SDR-14



The RFspace SDR-14 is a 14-bit software defined radio receiver. It offers a broad range of spectrum analyzer and demodulation capabilities. The hardware samples the whole 0-30 MHz band using a sampling rate of 66.667 MHz. The digital data from the ADC is processed into 1 and Q format using a direct digital converter (DDC). The I and Q data is then sent to the PC for processing using a USB 1.1 interface. All of the demod and spectral functions are done on the PC side. The connection between the SDR-14 and your PC is the USB 1.1 jack on the rear panel.

Supported formats at this time include USE, LSB, AM, FM, WFM, CW, CWr and DSB. Filter bandwidths are continuously adjustable. DRM is not supported via special demod mode using third-party software (DREAM) by routing the demod audio through the mixer control.

The SDR-14 comes with a High Frequency (HF) amplified frontend with switched attenuators and 1Hz tuning. A direct input port to the analog to digital converter is also included. This port can be used to sample signals directly up to 200 MHz+. This port can also be used to connect downconverters and spectrum analyzer frontends. The SDR-14 also supports high resolution spectral captures using up to 262144 point FFTs. The maximum spectral display width is 30 MHz simultaneously.

One of the most exciting features of the SDR-14 is the ability to record band segments of any band to hard drive in realtime. This is done at a rate of 52GB/day for a 150 kHz wide segment. The stored file contains everything that happened in that segment of the band for the duration of the recording. The fidelity of the file is superb with over 96dB of dynamic range. The recording can be played backat any time with full tunability and choice of demodulation modes. The recording can also be analyzed for hidden signals and carriers.

The SDR-14 comes with AC power supply, USB cable and computer CD.

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
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The Par EF-SWL is an end-fed short wave antenna optimally designed for 1-30 MHz reception. The radiator is 45 feet of genuine #14 gauge black polyethylene coated Flex-Weave wire (168 strands of #36 gauge woven copper). This material is very strong yet can easily be coiled like a rope for portable work. The UV resistant matchbox houses a wideband 9:1 transformer wound on a binocular core. Unlike other transformers. external stainless studs on the matchbox allow the user to configure the primary and secondary grounds for best noise reduction at their particular location. Output is via a silver/teflon SO239 UHF connector. The radiator also attaches via a stainless stud allowing it to be removed, or replaced with a different length radiator for experimental purposes. The 19th edition of the 40 page Australasian Shortwave Guide (ASWG) by Bob Padula, OAM, Chartered Professional Engineer is now available. The ASWG has over 1400 entries and covers the international shortwave transmission period commencing March 27, 2005, and concluding on October 31, 2005, known as the "A05 international transmission season". The Guide includes comprehensive schedules for broadcasts in English to Australia, Asia, the Far East, the Indian subcontinent and the Pacific: broadcasts in all languages to Australia and the Pacific. The data is arranged in two main sections, by studio country and starting time. Each entry shows broadcasting organization, frequency, starting time, finishing time, language, target area, transmitter site, transmitter country, studio country, and days of operation. Additional full operational schedules are provided, with transmitter sites. for: Radio Australia, Voice International, HCJB-Australia. Full schedules of Digital Radio Mondiale (DRM) transmissions intended for Australia, the Pacific, the Far East, Asia and the Indian sub-Continent. Schedules of the national services in English of broadcasters in the Australia-Asia-Pacific region. The ASWG is compiled from an extensive worldwide network of broadcasters, frequency planners, engineering consultants, professional monitors, and members of the Electronic DX Press Radio Monitoring Association. Information is also included from the detailed research by the author, himself a radio engineering consultant and technical journalist, with some 45 years experience at both the professional and hobby level. The Forum is Web-based (no E-mail), where visitors may post, read, word-search and reply to articles. which may include logggings, QSLs received, news, schedules, propagation, antennas, receivers, programming comments, discussions on Digital Radio Mondial (DRM), Broadband over Powerlines (BPL), and transmission technology. Past messages are archived. This new unmoderated service is very simple, with no need for user names, passwords, registrations, sign-ups, or filling in forms! There is no requirement to "join" or "subscribe"-visitors may come and go as they please! Neither is there any "membership list". The Forum is participative, and additional content is provided by the Forum Administrator, sourced to professional engineering contacts worldwide, much of which is not available elsewhere or in that format. I know we exchanged messages about this last year, but I just felt compelled to say again how much I enjoy these flash sheets, how well done they are, and how much I appreciate the time I know you put into this project. I'm fairly confident that I speak for my fellow NASWA members when I say this, too. What's more, you've always been exceedingly kind and gracious in whatever correspondence we've had.

I say all this just because I think that we're all, by nature, just far too busy these days, and don't often enough take the time to express gratitude to those who are providing a service that we might actually like a great deal, but just not say anything about. Folks just naturally remain mum unless there's cause for complaint, so that people like you who are doing wonderful things only rarely get to hear how much they're appreciated. And I just wanted you to know that.

My DXing was a bit on the light side this past winter. I didn't get my "shack" done, as planned, because of work around the house, though I did get my antenna up last year in time to participate in that worldwide DX contest that is put on in part by, I think, the Danish shortwave group. I was surprised: If I'm recalling this right, I think I was the only U.S. SWLer in the top 25 points-getters; and I hadn't been able to put the time into it that I'd wanted to because of the flu and work.

I really need to invest in a good tabletop receiver. I have some older Radio Shack units, including a DX-394 that I'm modifying with all the Kiwa add-ons. I also have a couple of Grundig portables, and a DX-440. My dream would be to buy a used Drake R-8, or Ten-Tec, or a new Icom R-75. With all the stuff we've needed for the house, I've not been able to get that together in a way that would've left me "free of guilt" (lol). Actually, I've got it really good. We bought a good-sized, five-bedroom house on eight-tenths of an acre in Northern Maryland (about 45 minutes north of Baltimore near Bel Air in Harford County) when my wife Robin and I were married about five years ago. I've got a hundred-plus foot longwire up, running pretty much N-S, and a buddy of mine sold me a used but very nice ham radio antenna mast for \$50 (if I recall, it's five or six sections, so maybe it's 30 feet). The big maple tree that holds up the innermost end of my longwire has to come down this spring, a real shame since it's the nicest tree on our lot. But the roots are starting to encroach upon the patio, driveway and septic system drain field, so it has to come down. I'm going to hang the

antenna on another tree, and also would like to get the mast installed (after I check zoning requirements and pour "footers" to serve as a foundation). Ahhh, the projects of the DXer.

Probably I should share my recent experience with a Grundig Satellit 800. The unit I bought had three significant defects:

(1) There was a fixed level of power supply hum in the audio. This was about 20 db below program with the volume control set low (as with earphones) but not objectionable when volume was turned up (as with my extension speakers). Less efficient phones would have been a solution. The replacement power supply sent by the retailer didn't help.

(2) The 800 is supposed to switch on its stereo circuitry automatically when a stereo subcarrier is detected on FM. This worked very poorly – recognizing the subcarrier on less than half of the stations which my Sangean ATS 818 receives perfectly with the same antenna.

(3) The clock lost about 30 seconds a week.

Although the synchronous detection with selective sideband worked wonderfully and will be much missed, I sent the 800 back and opted for a Sangean ATS 909 instead. I'm about to affix it to the table with carpet tape and enter a second day of getting to know the tiny thing. It's working perfectly so far.

I had to improvise around Steve Price's grounding methods. I got in 3 copper rods to ground my 160 foot long and 35+ foot high long wire, but the ground is very hard and rocky underneath my long wave.

The ground around my house is softer and stone free. So I grounded the radio (an R75) to 3 copper rods (all 8 feet long) 10 feet apart. The rods hug the wall of the house, so my XYL can't see them in the bushes. The final rod is in front of a basement window. The wooden window frame has a tiny doorbell hole in it already, so I grounded the 3rd and final rod to the copper cold water pipe that enters the house just below the basement window. The distance is 5 feet between grounding rod and water pipe.

I checked with the town engineer: my town uses copper and iron pipes for its cold water grid that serves a city of 9000 and covers several square miles.

The results on HF are a dream come true: Med basin stations sound like local MW stations. At night I have to attenuate signals from Sackville and the Middle East.

And ute DX is great too: ATC from Rio Janeiro, Lima Peru, San Francisco USA, W Africa (Dakar, Luanda, Niamey, Kinshasa, Accra, Jo'berg SA), N Africa, and East Africa (Nairobi, Addis Abba, Mogadishu, Seychelles, Madagascar). And VOLMET from Tokyo, Sydney, Honolulu, and Auckland NZ.

The Government's Green Paper on the future of the BBC is available as a pdf for download at http://www.bbccharterreview.org.uk/have_your_say/green_paper/ greenpaper_home.html.

The section which includes the BBC World Service "Bringing the World to the UK and the UK to the World" starts on page 42. The Government will take into account the conclusions of the independent review being conducted by Lord Carter of Coles before publishing its White Paper.

Among the main points: The Green Paper suggests BBC World Service undertake a "radical and creative reprioritization of its vernacular output." which is 42 languages. The 8 languages it currently has online websites for Arabic, Chinese, Hindi, Persian, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish and Urdu should be the starting point for the discussion. In particular it says that the BBC World Service's offering of services in 16 vernacular languages spoken in countries which either formed part of the Soviet Union or the Eastern bloc of countries formerly under the Soviet Union's domination is beginning to look anachronistic.

The Government says there is a case for the World Service to develop niche foreign language TV services, in particular an Arabic language TV service to the Middle East. However this would have to be done from its existing budget. This could be achieved by more efficient use of resources and a reduction in the number of vernacular radio services.

Once again I'm chasing serial numbers in an attempt to track the true production numbers of a Drake Radio and I need your help.

If you are an owner of a Drake SW-4 or Drake SW-4A this may be of interest to you.

From published information I have always thought that 500 to 600 SW-4 receivers were built before the change to the SW-4A version.

I no longer believe this is true.

I have acquired a SW-4A with a S/N of 451, this then would mean that 450 or less SW-4's were built before the change to the "A" version. I was surprised to learn recently of a SW-4A with much lower SN.

The owner was kind enough to send me plenty of pictures of this radio, it is clearly a SW-4A and sports the SN of 251.

This would mean a much smaller number of SW-4's were built before the change to the SW-4A.

Here then is my quest, To find more information about the SW-4's true production numbers.

Do you own a SW-4 or SW-4A? If so can you send me your SN and version.

I own two SW-4's, 221 and 225. Our friend Sindre has SW-4, 001.

Their are 4 versions of the SW-4A and it would be fun to track the SN breaks on these as well.

SW-4A differences:

1) Earliest type has Dial window and PTO knob like a R-4A

2) Next version is like the R-4B in the Dial window/knob

3) The C-Line type Dial and knob is next.

4) The last version is minus the NewYork Radio WW logo.

The SW-4 and SW-4A are a very over looked radio in the Ham world being a AM only rig, but an important part of the Drake History puzzle and one of my favorites.

Almost 40 years ago in 1966 when the SW-4 first appeared it was way above the means of a 14 year old paperboy. I had to settle for a Knight-kit SpanMaster at one-tenth the cost of the Drake. (I still have it!)

Still I dreamed of someday owning a Drake receiver and like many of us now I do, many times over, HI!

SW-4 S/N UPDATE....(25 March 05)

So far I have received 17 e-mails from SW-4 / SW-4A owners. Every scrap of information helps with sorting out this Drake puzzle.

I don't have enough information yet to do a serial Number breakdown of the SW-4A versions but I do have news on the SW-4.

A SW-4A with a serial number of 230 has been reported. This is most interesting as I own SW-4 S/N 225. With only 4 radios between the first version and the reported "A" version.

This would indicate that a much smaller number of SW-4's may have been built making it perhaps the rarest Drake production radio known.

As of yet I have not heard of a SW-4 with a S/N greater than 225 or a SW-4A of less than 230.

Make's one wonder where they meet, hi hi.

BBCWS drops more frequencies and hours; will be even harder to hear in the USA

By now I'm guessing most have heard that the BBC is cutting back its shortwave hours to the Americas as of the A-05 schedule that took effect at the end of March. I have superimposed the new shortwave schedule to the Caribbean and the Americas along with the programming scheduled for the A-05 season.

You might not recognize "Documentary 1" or "Documentary 2"—these are the slots reserved for the changing documentaries offered by the BBCWS. The early April entries are **Controlling Science** (Documentary 1) and **Global Perspectives** (Documentary 2), a cooperative series produced by a group of broadcasters including the BBC, CBC, Australia's ABC, Radio TV Hong Kong, Radio New Zealand, Ghana's Joy FM, Radio Netherlands and Soundprint, the US-based documentary production company.

The programs conspicuously absent from shortwave to the Americas include the last two hours of *Sportsworld* and the features block including *Discovery, Science In Action*, and *Health Matters*.

Filling in the gaps?

Even more than in 2001, we in North America will have to get creative in finding other frequencies that are likely to reach us in North America. I compared notes with John Figliozzi and supplemented them with listings provided by Andrew Reid of the ODXA; together the following should by your first choices for the BBC World Service targeting other areas but still potentially audible in eastern North America:

First, in general, try out 6195, 9410 and 12095 kHz. These are frequencies in use *somewhere* around the world much of the time.

Next, try out the following:

0300-0700: 7160 (from Ascencion targeting West Africa) 1400-1900: 21470 (from Ascencion targeting southern Africa) 1100-2100: 17830 (from Ascencion targeting west Africa)—this frequency will likely be better from 1600 onwards. 1200-1700: 15485 (from the UK targeting north Africa) 1200-1500: 17640 (from the UK targeting north Africa) 1500-1800: 15565 (from the UK targeting northwestern Europe) 1500-2300: 15400 (from Ascencion targeting West Africa)-probably the best bet of the bunch

While these cutbacks are tough enough on North America; they're even more dramatic in Europe. During much of the middle part of the day, only 17640, targeting both North Africa and Eastern Europe, may be feasible there. Service to Africa appears to be untouched; as the BBCWS continues to move towards alternate delivery systems, shortwave service to Africa will probably remain intact the longest.

The online discussion groups have been brimming with opinions and analysis following these announcements; the BBC says the general trend continues to indicate that shortwave audiences are decreasing in size, with listenership via other delivery methods (satellite, local FM rebroadcast, webcast) is increasing. While the advantages of webcasting—especially on-demand program availability have been often touted here in the *Easy Listening* column, the comparison of local rebroadcasting to shortwave results in statistical distortions: How do you equate local primetime availability of feature programming vs. overnight relays of mostly news?

The fact remains that the BBC WS is choosing to serve audiences in a targeted fashion, which is something shortwave is not ideally suited for. Those of us who were weaned on the BBC World Service via shortwave must either adapt to these new listening options or consider ourselves disenfranchised-not a desirable option. It's also undeniable that costs drive the BBC's decisionmaking process—it costs the BBC nothing for a public radio station in the USA to add BBC programming, since the programming is already delivered via satellite from the UK to the various shortwave transmitter sites. Shortwave transmitters on Caribbean islands usually have dieselpowered electricity generators to fuel the transmitter plant, and the year-long run up in petroleum prices hurts the BBC's operations budget as well.

Being the eternal optimist, at least the BBC isn't like RVI or Swiss Radio International, YLE and Radio Norway, which ended program production as well as shortwave transmission.

I'll continue to include BBC World Service programming highlights in the *Easy Listening* column when space is available; I'll include shortwave airtimes for the Americas and for Africa, since those are the two regions we're most likely to hear in eastern North America.

Admittedly, I'm sure many of us now listen to the BBCWS via the alternate, non-shortwave delivery methods of satellite radio (XM, Sirius) and overnight FM rebroadcasts if we're night owls. For schedule information relative to these other methods, I recommend two resources: 1) the regularly updated schedules appearing at the BBCWS website; 2) the listings for each program and each station at Kevin Kelly's *Public Radio Fan* website, http://www.publicradiofan.com.

It's also worth mentioning that the BBCWS schedule on Sirius appears to be changing

with the seasonal time change—instead of the strict "all-news" feed, Sirius will be carrying the same programming as the PRI feed to US public radio stations. This means that *some* of the music programming—specifically *Masterpiece* and *Charlie Gillett*—will be heard on Sirius, along with *Health Matters, Science In Action*, and *Go Digital*. The first hour of *Sportsworld* on Saturdays will also air on Sirius.

Some might wonder if it's worth the effort to resurrect the *Save the BBC World Service* initiative to try to turn around these decisions; I frankly don't think it's worth the effort. In 2001, word of the changes became public in May—a full two months prior to the changes. In 2005, this information only became generally known in late February once the planning for the A-05 season was locked in. And, as mentioned above, the BBC is acting as though American listening patterns since 2001 have vindicated these decisions.

So what's your take on all this? Which . non-Americas BBCWS frequencies work the best for you? Take a moment and drop me a letter, post card or e-mail. Your experiences can help everyone else here!

Other seasonal changes—relatively few

Most other broadcasters with significant English language presence aren't making too many changes this season, aside from the Radio Australia changes noted last month.

Radio Netherlands

Aside from the morning shift from 1200 to 1100 UTC, one program is worth special highlighting: *EuroQuest*, the weekly European magazine program hosted by Jonathan Groubert. During the 2005 summer season one of the especially interesting topics will be *The Future of Radio*. The exact timing of this topic hasn't been firmed up; more details will be available later. *Euro-Quest*—justifiably considered by *Passport* to World Band Radio as one of the Top Ten programs on shortwave—airs Tuesdays 1130 and Wednesdays at 0027, 0127 and 0427 UTC to North America.

Radio Australia

This somehow slipped under the radar, but the rotating ABC Education series aired on Radio Australia are normally very well researched and produced. The current series, Smart Societies, is an 11-part series, asking a range of people what they think it will take to be truly "smart" in the 21st century. Societies have come to think of "smart" as having a digital connotation with the development of "smart cards", "smart cars" and even "smart fridges". People in various fields in the Asia Pacific region, all specialists in their own fields, have diverse opinions on what makes for a smart society. Airs Sundays 0830, Wednesdays 0405 and 1105, plus Thursdays 1330. The last two episodes will go to air after you receive the April Journal; all episodes including the most recent are archived for on-demand listening at the RA website, http://www.abc.net.au/ra. Click on Radio Guide, then Programs A-z, then R-U, then Smart Societies.

So long to RVI on shortwave

As most should know, funding for shortwave and mediumwave broadcasts for **Radio Vlaanderen International** was eliminated as of the end of March. While we heard, yet again, the sympathetic comments from RVI's parent, VRT, these had no significant effect. There will be daily short audio newscasts available via RVI's website, and text news about Belgium will also be available via the RVI website. You can listen to Frans Vossen's last edition of *Radio World* (which includes mention of the 'Fest and a picture of some shortwave notables (along with yours truly to fill empty space) at http://www.rvi.be/ rvi_master/uk/radio_world/index.html.

I'll miss RVI—while they certainly weren't in the same class as Radio Netherlands or Deutsche Welle, it was the best way to find out about their corner of Europe.

Non-shortwave tip for April: Switzerland In Sound

I mentioned this last September, but it's worth highlighting again. Bob Zanotti, now retired from SRI, has taken it upon himself to produce a "voice" from Switzerland even though **Swiss Radio International** has gone silent. Bob's programs are mindful in style of his days on the air at SRI; they're of various lengths and provide interesting sound portraits of Switzerland and things Swiss. It was great to see Bob in person at the SWL Fest, and it's great to hear him on the air still. Visit Bob's site at http: //www.switzerlandinsound.com/, and tell him that I sent you.






