CRTC Reprieves CBC Atlantic AMs

The CRTC has wisely decided to leave CBH Halifax and CBD Saint John on the air for at least another year.

The Commission had previously set October 31, 1985, as the expiry date for the AMs, believing that after eight years of getting CBC Radio on both AM and FM, listeners would be accustomed to tuning FM. Not so. There was a great hue-and-cry, led by such notables at the premier of Nova Scotia, the city councils of both cities, and the director-general of the Coast Guard (who said that the lives of fishermen would be endangered if they couldn't pick up weather information on CBC-AM while out on the high seas).

The CRTC relented, claiming it merely wants listeners to have access to the best technical quality. The CBC is to survey the situation and report back to the CRTC within three months. CBC's director of radio in Halifax, Peter Loucks, told BT that one of the problems is the relatively low proportion of cars in the area having FM radios—54%. The transmitter of CBH (10 kw on 860), he admits, has a poor location and pattern. Loucks adds that no private interests have indicated they want to apply for a new AM, and if they did, better frequencies than 860 are available.

New Television Stations Licensed for Montreal, Regina and Saskatoon

CFCF WILL ADD FRENCH STATION ON CHANNEL 35

Four Seasons Television Network Inc., 66% controlled by CFCF Inc., has been awarded a licence for a third Frenchlanguage station in Montréal. CFJP-TV will operate 77 hours weekly on ch. 35, with ERP of 566 kw.

Denied by the CRTC: a bid by Four Seasons for channel 2 in Québec City, and applications by Télévision Saint-Laurent (Cogeco Inc. and Moffat Communications Ltd.), for stations in both cities.

The Commission decided against a new station in Québec City on the grounds that the existing radio and TV stations could not stand increased competition—only 3 of the city's 8 private radio stations made a profit over the past 3 years—and forecasts indicate declining population during the years 1986 to 2000.

Concentration of ownership was an issue in the decision, with commissioner Monique Coupal dissenting from the majority opinion. CFCF Inc. owns Englishlanguage stations CFCF-TV, CFQR-FM,

CFCF-AM and CFCX short-wave, also Champlain Productions and CF Cable TV, all of Montréal. However, the CRTC says that the combined audience of the CFCF group, including the new station, will be less than 20%, with the French station attracting an entirely different audience than that now served.

CFCF Inc. policy is that each of its operations is to remain a separate entity; also news staff for the two stations would be 'clearly separate' and Champlain will not produce programs for channel 35. The sharing of facilities such as production and post-production equipment, news bureaus and news services, film footage and microwave links, will provide economies in establishing CFJP-TV, and, the CRTC anticipates, will strengthen the company in an 'increasingly competitive' market.

Production by Independent Producers

All local program production, except for news and public affairs, will be delegated to independent producers. Projected program costs for the first year of operation are \$14.6 million, with \$8.6 million for independent production (29 hours weekly). This will include a prime-time drama series and a late night talk show—both Monday thru Friday. The major news production will be a one-hour report at 5:30 pm M-F. An interesting program aspect is that there will be no telecasts of sports events.

The Commission says that it is ready to receive applications for the extension of channel 35 to Québec City and other parts of the province. In addition to cable TV distribution, it suggests rebroadcasters be established, either by Four Seasons or jointly with local operators.

CANWEST WINS LICENCES FOR REGINA AND SASKATOON

Saskwest Television Inc., a wholly-owned subsidiary of Canwest Broadcasting Ltd. (CKND-TV Winnipeg), has been licensed to provide third TV service in both Regina and Saskatoon. The Regina station will operate on channel 11 with 159 kw ERP, Saskatoon on ch. 4 with 57 kw; on-air target date is September, 1986.

Don Brinton, president, said Saskwest would spend \$6 million to establish the two stations, which will operate 24 hours a day and employ about 120 people.

Proposals for 3rd English service were sparked by a March, 1984, application by Saskwest for Regina, followed by one for Saskatoon. Competing applications were filed by Allarcom Ltd. (CITV Edmonton), and by Harvard Developments (CKCK-TV Regina), who, with a group of other broadcasters, proposed cable delivery throughout the province via Sask-Tel's broadband network. All three applicants expected to use channel 13 in Regina, which the CBC plans to relinquish when it builds a new transmitter site at Belle Plaine. However, in January, 1985, the CBC postponed the Belle Plaine project due to financial restraints, making ch. 13 unavailable. Saskwest simply revised its proposal to use channel 11 in Regina. Allarcom and Harvard opted for an entirely different approach: they proposed relaying the signal of CITV Edmonton (via Cancom satellite), adding local programs and commercials, for distribution on cable TV; Allarcom would run the Saskatoon operation, while Harvard would participate and supply studio facilities in Regina.

When the revised applications were heard in Regina in June, 'a vast majority of interventions' supported the Saskwest plan for over-the-air stations.



As to the ability of the markets to support third services, the CRTC notes that the existing private stations, CKCK-TV Regina and CFQC-TV Saskatoon are 'among the most profitable' in Canada. Also, in all cities where third TV stations have been licensed, they have become viable without 'insurmountable hardship' to the existing stations. It is estimated that the two new stations will reach 500,000 viewers in Saskatchewan, twice that reached by the cable systems in Regina and Saskatoon.

A Third English Network?

In response to charges that Canwest is attempting to form a third national English TV network, Saskwest insists that, like CKND-TV, its stations will be autonomous. Although Canwest holds indirect negative control of Global TV, it does not control the southern Ontario network; as for loan arrangements with CKVU-TV Vancouver, it would be 'entirely hypothetical' to assume that CKVU would ever come under Canwest ownership. Saskwest says it intends to offer up to 49% of its voting shares to residents of Saskatchewan, and will have four directors from the province.

Each of the new stations will have its own studio and production facilties, and will provide 23.5 hours weekly of local programming. There will also be 51.5 hrs. of other Canadian programming weekly, and 91 hrs. of non-Canadian programs not currently broadcast in the two markets. A mobile unit will be based in Saskatoon.

POWER CORP. WANTS TO BUY MONTREAL'S TELE-METROPOLE

Power Corp., which has a reputation as an expanding and investment-wise conglomerate, has set its sights on Télé-Métropole. Power proposes paying \$97.8 million for a 41% equity, including almost all of the voting shares.

Télé-Métropole owns CFTM-TV Montréal and CJPM-TV Chicoutimi, and has a one-third interest in Pathonic Communications (CHLT-TV Sherbrooke, CHEM-TV Trois-Rivieres). All four are part of the TVA network, which is anchored by CFTM, Canada's largest and most profitable French-language TV station and a major production centre.

The media cross-ownership issue, however, could be an obstacle in obtaining CRTC approval for the purchase. Power Corp. owns four dailies—in Montréal, Trois-Rivieres, Sherbrooke and Granby. It also controls radio station CHEF Granby, and eight weekly papers.



SLAIGHT-STANDARD DEAL IN CRTC's COURT

As BT went to press, a CRTC decision was still awaited on the purchase of Standard Broadcasting by Slaight Communications. The hearing was held September 18, after which Canadian Press reported that Allan Slaight brought 'at least 27 people and Toronto financier Conrad Black on video tape' to 'the chummy, clubhouse atmosphere of the half-day hearing...' When

the Commission said it would not make a decision until after October 9th, the cutoff date for Slaight's conditional offer, Slaight waived the condition and took up the 84.8% of Standard shares which had been offered. Cost of the purchase is approximately \$110 million.

Slaight accepted an offer of over \$18 million for Toronto stations CFGM and CILQ-FM from Westcom Radio Group Ltd. of Vancouver—also subject to CRTC approval.

ONTARIO FM APPLICATIONS

Applications for FM stations in several Ontario cities were heard at an October public hearing in Toronto.

- Bracebridge: Hugh and Michael MacKenzie propose operating on 97.7 with 65,000 watts; they would originate 47 hours of local programming a week, and at other times would rebroadcast CHFI-FM Toronto. Joseph F. Duchesne, owner of CFBK Huntsville, would broadcast on 107.7 with 50,000 watts; he would initially rebroadcast CFBK, but by year 5 would provide 100% local programming.
- Brockville: Eastern Ontario Broadcasting (CFJR) proposes a pop/soft rock format on 103.7, with 50,000 watts ERP.
- Chatham: Competing applications were filed by Bea-Ver Communications, for a pop/soft rock format, 35,400 watts; and by Key Radio (CFCO) for a country music format, 50,000 watts.
- London: London Broadcasters (CKSL) propose a pop/soft rock format on 103.1 with 3,000 watts.
- Parry Sound: Robert R. Bowland of Barrie would acquire CFBQ from Jos.
 Duchesne and also establish an FM station on 103.3 with 1700 watts ERP. Programs would be simulcast for six months, at which time the AM (on 1340) would be phased out.

COMMUNITY FM FOR INUVIK

The Inuvik (NWT) Community Broadcasting Society has been licensed to operate an English-language station on 103.1 MHz with 7.8 watts ERP. The CRTC describes the station as 'an important local service' for developing community radio programs.

CITY-TV SEEKS CH. 31 WOODSTOCK

CHUM Limited has applied for a rebroadcaster of CITY-TV Toronto to be located at Woodstock. Operating on channel 31 with 70.6 kw ERP, the station would cover much of southwestern Ontario, including the cities of London and Kitchener.

NATIVE RADIO NETS PLANNED

Three native organizations are planning to expand radio network operations, via CBC's Northern Québec satellite service.

- The James Bay Cree Communication Society would broadcast Cree and Algonquin programming produced at Mistassini, PQ, over nine CBC stations;
- Société de Communication Attikamekw-Montagnais would produce programming in three locations for broadcast on 15 CBC and community stations; and
- Taqramiut Nipingat Inc. would distribute Inuktituk programs produced at Salluit over CBC outlets plus five community stations in northern Québec.

PRAIRIE CTV AFFILIATES SHARE DRAMA PRODUCTION

Five western television stations, all CTV network affiliates, are joining forces for the production of quality TV dramas. Initially, resources of up to \$2 million will be pooled by CFRN-TV Edmonton, CFCN-

TV Calgary, CFQC-TV Saskatoon, CKCK-TV Regina and CKY-TV Winnipeg. They hope to obtain additional funds from Telefilm Canada for ongoing production of drama in the prairie region. The shows will be aired in prime time and made available for sale in other markets.

FM BIDS FOR MONCTON, CHATHAM

The CRTC has received applications for English FM stations at Moncton and Chatham, New Brunswick. A deadline of November 15, 1985, was set for further applications, which may be for either English or French FM operations.

FORT ERIE AM SOUGHT


Keith Dancy has applied for AM for Fort Erie, Ontario, to operate on 530 kHz with 250 watts. It would combine local programming with programs from Dancy's CJRN Niagara Falls, using the CJRN studios and transmitting tower.

CJRT CONTINUES LIVE CONCERTS


Among the live concerts being presented by CJRT-FM Toronto during the 1985-86 season are a 4-part Mozart series and ten Sound of Toronto Jazz shows. Tapes of the series are available to other Canadian stations through the Program Exchange Service of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters.

In renewing CJRT's licence for a 5-year term, the CRTC commended the station for its commitment to Canadian talent, which includes some 50 live concerts per year.

- Community radio station CKWR-FM Kitchener marked its move to new studios with a grand opening on Sept. 28.
 The new facilities are in a remodelled house on Regina Street North, Waterloo.
- Multilingual CFMT-TV Toronto had a 'gift' from the CRTC to help celebrate its 6th anniversary: all cable systems within 20-miles beyond the B contour are now required to carry ch. 47 on the basic service. CFMT is now on 56 cable systems, and is microwaved to London, Windsor, ON, and Rochester, NY.
- The Mount Allison University station CHMA Sackville, NB (Attic Broadcasting Co. Ltd.) is replacing its carrier current operation with a 50 watt FM station on 106.9 MHz—Sackville's first radio station.



CHAM HAMILTON CELEBRATES MOVE TO 820 kHz



Hamilton's Mayor Bob Morrow and CHAM morning man Cliff Dumas are seen turning the dial on a gigantic radio from CHAM's former position (1280) to its new spot at 820. The event took place at a free family concert in Hamilton's Gage Park, when CHAM Radio increased power from 10,000 watts to 50,000 watts—allowing country fans all over south-central Ontario to receive the CHAM signal 'loud and clear'.

STUDER DONATION TO CFRO-FM

Studer Revox Canada, Ltd., has donated replacement tape recorder heads valued at \$1,400 to Vancouver Co-operative Radio. Chief engineer Bruce Whittington says Studer's generous donation will greatly enhance technical quality of CFRO—the only community radio station in western Canada.

ARMSTRONG AWARD WINNERS

CBC Radio in Toronto was among the winners of the 21st annual Armstrong radio awards, which honor the inventor of FM, Major Edwin H. Armstrong. Another award in the 'excellence and originality' category was to WEEI Boston.

- There were four special awards:
 For technical achievement—WNCN New York, 'a model in FM quality' and pioneer in using digital compact discs; and KSJN St. Paul (Minnesota Public Radio), for its accomplishments in digital and satellite broadcasting.
- For outstanding service to the industry— Ben Hoberman, president of ABC Radio, for AM; and Norman Pellegrini of WFMT Chicago, for FM.



- Power increases have been approved for CJMT Chicoutimi (from 2,500 to 5,000 watts night) and CKBS Saint-Hyacinthe (from 250 to 1,000 w. day).
- Access Network and the University of Alberta sponsored a Nov. 1 symposium in Edmonton on the restructuring of the Canadian Broadcasting system. Participants were able to interact with the federal Task Force on Broadcasting Policy and other resource people. Four sessions covered 1) technology; 2) regulator and incentive provisions; 3) regional and local TV; and 4) multilingual broadcasting.
- CKO Radio will carry the Canadian Opera Company's 4th annual Radiothon (Nov. 29-Dec. 1). Six COC performances are again being heard this fall throughout Canada (on CBC) and the United States.
- C-FAX Victoria is claiming two 'firsts' in weather reporting for the area: it has installed a digital radar system which scans for rain and snow within a 64-mile radius, and has named Blane Coulcher to be the first radio station meteorologist on Vancouver Island.
- Some items from along the CBC Radio network... CBNC Stephenville, NF, has ceased AM operations and been replaced by CBNC-FM... FM rebroadcasters on the drawing board include Bonne Bay, NF (1,000w on 89.1, ex-CBY); Northeast Margaree, NS (42w on 93.9, ex-CBI); Hearst (10,500w on 90.3) and Wawa, ON (890w on 90.7), both ex-CBON-FM Sudbury; Bonnyville (50,000w on 98.7, ex-CHFA Edmonton); High Prairie (50,000w on 90.9) and Whitecourt, AB (5,000w on 90.5) both ex-CBX Edmonton... And a rebroadcaster of CHAK Inuvik has been licensed for Aklavik, NWT. It will operate on 540 kHz with 40w, replacing a proposed FM rebroadcaster.
- CFTR Toronto has broken the longstanding record of CFRB as having the largest radio audience in Canada. 'RB, however, hopes that recent program changes will re-capture the #1 spot. Stay tuned!
- Publicity from CKVU-TV Vancouver tells us a recent episode of Stir Crazy was shot on the Capilano suspension bridge. Rumor has it that, even with that much suspense, the show is still being axed...

- New call letters for CJAZ are CKKS-FM Vancouver. The Selkirk station recently switched from a jazz format to MOR.
- The clock ran out on plans by Cariboo Central Interior Radio Inc. for FM operations at Burns Lake, Smithers, and Houston, BC. After it licensed the stations in Nov/82, the CRTC granted an extension to Nov/84, but has now rejected any further time to get the stations on-air.
- CFRB Toronto has altered its nighttime radiation pattern to improve service to the northwest—including major centres such as Bolton...
- Ownership of CFRC-FM Kingston has been transferred from Queen's University to an independent body known as Radio Queen's University, to comply with CRTC requirements. Also authorized: simulcast of AM and FM during student vacations.



THE BASICS By Bruce Dingwall



Part 3 of an in-depth look at AM Stereo -plus some timely technical tips

For the past two installments of *The Basics*, I have been describing the rather incredible and convoluted path by which AM Stereo came to be a reality. As well, I have been passing on things which I have learned about getting ready for AM Stereo, and making it work. It has been rather interesting, the calls and the mail which I have received on this particular series of articles. I'm very glad so many of you appreciate having this information pulled together like this.

More About Kahn/Hazeltine

Leonard Kahn has been very involved, first with the 'phone conversations I mentioned last issue. Then, a few weeks ago, he sent me a copy of the manual for his new STR-84 Exciter. This manual contains a wealth of information, not only about the principles of operation of his system, but also about the requirements for AM Stereo in general.

The Kahn system has obvious advantages for those with adjacent channel sideband interference problems. To set this down in his own terms, here, with Leonard Kahn's permission, is a quote from the introduction to the STR-84 manual:

(The Kahn AM Stereo system is) less sensitive to adjacent channel interference than even conventional monophonic reception. This unique feature, which makes use of the "cocktail party effect" known to physiologists, allows listeners to discriminate against interference by use of spatial selectivity. The Independent Sideband technique used in the Kahn/Hazeltine system places adjacent channel interference at the extreme ends of the stereo stage so that listeners can spatially discriminate against this type of interference.

However, there are still a number of points about the Kahn system which I want to discuss with Leonard Kahn, in order to make it clearer for readers of this column.

Motorola Responds

It had puzzled me that the Motorola people had not responded to this series; surely they must want to have some input into the discussion. As it had turned out, I had no sooner put these words on paper one evening, than I received a call from Frank Hilbert of Motorola the next day! He took issue with a number of points I had made in Part 13 (Sept/Oct/85):

One point with which he took exception was the statement that the C-Quam system trades the envelope detector compatibility problem for a complex stereo decode algorithm which can be optimized for separation or distortion, but not both. I asked him to express it his way.

He says that the use of the various adjustments in the C-Quam Exciter allows the user to trade reduced separation for reduced distortion, particularly in older transmitters which need help "cancelling distortion".

However, my question is, can the tradeoff be optimized to advantage in newer transmitters? I'll have to be shown the answer to that one.

 On another point, we discussed whether the C-Quam decoder, built around the M13020P IC, was an approximate or an exact decoder. He maintains that it is exact, up to 70%, single channel modulation; after that it becomes approximate, for the reasons I discussed in the last issue. Compromise? Finally, he told me that, after the FCC decision in favor of the PMX system, Motorola were going to look to changing their chip to operate on the PMX principles, but found various problems with the PMX system, revolving around sideband asymmetry

This problem is something of which I was only remotely aware. Apparently, though, it is severe enough to affect performance, particularly in Electronically Tuned Radios. As the units age, and the tuning goes off by 1 kHz or more, the anomolies become very scarce.

These anomolies have been perceived in the Delco road tests, predictably at certain points on a test route. No explanation could be given for their cause, nor their cure. It was at this point that Norm Parker and the boys at Motorola sharpened their pencils, and sought to improve their own system.

Platform Effects

Of the AM Stereo anomolies which have garnered the greatest amount of press, number one is probably "platform rotation" and "platform motion". Platform motion is something which I finally

50 Widmer Street Toronto, Ontario M5V 2E9 experienced with a Delco UX1 option radio in a 1985 Camaro I had as a loaner for a couple of days. It was due to reradiation off nearby hydro lines, and it was disconcerting!

When I put this to Frank Hilbert, he told me that Motorola were painfully aware of, not so much the problem, but the press it has received. In point of fact, they feel that AGC effects and loop following effects are far worse than any platform effects.

However, in response, during minor revisions to the design of the AM Stereo M13020P chip, a provision was put in to have the channels "blend" when the co-channel interference became greater than 8 per cent.

This is similar to FM Stereo receivers going to a "blend" mode when the signal strength becomes so low that the recovered audio is getting quite noisy. An interesting and effective solution, but will it work effectively?

I have asked for more details about C-Quam; in fact, I was very critical of Motorola for their failure to provide anything but materials that were either consumer bland, or far too theoretical for the average engineer to want to wade through. Hilbert has promised much more information; in fact, he has requested a meeting during CCBE/85. It is during that show that I hope to meet, on your behalf, with Leonard Kahn in order to clarify a number of basic points regarding his systems (1977 and 1984 versions).


It is my sincere hope, when we continue the discussion of AM Stereo, not to resolve the debate, but to give you the most accurate and honest interpretation of the information received in my sessions with these gentlemen.

Basics in Brief

 DIRECTIONAL ANTENNAS: Always on the lookout for books which contain fundamental information ("basics"), this one was brought to my attention by John McCloy: Directional Broadcast Antennas: A Guide to Adjustment, Measurement, & Testing by Jack Layton (TAB Books #733, 1974).

The book may be a bit dated, but that's no reflection on the good information contained in it, and the clarity with which Layton presents it.

- PERSONAL COMPUTERS: Bill Schofield called from CJIC-TV in Sault Ste Marie, to tell me about a PC clone he has found. It is available in kit form, and very reasonably priced. The ASC-1000 is available through Soltec in Vancouver, BC. Call or write to Bill for more details on the computer, and how his department likes it.
- GET THAT FOAM OUT: If you have a Continental 317C-2 (or similar transmitter) where the company who installed it lined the air intake/modulation transformer plenum with acoustic foam, get the foam out of there as soon as possible. It has a tendency to break down and become a sticky mess. It will also shred, and you'll find it throughout your transmitter.
- GUY ANCHOR CORROSION: If the guy anchors at your AM site are not buried in sand, but rather in clay or a similar congealing earth, better think about having them excavated and inspected. Reinforcing what Ernie Mott demonstrated in his talk at CCBE/83, the corrosion which can take place due to anerobic action is very startling and devastating. I do not know the situation as it pertains to FM or TV



transmission tower guy anchors, but at high-power AM sites, there may very well be problems. This information comes from a well-respected corrosion expert.

 WIRING SYSTEMS: There were some questions about wiring systems employed at CFRB. The technology of the Northern Telecom/ADC "66" series block has been employed by many stations, since it is cost effective, convenient and simple.

However, one of the things that I have seen done with "66" series blocks, which I don't like to see, is to put AC circuits on the blocks. Dangerous!

Also, I have seen some installations by one service company, where the gauge of wire employed was far larger than the "66" clip can accept. The result is an over-extension of the clip and resultant loss in jaw tension, leading to intermittants in the circuits. This is why I recommend staying with Cinch-Jones 140 and similar series terminal blocks, and compression lugs for power circuits and situations where wire gauges larger than #22 must be employed.

There is a new series of block from ADC, the Q66 series, which were reputed to take stranded and solid wire, and have a higher density than the NE-66, or even the smaller NE-66M series of blocks. One of the products in the lines was a connector block terminated in a 50-pin ribbon type plug. This new series would have the obvious advantages of reducing wiring time and connector block space requirements. However, due to quality control problems in the initial runs of this new product, ADC pulled it off the market. My sources tell me that it should be rereleased to market just about the time you read this.

Since many new pieces of equipment have low voltage and logic level control circuits, we are experimenting at CFRB/CKFM with the Northern Telecom BIX series of high density connecting blocks. Designed for the #22, #24 and #26 solid wire, our initial findings are that they will work nicely with #22 and #24 stranded wire as well. Besides being quite low in cost, the BIX series has the inherent design advantages of a "dead front" design (no exposed terminal clips), and high density. Since we are trying them in a current installation, I will report on the degree of success achieved with these new materials.

The two features are co-ordinated by Drew Marketing and syndicated under the direction of Dean Cooper, Seacoast Sound, Victoria... Radio producer Heikki Kuld moved from Sears to Leo Burnett... BBM, expanding its operations in Montréal, added Rodney Neander as an account exec...

At Broadcast News: Richard Neff was appointed Ontario regional editor, Toronto; Rose Jansen joined BN from CKEY-Newsradio; Anna Geddes became staff correspondent in Calgary; Gerald Weseen, sports editor at Toronto moved to the Halifax bureau and was replaced by Abe Hefter; Norman Jack moved from Toronto to Ottawa to replace Rick Gibbons, Parliament Hill veteran, now BN's London-based European correspondent; and Will McKenzie moved to Fredericton, replacing Heather Boyd, now western supervising editor based in Edmonton... Ron Moray, the former CHUM and CKEY staffer who became a major voice-over figure and with it a millionaire living in New York, plans to buy a U.S. radio station... Veteran broadcaster Peter Webb joined the Les Salnick rep firm ... Jerry Morton, who'd been an account exec with CFMT-TV Toronto, has returned as assistant national sales manager... In the U.S., top price for a prime time 30-sec. network TV spot now runs over \$175,000... WKBW-TV Buffalo sold for \$65 million...

The CBC plan for a broadcast centre to replace its 22 locations in Toronto seems justified. Describing the present situation, writer Gordon Donaldson calls Toronto 'the slum capital of broadcasting'... Doug Trowell, who retired as president of Key Radio, contributed much during his 39 years in the industry ...Pierre Nadeau says that Canadian content represents 70% of TV program costs, and only 30% of revenues; U.S. programs represent 30% of costs and bring in 70% of revenues... Halifax stations got more competition when WBLZ-TV Bangor, Maine, opened a sales office in the city... Where are they now? 





Audio Cartridge Eraser Splicefinder



The Sonifex HSE is an automatic eraser-splicefinder, based on the rugged CQ N.A.B. cartridge mechanism. The unit is compact, measuring only 3" × 6 3/8" × 10" deep, and operates at 95 cm/sec. It can be used as an eraser-splicefinder or as a splicefinder only.
