatham, The Ebony, The Gotham, and The Normandy. My model is the 1958 Normandy. It measures 36" w x 38" h x 21" d. The cabinet uses plywood with a veneer. Even the wood piece covering the speaker compartment is 3/4" plywood! The chassis is a Fisher model K-100 with 15 tubes (similar to the Fisher 500 mono chassis of the 1950s.) There are five main controls on the chassis and two secondary controls on the faceplate. The controls are AC Power on/off; station selector; tone – bass & treble; volume/loudness (three position loudness control); and the selector control with AM, FM, AES, RIAA, LP, NAB, Tape, Aux 1, and Aux 2. (Figures 4 & 5). The secondary controls are Presence and Brilliance. The secondary controls are two wire wound pots connected to the console faceplate (figure 6 & 7). The outputs tubes are EL37s. Very expensive if you drop one!

The turntable is a Garrard RC-88/4 record changer (figure 8).

I took the chassis down to the work bench to start the restoration.

Now, let's stop for a second. Everyone I know who works on vintage radios, TVs, etc. has a different method of repair/restoration. My own personal opinion is that with audio equipment you want the best fidelity and I replace most of the electrolytic, bumble bee, and wax capacitors. The capacitor values have changed after 50 years. I especially do this in TVs of the late 1940s when most of the capacitors are out of their value range and you can see the effects on the CRT images. For a simple "All American Five" I wouldn't do this type of replacement. Also, some people will open up the electrolytic cans and hide the new caps. I disconnect the cans and place new electrolytic capacitors under the chassis.

When I work on a chassis where many parts need to be replaced, I check the unit after each part is changed. I had a speaker system connected to the chassis as I worked on it. Also, I checked voltages before and after each replacement. You can get to learn much about circuits and how they operate by seeing how the voltages change with the new parts.

I ended up replacing 26 capacitors, some lamps, a few resistors, and a couple of tubes. This chassis uses six mini indicator lamps for AM, FM, Phone, Tape, Aux 1, and Aux 2. It also uses two #47 lamps to illuminate the dial. All controls and tube sockets were cleaned. The chassis was




Figure 4. Top chassis – before




Figure 9. Chassis – diagram top view




Figure 10. Chassis bottom - before




Figure 11. Chassis bottom - after

partially cleaned with care to avoid removing labels (figures 9, 10 & 11).

Fortunately, I was able to obtain a service manual for the K-100 chassis that had all the necessary information about the chassis including voltage readings and alignment instructions.

THE TURNTABLE

Now what to do with the Garrard RC-88/4 record changer. Since I'm not very good at repairing turntables I did the best thing possible – I gave it to my friend Chris who knows what he's doing. It works fine now after he cleaned out the 50-years of hardened grease and lubricated it. It probably can use a new idler wheel but I'm satisfied with its performance. In the near future there will be an article on repairing this turntable.

In the turntable compartment there was a lamp

that wasn't working. There was no voltage at the lamp socket. The wires from the socket to the chassis were hidden by a piece of wood. At the chassis was 6 3 vac going to the lamp. I figured that maybe the wires were broken at some point under the wood. When I removed the turntable for servicing I was surprised to find the lamp is activated by a switch. Moving the turntable drawer in and out opens and closes the switch. Cleaning the switch contacts fixed the problem (figure 12).

BACK IN THE CABINET

The chassis was returned to the cabinet. At the same time I replaced the capacitors in the speaker network.

It was powered up and I am happy to report it sounds very nice. The tuning eye now works. Even though it is not stereo, the console sounds good and is certainly a conversation piece. I like that it has both AM and FM because I often listen to FM radio.

FISHER HISTORY

Avery Fisher, founder of the company, was born in 1906 and died in 1994. In 1937 he founded his first company, Philharmonic Radio. In 1945 the company was sold and he founded The Fisher Radio Corporation. Fisher sold the company to Sanyo in 1969.

The Custom Electra II sold for \$595 – a huge amount of money in 1958. The most expensive Fisher console model in that year was the Fisher President which sold for \$2495! The Custom Electra line was sold through the late 1960s. More information on Fisher consoles can be found at www.fisherconsoles.com.

Sometime in the next few months there will be a more detailed article on the history of the Fisher Corporation.

CONCLUSION

Recently a friend came over to pick up a repair. He saw the Fisher and wanted to hear it. By the way, this person views himself as an "audiophile." My friend was very impressed with the sound and commented "the stereo separation is very good for something this old." I didn't have the heart to tell him it was mono.

Warning: This article involved restoration of a chassis. There are high voltages in this and many pieces of equipment on which you may be working. Do not attempt to work on any equipment where high voltage may be be present unless you are familiar with electronic circuits. These voltages can cause injury and possibly be lethal. Always practice caution in your work.

wife Sarah for a grand party.

Some of the guests had never seen the Terrey's barn built only a few years ago to house John's radio and book collection. The barn also includes a studio for Sarah, an office for the magazine, and know, John's extensive collection spans from the very early 1900s to the Art Deco period. One set in particular had a prophetic air about it — an RCA Radiola IX console with windup phonograph which had been purchased about

ten years ago from none other than Editor Jon Kummer. It may take a while, but one thing often does lead to another.

Perhaps the highlight of the tour was the 1929 RCA Theremin, an electronic musical instrument, played by hand motions, not by actual touch. Naturally, several guests had to give it a try, but its weird sound makes for better use in the movies, or even a symphony hall, than in the home.

Also on display were old photos of the staff enjoying past holiday parties or just caught in moments in the office or at flea markets. There were examples of artwork pasted up in the old way, using an x-acto knife and wax, before computers made the job easier. In those days, every page was transported by hand to the printer, and we always feared that bad weather or an accident would interfere with its transit. Now everything is done digitally and transmitted to the printer via the Internet — much more easily, of course — but not without its own challenges.

The collectors among us could have stayed in the museum all evening, but it was time to move our party to the house for dinner, set at a large rectangular table (actually, A.R.C. flea market tables, which had traveled to many a meet, were under the tablecloths.) When it seemed that the food couldn't get any better, dessert arrived in the form of an incomparable chocolate layer cake, topped with a small glass radio bank. Flagging the bank were two A.R.C. covers, John's first from 1986 and Jon's first from 2010. The Terreys know how to throw a radio-related party!

Then the story telling began, prompted in part by the 289 A.R.C. covers displayed side-byside around the room — 132 feet of them. This memory-lane display pays tribute to work well done in the past by many of the people present and points to a hopeful future for A.R.C.

In that regard, both John Terrey and Jon Kummer spoke about their commitment to a strong, quality A.R.C. in the years to come. Sarah Terrey too thanked everyone who had helped to introduce her to the world of radio when she and John married eight years ago.

In summing up his 24-year stint, JVT, as the staff often called him, talked of the over two dozen employees who had contributed to the growth of the magazine over the years. Sadly, some, like our special "Radioman" Dick Desjarlais, had passed away, but others had moved on to other fields, and some were still here to



TELEFUNKEN DEVICE – This large, slider type, clockwork device was made by Gesellschaft f.drahtlose Telegraphie m.b.H. Berlin (Telefunken) during World War I. It was constructed for reception of damped and continuous waves and for testing of transmitters and receivers for continuous waves. The wheel on the left indicated by an "O" on top is a timer that runs about two hours. This set is a great novelty and now the oldest set in my collection. (Erwin Macho – Vienna, Austria)

RCA MODEL 96X – RCA Victor manufactured this Bakelite set in 1939. Designed by Vassos, it came in brown/tan, brown, and ivory. It uses one each of the following tube types: 6K8, 25Z6, 65K7, 65Q7, 35L6, and a BK498 ballast tube. It tunes both the broadband and shortwave bands. (*Clark Trissell* – *Lincoln, NB*).



FALCON CATHEDRAL – This cathedral, ca 1932, measures 12" wide x 14" high. Its tube complement includes the following types: 80, 47, 56, and two 58s. There is no other information on the cabinet or the chassis. (Ken Armstrong – Storm Lake, IL)




PHOTO REVIEW -

RCA LOUDSPEAKER 103 – This dynamic-type loudspeaker was manufactured by the Radio Corp. of America (RCA) in 1928. It is now known as one of the "Tapestry" speakers, as the front grille cloth is a woven tapestry fabric. Its octagon frame is made out of a Repwood material, and its base has a tendency to warp. Collectors then called it a "rocker." In 1928, it sold for \$37.50 and was marketed to accompany the Radiola 16, 18, 21, 44, and 60 sets. (Robert Kitchel – Danville, VT)





POSTCARD BY ARTHUR THIELE – This postcard, probably designed in the early 1920s, shows the inspiration of modern radio. (Erwin Macho – Vienna, Austria)

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PHOTO REVIEW -

Atwater Kent Model 84 - This 1931 receiver was the first cathedral radio that Atwater Kent produced. It is a 6-tube Hetrodyne circuit with the new, (then), screen-grid tubes. It tunes the broadcast band only. (Dave Crocker -Mashpee, MA).

EMERSON MODEL AX-235 – This Catalin radio was manufactured by the Emerson Radio & Phonograph Company of New York. The cabinet is made of butterscotch Catalin with black grille pieces and black knobs. Emerson called it "The Little Miracle," as it is a very small radio, indeed. (Robert Kitchel – Danville, VT)





GENERAL ELECTRIC MODEL

65 – This ivory plastic clock radio was manufactured in 1949 by the General Electric Co. of Bridgeport, Connecticut. Tuning was done by the horizontal thumbwheel dial at the top. This 5-tube receiver runs on AC current only. (Clark Trissell – Lincoln, NB)

COLOMBIA MODEL 20 – This portable "Grafanola" record player was manufactured by the Columbia Phonograph Co. It has a removable crank handle to wind up the spring. The leatherette cabinet has storage inside the cover lid for 78 rpm records, which is the only speed the phonograph plays. (*Clark Trissell – Lincoln, NE*)

FEDERAL TYPE 57 – This 1922 4-tube receiver was manufactured by the Federal Telephone and Radio Corporation of Buffalo, New York. The tubes used are Type 201A and are accessed through the metal door at the top right. The cabinet is all black minted metal with a highly polished Bakelite panel. (Wally Worth – Wollaston, MA)





ATWATER KENT MODEL

3925 – This breadboard was one of the first receivers Atwater Kent manufactured. It was sold in 1923 for \$23, and consisted of a 2-tube TA unit (detector/amplifier), a coupled circuit tuner, and a variomenter. (Wally Worth – Wollaston, MA)
