#### POLISH PATHFINDERS BROADCASTING STATION



Probably one of Europe's least known broadcasters is in Poland. Least known to the North American continent, that is. For, in Europe, Polish Pathfinders Station is ROZGŁOŚNIA VETY popular. Broadcasting on two except Monday, the Rozglosnia

and an RCA 300 watt transmitter to speak to Polish youth, About sixty percent of all broadcasting time is devoted to pop music, mainly of teenage appeal. The



youth of Poland are the most numerous of all lis-teners. Some programming consists of music of other countries as well. The station receives thousands of letters from many countries, including a rare occasional report from America. The Polish Pathfinders Union is the only youth organization in Europe owning an independent broadcasting station. It may be roughly likened to Boy Scouts, but with a semi-political nature. The interval signal tune was taken from a popular pathfinders' song. The organization is for youths between 10 and 18, with about 2 million members in uniforms.

Polish Pathfinders Station began 17 years ago over coffee when several pathfinder instructors gathered to discuss ways of keeping members in touch with one another all over the country. Today, after help from the government, the Union owns premises of about 200 square meters. A professional staff of 8 engineers, 12 editors, and a considerable number of part-time journalists complete the employment of Polish Pathfinders Station. Seventeen years ago, station officials were long on ideas, but short on editorial experience. Now, things have improved in good measure, and the program is very ambitious. It is regarded as one of the leading stations in Poland for its quality and pedagogical value.

Recent communications with Polish Pathfinders Station official, Szczesny Borodzicz, had established a special broadcast from the Pathfinder Station to NASWA members during May or June. But, late word came that new improvement to equipment and premises during the Spring forced a postponement until Fall or Winter.

When renovations are completed and negotiations can be resumed, NASWA will be honored with a special broadcast to North America - probably of 30 minutes duration, and in English. Power of the station may be more than the 300 watts after renovation of the station. Frequencies used, and times, were: 7,306 and 6,850 kHz. 1100 - 1700 GMT weekdays except Monday, and 0900 - 1700 on Sundays. It is not known what frequency is used when. Watch for more word in a later FRENDX for this special broadcast. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

It was more than 10 years ago that TransWorld Radio first attempted to establish an international shortwave station on U.S. soil. However, due to FCC regulations there was a freeze on shortwave transmitting stations and no permits were granted during this time. In 1971, Trans World Radio sought unsuccessfully to have the FCC accept application for Guam. Then in the summer of 1973 the freeze was lifted and TWR again applied to the FCC for the construction permit for Guam. The call letters of the station on Guam will be  $\underline{K}$  T  $\underline{W}$  R and the power of the shortwave station will be 250 kilowatts. #### RADIO NEDERLAND'S ALL-ROUND DXER'S COURSE Information courtesy of DX Jukebox

Ed. Note: NASWA will feature some of Radio Nederland's courses from time to time. At the present, is is felt that with approach of the Fall and Winter DX season many NASWA members might enjoy learning more about their hobby. Following is a short resume of one course entitled the "All-round DXer's Course," compiled by Radio Nederland's own energetic friend of all DXers, Jim Vastenhoud. Various sections of the 25 lesson course have been written by reknowned DXers around the world, such as Arthur Cushen of New Zealand, Jan Tuner of Sweden, Dr. Richard Wood of Louisiana, Glenn Hauser of Oklahoma, Alain Descrieres of France, Maarten van Delft of Holland, Radio Nederland's own storehouse of expertise Harry van Gelder, and Jim Vastenhoud himself. With this kind of study material, how could one go wrong?! Read on....we believe that every DXer worth his salt (or thinks he is) should have this information. The "All-round DXer's Course" is just about the best source available anywhere - commercial or otherwise.

How does it work? Well, first you must write to Radio Nederland expressing your desire to join up for the course. Of course, there is no fee involved. You will be enrolled and shortly sent the first set of four les-When you have answered the review questions at the end of each lesson and completed the set of four, simply send them in for grading and the next set of four will be returned to you. You must send in a completed set in order to continue the course. This is reasonable, and assures Radio Nederland of your continuing interest in pursuing the course, and it also permits them to see how well you are faring.

Just to give you a preview of what the course is all about, a few of the lessons titles are given here: A Brief Outline Of The Hobby, The Shortwave Bands, DX Codes (the hobby jargon), The Antenna, Shortwave Propagation, DXing Latin America, DXing Asia and the Pacific, DXing Africa, Utilities, Time Signal Stations, DXing TV and FM, DXing Medium Wave, DX Organizations, and International Telecommunications. These are but half of all you will learn about. There is much information here that is not available to just anyone. Even our hobby's most experienced leaders could learn something in this course and still have the satisfaction of accomplishing a worthwhile endeavor.

### A TALE OF EXOTIC DX - St. Helena Government Broadcasting Station

Now you see it, now you don't. St. Helena was on the air for a very short time with experimental broadcasts, but no reports of the short lived broadcasts found their ways to St. Helena Island - isolated away down in the reaches of the South Atlantic Ocean.

When word first broke that St. Helena was on (or planned to be) the air, attempts to contact the station were met with the realization that a letter takes several weeks to reach the island. There is no air service to St. Helena and surface ship contact occurs about every ten days - half going to South Africa and half going to England considering all calls.

Your editor has had three communications with the secretary of Broadcast House at The Castle, and the following points are shared concerning the short wave service of St. Helena.

A series of tests were carried out on frequencies of 6100 and 11830 kHz during August-December 1973. The tests were not entirely satisfactory as expected. The frequencies are not yet firmly established, but NASWA is assured of advance notice of any changes made when broadcasting resumes.

Preliminary investigations to start shortwave in St. Helena began in 1971 or earlier, the main objective being to give St. Helenaresidents in Ascencion Island the opportunity to keep in contact with home. At the moment, the AM station on 1511 kHz serves St. Helena. A proper QSL card will certainly be prepared in due course. Regretfully, a special broadcast for North America would seem impractical since a limited (1 KW) facility beamed to Ascension Island would have little likelihood of reaching the U.S.A. The station is building a small record library and would appreciate offerings of current popular music, or high fidelity recordings of the same.

Several brochures sent with the secretary's latest letter included a visitor's guide for the island, from which a few facts are given here. The island was the place of Napoleon's incarceration until death. His body was returned to France in 1840. The island is only 47 square miles, mostly green, mountainous interior surrounded by generally rocky coasts. The only town of any size is Jamestown with less than 2,000 souls of the island's near 6,000 population. The entire population is a homogenous race except for approximately 200 mainly British caucasians - all employees of Cable and Wireless, the Post Office, Steam Ship Office. A half dozen other families have settled there from Britain.

Life in St. Helena would seem to be idyllic. Temperatures are moderate in Summer and sweater-worthy in winter. The hills tend to be several degrees cooler. Rain on the coastal areas such as Jamestown only amounts to 9 inches or so, while the hills average 30-40 inches. Greenery is everywhere. A price list of the 1974 index indicated that food stuffs and general commodities imported are comparable to U.S. prices of five years ago. Domestic produce and meats are considerably cheaper. There is little electricity available outside Jamestown. A short wave radio is an absolute essential entertainment, according to the brochure. There seems to be adequate facilities for maintenance of common household equipments.

Visitors to St. Helena are welcome, although immigrants are discouraged unless they bring an independent source of income and have arranged for their home in advance. A leisurely and graceful existence with hired service can be maintained for \$5,000 or so per year. Hotels are not plentiful, but few people visit St. Helena. Two tourist home type places offer room and board for approximately \$5 - \$7 per day per person.

The radio station plans to operate the short wave service the same as the AM service, Sunday through Friday. Sunday schedule is from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. local. Mondays: 12 noon to 9:30 p.m.. Tuesdays: 9:45 to 10 p.m. Wednesdays: 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Thursday: 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. and Fridays: 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. (How's that for a cock-eyed schedule?)

Programming is typically British for colonial outpost areas. Programs are drawn from BBC repertoire heavily. A few local talent programs and dances are occasionally broadcast. Local announcements are made each night at 8:30 p.m.

This page will bring back some fond memories for many NASWA members. Our illustration is from a February 1934 issue of Short Wave Craft. #### HOW TO GET ELEVEN COUNTRIES THE EASY WAY - ALMOST

VOA Transmitters

Eleven countries are available to most DXers in the U.S.A. and Canada, and most of them can be heard on very modest equipment. Thanks to Uncle Sam, the YOA provides these eleven countries (according to the official NASWA Country List - 25c from HDQ), and they can be heard with usually strong signals anywhere in the whole continent. One or two of them may give a problem, but patience is the key word. The countries - in no particular order - are these:

BERLIN (VOA'S RIAS)

DODECANESE ISLANDS (RHODES)

LIBERIA (MONROVIA)

PHILIPPINES (PORO/TINANG)

ENGLAND (WOOFFERTON)

RYUKYU ISLANDS (OKINAWA)

GERMANY (MUNICH)

GREECE (KAVALA)

TANGIER (MOROCCO)

SRI LANKA (COLOMBO)

U.S.A. ( BETHANY, GREENVILLE, DELANO, AND DIXON)

Below are listed a few of the easier and currently reported frequencies for these countries, and a time period when they are scheduled to be on the air. The frequencies and times are accurate according to VOA's own frequency schedule valid until 1 September 1974. However, this is not a complete listing. No consideration has been given as to languages used and the intended targets. Frequencies listed in same time periods does not necessarily mean that these are parallel programs - many of these examples were consolidated as a space-saving move.

The above suggested frequencies and times were compiled in consideration of darkness patterns between the transmitter and the U.S.A. Also, some estimated fade in/out times are illustrated with a squiggly line. A complete listing of all VOA transmitter frequencies and times, giving sites and target areas, and powers, is available from your Short Wave Center editor for 25c xeroxing fee and a legal size, self-addressed and stamped envelope (2 stamps). Finally...yes, I agree that VOA's RIAS transmitter in Berlin is likely to be difficult if not impossible at present - due mainly to location of BBC on the same frequency. It used to be generally heard up until 0330 GMT when the Munich transmitter for RIAS took over.

#### PULLING THE PARTY'S TAIL: EASTERN EUROPE'S UNDERGROUND RADIOS

Editor's Note: CB is proud to present this month a unique expose on Hastern Europe's truly underground radio activity by none other than France's well-known writer on motorcycle touring, Errant Limiers-Ondes. His manuscript was in French; any errors in translation are therefore entirely mine.

Although the CIA may protest in secret out of injured pride, the home of official clandestine radio is Eastern Europe. Stations like Radio España Independiente have been around for so long that their bureaucracies must now be just as fossilized as the grey bureaucracies of Radio Berlin International and friends. The more dull the official activity, though, the more interesting is what goes on without official approval. Governments do not part with information about this private sport, either because it is illegal and embarrassing or because it refers to their plans for taking advantage of their neighbors. Either way, I can recommend the hunting of the information "on location" as a fine game which mixes the skills of crossword-puzzle solving and bullfighting.

American newspapers have taken up the story of the Russian hobby pirates which first appeared in the German weekly <a href="Der Spiegel">Der Spiegel</a> around the end of 1972. Our legality is apparently more legal than Socialist Legality, at least if one leaves all the violations of FCC rules by Citizens'Band operators out of consideration. Even if the Russians bent their consciences enough to reserve a similar part of the spectrum where the rule would be "anything goes", their problems would not be over. The Russian pirate has a passion for communicating his views to the widest possible audience — maybe a relief from the non-communication which is built into his daily life — so he is unlikely to be satisfied with anything less than a slice of MW or the 60 meter band, where he lurks at present in wait for a domestic audience. The official line that the pirates interfere with essential services like aviation is understandable as propaganda for internal consumption, but is probably nonsense in fact, because the utility bands are not where the listeners are.

Frustration makes the authorities bad-tempered, as in the case of the elusive Radio Red Baron in a corner of the Ukraine. No politics for the Baron, if one excepts complaints against his water supplies and bus connections, but even a ghostly voice on 1250 kHz which replies to the Kiev regional program's boasts -- not coincidentally on 1241 kHz -- about agriculture with yet another installment of "100 ways to cook cabbages and potatoes" is unnerving. A low official usually doesn't talk back to a high official, but the government's failure to catch the Baron allowed one low official to engage in a little boss-

baiting in my presence not long ago. Fortunately, I was able to fade away at the point where they were about to pour glasses of tea over each other in their excitement. No CIA plot could have been better at sowing internal dissension.

How to hunt your favorite private clandestines is fairly simple. A receiver is helpful — the most efficient portable which can be carried as luggage without being arrested at the average frontier is ideal (but be careful of the Czech customs police!) — both to pick up what is going on, and to act as a bait for conversation with curious civilians who may have stories about what is going on or what has gone on in the past. Occupants of military uniforms are also good for conversation, but here the receiver is to be kept well out of sight. Bars in places where uniforms are concentrated (which means almost anywhere, but border towns obviously offer special possibilities) are similar in many ways to bars near American military bases. The most promising target in a bar is the drinker with the highest rank, but for the sake of both safety and a ready flow of talk it is best to make a trade-off between the amount of brass on the outside of a uniform and the amount of firewater inside it. Having picked your conversational prospect and brought out your tourist phrase-book, you are then on your own.

Some interesting information about Slovenia and Croatia has come out of alcoholic military conversations (eat well beforehand, and choose spongy foods!). In case the fraternal Russian and Hungarian comrades find it necessary to visit these areas of Yugoslavia to offer comfort to the population in the case of unexpected changes in the central government, it seems that two

types of broadcasting are ready.

Firstly, there are "black" clandestines to imitate stations of the regular Yugoslav networks, and secondly there are even blacker clandestines to behave like spontaneous stations of popular resistance and to send confusing news.

On the other side of the fence, "spontaneous" stations are being prepared carefully by people with some technical knowledge, partly in anticipation of visitors from across the border, but partly as a hedge against unwelcome attentions from Belgrade. While much of the activity can be guessed only from rumors, the "military spokesman" who led me into this paragraph reported the monitoring of one MW clandestine operated briefly by students in Zagreb during the forced alterations in the leadership of the League of Communists there in December, 1971. Even SWL's should lend an ear to this part of the world whenever it makes the headlines in their local newspapers.

Best Hunting on 49 Meters

If I must point to a place where the ear should be put, I recommend 49 meters, because this has the greatest chance of providing the stations with an audience. Most European receivers with SW coverage have a band from 6 to 12 MHz, with 15 or 18 MHz as the upper limit in some cases, but there are also many popular local products and Japanese imports where "SW" is a bandspread version of 49 meters only, usually 5.9-6.25 MHz. Again according to a military listener, the short Greek student rebellion of 1973 was represented on SW near 5.9 MHz by a station built quickly by students of Athens Polytechnic and operated on November 17. In Western Europe the HF end of the band is popular with pirates, as monitoring by people like Al Martin and Gregg Calkin in NASWA's own "Log Report" snows. The December, 1973, issue contains a particularly interesting case, on 6238 kHz, of a hobby pirate suddenly taking on a political coloring. When the disturbance is right, many Eastern European hobby pirates are likely to make the same switch. It may be hard to think of a disturbance which would turn the Red Baron's neighbors into clandestines, but other places with their share of radio-hooligans (official translation) are more volatile. The riots in Kaunas in May, 1972, led to a short-lived burst of activity. In longer riots anywhere in the future, I expect the broadcasting to be longer-lived.

Polish Transmitter Hidden Under Floorboards

Hobby pirates are relatively rare in Poland. There, transmitters which emerge in response to a need are built from the ground up, but then survive under floorboards against the "next time". The clandestines in Szczecin in the food-price riots of December, 1970, which caused the disappearance of Gomulka, were well-heard in Sweden, even though some were initially of poor technical quality. Since those transmitters were thrown together between demonstrations, the quality was not surprising. It was civilian curiousity about my portable receiver which led me by a roundabout way to an under-floor-board transmitter, the pride of its proprietors despite its bread-board style

of wiring. I estimated the power at 100 to 150 crude but effective watts. It was not fired up in my honor because the location was too central, but I was told that it had played a sound role in the 1970 games. Since then, it has been gradually refined as the builders read more and more textbooks in electronics, and after each improvement it has been tested in the disguise of a hobby-pirate.

To end, my message about grass-roots Eastern European clandestines is "Watch a) the headlines, and b) the hobby pirates". Suitable headlines turn even the most sleepy pirates into clandestines. Most of the activity will be on IW, but you can look for Russians among their Home Service stations on 60 meters and others off each end of the commercial 49 meter band. And if you can't take your vacation with your portable and your phrase-book in Eastern Europe, try Gotland or Bornholm as a listening-post.

#### CORRECTION

In the June edition of "Clandestine Bulletin", p. CB-4, it was erroneously stated that "Radio Sorush" appeared to be the successor to the "Voice of Iranian Freedom Lovers" and may therefore be via a 50 km transmitter of Radio Baku, USSR. The placement of this sentence was such that the material could have been construed as having originated with the BBC Monitoring Service.

The source of that material was not the BBC MS. As for the correct mater-

ial, the BBC MS's Chief Monitor, Mr. G.A. Weston, writes,

"'Radio Sorush' follows much the same line as the defunct 'Iranian Revolutionaries' Radio' and undoubtedly uses Radio Baghdad's facilities. The Baku-based clandestine is the 'National Voice of Iran', which is still broadcasting."

CB regrets the error and thanks Mr. Weston for providing the correct information.

TOKYO REPORT by Isao Ugusa

Isao Ugusa, updating the material on Soviet black clandestines beamed to the People's Republic of China, provides not only new details, but also the discovery of a very unusual type of black clandestine radio operation that probably emanates from the same facilities used by "Sparks", "Voice of the Liberation Army", and "Proletarian Battle Division". He writes.

"Another Chinese-language station was heard on 7525 (7530) kHz. Since around May 1st a very strange station has been noted on 7525 kHz with a very irregular schedule. It was heard once or twice (three times at most) at the following times: 1100, 1130, 1230, 1330, 1430, with programs of 7 to 23 minutes length. It would sign on with "The East Is Red" and sign off with the "Interna-

tionale" (mixed chorus) which is used by Chinese domestic radio stations.

After "The East Is Red" comes the ID, "Chungyang Jenmin Kwangpo Tientai",
"Hupei Jenmin Kwangpo Tientai", "Hunan Jenmin Kwangpo Tientai", or some other
Chinese domestic radio station ID (the ID varies from day-to-day, but Chungyang JKT -- "Radio Peking" -- is the most common). The bogus Chinese station
carries the respective station's program for several minutes, then comments
on the recent "Pi-Ling Pi-Kong" movement in China. It is jammed during this
segment. This station may have become inactive after May 10."

Veteran monitors will recall the numerous "Radio Pragues" during the Warsaw Pact invasion of Czechoslovakia in 1968, all but one of which were bogus. However, this is not quite so crafty as the Chinese-Language operation, which goes so far as to relay, apparently in parallel, home service programs, injecting only a brief bogus segment designed to mislead listeners. This is really the blackest of the black propaganda radio operations!

Isao Ugusa continues with some observations on more conventional Sovietbased anti-China black clandestines.

Thieves Take Radio Tower
EDWARDSVILLE, Ill., June
17 (UPI) — A 100-foot radio
tower was stolen, along with
a number of other items in a
weekend burglary from the
Phacker Construction Company,
the police reported today. The
owner of the company, Floyd
Phacker, told the police that
he discovered the theft yesterday when he stopped by his
office. Value of the stolea
items was placed at more than
\$10,000.

"The recent Soviet black clandestines' schedules are more complicated than those in June's CB. For example, the most common station name on 7520 kHz at 1100 is "Proletarian Battle Division", but sometimes "Station Sparks" ("Huchua Tai") — formerly "Sparks" ("Huchua") — is heard instead with the same style and playing the "Internationale" at sign-on and sign-off. In addition, "Voice of the Liberation Army" is rarely heard at that time on that channel. Therefore, such expression as "Proletarian Battle Division. Voice of the Liberation Army, and Station Sparks have been merged into a joint operation" may be right; but, again, the Voice of the Liberation Army is less active that the other two stations on that frequency at that time. Overall, Proletarian Battle Division is the most active, followed by the Voice of the Liberation Army, with Station Sparks rarely heard now (Station Sparks Chinese ID is currently, "Qing zhuyi, qing zhuyi! Zheli shi Huchua Tai xiang quanque qingnian tongzhi quangbo").

"Radio Red Flag is probably inactive on 995 kHz now, but I'm not 100% sure. The unidentified Chinese-language black clandestine on 7120, reported on in last month's CB by Victor Goonetilleke, is the Red Army Radio Station, also

noted at 1415-1423."

Going on to Korean-language clandestine operations, he continues, "The Korean station on 4699 (also reported on 4695) is not a clandestine station after all, but rather a utility station from North Korea called "Chosen Yonghe Hesan Pangsong Sil". As for the <u>Voice of the Revolutionary Party for Reunification</u>, based in North Korea, they now announce their schedule as follows:

2100-2300 Korean 1135v, 4557v kHz 0300-0500 Korean 1135v, 4557v kHz (new time, but not yet confirmed)

1000-1400 Korean 1135v, 4120v, 4557v kHz

1400-1430 English 1135v, 4120v, 4557v kHz (Editor's note: is the relay of this station from 1000-1100 Sundays via KCBS, Pyongyang, still active on 645, 655, 685, 735, 800, 3320, 6250 and 6400 kHz?)

"Inactive Southeast Asian clandestines include Radio Liberate the Southern Part on 6320 kHz, Voice of the People of United Indochina on 6803 kHz,

and Voice of the Destiny of the Fatherland on 6990v kHz."

Thank you very much, Isao Ugusa! Thanks, too, for the most interesting tape recording of many of these stations; I hope to study it in more detail before long. In closing, IU noted an unidentified Laotian operation on 6643 kHz to 1500 s/off with the Laotian National Anthem. He welcomes any clues as to its identity.

Finally, "Cairo's relay of the Voice of Palestine now signs on at 1630, one hour earlier than before, noted fair in Tokyo. Voice of Malayan Revolution is still on the air after June 1, despite the diplomatic accords between

Malaysia and China."

Yes, Voice of Malayan Revolution is still noted here at 1030 on 11830v. Professor Anthony Short, commenting on the "24 Hours" program of the BBC World Service May 28, suggested VoMR may not be located in China as previously thought, but rather in North Vietnam. However, its continuity during the major US bombing raid on the Hanoi clandestine site, plus several other clues, suggest Hanoi is not the site. The Hunan Province, China, site is well-substantiated by reliable Western monitoring and military sources.

#### RADIO FREE SCOTLAND

Our new reporter in Scotland, Ian MacIntosh, writes that Radio Free Scotland was a "celebratory" operation of a pop pirate under a different name, partly because all the other RFS's were silent at a time of national importance. It doesn't plan to broadcast regularly, but "we haven't heard the last of it yet." As you recall, RFS was noted several times on 6248 kHz earlier this year.

#### AFRICAN DEVELOPMENTS

The BBC Monitoring Service reports that the "Voice of Free Angola" now transmits via Radio Kinshasa and Radio Lubumbashi twice daily (except Sundays) at 1800-1830 and 2200-2230 on 11865v and 15245v kHz. Sundays only the 2200-2230 transmission takes place.

Finally, John Campbell of England (for now) reports a "Voice of Namibia" is due to commence operation from Zambia soon, thanks to Chinese, Irish & UN help.



#### Radio Marathon Record Set

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Jim Dawson has claimed the record for the world's longest continuous radio appearance, after completing six days and six hours on the air yesterday.

As I am typing this edition of LN up, I am in Charlottesville, VA, at my parents house and listening to the FM tabletop. I tried to tune in a Richmond FM station, abt 70 miles away on 102 KHz. The only thing I could get was KFWP (tent) on 101 KHz in Oklahoma City. On 103 KHz was KAFG, also in Oklahoma City! That "ain't" bad - 1500 approx, at mid-day, EDT on Fox Mike, 6/15 - DJ

ETC. - - - A tip for those, with cassette recorders (or anything similarly suitable) and without a decent pair of headphones, who have to get by without hi-falutin' equipment: - by Diane Levesque. Having experience w/packratted earphones and headsets, I've found all of them take a noticeable bit of volume fm the listening when connected directly to the set. You can get around such stuff as this run-of-the-mill-junk-for-common-folk and get more volumn by (A) connecting your recorder as if you were going to record via auxilliary (sans mike) (B) reframing from putting a cassette in (C) pushing the metal bar (located at the upper left corner of the cassette compartment) back (D) pressing both the RECORD and PLAY buttons (E) plugging in the earphone as it should be in the recorder - - - and you're all set. Of course, if you've a good headset (and you must be rich, OM!) you needn't go thru the hassle. .....sneaky Diane, but nifty too! DJ (Diane Levesque, IL via SWC Editor Ed Shaw)

Try the capital city, Accra on 3295, 3366, 4915, 7295; Ejura on 3350, 4980, 9640, 9760, 11850, 15285, 21720; and Tema on 6070, 6130, 9545, 21545. Look for the 60 and 90 meter band freq's during your local time for African reception; either in your local late afternoon or near midnight. They should not be very difficult catches. Most of them are 10 or 20 KW'ers.


