This Union of ours, which barred the entry into Britain of Louis Armstrong—who would have put no British musician out of work and would have monopolised no broadcasts due to British musicians, have sanctioned the visit of the New York Philharmonic contingent's one apiece. According to Union principles, this is actually taking fees away from our own nationals. The Americans were keen to avoid it when Sir Thomas Beecham went over there. As we have already stated, Sir Thomas declined to accept such engagements in case they affected American musicians adversely, But there is little doubt that in the absence of British good maners, as exemplified by Sir Thomas on that occasion, the American Federation of Musicians would have taken the most drastic action themselves.
